

The Twenty-first Augual Session of the Union Association No. 2, of Missionary Baptists, convened with Shiloh Church, Searcy, County, Arkan-

sas, on Fridey, September 11, 1900, at 11 o'clock, a. m.

CIRCULAR LETTER

OF UNION ASSOCIATION No. 1, OF MISSIONARY BAPTISTS, A. D. 1900.

"COVE UNTO ME."-Motto Text.

Incline your ear and come unto me and your soul shall five, and I will make an everlasting covenant with you, even the sure mercies of David.—Isalah 55; 3.

The old Covenant being a covenant of human works having to it no accurity, man, one of its parties fuiling, it was, so far as concerned oternal life to its subjects a failure, and left all the world guilty before God. Rom. 3: 9 to 20. Between these two covenants God makes the contrast and in that different grounds on salvation. But now he has obtained a more excellent ministry, and he is also the mediator of a better covenant, which was established upon better promises, for if that covenant had been faultices, then should no place have been sought for the second. For behold the days come, eayoth the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel, and with the house of Judea, not according to the covenant that I made with the fathers in the day when I took them out of the land of Egypt, because they continued not in my covenant, and I regarded them not, sayeth the Lord. For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, sayeth the Lord. I will put my lave in their minds and write them in their hearts; and I will be to them a God and they shall be to me a people; and they shall not teach every man his neighbor and every man his brother, saying, know the Lord, for all shall know me, from the least to the greatest. For I will be morciful to their unrighteousness, and their sins and their iniquities will I remember do more. Hobrow 8: 6 to 12.

I will give them one heart and one way that they may fear me forever. For the good of them all and their children after them. And I will not turn away from them to do them good, but I will put my fear in their hearts and they shall not depart from me. Jer. 32: 39, 40.

And Jesus answered and said unto ber, Martha, Martha, thou art careful and troubled about many things, but one thing is needful, and Mary has chosen that part which shall not be taken away from her.

Lake 10: 11, 42. The good part chosen by Mary was salvation of the Lord.

And as Moses lifted up the scrpont in the wilderness, even so must the son of man be lifted up, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have eternal life. John 3: 14. A life that will not end.

Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that beareth my word and believeth on,him that sent rue, hath everlasting life and shall not come into

condemnation, but is passed from death unto life. John 5: 24.

My sheep hear my voice and I know them and they follow me; and I give unto them eternal lite, and they shall never perish, neither shall any pluck them out of my hand. My Father which gave them me is greater than all, and none can pluck them out of my Father's hand. John 10: 27, 23, 29. And when the Gentiles heard this they were glad and glorified the word of the Lord. And as many as were ordained to eternal life believed. Acts 13: 48.

My contention is that as many as believed were ordained to eternal life, for no man will be saved in unbelief. For the King of Heaven says: Ito that believeth not shall be damked Mark 13: 16. For 1 am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor length, nor depth, nor any other creature shall to able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Bord. Romans 8, 82, 89.

What then can separate us from his love? Who will answer?

For ye are dead and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ who is our life shall appear, then shall yo also appear with him in glory. Col. 3: 3, 4. Not in hell but in giory, bless God!

In the foregoing scriptures we have the doctrine of the final preservation of the saints proved to a domonstration. In the quotation last named Christ is said to be our life, then, before we can perish, Christ,

our life, must be destroyed.

To an inheritance incorruptible and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in Heaven for you, who are kept by the power of God, through faith, unto sulvation, ready to be revealed in the last time. 1st Peter 1: 4, 5.

If I am found in Jesus' hands,
My soul will ne'er be lost.
His honor is engaged to save
The meckest of his sheep.
All whom his Heavenly Father gave,
His hands securely keep.

Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remainsthin him; and he cannot sin because he is born of God. 1st John 3: 0

In this the children of God are manifest and the children of the Devil. Manifest—to make known. In the new birth the children are made known. That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the spirit is spirit. John 6: 7, 8. Marvel not that I say unto thee, yo must be born again. He that overcometh the same shall be clothed in white raiment and I will not blot out his name out of the book of life, but I will confess his name before my Father and before his angels Rev. 3: 5. For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Ist John 5: 4.

When we wish to prove the doctrine of the final preservation of the saints quickly and absolutely, we call on these passages, for they teach us most positively that the children of God are in possession of eternal life, and if so they cannot cease to live a single moment. It they have it in prospect they have it all the same. But these passages will not bear such an interpretation as this, for Jesus says This is life eternal, that they might know the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou

hast cent John 17: 3

Then according to the Savior's definition, to know the Lord in the forgiveness of sine is eternal life, and no one will dare say that we have to wait dutil we die to be regenerated and made new creatures in Christ

CONSTITUTION OF

UNION ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE 1. This Union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of The Union Association of Baptists.

Art. II. This Association shall be composed of delegates from churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be requested to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

Art. III. The delegates when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot of members of the Association at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

Art IV. The Association shall not Interfere with the rights of the chifches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government and shall act only as an advisory council. Assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or life evidently implied by the nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its ewn members, the delegates from the churches and the right to withdraw from and discown all churches which depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming heteroiles in faith, or disorderly in practice. It shall, therefore, regard all united under this Constitution with a vigliant eye for good, and endeaver to extend the Kingdon of Christ on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and cultivate a close fellowship with all the discrebes of Christ, especially with those united in this Constitution.

Art. \. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this Union on sending their principles to any annual meeting of this A-sociation, with a petition for addition, and by their principles agreeing to the abstract of principles herein.

"Art. VI. The churches of this Union shall transmit to every annual session of this Association a written communication specifying the names of their delegates, their number in fellowship, the number baptised, received by letter, dismissed, restored, decrees number of licentiates and ordained ministers sindisour last session, and affective information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and ministed accordingly.

Art. VII. This Association may have a fund, supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches, and all money contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Finance Committee to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall retain and manage funds agreeably to the order of the Association, and shall present annually, for insertion in the manutes, a clear statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

Art. VIII. This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every seasion,

- Art. IX. This Association shall take cognizance of no query sent to them by the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same and failed; nor of any difficulty between the trebes unless they have pursued directions given in the 18th chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them when this Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion,
- Art. X. It fluid be the duty of the rierk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body, and deliver over same to his successor in office.
- Art. XI. This constitution shall be altered or amended at any regular meeting of this Association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members then present, provided such alteration or amendment be approved by the churches composing this Association.

RULES OF DECORUM.

RULE 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Rule 2 The Moderator and Clork shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Rule 3. The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order and shall have the right to call to order at any time.

Rule 4. A member not satisfied with his, dicision rang appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

Rule 5. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rive on his feet, and obtaining permission, proceed.

-Rule 6. The Mollérator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by maining the person or otherwise.

Rule 7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, upless he departs from the subject, or unless words of personal reflection are used. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association unless withdrawn by him with made it.

Rule 8. Every case taken up by this Association shall be decided or with-drawn before another can be offered.

Rule 9. When a question is up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association on the subject, and the members on the affirmative of the question shall signify the same by rising from their seats, and those in the negative retain theirs.

Rule 10. The Moderator shall prondunce the decision before those stand-

Rule 11. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

Rule 12. No member shall speak more than three times on the same question without permission of the Association, nor more than once until every member that wishes to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 13. The appellation of Brother shall be used in the Association by members in addressing one another.

Rule 14. Names of members shall be called as often as the Association may direct.

Rule 15 No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to in-

Rule 16. The Mederator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat during the time; but he shall not vote on any question, unless the Association be equally divided.

Rule 17. Any member violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at his discretion; but only on the day that the breach be made.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe in the one only true and living God, the Father, Word and Huly Ghost.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are of divine anthority and the only infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 3. We believe that man cannot, by his own free will or ability, recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature.
 - 4. We believe in original sin.

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- 5. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification unto obedience of the Spirit and sprinkling of the blood of Christ.
 - 6. We believe the Saints will be preserved in grace and never fall away.
- 7. We believe baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of the church of Christ; that haptism by immersion is the only apostolic mode; true believers are the only prayer subjects; and that washing the saints feet is a duty.
 - 8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
- 0. We believe that the joys of the saints and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 10. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances except those who have been regularly baptized and called of God, and come under imposition of hands by a Presbytery.
- 11. We believe it to be our indispensable duty to do all we can for the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom and spread of the Cospel.
