### PROCEEDINGS.

#### Friday Morning Session.

Pursuant to an adjournment Stevens Creek Baptist Association convened at Mount Hope Church, at 10 o'clock a.m., October 12th, 1900. Officers present, R. T. Middleton, Moderator, and G. H. Davis, Clerk, and Treasurer absent. The Moderator appointed L. Ray Clerk and Treasurer pro tem.

Adjourned to meet at 2 p. m.

#### Afternoon Session.

After singing, and prayer by R. L. Lafferty, the body was called to order. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. G. N. Joyner. Text, 2d Corinthians, 2: 17.

The first order of business was calling for letters from the churches comprising the Association. The following churches reported: Union Hill, Mount Hope, Holly Springs No. 2, Holly Springs No. 1, Salem and Independence.

#### Saturday Morning Session.

The Committee on Sunday Schools made the following report:

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, submit the following report: We must truly say we consider the Sunday school work to be one of most importance, as important a subject as could be brought before a body of Christian workers. Having been engaged in Sunday school work more or less for the last fourteen years, we can say there is no better place to instruct the young and rising generation, in the true principles of christianity, than in the Sunday school. Weekelieve every church could and should have a good Sunda;

school at all times, and try to get young and old, especially little children, to take part in the work. Just think what a vast amount of good might be accomplished if every child in the bounds of this association should attend Sunday school every Sunday and there be taught the principles of christianity as laid down in the bible. It would be one of the greatest powers in the world in christianizing the world. We would urge the pastors of this association to insist that each church organize and maintain a Sunday school all the time, and report its results to this association at its next meeting. May God help us to be alive to this work.

Hence every consideration connected with man's duty to God and to his fellow men, makes it obligatory upon us to send and carry the gospel to those who are without it. This is an age of marvelous energy and great activity in missionary effort, and we are glad to know that the Baptist denomination is accomplishing much in this mighty work. Our Home Board is prosecuting its work with increasing vigor in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and sends the gospel throughout this field according to the means placed in its hand. The Foreign Board is carrying on its work with commendable zeal, but is somewhat handic apped for the lack of funds. missionaries in China, Japan. Brazil, Africa, Mexico and Italy. We do not know the amounts that have been raised during the past years; we are convinced that the amounts raised are far short of the demands. We would respectfully urge the necessity of a campaign of education on the subject of Home and Foreign Missions. What the people need to prompt them to duty is information. To this end we would recommend the placing in the hands of our people such literature as is best suited to that purpose, and that the pastors of the churches preach on the subject of missions as often as may be advisable, and every effective instrumentality not contrary to the Word of God should be used to waken our interest on this Respectfully submitted. subject.

#### Constitution.

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers from the churches hereunto subscribed, being thoroughly convinced of the great utility of Christian combination, in order to cultivate and perpetuate union, love, tellowship, and intelligence throughout the respective churches within our bounds, and to advance the Redeemer's kingdom in these parts of the country, do unammously agree to adopt the following articles:

ARTICLE 1 Name - I'ms Association shall be known as the Stevens Creek Babtist Association.

- ART. 2. Messengers—The messengers composing the annual meetings shall consist of messengers sent from churches.
- ART, 3. Number the messengers from each church shall not exceed three.
- ART. 4. Meetings -The association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall have been previously appointed.
- ART. 5. Officers The officers of the association shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by a majority at the annual meeting.
- ART. 6. Objects -This association shall have no power to control or regulate the internal affairs or discipline of any church, but it may adopt and recommend all such measures as may be best calculated to produce harmony and prosperity in the churches and advance the Redeemer's kingdom; advise and gonsult upon such matters as the church may at any time time present for its consideration and advice; and may receive churches into the fellowship of this association in good order, and may dismiss by letter when in good order; inquire into the state of religion within her bounds, and any church holding any unscriptural doctrine or practice shall be reported to the association, and on proof shall be excluded from the association, and the cause be placed on the minutes. The association shall not exercise any legislative power over any of the churches, but shall be a common bond of union of the same.
- ART. 7. Amendments—No amendments shall be made to this constitution except by a request of the churches.
- ART. 8. This association shall have no power to make any appropriations of money, only as the churches may direct.
- ART. 9. That no church in this association shall receive members from any church of our faith and order without a letter, or until the church from which they might come shall first have been declared out of order by a council of other churches.

#### Rules of Decorum.

- ARTICLE 1. This association shall commence with religious exercises and a sermon from some preacher who shall, have been previously appointed, unless the association shall otherwise direct.
- ART. 2. The moderator of the previous session shall preside, and the former cierk shall act, provided they attend, until the letters from the churches connected with the body shall have been read and the moderator and clerk elected.
- ART. 3. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over the meeting during the session, and he shall have a right to speak on all subjects by calling a member to the chair, and shall not be entitled to a vote except in case of a tie.
- ART. 4. The committee on finance shall receive all money appropriated by the churches and report to the association the amount, and place it in the hands of the treasurer.
- ART. 5. A committee of arrangements shall be appointed at the commencement of each session, whose duty it shall be to regulate the order of business.
- ART. 6. The churches shall designate their messengers and report their condition by letter.
- ART. 7. Preaches in good standing of our faith and order, when attending the annual meeting, shall be invited to seats with us, and have the right to speak on all subjects that come before the body.
- ART. 8. Any member may speak three times on the same subject under debate before the meeting, but ho oftener without leave, and when speaking shall stand and address the moderator. No member shall absent himself from the association during the session without leave.
- ART. 9. Any person who shall violate the constitution or rules of decorum shall be reported to the church for disorderly conduct.

#### Articles of Faith.

ARTICLE 1. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and it is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and shall remain to the end of the world the true center of Chris-
