CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be known as the Dardanelle Baptist Association.

ART. 2 It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three Messengers; and churches with more than one hundred members shall be entitled to one Messenger for each succeeding one hundred.

ART. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, unless ordered by a two-thirds vote, at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. 4. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body according to parliamentary usage. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the printed minutes of every session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to the order of the body.

ART. 5. The objects of the Association shall be: 1. To promote fellowship among the churches, secure unanimity of faith, and cultivate the piety of its members. 2. To labor for Domestic and Foreign missions and encourage the circulation and reading of Baptist literature. 3. An especial object shall be to encourage and provide assistance for the rising ministry, and for this purpose to establish an institution of learning in our midst as soon as practicable.

ART. 6. This body shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever it may be necessary. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ART. 7. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted into this body upon their petitioning by letter and Messengers at our annual meeting, and by their Messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.

ART. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Association upon application at an annual meeting, for the purpose of forming a new Association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. 9. A quorum to do business in this Association shall consist of at least two-thirds of the Messengers who may assemble at its session.

ART. 10. This Association shall adjourn each day during its session for divine services.

ART. 11. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of this Association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members who are in attendance.

The Sunday School work is one of great importance. There is no part of the church work that has a greater influence towards making christian men and women of the rising generation than does a well conducted Sunday School. It is indispensable in the church or the preaching service, and therefore we need a more energetic and consecrated Sunday School people.

We notice from the reports of Sunday Schools in our association that only 16 churches have Sunday School. This shows that less than one third of our churches have Sunday School. This is lamentable indeed, and something must be done to awaken an interest in this important branch of our work.

We recommend that our pastors consider this matter

prayerfully, and make an effort to have a Sunday School organized and maintained in every church.

We also recommend that our schools use Baptist literature and elect Baptist teachers in every department when possible.

F. F. McDonald traveled 75 miles and preached 15 sermons. He was pastor at Delaware.

E. H. Gray reported 12 days work in McLain's Bottoms. Sermons preached, 9, miles travelled 240, collected on field \$17 30, was paid by Board \$12.70.

16. Appoint time and place of holding next session.
17. Adjournment to time and place of holding next session of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father Son and Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the scriptures of the Old and New Testament are a revelation from God, and that the New Testament is our only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in original sin by the fall of Adam.

5. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to rescue himself from a fallen state in which he is by nature.

6. We believe that the saints are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

7. We believe that the saints will be preserved in grace, and never fall finally away.

8. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that believers are the only proper subjects of Baptism; and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

10. We believe no minister has a right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel but one who has been regularly immersed, and that is called and comes under the imposition of the hands of a Scriptural Presbytery.

11. We believe that none but regularly immersed believers have a right to come to the Lord's Supper.

12. We believe that the Lord's day should be kept as a day of rest and devotional exercise.
