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

OF THE

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

FAYETTEVILLE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

The Association convened with Shady Grove church Sept. 5, 1903 at 9 o'clock a.m., and after a chapter of the Bible was read, and prayer by Elder J. A. Smith. On motion Elder D. L. Hood was elected Clerk protem, the regular Clerk A. L. Thompson being absent.

2 o'clock p. m.—Association again met and was called to order by the Moderator. After singing and prayer by Elder J. A. Stone the Association then proceeded to organize by electing I. M. Phillips Moderator and C. W. Walker Clerk.

Rules of Order read by Moderator. Petitionary Letters called for-none.

Elder Crawford and the messengers of Shady Grove church were appointed Committee on Divine Service. Circular Letters read by brother Denham, which appears elsewhere in these minutes; letter after being amended by

substituting \$500.00 for \$300.00 was adopted.

Visiting ministers invited to seats in the Association: brother J. F. Love Secretary of State Missions, brother O. D. Slaughter, H. C. Winstead, W. E. Flenor, C. J. Lester. Johnson Crawford, G. P. Hanks and J. F. Parker accepted the invitation. Brother Carr assisted by brother Hood appointed to fill the pulpit, at this, Shady Grove church at 7:45 p. m.

of sickness in his family.

Report of Committee on Orphans Home read, discussed by brother Hanks, Helpler and others and afterward adopted.

Collection for Orphans Home \$10.45 and at School

house \$14.55.

Also \$2.55 turned in by brother Parks.

Recess until 3 p. m.

Association met at 3 p. m. pursuant to adjournment opened with prayer by brother Hambee.

Committee on Temperance presented their report which was read and after discussion participated in by brothers Carr, Crawford and others was unanimously adopted.

Adjourned to 7:45.

Association met at 7:45 p. m. pursuant to adjournment. Introductory to the regular service of the hour 20

minutes were spent in song and prayer.

Sermon of the evening preached by brother J. H. Milburn, text "Except ye be converted and become as little children ye cannot enter into the kingdom of heaven Sermon Conversion.)

At 8 o'clock a. m. Monday morning the Association

met pursuant to adjournment.

Report of Committee on Assocational Missions was read and after discussion by brothren H. P. Green, W. B. Brogden, C. O. Farmer, Helpler and Denham, and after amendment was adopted. The Association then went into the election of a missionary for the ensuing year; brother J. Crawford was put in nomination and unanimously elected.

Report of Committee on Ministerial Education, after discussion was tabled.

Report on Foreign Missions, discussed and adopted.

Recess until 11 a. m.

At 11 o, clock a. m. brother Moss preached a most excellent sermon, taking as his text, "I will look to the hills from whence cometh my help," Ps. 12-1. On motion the Association took a recess until 1:30 p. m.

The Association met at 1:30 p. m. and after service of song and prayer resumed the regular order of business.

Circular Letter.

Your committee on Circular Letter submit the following setting forth the condition, needs and remedy for the laxness and apathy among the churches of this Association. We have studied somewhat carefully the field, the natural and contiguous advantages, the necessity for the country churches, and the need of more careful and thorough work among them. We have come to think, not to much of the work in our towns, but too little of the work in the country and rural districts. In expecting great thing for carrying on the missionary work in State, Home and Foreign fields, it is very natural for us to look to the larger and more thoroughly organized churches in our towns and cities, but why should we not as confidently appeal to the country churches? If men will give to missions when they move to the towns, why did they not give before? This question has forced a study of the condition of the country churches. We find many of them in an exceedingly primative state. In some instances almost wholy without development- Some of our churches have no Sunday school, and most of our country churches have no prayer meeting, and a collection for any of our great missionary enterprises meets with little or no response. Such a condition we believe greatly hinders the progress of the Baptist demonination in Washington Co.

2nd We believe the first great need of this Association is, pastors who will develope the churches. Pastors who feel in a great measure the responsibility of soul winning, and who are not only acquainted with the fundamental principals of the gospel, but who can preach the whole gospel, and esteem it neccessary to the develop-

ment of the churches.

The second need is, churches that will be satisfied with nothing less than capable fearless efficient pastors, who will lead them to the greatest usefulness in our Lord's

service. Churches that will pay their pastors a reasonable compensation for their labors. We can expect little from churches that are not interested enough in the cause of Jesus to pay the men who labor and sacrifice for them.

3rd We need more money to help us reach the destitute points in our Association. The past year has been a successful one. Our missionary has done faithful and efficient work. For the year to come we need \$500. and we appeal to every church in Fayetteville Association to come to the help of our board in this work.

4th The remedy, First, Better pastoral support, there are churches of 50 to 100, members in our Association that pay from \$10 to \$25 for pastorial support, and if the pastor looses a day, dock him for it, these same churches are able to pay from \$75 to \$150, per year.

When our churches awake to their financial re-

sponsibility then may we expect great things of God.

An another remedy is, Pastors who will lay before their churches the great enterprises of the denomination and ask for a collection for the work we have undertaken.

Pastors who are interested in the work in the broader sense and who will post themselves on the achievements of the lord in State. Home and Foreign Missions, will not fail to develope the spiritual side of their churches. To this end may the year to come be more successful. Respectfully.

ARTICLES OF CHRISTIAN BELIEF.

I .- OF THE SCRIPTURES.

"We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, Salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried."

II .- OF THE TRUE GOD.

"That there is only one true and living God, whose name Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth: inexpressibly glorious in holiness, worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; equal in every divine perfection and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption."

III. -OF THE FALL OF MAN.

"That man was created in a state of holiness, under the law of his maker; but by voluntary transgression for from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice, being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, wholly given to the gratification of the world, of Satan, and of their own sinful passions, and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defence or excuse."

IV .- THE WAY OF SALVATION.

"That the salvation of sinters is wholly of grace; through the Mediatoria! Offices of the Son of God, who took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored law by his personal obedience, and made atonement for our sins by His death, being risen from the dead. He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful personal the tenderest sympathies with devine perfections, is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate and an all sufficient Savier."

V .- OF JUSTIFICATION.

That the great Gospel blessing which Christ of his fullness bestows on such as believe in Him, in Justification; that Justification consists in the pardon of sin and promise of eternal life, on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through His own redemption and righteousness; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

VI. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION.

"That the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate-duty of all to accept them by a cordial and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, except his own voluntary refusal to submit to the Lord Jesus Christ; which refusal will subject him to an aggravated condemnation."

VII. - OF GRACE IN REGENERATION.

"That in order to be saved, we must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind, and is effected in a manner above our comprehension or calculation, by the power of the Holy Spirit, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel: and that its proper evidence is found in the holy fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God."

VIII. - OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE.

"That election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with that end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it is ascertained by its effects in all who believe the gospel; is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves, demands and deserves our utmost diligence."

IX. - OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS.

"That such only are real believers as endure to the end; that their persevering attachment to Cnrist is the grand mark which distinguishes them from mere profes-

sors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation."

X .- HARMONY OF THE LAW AND GOSPEL.

'That the law of God is the eternal unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arise entirely from their love of sin to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the means of grace connected with the establishment of the visible church.'

XI. -- OF A GOSPEL CHURCH.

"That a visible Church of Christ is a congregation of baptised believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by His laws; and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only proper officers and Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus."

XII!-OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER.

"That Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Spirit; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, the purifying power of faith in a crucified, buried and risen Savior; that it is pre-requisite to the privileges of a church relation; and to the Lord's Supper in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by a solemn self examination."

XIII. - OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH.

"That the first day of the week is the Lord's day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all labor recreations; by the devout observance of all means of grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest which remaineth to the people of God."

XIV .-- OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT.

"That civil government is of divine appointment, for

the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed, except in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the prince of the kings of the earth."

XV .-- OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED.

"That there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death,"

XVI. -OF THE WORLD TO COME.

"That the end of this world is approaching; that at the last day, Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgement will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or helf, on principles of righteousness."

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be composed of Messengers who shall be members of the churches they represent (except such as may be invited to seats by consent of the body) and shall be styled the Fayetteville

Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II.—This Association shall meet annually on Thursday before the ind Sunday in October, at the place previously appointed, and after public worship, reading the letters from the churches and acting upon those soliciting membership, a moderator and clerk shall be chosen from the messengers by the voice through tellers both of whom shall hold their office until others shall be elected.

ARTICLE III.—It shall be the duty of the clerk to make an accurate record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Association, in a book provided for that purpose. He

shall also act as treasurer.

ARTICLE IV .- The churches shall each send not more

than three messengers who shall present letters certifying their appointment and briefly expressing the state of the churches, their increase and decrease and their aggregate number. Each church shall send with their letter money

for printing the Minutes.

ARTICLE V.—Churches wishing to unite with this Association may apply by letter and messengers and upon giving satisfactory information of their being sound in character and correct in practice and Faith, they may be received by a unanimous vote in token of which the moderator shall give to their messengers the hand of fellowship in behalf of the Association. Churches may be dismissed upon application.

ARTICLE VI.- We acknowlege the independence of the particular churches and that no authority or jurisprudence is to be exercised over them by this Association, nor will the Association decide in any controversy that may arise in any hurch. Nevertheless they deem it their duty to disown any church belonging to this body which may have

essentially departed from Faith.

ARTICLE VII.—When a church shall neglect making any communication to the Association for three years successively it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us and shall be dropped from the Minutes of the Association, unless at least two members request their standing and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII.—This Association shall have the right to open and hold correspondence with other Associations as

may be deemed expedient.

ARTICLE IX.—It shall be the duty of the Association from time to time to suggest to the several churches such measures as may be deemed wise and proper to promote the interest of the Messiah's Kingdom and spread the gospel throughout the world.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. At every meeting of the Association, business

shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. Ministers present invited to seats with us, may debate on all subjects before the Association but shall not vote on any.

3. Those who speak shall rise from their seats and address the Moderator, and shall cast no personal reflections.

4. No motion shall be discussed without first being seconded.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association unless withdrawn by the person who made it.

6. Any question susceptable of division shall be

divided at the request of any member.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes unless it be so ordered at the time.

8. No person shall speak more than twice on the

same subject without leave of the Association.

9. All questions brought before the Association for action shall be decided by a majority of the members present.

10. No member shall absent himself during business without leave of the Moderator, nor leave the Association;

if so, his name shall be left off the Minutes.

11. The Minutes of each session of this body shall be read and approved before the rising of the Association and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

12. That it shall be the duty of the Association to make arrangements for the preaching of two or more ser-

mons on each day during her session.

13. These rules of order shall be distinctly read from the chair, immediately after tue organization of each thereof.

14. Alterations or amendments may be made to these rules of order, at any subsequent regular session of this Association.
