## Minutes:

The 24th Annual Session of the Buckner Baptist Association of Western Ark., met pursuant to adjournment with Glendale Church in Logan County, Ark., on Saturday, the 20th day of October, A. D., 1894, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Come together by singing; Bro. J. H. Anderson read the first fourteen verses of the first chapter of I. Corinthians; prayer by Bro. J. H. Anderson. The Introductory sermon was preached by Bro. J. H. Anderson; text, 8:26 Acts of the Apostles, followed by W. P. Hall.

The Moderator appointed a committee on preaching, consisting of the ministers and deacons of Glendale church with Bros. Wm. Trusty

and James P. Stephens committee.

The Moderator appointed a committee on enrollment, viz: Bros.

James Edmondson, W. L. White and B. D. Barnes.

A motion prevailed to adjourn till 1:30 p. m.; benediction by W. P. Hall. At 1:30 p. m., the body come together by singing; the Moderator read the 16th Psalm; prayer by Bro. James Edmondson; called for the letters from the different churches of this association; the Moderator appointed Bros. James Edmondson and W. L. White to read the letters from the different churches composing this association. The Moderator appointed Brother D. C. Yeargin to take the vote for Moderator; Brother James N. Pennington to take the vote for clerk, and R. T. Little to take the vote for treasurer. After the vote was taken Elder R. P. Claborn was declared Moderator, Bro. G. P. Watkins, clerk, and Elder James Edmondson, treasurer on permanent

organization of the body.

Called for petitionary letters, received one from Hackett City church. Motion and second that Hackett City church be enrolled in this body as one of our churches; carried. Notion and second that the other four petitionary letters from Ross C. ck, Smyrna, Pleasant Valley and Shady Grove Churches be received ato this body, and the right hand of Associational Fellowship gion to their messengers. Carried. Call for correspondence. Brethron James N. Pennington, T. A. Rippey and D. C. Yeargin reported as correspondents from Concord Association. Motion and second that the correspondents from Concord Association be seated. Carried. Motion and second that Brother John Condrey be seated as a messenger from Dayton. Carried. Motion and second that Bro. A. J. Rippy, of the Concord Association, be seated in this body, adopted. Motion and second that Bro. T. H. Ward be seated in this body as a messenger from Souloh church, carried.

Motion and second that the money for Home Missions sent in by the different churches and the collection on the Sabbath, be applied to liquidate the debt that this body owes to Bro. R. P. Claborn for past services as missionary of this body.

ing at 10 o'clock Sunday morning.

Motion and second that this body adjourn until 8 o'clock a. m.,

October 22; carried. Benediction by R. P. Claborn.

Sunday Morning, 10 o'clock a. m.—Prayer meeting conducted by Bro. R. R. Pace; prayer meeting dismissed for 11 o'clock services; at 11 o'clock a. m., Bro. W. P. Hall read the 9th chapter of I. Corrinthians. The missionary sermon was preached from the 9th chapter and 9th verse of I. Corrinthians, followed by Bro. James Edmondson.

The missionary collection on the Sabbath was, home missions, \$8.65; foreign missions, \$4.00. Benediction by Bro W. P. Hall, At 2:30 o'clock p. m., preaching by Bro. D. C. Yeargin; text, 3:9 of I. Corrinthians. Dismissed without the benediction. Preaching at night at Glendale by Bro. John Young; text, 3:14-16 of St. John; benediction by Bro. John Young; at Hickory Grove by Bro. T. N. Watkins, followed by Bro. Anderson; text, 10:9 St. John. At Long Ridge, Rro. R. L. Bean, followed by L. W. Linsey. At Center Point, by Bro. B. F. Haddock, followed by B. F. Hall. At Ferguson's School House, by Bro. James P. Stephens.

The committe on Circular Letter made their report; moved and second that the letter be received, read and printed in the minutes of

this body, (for report see appendix J,) carried.

Monday Morning, Oct. 22.—Met pursuant to adjournment; come together by singing. The Moderator read the 15th Paslm; prayer by Bro. D. M. Bryant; minutes of Saturday and Sunday read and approved; the roll was called and corrected. Motion and second that Bro. D. M. Bryant be seated as a visiting Baptist, also Bro. R. R. Pace as a visiting Baptist; carried. Called for correspondence, Bro. John Young reported from Dardanelle association; motion and second that Bro. John Young be seated as a corresponding messenger from Dardanelle association. carried; called for reports of committees.

The committee on religious literature made their report and was

adopted as read.

Motion and second that speeches on reports be limited to five min-

utes; carried. (See appendix A.)

The committee on temperance made their report; after some discussion on the report the report was adopted as read. See appendix B.

The committee on foreign missions read their report; motion and second that we receive the report; after some discussion the report was adopted as read. For report see appendix C.

11 o'clock a. m.—Bro. T. N. Watkins preached the 11 o'clock sermon; prayer by Bro. T. N. Watkins; text, 16-17:14 St. Luke, followed

by Bro. James Edmondson; foreign mission collection taken up and received \$6 10; benediction by Bro. T. N. Watkins; adjourned until 1:30 o'elock p. m.

At 1:30 the body ome together by singing; the Moderator read

the 34th Psalm; prayer by Bro. T. A. Rippey.

The committee on home missions read their report; moved and second that the report be received; adopted as read. See appendix D.

The committee on nominations read their report; moved and secand that the report be received; the report was adopted as read. For report see appendix E.

The committee on Sunday schools read their report; motion and second that the report be received; motion and second that the report

be adopted; the report was adopted as read. See appendix F.

The committee on deceased ministers read their report; motion and second that we receive the report; motion and second that we adopt the report; the report was adopted as read. For report see appendix G.

Committee on finance made their report; motion and second to receive the report; the report was adopted as read. For report see ap-

The treasurer made his report which was examined, found to be

correct and was adopted as read. For report see appendix I.

Then an an old fashion song was sung, and the parting hand was given to the the body; it was a joyful time; many of the brethren were happy, and many cups of joy were full and running over. Psalm. 8th verse: "Ask of me and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." Also in Acts 4:12; Romans, 10:14-15. We believe that our ministering brethren should preach more on Christian giving, so they may be better instructed. We know that they do not all understand what God demands at our hands. We further recommend that the pastors, in the bounds of Buckner Association of their respective churches, preach a sermon in November on support of Foreign Missions, and with the deacons of their respective churches, take up a collection for Foreign Missions, to be turned over to the financial agent of the general association.

#### CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Hebrews were an agricultural people, and the masses received what we should call a common school education; with this the Levites, the hereditary teachers, blended instruction in Sacred history and the precepts of religion. Students were taught their duties to their God and their country. Thus were lessons of principles and patriotism firmly implanted in the breasts of the young Hebrews, the results of which were shown in such heroic men as Gideon, Sampson and others, who rose up from time to time, in the dark days when nationality and religious fervor waned and

idolatry became prevalent.

The Phænicians who, like the Hebrews, were Semites, occupying a little territory a hundred and fifty miles long and fifty miles broad, have by their superior education, influenced the world's history; its sacred books constituting the Bible and its religion, moulding the faith of the most progressive and civilized nations in the world. In modern history the truly great men have been fostered in institutions noted for their higher grades of morality. Tis true, that some of our nation's statesmen owe all their greatness to the superior training of a mother, but it must not be forgotten that those mothers have themselves been trained in such institutions as have been mentioned. God has given to man such a natural upward bearing, that in all nations men look instictively to those above for guidance. In heathen lands they turn if bold, to their chiefs to lead them on to deeds of blood; or if submissive, they bow before them to return thanks for the provilege of breathing in their presence. The same spell of influence in enlightened lands is thrown by those who are superior in power over those beneath them. The energy of the world is directed by men of higher education. How great then are the duties of each generation in this matter to posterity. The utmost possible efforts should be made in every age, not only for procuring a higher Christian education, but for perpetuating it forward if we as Baptists love one denomination and desire to see it extend its borders, increase its members and rise in the scale of mandeur and power, let us look beyond a common school education; untie our purse strings and give to our sons and daughters a higher Christian education, thereby elevating them above the mist and log of the valley, high up on the mountain side where cool fountains burst forth and gentle breezes play. Who can say that there are not now being fostered within the bounds of this Association, boys, who if properly educated, would come as champions of our faith, and trumpet-tongued, lead hundreds of souls to God and to glory. Oh, my brethren! if you love your church, if you love your country, blend with the education of your children, like the Hebrews of old, principles of patriotism and religion. By so doing you will not only wreathe your names with greatful remembrances in the hearts of your descendants, but you will be performing a duty which you owe alike to your country and your God, and in your decling years you will have the sweet satisfaction of seeing your offspring filling high places in church and state, thereby reflecting untold happiness and honors around your last hours.
