

CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION.

The following amendments to the Constitution were proposed. The change in Article 2. was unanimously agreed to. That in Art. 4. by a vote of 26 to 4.

Resolved that Articles 2. and 4. of the Constitution be changed as follows:

Article 2. Be changed so as to make provision for a financial exhibit of the work done by the churches of the Association.

Article 4, Be changed so as to read. Every church of this Association shall be entitled to three messengers, except such churches as have a membership over 100, these churches shall be entitled to one additional messenger for each 50 members over 100 or for a major portion thereof.

Committee on Orphan's Home inadvertently admitted, and instead of a Finance Committee, the messengers voted to turn over all funds brought to the meeting, directly to the Treasurer.

INTRODUCTORY SERMON.

At this point the body called for the Introductory Sermon, which was preached by Eld. O. L. Hailey, the regular appointee, from Matt. 28;16 to 20, following this a voluntary collection for Associational Missions was taken, amounting to \$4.30,

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The report was read by O. L. Hailey, the chairman, Rev. J. B, Sellman read his report as missionary,

A motion was made to adopt, and after remarks by O. L. Hailey, J. B. Sellman, G. B. Rogers, J. W. Brewer, the report was unanimously adopted as follows;

To the Texarkana Baptist Association:

Dear Brethren: After several efforts, the Boald met at New Boston on March 27, 1901, and according to your instruction elected a missionary—Rev. J. B. Sellman at a salary of Fifty (\$50) Dollars a month. He was to begin work April 1st, and continue till the meeting of the Association. He was given the general instruction of this body as set forth in your report on Associational Missions, last year and found on page 7, of your minutes.

We then made application to the State Board of Missions for assistance to the amount of One Hundred dollars, which was promptly allowed. And we desire at this time to publicly express our appreciation of their generous help.

Bro. Sellman has been a diligent, and we believe a valuable missionary from the first until now. He has kept himself in constant correspondence with the Board, through its chairman, and has sought counsel at every important step. We commend him most heartily and his work. For the particular, we refer you to his report, submitted herewith, and made a part of this report.

During the year we have held three successful Fifth Sunday meetings, as follows; New Boston in March, Tennessee in June and Hubbard's Chapel in Sept. If it is the pleasure of the Association that such work be continued, it might be helpful for the body to say so.

At the June meeting, the Bo rd was advised that Bethel Church would find it inconvenient to entertain the Association at this session, and after conference with the Moderator, and upon invitation from this, Pleasant Grove church, we issued a call, changing the meeting from Bethel to this place, obliving that the churches would approve of our action.

During the year we have secured copies of the minutes of this Association complete, except the first year, and the years 1891, 1892. And the thanks of the body are que to Rev. J. R. Alexander, of Troy, Bell Co., Texas, for some years the honored Moderator of this body, for most of these minutes. We venture to suggest the advisability of appointing a Historical Committee, who shall write a succint history of this body, and from time to time print its report in the minutes.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We would respectfully invite the attention of the Association to the following points:

1i That our Executive Board consists of five members together with the Moderator and Clerk of the body, who shall be ex-officio members of the Board, and that it be located so that a quorum may be easily gotten together.

2. That in each church some brother or sister be chosen, by the church to co-operate with the Board.

3. That the Board be instructed to employ a missionary who shall labor within our bounds, and that he be secured with as little delay as possible, so that he may labor during the whole year.

And that the Board be authorized to make application to the State Board of Missions for the sum of \$200.00 to help defray the expenses. And that all our churches be asked to make liberal contributions to the support of an Associational Missionary.

Miss Ada Bentley, representing the "Cottage Work" at Baylor Female College, was presented and spoke of the work in which she is engaged. and a voluntary offering was made, amounting to \$9.35 which was turned over to her at the moment.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS,

Report read by W. P. Bankston, and upon motion to adopt. remarks were made by O. L. Hailey, J. P. Teeguarden and the report adopted.

We your committee on Sunday schools report as follows:

The Sunday school work throughout this Association, as shown by the reports, has improved to some extent this year, but not so prosperous yet as should be. The literature is good. The foreign assitance is good, so the fault certainly must rest upon us, in not zealously doing the work in Sunday school capacity, hence we recommend that more leaders and teachers be sought out, and strengthened with that spirit, go.

EDUCATION.

The report read by J. B. Lumbley and upon motion to adopt remarks were made by J. A. H. Granberry, J. B. Lumbley. G. B. Rogers and report adopted as follows.

We your committee on Education report that we are glad to note with much pride, the great success of the Missionary Baptists; in educational work. Our correlated system of schools is without a parallel in history. We have, in Texas, six colleges under our system. Last year about 2,000 pupils were enrolled in these colleges. During the last fifty years 30,000 workers have been sent out to tless this state and other states and foreign countries This great host of educated men and women, to some extent accounts for the fact, that Baptist people of Texas have a hundred thousand more members than any other denomination. Our success, to a great extent, depends upon the dissemination of the right kind of information. Intellectual and moral training go hand in hand in lifting the human race to higher living. 'I hese correlated schools own property to the amount of \$750,000 with but 52,000 indebtedness. This \$52,000 has not yet matured, but an opportunity is before us to liquidate tuis indebtedness. Two brethren offer to pay \$10,-100 each provided the denomination will raise the other \$32,000. Still anothcr ten thousand dollars has since been provided for, and practically only \$22,000 is to be raised by the denomination to entirely relieve the denomination of this burden of debt after which, our energies can be directed toward the permanent endowment of these institutions. But these three thousand dollars are promised only on condition that the denomination raise the oth er twenty-two thousand dollars. Shall we see the liquidation of this indebtedness fail and lose this three thousand dollars or shall we raise the twenty. two thousand dellars and free the schools from debt? We recommend that this Association do what she can in paying off this debt.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The report was read by W. M. Bridges, and pending adoption, he spoke on the question. And the report adopted,

God's command to go into all the world is still binding upon the churches—our obligation to obey is as great today as when uttored by the Master him self. The field is still the world, and is riper unto the harvest, than ever between the question of all questions—go ye into all the world is still ringing in our ears—the obligation to give light to those who sit in the region and shadow of death is as pressing as it was when the Savior went back to heaven. The prison doors must be opened—the shackles of bondage must be broken and the liberty wherewith Christ makes free, must come as God has appointed and commanded—no change of purpose or shifting of responsibility has marked the ages for these 1900 years; and it will remain unchanged until the last battle is fought with sin and the last victory won.

GOD'S METHODS.

God's methods, in his purpose to evangelize the world, are also unchanged. How shall they believe on him of whom they have not heard and how shall they hear without a preacher, and how shall be preach, except he be sent? He who ignores God's methods of grace, ignores his purpose of grace. Consecrated men and women and money will be needed and must be sent by the churches as long as God has a purpose to save. The churches of God must ever remain the pillar and ground of the truth—must hold the truth and send it forth as doors are opened and opportunities are offered—He that refuses to co-operate in this work of the churches, turns his back on 1900 years of history that God has sanctified and smiled upon with his protecting power to save.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS,

The report read by C. B. Williams. Pending a motion to adopt C. B. Williams addressed the body. J. W. Brewer indicated that he had something to say that might be calculated to reflect upon some one or something of which he did not choose to tell

the body until the collection should be taken, the following motion was unanimously adopted. That G. B. Rogers, representing the State Board of Missions shall have the privilege of the closing address on this subject. And further remarks were made by J. W. Brewer, J. B. Lumbley, W. M. Bridges and G. B. Rogers. Bro. Rogers took a collection in cash and pledges amounting to \$76, and the report was adopted.

STATE MISSIONS.

192 missionaries have been on the Texas field for the last year. This is the largest force on the field of Texas at any time. Last year the work was conducted on a \$50,000 basis; 40 of the missionaries are colporters sowing the state in gospel and Baptist literature, 4 of them are general missionaries, visiting and preaching in different parts of the state.

The State Board aids weak churches, but urges them to become self-supporting as soon as possible. It is beginning to appropriate funds for building new church houses in destitute localities. It conducts the work of Old Ministers Relief. It represents the Home and Foreign Boards in Texas, to which Boards the state gave \$32,000 in 1900 and hopes to secure \$40,000 for 1901.

The State work has pushed the Education Commission, especially in the earlier months of the year, thus giving Texas Baptists the finest Baptist schools in the South.

The total expense of the State Board, including the pay of Superintendent, bookkeeper, stenographer, traveling expenses, postage, interest, etc, is less than 7 per cent. that is, over 93 cents of every dollar given, goes directly to the object specified by the giver.

The past year has been one of universal prosperity in the state work. Many Sunday-schools and churches have been organized and hundreds upon hundreds of souls have been converted on mission fields, and in countless ways the smiles of God have rested on the State work in 1901. Therefore, let us

- As pastors preach and practice the giving of the truth, as Baptist hold it to the Empire State of the south,
- 2. As churches of the Texarkana Association let us join heart and hand in spreading the gospel from the Rcd River to the Rio Grande, from the Indian Territory to the Gulf.
- 3. As individuals let us follow the example of those liberal souls who are giving their money and influence to sow the state with seeds of truth and make it blossom as the garden of our Lord.

CONSTITUTION

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Christ in the States of Texas and Arkansas, having been baptized upon a profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union amongst us and preserve and maintain a correspondence with each other. We, therefore, propose to maintain and keep the order and rules of an association according to the following plan:

1. The association shall be composed of members chosen by different churches in our association who, on producing letters from their respective

churchee certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

2. The letters from the different churches are to express their members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored and dead since last association; also inscribe on the backs of their letters the name of church, postoffice, delegates, pastor and clerk, and shall present a financial exhibit of what monies have been expended by them in the Lord's cause.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall be known as the Texarkana Missionary Baptist Association, who shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe on any of the eternal rights of churches in the association, but shall be considered an advisory council in matters respecting their internal concerns, for the benefit of all such churches; but the association shall have power to exclude any church from its body who shall violate or deviate from the rules of the orthodox principles of the gospel.

4. Every church in this association shall be entitled to three delegates or messengers, and such churches as have a membership of more than one hundred, churches shall be entitled to one additional messenger for each fifty members, or major portion thereof, over the first hundred members. And should any church fail to represent herself, she shall state her rea-

sons in her letter to the next association.

5. New churches may be admitted into this association, who shall petition by letter and delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the association, and the reception thereof manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

6. This association when convened, shall be governed by regular and

popular rules which they are authorized to form for themselves.

- 7. The association shall elect a moderator from among themselves by ballot, whose duty it shall be to see that the Rules of Decorum be attended to and take the vote of the association in all questions properly brought before it and to organize the next association; also a clerk, whose duty it shall be to take proper and correct minutes of the proceedings; also a treasurer, whose duty it shall be to receive and disburse all money coming into his hands as directed by the association, giving and taking receipts for the the same, and make a report of the same to the association.
- 8. The association shall in all cases be governed by a majority of the members present except in the reception of new churches, which shall require a unanimous vote.
- 9. Every query sent by a particular church must be included in her letter, certifying that she has eudeavored to settle it, but could not; in which case the association shall take it under consideration and give its advice.
 - 10. Business which immediately concerns the association at large, when

sent by a particular church as from it or handed in by a member shall be taken up and decided as soon as opportunity will admit,

11. The association shall correspond with other associations as may be agreed upon when in session.

12. The association shall elect one of her ministers and his a ternate to preach the introductory sermon at the next association.

13. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of her proceedings.

14 Amer dments to this constitution may be made at any time when two-

thirds of the messengers composing the association deem it necessary.

15. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected (if neces-

15. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected (if necessary) and signed by the moderator and attested by the clerk before the association adjourns.

16 The association shall at each annual session appoint a Missionary Board, which shall choose its own officers, which shall consist of a president, vice president, clerk and treasurer. Said board is required to report at each session of the association,

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction: that it has God for its author, salvation for its ene, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is the true centre of Christian union and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried.

Art. 2. We believe there is one and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the maker and supreme ruler of heaven and earth, inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every Divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

Art. 3. We believe that man was created in holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from the holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint, but by hoice, being utterly devoid of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil, and therefore under just condemnation to eternal without defense or excuse.

ruin without defense or excuse.

Art. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the appointment of the Father freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin, honored the Divine law by his obedience and by his death made a full atonement for our sins; and having risen from the dead he is now enthroned in heaven, and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections he is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate and all-sufficient Savior.

Art. 5. We believe the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification, and justification includes the pardor of sin and promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done but solely through faith in the Redeemer, by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state

of most bles ed peace and favor with God and secures every other blessing

needful for time and eternity.

Art. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial, penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel, which rejection involves him in an aggravated con-

demnation.

Art. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration consists in giving holy disposition to the mind is effected in a manner above our comprehension, by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel, and that it proper evidence appears in the holy

fruits of repentance and faith, and newness of life.

Art, 8. We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God. whereby being deeply convicted of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition. confession and supplication for mercy, at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our prophet, priest and king, and relving on him

alone as the only and all-sufficient Savior.

Art. 9. We believe that e'ection is the eternal purpose of God according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners, that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end, that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love prayer, praise, trust in God and active imitation of his free mercy, and that it encourages the use of mean- in the highest degree, that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance, and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost dilligence.

Art. 10 We believe that sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of his holiness; that it is a progressive work: that it is begun in regeneration, and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the sealer and the comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means especially the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and

praver.

We believe that such only are real believers as endure to the Art. 11. end: the persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the power of God through faith

unto salvation.

We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable Art. 12. rule of his moral government; that it is holv, just and good, and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is one greatend of the gospel and of the means of grace connected with the establishment of the v sible church.

We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the

gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by his word; that its only Scriptural officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the epistles to Timothy and Titus.

Art. 14. We believe that Christian baptism is immersion in water of a believer, into the name of Father and the Son, and the Holy Ghost, to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Savior, with its effect, in our death to sin and regeneration to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which members of the church by the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self-examination

Art. 15. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreation; by the devout observance of all means of grace, both private and public, and by preparation for that rest

that remaineth for the people of God.

Art. 16. We believe that civil government is of Divine appointment for the interest and good order of human society, and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed, except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of con-

science and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

Art. 17. We believe there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and sanctified by the Spirit of our God are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and under the curse, and this distinction holds among men; both in and after death.

Art. 18. We believe that the end of the world is approaching; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave for final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men

in heaven or hell on principles of righteousness.


