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

#### Forty-Fifth Session

Grand Prairie Baptist Association convened with Stuttgart Baptist Church, Thursday, October 16th, 1919, 8 P. M. After singing "Just When I Need Him Most," W. A. Rochell led in an earnest prayer.

After which a song "Higher Ground" was sung.

Talk by W. H. Gregory. Song, "Jesus Saves."

The time having arrived fo rthe Introductory Sermon, B. F. House, the appointee, read a scripture lesson, and H. W. Jean lead in prayer.

Song, -"Nearer My God to Thee."

B. F. House took as his theme, "The Church," preaching a help-ful sermon. Song—"Glory to His Name."

Moved and carried that Association adjourn until 9 a. m. Friday. J. T. Fowlkes was appointed to conduct devotional exercises.

Benediction by W. H. Gregory.

#### FRIDAY MORNING SESSION 9:00 A. M.

The Association was reconvened by singing, "How Firm a Foundation." Prayer by E. G. Stout. Song—"Revive Us Again." J. T. Fowlkes then read the 24th, Psalm, and Miss Elsie Harrison led in prayer. Song—"Leaning On the Everlasting Arms."

The Moderator called for the letters from the churches, and H. W. Jean and C. C. Lumpkin, were appointed to read.

These churches having adopted the "Articles of Faith" and "Rules of Church Government" as laid down in "Pendletons Church Manuel," the Moderator extended to their messengers the right hand of fellowship, and they were admitted into the body.

Moved and carried that the Association go into permanent organization.

C. W. Fox and H. W. Jean were placed in nomination for Moderator. A vote by ballot resulted in the election of C. W. Fox. In a few well chosen remarks the newly elected Moderator expressed his appreciation of the honor confered on him, and took the chair.

H. W. Jean was placed in nomination for Vice-Moderator. There being no other nominations the clerk cast the vote of the body for H. W. Jean. C. P. McGraw was elected Clerk, and J. H. Rounsavall, Treasurer, in the same manner.

#### ORPHANS' HOME

The report of the Committee on Orphans Home was read by W. F. Dorris, Superintendent of the Orphans Home at Monti-

cello. Report follows:

The care of the homeless, destitute orphans, is a part of the great world-wide Mission program given the churches by our Lord. Saving these unfortunate children is a most far-reaching work of mercy-an untold blessing to those rescued from a life of sin, and also a benediction to the state. To neglect this work, is to call down the certain wrath of Him who is "Father to the fatherless."

We have two Homes in the state. One Home at Monticello, and one at Texarkanan. Monticello Home has now 55 children. health of these children has never been better and they seem

happy and contented.

Teh Home of Texarkana, as we understand it, has between 30 and 40 children. So far as your Committee knows, the health of their children is good. Their Board of Trustees has sometime, purchased a tract of 160 acres of land and are trying to raise money to pay for it. Both these Homes are yours. They should have our sympathy, prayers and constant support: 1st, That our churches and pasters and Sunday Schools lay this great work on the hearts of their people, and urge them to see to it that these two Homes have adequate funds with which to carry on their work, and on a cash basis.

2nd. That our Sunday Schools make one Sunday in each month "Orphans Home Day," and send whatever offering is taken on that day to the Home they chose to support, and send it in prompt-

ly.

Send all money for the Monticello Home to Dr. E. P. Alldredge, 405 Donaghy Bldg., Little Rock, Ark., and all money for the Texarkana Home to Rev. J. W. Sims Marvell, Ark.,

#### HOME MISSIONS

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was read by G. W. Bray. Report follows.

We your committee on Home Missions make the following re-

port:

Home Missions is the basis of all other Missions. Since the home field is the source of all other Missions, we ought to lay the foundation well and cultivate the home field well. Our field is the Southern States, the Phillipine Islands, Cuba, and the section of country along the Panama Canal.

Much depends upon Southern Baptists. If this world ever gets

a pure gospel, we will have to give it to them.

Our Home Board forces did a great work last year. Our baptisms numbered nearly 40,000, and the number of additions to our churches through our workers was something over 59,000.

Brethren, if we raise the 75 Million Dollars, we ought to double

our work, and double the results.

God help us to be faithful.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by

H. W. Jean. The report is as follows:

Any just appreciation of the Foreign Mission Board's work and responsibilities and ayn effort to provide adequate resources for this work must be based upon knowledge and just consideration of the extensive fields which the Board is cultivating, the conditions on these fields, the variety of work that is bing conducted, and the necessities of the work which we have allowed to accumulate throught the years.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is charged with propagating the gospel in Japan, China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil, Argantina, Chile, etc. Such numerous and extensive mission fields put this work out of com-

parison with anything else we are doing.

On these fields there are vaster numbers of human beings than the human mind can grasp. The population in these lands mounts into the hundreds of millions,—some of them white, some black,

some yellow, but all of them the object of God's love.

The condition of these millions as compared with the people whom we know adds emphasis to the appeal of the great field and the great numbers. These multitudes whether in pagan or papal lands, are handicapped by ignorance and superstition, by physical suffering, and above all by aggravated sin for which they have found no remedy. If there is any pity in the Christian heart, it ought to be provoked by the deplorable conditions under which

millions of our fellow beings on these missin fields are spending their lives while we enjoy th blessings of the gospel and a Christian civilization which it has produced.

But we shall not properly appraise Foreign Missions if we overloog the fact that it includes the evangelization of the lost, the education of the ignorant, the training of the saved, the healing of the sick, the housing of feeble mission churches. Indeed, all that we are doing at home through state mission boards, home mission boards, education boards, orphanages, sanatariams and the rest we are doing throught the Foreign Mission Board. No adequate provision can be made for a work so extensive, so varied and comprehensive if we put Foreign Missions on a parity with any single Christian enterprise which we are conducting at home.

There is another fact, and a great fact it is, which must be taken into consideration if we are to meet our obligations to this great work at this time. The War immeasurably enlarged our international Christian duty. The heroic efforts and sacrifices which we made to set the world free from the extraordinary restraints of autocracy creates for us a new and larger duty to promote everywhere the internal constraints of the gospel of Christ. The unrestrained freedom of unregenerated human nature inevitably menaces the world. The extraordinary world situation which we have created with our guns lays upon  $\mathbf{u}_{\mathrm{S}}$  the most serious responsibility to send the gospel into all nations.

The Convention at Atlanta in May recognized the new obligations which this extraordinary world situation laid upon Southern Baptists and authorized the Board to undertake reconstruction work in Europe, to hasten with the gospel into disturbed and endangered Russia, and to set up the banner of Christ in Persia, Syria and in Galilee, from whence the blessings of Chirst's life and death have flowed down through centuries to us, and to which we are under peculiar obligations. In the new work thus designated for the Foreign Mission Board its task and its needs have been well-nigh doubled. Let churches and individual givers lay to heart these facts in making future contributions to this work.

It is fitting to say that as poorly as we have supported this great world enterprise, the blessings of heaven have been upon it. Some of the results of the work last year were 5,635 converts baptized, 41 churches organized, two churches assuming self-support, 61,588 patients treated, and 129,298 treatmnts administered.

The world fields are ripe unto the harvest, but much of the bending grain will be lost of we do not quickly thrust in the sickle. The world has never seen the universelsrla hrldu hrdlu rdluuuuu The world has never seen the universal human mind so expectant, so ready has never hrdlu hrdluu hrdlu rdlu rdlu rdlu rdlu rdlurdlu so ready to make great decisions, and therefore such need for quick and decisive action by those who would turn that mind to the right things and lead the world by the highway of the cross back to God. Foreign Missions duty was never si imperious as just now.

The Foreign Missions Board furnishes for free distribution the

best tracts and can fill orders for the best books on Foreign Misions. We would, therefore, recommend to our people that they cultivate an acquaintance with the Literature Department of the Board and seek to promote among our church membership a bet-

ter knowledge of the work.

While the 75 Million Campaign has been presented to the body in another report your committee on Foreign Missions would add its endorsement of this movement and its admonition to the churhes of the Association that there be no failure to give this Campaign the most unqualified, faithful and nthusiastic support. The success of the Campaign will help everything that we are doing and its failure would hurt everything. Wt have set for ourselves a task worthy of a great people and shall prove ourselves worthy of our inheritance if we accomplish it. The eyes of our Lord and of the world are upon us and we must succeed in this great thing to which we have laid our hands.

School as the teaching agency of the church.

We have come at last to recognize the fact that teaching the young people the principles and doctrines of Christ, leads to thir conversation in early life. It is estimated that 80 per cent of baptisms come from the Sunday School, and that a majority of those who profess conversion and unite with the church, do so between 12 and 20 years of age. We cannot lay to much stress on the work of the Sunday school.

The B. Y. P. U. is the training service of the church. It is the aim of the B. Y. P. U. to train young church members for service in the Masters Kingdom. The Motto of the B. Y. P. U. is, "We study that we may serve."

We carnestly recommend that a Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. be organized and zealously maintained in every church in this

Association.

#### CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be known by the name of Grand Prairie Baptist Association, and composed of members chosen by the different churches in the union, who, on producing letters, shall be entitled to seats; also the ordained ministers in good standing, retiring moderator and all committees appointed at one to report at the next.

ARTICLE 2. The motto of this Association shall be: "The truth in its purity, preached in every section of our bounds."

ARTICLE 3. The letters from the churches must state the number of members baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded, and the name and postoffice of pastor and clerk.

ARTICLE 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to infringe on any of the rights of the churches, but may act as an advisory council for the common good of all churches, and for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom, and have power to exclude any church from her fellowship which may depart from the Gospel of Christ, either in faith or practice.

ARTICLE 5. Each church composing the Association shall be entitled to three delegates.

ARTICLE 6. Should any church fail to represent herself for two consecutive years, she may be dropped from the list of churches should a satisfactory reason not be given.

ARTICLE 7. New churches may be admitted into this body who petition by letter and delegates, if found to be sound in faith and good order, the reception to be manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messengers:

ARTICLE 8. This Association shall annually elect a Moderator from among themselves, whose duty it shall be to see that the rules of decorum are observed and take voice of the association on all questions properly brought before it; also, a Vice-Moderator, and a Clerk and it shall be the Clerk's duty to keep a correct record of all the business of the Association; also a Treasurer, to receive and disburse funds sent up to the Association, as directed by the body of churches sending same.

ARTICLE 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to retain on the Minutes the names of all churches admitted to membership, until such are dropped by action of the Association, and in case of non-representation it shall be his duty to write, "not represented," in the proper place opposite their names in the statistical table.

ARTICLE 10. This Association shall in all cases be governed by a majority of the members present except in the reception and admission of a church, which shall be unanimous.

ARTICLE 11. This Association may correspond with other Associations and Conventions as may be agreed upon while in session.

ARTICLE 12. It shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a minister to preach an introductory sermon, with an alternate to preach a missionary sermon at each succeeding session; and to fix the time and place for the next meeting of the body.

ARTICLE. 13. The messengers assembled shall elect the Missionary; and the Moderator shall appoint, at each session, an Executive Board, consisting of at least one member from each church, whose duty it shall be in case a vacancy occurs between the sittings of the Association, to elect and employ a missionary or missionaries.

ARTICLE 14. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, except that clause in the fourth article which prohibits interference with the internal rights of the churches, which shall forever remain intact.

ARTICLE 15. The Minutes shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1 The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be elected by ballot by the members present.

ARTICLE 3. The Moderator shall be considered the judge of order, but any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the body.

ARTICLE 4. The Moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speaking as other members, but not to vote, unless it is a tie.

ARTICLE 5. All questions shall be introduced by motion, and if seconded, shall be opened for discussions, unless withdrawn by the mover or the second. When a subject has been discussed a reasonable length of time, the Moderator shall, when the question is called for, proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and nays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.

ARTICLE 6. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or make personal reflections.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than once upon any subject until all who wish to speak have had opportunity, nor more than twice without permission.

ARTICLE 8. Every subject introduced shall be decided before another is offered, unless it is laid over by motion, with the consent of the mover and the Association.

ARTICLE 9. The names of messengers shall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

ARTICLE 10. The appllation of "Brother" shall be used in addressing each other.

ARTICLE 11. Any member violating these rules shall be subject to reproof of the Moderator.

ARTICLE 12. Amendments or alterations may be made to these rules when majority may deem it necessary.

ARTICLE 13. Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by general parlimentary rules.
