The Tigers met the Muleriders on the Tiger field for their first AIC game. Turner's talented toe saved the day for Ouachita as the Tigers downed the Muleriders from Magnolia 21-20. The game was just as close as the score indicates.

The Tigers drew first blood as James Johnson recovered a blocked kick on the A&M 14 yard line. From this point Sanders carried the ball into the end zone. Turner kicked the extra point, and Ouachita led 7-0.

After the kickoff, the Muleriders carried the Ball to the Tigers 20; then with a pass to Wallace to make the rest of the yardage, and a kick by Cathy, the score was 7-all. The Muleriders recovered a Tiger fumble on the kickoff, and Cathy tore

around barely making the 29 yards; Cathy again kicked for the extra point, and Magnolia led 14-7. After a nice run by Dial, a pass by Raper, another run by Dial, and a pass to Kirkpatrick for the touchdown, and conversion by Turner, the score was 14-all.

After their first AIC win over A & M the Tigers journeyed to State Teachers at Conway where they were beaten 39-14 in a toughly fought game that saw State Teachers get all the breaks and not turn one away as they constantly knocked at touchdown's door.

Ouachita made 2 first downs past mid-field in the opening quarter and threatened to go all the way but a Tiger fumble and a State recovery on the Tiger 33 stopped that. Three downs later the Tutors carried the ball across the double stripe. Again early in the second quarter, the Tutors got the ball on the 12, and Stephens carried it across. Late in the second quarter, Grizzle intercepted one of Raper's passes on the

25; four plays later, De Vazier went over from the one. The Tutors recovered a Tiger fumble almost as soon as the ball was kicked and went 15 yards into the end zone. Just before the half Smith made an 85 yard run on a punt return to give the Tigers their first score. Turner kicked the goal and the half ended 26-7 in favor of State Teachers.

In the third quarter the Tutors scored twice, leading 39-7; the Tigers made a gamble late in the fourth when Harris passed 40 yards to Corley and then Smith and Kirkpatrick, carrying the ball over from the 4. The game ended 39-14 with the Tutors coming out on the long end of the horn.

arkansas state 20 ouachita 0

Arkansas State went all out in the first half of a game played in a downpour of rain on a sea of mud to score 20 points and hold on the rest of the way to beat the Tigers in their third AIC game.

State opened the scoring in the first quarter after a sustained 85 yard drive. McGuire scored the second touchdown midway the second quarter; the final score came late in the second quarter when the Tigers

bottled up on their own one yard line kicked to the 46; two plays later, McGuire raced over for the final score. The final half saw both teams bogged in the mud, and resulted in a punting duel between Ouachita's Turner and State's Reid; Turner kicked 9 times for an average of 30 yards, Reid kicked 5 times for an average of 36 yards.

little rock junior college 21 ouachita 14

Coming back from a 7-7 deadlock at the half, Little Rock Junior College came through to a 21-14 defeat over the Ouachita Tigers. Paul Kirkpatrick pulled through a 68-yard run around end to go over for paydirt. A Raper-to-Sanders pass connected for the other TD. Both Turner conversions were good.

Bobby Spann, Jaycee quarterback at-

tempted to ground the pigskin on his own 19-yard line while the clock registered less than sixty seconds. However, the officials said the Spann knee did not touch the ground and then the Tiger eleven took over. Desperate passes came from Jamie Raper, OBC frosh quarterback, but all fell incomplete.

arkansas tech 27 ouachita 21

Ouachita dropped a hard fought battle to Tech 27-21 but it wasn't until the final gun that the game was decided. The Tigers fought hard and were even on the verge of scoring as they were in the middle of a long drive that had placed them on the 8 yard line, when the final whistle sounded.

The Bengals racked up the first score early in the first quarter on a sustained drive that ate up 55 yards. Keith Dial ripped over from the one for the score and Turner converted and the Ouachitonians in the stands began to cheer their Tigers more than ever.

But the Tech machine began working in the third period when Jimmy Albright flipped a short pass to Voris Johnson who scored from the 10. Jack Elliott toed the extra point. On the kickoff, Laverne Lewis pulled the run of the night when he tucked the ball under his arm and galloped 93

yards for a Bengal score. Turner converted to put Ouachita in the lead 14-7.

Again Tech's machine started working and after driving to the 35, Jack Simpson streaked 35 yards for the score. Elliot's kick was good and the score was 14-all. Following the exchange OBC bogged down. Jack Wilkins, fleet Tech end, knifed through to block the Tiger boot and score another Wonder Boy tally. Elliot then missed his first conversion try and for the first time Tech led 20-14. Still the Tigers wouldn't give up as they covered 50 yards to the Tech 18 in the fourth period. Kirkpatrick went over from here and Turner's kick made the score 21-20 as the Tigers again went into the lead. Later, Tech's Simpson uncorked an 88 yard sprint to add six points, and Elliott toed the extra point. The Tigers again threatened, but the gun ended the game with Tech in the lead.

The Ouachita Tigers scored in all four periods to hand the Poteau (Okla.) Junior College Buccaneers a 42-0 licking at A. U. Williams field. It was a field day for the Bengals, who for the first time of the season were rated as pre-game favorites.

Ouachita crossed the goal twice in both the second and third quarters and once in the first and fourth. Poteau crossed into pay dirt only once — on a 37 yard pass play during the first.

Ouachita's Turner split the uprights six times to boost his personal record of extra point conversions to 25 straight. As

for scoring, a different man made each touchdown. OBC scored first at the end of a 52 yard drive with Smith going the final 20 yards; the second came after a drive of 36 yards, with Plumlee crashing over from the 2. A Raper-to-Thomas combination, good for 63 yards made the third score; Stark plunged over center from 9 yards for the fourth; a 54 aerial play—Kenny Taylor to Kirkpatrick was good for the Tiger's fifth score; OBC took over on its own 31 and drove 69 yards to score in the final quarter, with Dial going the last 12 yards on a slice off tackle. Turner kicked his sixth extra point to make the final score 42-0.

Some 5,000 fans, standing around the edge of the playing field, watched Anderson pass for three touchdowns and set up another with an 81 yard run as the Arkansas A & M Boll Weevils gained their first victory ever over Ouachita.

Anderson started the Weevils off to the lead with a 10 yard touchdown pass to Dicken; Parker kicked the first of his five conversions. Then in the second quarter, Anderson produced his second and

third touchdown passes for the Weevils. Parker lunged over to score for the Weevils in the fourth; Burt raced 60 yards in the fourth to put the ball on the 16, then went the rest of the way from scrimmage on the next play.

Corley pulled in a 32 yard pass from C. E. Harris for Ouachita's second and last score in the fourth quarter. Turner kicked good for the extra point.

b a s k e t b a l l

In a dedication tilt in the Cabot High School gym, the *Ouachita College Tigers* came out on the small end of a 63-49 score against the *Arkansas State Teachers College Bears*. Cecil Malone was high-pointer for the night with 20 points, followed by Roger Waggoner's 14; for the victors was Davis with 17.

The Bengals dealt the *Arkansas A. & M. Weevils* a 48-45 blow in the first home game on the Baptist court. Ouachita's men were hitting good the first half which ended in their favor 26-12. The Tigers went over to victory after taking an early lead and then were never left behind.

Not being able to find the basket on either free throws or field goals, the *OBC Tigers* went down to defeat before the

Southern State Riders 85-44 on the Rider court. Twelve of the Baptist's points were secured from the free throw line. C. E. Harris and Malone were both off for the night's encounter with only 8 points each. Waggoner took the honor with 10. Thomas of the hosts was way out with 23 followed by Benefield with 21.

For a pre-Christmas game, the *Tigers* journeyed to Conway to take a 65-47 defeat from the *Hendrix College Warriors*. Malone and Harris paced the OBC quintet with 13 and 12 points respectively. Both teams fouled heavily during the game with Hendrix aggressors with 28-21. However, Hendrix made only 9 of the charity tosses while the Baptists connected with 15 accurate ones.

Manual Whitley paced the *LRJC Trojans* over the *OBC Tigers* in a 65-58 battle in the Capitol City. The Bismarck lad accounted for 24 of the Trojan markers. With six minutes left in the half, Malone took the ball deep in Jaycee territory on an intercepted pass, dribbled the length of the court and scored, to knot the score at 24-all.

Making a fine performance for an away game, the *Tigers* went down before the *ASTC Bears* 73-64. Malone, OBC's ace forward from London, took top scoring honors with 30 markers, highest individual record for a Tigerman or any of the *Tigers'* opponents in the season as of this game. Nunally and Fain of the Bears showed up with 15 each.

Using only one substitution, Branham, and that only for just a few minutes, the *Ouachita College Tigers* downed the *Henderson State Teachers College Reddies* on the HSTC court 63-57. C. E. Harris led the *Tigers* with 29 points, Malone followed up with 13. Harris had a scoring mate with the Henderson's Bobby Reese who took 27 of the Reddie markers. Roy Glenn Green, last season's all-stater, was held down to a bare record of 6 points. Close guard-

ing was also put on Malone, the man on whom the Tiger coach put his stakes for AIC all-state. The Bengals led 29-23 at half-time. Late in the last half, Bill Groce of the Reddies put the ball in for a 42-41 count, the Baptists leading. Bill Vining pulled the *Tigers* out in front on a jump shot. Harris kept shooting the Masterful shot of his, and the final score ended 63-57, *Tigers'* favor.

Putting on a one-man show, Cecil Malone racked up 21 points to push the *Ouachita* quintet to a 49-43 victory over the *LRJC* five on the Tiger court. The *Trojans* put out a great defensive play on the *Tigermen*, but Malone just couldn't be stopped. Fouls made numbered 26, but only 6 of them were missed—Vining's 3, Malone's 1, and two for the Jaycee team.

The *College of the Ozarks'* five put over a 48-42 victory on the *Rab Rogers'* coached *Tigers*. Waggoner and Harris were the big noise for the losers with 13 and 12 points respectively while Rex Yerby and Dennison yanked out 18 and 14 markers for the victors. *Ouachita* led at halftime 24-22, but didn't get back onto the winning streak in the last.

Arkansas College's Highlanders took a sixth AIC victory at the expense of the *OBC Bengals* 81-58 on the Batesville court. During the first eight minutes of play the Scots took a 19-5 advantage. Ouachita's only hope came in the form of Malone who added 28 of the Baptists' counters.

Ouachita just couldn't get started against the *Arkansas State Indians* who smarted out a 84-53 shellacking. Holmes and Benson kept the Indians out in front even at halftime when they led 46-28. Neither man, though, topped OBC's Malone for top honors who pulled out 24 from the rack.

Arkansas College connected with both field goals and free throws to throw a 70-56 defeat to the *Bengals*. Malone took individual honors for the night's play with 26 markers while Harry Neff and P. Shell shoved 17 and 15 points, respectively, through the net. The Scots overcame a commanding lead for the first half of playing and then came back later for victory.

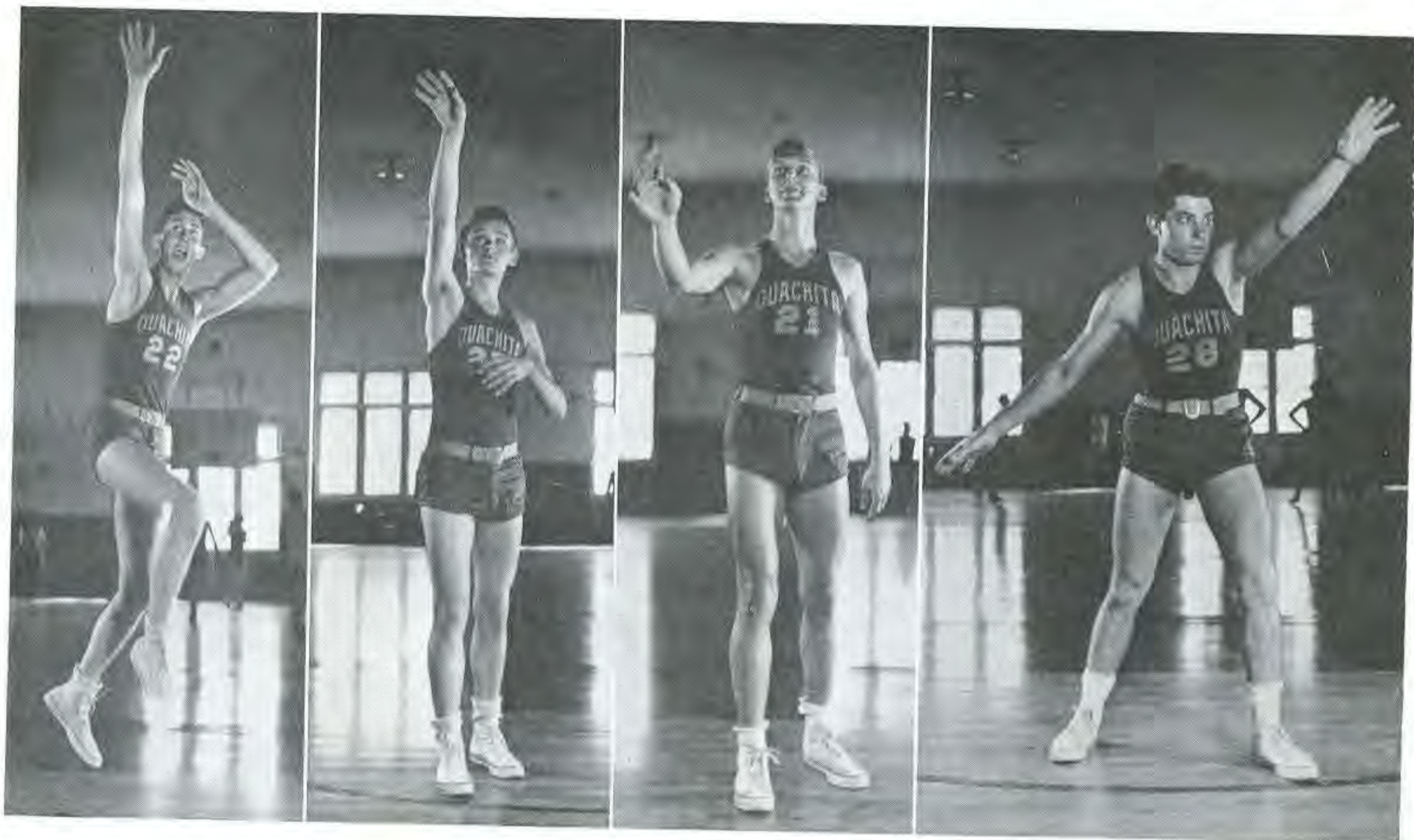
A true upset came in the form of *Ouachita's* triumphing over the oh-so-powerful *ASTC Bears* of Conway on the Arkadelphia hardwood 66-63. A Bear drive went for a 22-15 lead but was quickly upset by the working of Waggoner, Vining and

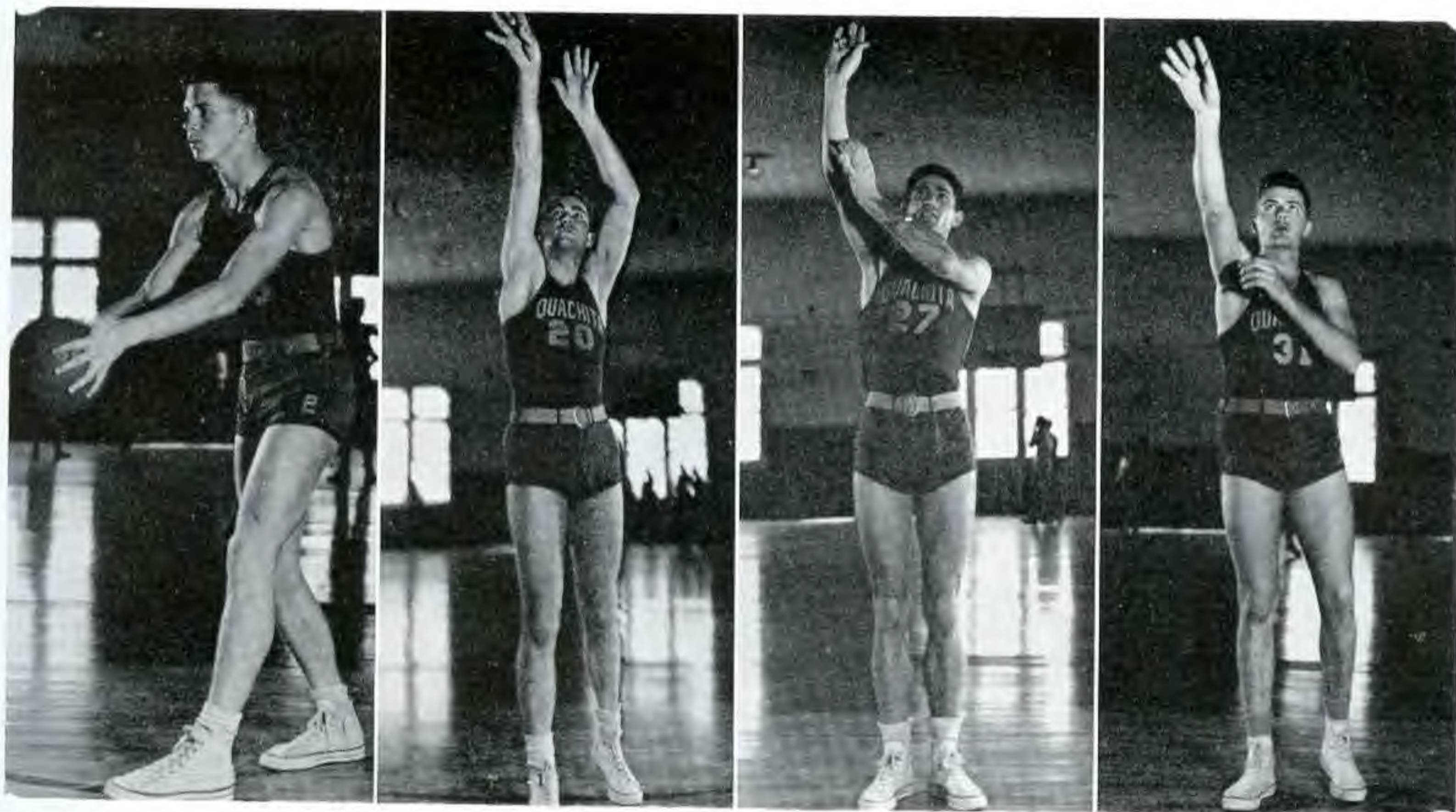
Malone who pulled a 27-all tie with only a few seconds remaining in the half. The Tigers never gave up hopes for a victory and went out on the big end of the score. Dillard of Teachers was a brilliant performer with 14 followed by Davis' 12. Malone took 26 with Vining coming up with 17.

In a benefit tilt the *Ouachita Tigers* eked out a 57-51 victory over the *Nowlin Furniture Independents* of Arkadelphia. The Independents were composed of several college formers and an all-stater in the form of Bob Jacobs from Ozarks who netted 18, followed by "Copper" Davidson, former OBC player, who made 16. Malone came next with 15 for the hosts.

The *Ouachita College Tigers* humbled before the *Arkansas Tech Wonderboys* who rubbed in a 106-69 defeat. Deward Dopson's 28, and 42 points split between Ruff and Carmack were too much for the Baptist men. A duel between Dopson and Malone resulted in Dopson's edging him out by 6 points — the amount that Dopson made during the first half. The 100th Tech point came just before Dopson fouled out. Waggoner's 12 and Harris' 17 helped to bolster the Tiger team.

A former Ouachita player led his adopted team over the Tigers when the *Arkansas A.&M. Weevils* downed the *Baptist* quintet 77-56. Boyd Miller led the attack with 20 markers, but OBC's Malone led in individual scorings with 24. Harris backed him up with 14.

What seemed like a sure AIC victory for *Ouachita* turned out to be an 80-71 defeat from *Southern State's Muleriders* on the Baptist hardwood. As the final two minutes started the 'Riders went all out for the victory with desperation drives by W. T. Watson, Bob Keck and Rayford Benefield. Malone shot for 24 with Keck's coming almost abreast with 23, followed by Thomas 21.

Three *Arkansas State Indians* went out on fouls, but *Ouachita* couldn't keep apace and went down 79-68. Malone went high for scorers with 23 followed by Harris' 17. R. Scott topped the victors with 19 markers. Johnson's and Malone's four fouls each had to be taken under consideration in the last minute attempts for victory.

Making a record for high scoring in his own column this season, Cecil Malone shoved 34 points through the mesh only to be topped by Dopson with 38 while the *Tigers* took a 96-63 licking at the hands of *Tech*. The Tigermen worked on the

zone defense program for the night but just were not up to the playing of the AIC champions.

Malone made a second-timer of 34 points in two consecutive nights on the road and when he led *Ouachita* to a 72-55 win over the *College of the Ozarks Mountaineers*, Ouachita led all the way holding a 34-25 lead at the half. Ed Johnson, fake artist, came up in scoring and tallied 19 for the night's encounter. Yerby and Denison paced the C of O quintet with 19 each.

After tying the score 11 times and changing leads 9 times, the *HSTC Reddies* went statistically — officially — to a 61-59 win over the *OBC Bengals*. Elgie Goss put in a two-pointer and the Reddies were successful in freezing the ball in the few seconds that remained in the game. Henderson's high pointer was Roy Green with 12 while Malone went over with 28 (including the two free throws which were not counted until after the game's result had been termed as "official"). Ouachita led at halftime with 38 to the Reddie's 30.

And after this game, Cecil Malone, Ed Johnson, Paul Kirkpatrick, and Bill Vining wrote the end to their AIC basketball careers.
