## PROCEEDINGS

Pearson, Ark. Sept, 18, 1919.

### Thursday Night

None of the officers or the preachers of the introductory sermon were present, so Dr. L. E. Barton of Little Rock was asked to preach.

### Friday Morning

- 1 In the absence of the moderator the body was called to order by L. C. Langley, H. L. Waters clerk pro tem.
- 2 Letters from following churches were read: Pleasant Ridge, Pales-

tine, Mt. Hebron, Mt. Olive, New Bethel and Heber Springs.

3. The following officers were elected by association: Moderator L. C. Langley, Pangburn, Clerk and Treasurer H. L. Waters; Heber Springs

4. Dr. L. E. Barton of Washington County Association and Miss Una Roberts of Greenbrier Association, spoke briefly, both were present in the interest of the 75 million campaign.

5. Motion carried that Dr. L. E. Barton be asked to preach at this hour.

6. Benediction-Adjournment to two o'clock, (sun-time.)

7. Following song and prayer, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator.

a. Miss Una Roberts was given time to discuss "Womans work as related to the 75 million campaign."

10. Report on Foreign missions was read by Dr. Barton and H. L. Waters was adopted as follows.

Foreign missions, like Home missions and all other gospel work, is based on the universal atonement Christ made for sin. Anyone who believes John 3-16, "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that who soever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Believe in foreign missions. "He is the propitiation for our sins and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world," is John's way of expressing the world wide missionary doctrine. To reject Foreign missions is to reject the authority of God's word.

If the gospel is not for all the world, it is not for any of it. A gospel that can't save all men, who believe it can't save any man. Baptist have a peculiar duty to carry the gospel to all nations. To withhold the gospel is to try to defeat the plan of God for the world and make the death of Christ of no effect.

Southern Baptist gave last year about one million two hundred thousand and for Foreign Missions. Arkansas Baptists gave only \$32,000.00 in their



regular contributions to Foreign Missions last year in addition to this Bro. and Sister G. W. Battons of Texarkana gave one hundred thousand dollars, the largest amount ever given up to that time by any Southern Baptist to this cause.

We have about eleven hundred missionaries and native ordained preachers and helpers on the Foreign field. The Southern Baptist Convention has missions in China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Argentina and Mexico. This work needs two million dollars this year to maintain it on its present basis.

Six hundred thousand dollars of the amount Arkansas raised in the 75 million Campaign now on will go to Foreign Missions.

Foreign Missions is the hope of the world and we must enter into it with new zeal and liability if we want to make Christ king.

### FRIDAY NIGHT

17. After song and prayer by Joe Stark, meeting was called to order by Moderator.

18. Sermon by H. L. Waters on "Some Fundamental Baptist Principles which need emphasizing in our day."

19. Report on Home Missions was read by A. A. DuLaney and after discussed by him was adopted as follows:

## HOME MISSIONS

The value of the work of the Home Mission Board is inestimable. The strength of the Foreign Mission influence depends, primarily, on our home base. The results of last year's work are gratifying.

The gospel has been carried to the Indians of Oklahoma and New Mexico, to the Mexicans in Texas and New Mexico, and good work has been done in Cuba.

Our schools that are maintained by the Home Board, are not only training Mexicans, Cubans and Indians, but our own children of Arkansas are reaping the benefits from our mountain schools at Maynard, Mountain Home and Blue Eye. The Board is establishing and promises to maintain a College at Jonesboro, Arkansas.

In view of these facts, we, your committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That our people of this association raise more than \$500. per year for Home Missions.
2. That we make greater efforts to inform our people of the things accomplished by our Home Board, and the needs of the Board for greater power. A. A. DuLaney, A. J. Patterson and G. W. Hazlewood, Committee.

## SATURDAY MORNING

21. Called to order by Moderator at 9:45. Devotional exercises led by Bro. Joe Stark. Bro. Stark recognized as a visitor from United Association.

22. Report of Committee on Christian Education was read by A. A. DuLaney, and after discussion by A. A. DuLaney and H. L. Waters was adopted as follows:

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our Baptist schools are training our Christian forces. The untrained soldier is not able to cope with the trained soldier of the enemy, so it is with the soldier of the cross. This is a day of efficiency, a day of experts and specialists. We must have trained leaders and workers if we would do the best work and get the greatest results.

Our schools need more equipment, more teachers and larger funds for endowment. At present, there are five schools, Ouachita College, Central College, Mountain Home College, Maynard Academy and Mont View Institute, that are maintained within the borders of Arkansas. Nearly a thousand students attended these schools last year.

We, your committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That the Baptist of this association raise more than \$5000 within the next five years for our schools.
2. That we send more of our boys and girls to our Baptist schools.

24. Report on publications read by E. M. Patterson, and after discussion by E. M. Patterson, A. J. Patterson, L. C. Langley and Joe Stark was adopted as follows:

We your committee on publications be leave to submit the following: The great question confronting Arkansas Baptist is how can we arouse the members to their duties. We feel that our State men and our Universities have done a wonderful work along this line during the past year. Arkansas Baptist are more eager to do and give than ever before. We are pleased to know that they are willing and eager to give when called upon if they have been properly instructed.

We recommend that each church induce its members to take and read the Advance and Home and Foreign Fields.

We also recommend that our minister lose no opportunity to urge upon every Baptist the duty of taking the Advance, as it is a wonderful instructor for Baptists. Respectfully Submitted by E. M. Patterson, George Clay, Willie Childers.

25. Report on State Missions was read and discussed by H. L. Waters, was adopted as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS

Last year was the greatest year in the history of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. In spite of the war and the awful epidemic of the Influenza, more than \$62,000. was raised which has been wisely spent in the employment of missionaries and enlistment men, the supplementing of pastor's salaries and the supporting of our Mountain schools. More converts were reported than ever before, yet the great task has by no means been accomplished.

All other missions and benevolences depend on State Missions, where State Missions are neglected other denominational enterprises lag behind.

Associational missions are very closely related to State Missions in the 75 million campaign, these two interests are to receive \$700,000. This looks like an enormous sum, but when it is remembered that this is for five years and covers both State and Association missions the amount is not so large. In fact, counting only 80,000 cooperating Baptist it means .03½ cents per week.

We urge that ever Baptist get behind State missions with his prayers and means and we believe that when he knows the destination of our state, he will do so. Respectfully submitted by H. L. Waters, W. M. Floyd, Allen Price.

Believing as we do, that prayer is a most essential part of christian work and that we are taught that "The prayer of the righteous availeth much," we would recommend that all the churches take a greater interest in the prayer meeting. We trust that one year hence every church within our bounds will report a good prayer meeting.

30. Report of committee on Stewardship was read and discussed by H. L. Waters and adopted as follows:

### REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP

One of the outstanding doctrines of God's Word which was long undiscovered and about which there is much misunderstanding is the doctrine of Stewardship. This, in brief, means that we and all we possess belongs to God and that we are only Stewards and are responsible to him for our Stewardship.

We recommend that each Baptist make a careful study of this Scriptural teaching, and where possible classes be formed for this purpose, and that he subscribe to the 75 million campaign in view of his stewardship.—H. L. Waters, J. W. Davis, E. M. Patterson.

31. Report of committee on Orphan's Home was read by E. M. Patterson and after discussion by E. M. Patterson and Joe Stark was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHAN'S HOME

We your committee on Orphan's Home, beg leave to submit the following report:

The Orphans Home at Monticello has been in existance for 23 years, and has been a wonderful blessing to the orphans of Arkansas. The seeing after the orphans in this way will develop many boys and girls of the state into noble men and women, who otherwise would be drags through life.

The policy of placing the orphans in private homes has proven successful in some respects, as it gives room for more who have no homes.

When the children are placed at Monticello, they are provided for with the best of care that can be had in the way of food, clothing, schooling and the teaching of God's eternal truth.

We are planing to do some more improving this year in order that the orphans may be held there instead of placing them in private homes.



The monthly offerings of churches and Sunday Schools have proven a great success and we urge that each Church and Sunday School continue this process. We feel that this is one of the grandest institutions of our state and feel that it is each persons duty to aid it in every way possible. Respectfully submitted by E. M. Patterson, J. W. 32. Report of committee on Sunday School was read by G. W. Norman and after discussion by J. B. Stark, Joe Stark, E. M. Patterson, Dr. Beasley, G. W. Norman and A. A. DuLaney was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

Our Baptist people neglect the study of the Bible, "We perish for lack of knowledge." A regular systematic study as is given in our Sunday School lessons, is very beneficial. If one will follow the outline for daily readings, he will not only be benefited by the information and inspiration gained but will contract a very splendid habit.

Therefore, we, your committee, recommend the following:

1. That our present Sunday Schools be enlarged and better organized.
2. That the churches that do not have Sunday Schools organize them and enlist all members and their families and all others possible. Respectfully submitted by J. B. S. Stark, J. J. Nored, G. W. Norman Com.

33. Report of committee on Associational missions was read by A. A. DuLaney and after discussion by A. A. DuLaney, G. W. Norman, Joe Stark, was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

It has been several years since the Little Red River Association has had a missionary. No one can deny the fact that we need one.

We have only Ten Churches represented in the present meeting, but there are a number of others that are not represented that should be harnessed and fully in the work. The full service of one person is small, but these churches, some of which are dead and have not had preaching for years could be enlisted by this means. We have cases of serious destitution in our own association.

We are to raise \$700,000 for State and Associational missions in the next five year. The State Board plans to help each association to have a missionary. We need their help, therefore, be it resolved, that a committee of three be elected for 1, 2 and 3 years respectively and that this committee be given power to co-operate with the State Board in securing a missionary as soon as possible. 34. J. B. Stark, Buck Harmon, D. E. Steely were nominated as Executive Board. Motion carried that these three be elected for one, two and three



years respectively and that the Moderator of this body be chairman of the Board.

35. Report of committee on the 75 million campaign was read by chairman.

36. Motion carried that report be tabled until the night session.

37. Report of Finance committee: amount received on minute fund \$20.20. S. O. Varner and W. M. Floyd.

38. Adjournment, prayer by Joe Stark.

### SATURDAY NIGHT

39. Song and prayer, sermon by A. A. DuLaney on, "Catching the Vision."

40. Report of committee on 75 million campaign taken up and after discussion by H. L. Waters and A. A. DuLaney was adopted as follows:

The Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Atlanta, Ga. in May, with twice as many messengers in attendance as at any former meeting, determined with unity of purpose and loyalty of spirit to raise 75 million dollars in the next five years for the enlargement of their work in missions, education and benevolence. The following considerations evidently led them to propose this movement for Christ; 1. Baptist Convention and policy demanding a course of separation from the unorganizing and federation movements about them. 2. The realization as never before of the need of larger equipments for all their churches, schools, orphanages, hospitals and other agencies both at home and abroad. 3. And a deep passion for lost souls.

What will success in this campaign do? 1. It will call us to prayer as never before. 2. It will test our faith. 3. It will test unity and the efficiency of our organization. 4. It will fathom the depths of our sacrifice giving.

What will the campaign and the Successful Issue of it do for Baptist? 1. It will enable them to greatly multiply and strengthen their missionary agencies at home and abroad. 2. Almost double the efficiency of our Christian schools. 3. Enable Baptist to increase their hospital efficiency and the support of hundreds of orphans. 4. It will also bring to us a spirit of revival quickening, call out the called, deepen our passion for lost souls and enlist the indifferent.

Our state apportionment is \$3,000,000., as loyal servants of our Lord, and faithful messengers of his gospel, we are asked to join this movement with the most co-operative spirit and in the most sacrificial way.

We, therefore heartily recommend that we pledge ourselves to aid in effecting the best organization possible for the raising our quota until success crowns our cause and then join in jubilant praise to God for victory. H. L. Waters, Joe Stark and J. W. Davis.

42. The following resolution was adopted: Resolve that we extend to the members of Palestine Church our thanks for their hospitality during the sitting of this body.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe the Scriptures composing the Old and New Testament are the Word of God and the only safe rules of faith and practice.

Article II. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the death of Adam.

Article IV. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

Article V. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

Article VI. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away.

Article VII. We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, governed by the laws of Christ (not men,) exercising the gifts, rights and privileges vested in them by His word; that its proper officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose duties are defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.

Article VIII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that baptism by immersion is the Apostolic mode.

Article IX. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

Article X. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal on principals of righteousness.

### CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Little Red River Missionary Baptist Association.

Article II. The members composing the annual meeting of this Association shall consist of Messengers sent by the churches.

Article III. Each church of fifty members or less shall be allowed three messengers, and one additional for every twenty members over



fifty or majority fraction thereof. Provided that no church shall be allowed more than five messengers.

Article IV. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall have been previously appointed.

Article V. The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at the annual meetings.

Article VI. This Association shall have no power to control or regulate the ministerial affairs or discipline of any church, but may adopt and recommend all such measures as shall be considered best calculated to promote the harmony and prosperity of the churches and advance the Redeemer's Kingdom; advise and consult upon such matters as the churches may at any time present for their consideration and advice, and may receive churches of the same faith and order into this Association, or dismiss churches from the Association; inquire into the state of religion and its bonds and suggest measures for advancement, and a common bond of union among the churches, but shall not hold any legislative power over the churches.

Article VII. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present, providing notice has been given at a previous meeting.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. The Association shall commence with religious exercises and a sermon by some preacher who shall have been previously appointed, unless the Association shall otherwise direct.

Article II.. The Moderator of the previous session shall preside and the former clerk shall act, (provided they attend) until the letter from the churches connected with the body shall be read and a Moderator and Clerk elected.

Article III. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the meeting, appoint committees, unless the Association shall otherwise direct; preserve order, report impropriety, and shall have a right to speak on all subjects, calling any member to the chair; examine and correct the minutes if necessary.

Article IV. The Clerk shall keep a correct copy of all proceedings of the meeting, read the letters and documents, and call any member to assist him; at the close of the meeting take charge of all papers and documents unless otherwise directed by the Association.

Article V. A committee or Arrangements shall be appointed at each meeting, consisting of three, whose duty it shall be to regulate the order of religious exercises and by whom performed, unless otherwise directed by the Association.

Article VI. Preachers in good standing of other churches and Associations, with whom we are in fellowship, when attending our annual meetings, shall be invited to a seat; and these meetings shall always be opened and closed with prayer.



Article VII. Any member may speak twice on any subject in discussion before the body, but not more without leave, and when speaking shall stand and address the Moderator, use decorous Christian language, and no member shall absent himself during the session without leave. Any member who violates these rules shall be reprovod as the Association thinks proper.

Article VIII. The churches shall contribute funds to meet the ordinary expenses of the body, such as printing the minutes and paying the traveling expenses of such members as the Association may send to other bodies.

Article IX. A public collection shall be taken at the option of the Association at each association and give to such benevolent purposes as the Association may direct.

Article X. These rules may be amended by a majority of the members present at any regular meeting.
