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Proceedings of the Sixty-Third Annual Session of the Red River Baptist Association

Held With the Richwoods Baptist Church, Clark County, Ark., October 6-7-8, 1911.

After a short season of prayer and praise service the Red River Baptist Association met in its Sixty-Third annual session with Richwoods Church, Clark County, Arkansas, and was called to order at 10 a. m., by the former Moderator, Elder James H. Smart.

The letters from the churches' were placed on the Clerk's table and the Moderator appointed Brethren J. A. Ross, John B. Langley and H. L. Winburn Reading Clerks. The reading of the letters beginning to encroach on the preaching hour, a motion prevailed that the reading proceed until 11:30.

At that hour Dr. N. R. Townsend entered the stand to preach the introductory sermon, taking for his text, Num. 32:6, "And Moses said unto the children of God and to the children of Reuben, Shall your brethren go to war, and shall ye sit here?" Our hearts were made glad, as the Brother showed to us the things that go to make an efficient soldier for our Lord Jesus Christ.

Preceding the sermon Bro. W. U. Davis offered prayer. The sermon being ended, Dr. J. T. Christian and Bro. W. E. Sherrell made some Sunday announcements, after which the Association adjourned until 2 p. m.

REPORT C. Ministerial Education.

From time immemorial the teacher has been a man of information. The teacher cannot teach what he does not know. Christ taught His disciples the Apostles some three years before He left this world, and committed to them the gospel to be taught by them to the world.

The teacher of the Bible should be taught in all the various branches of learning so he may teach others. All our church work is important and needful, but the education of the rising ministry is by far the greatest of our work. Rom. 10:14, 15. How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?

Again, the state is making great efforts to educate the citizenship of our state, and unless we educate our preachers we shall have the great contradiction, and force and educated few, and an ignorant pulpit.

Again, the Baptists in all ages have had educated preachers and schools for this purpose. In Arkansas we now have one school where we are trying to do good work along this line. Some fifty young men are there studying to get ready for this great work. With few exceptions, God calls His preachers from the poor; this is as it should be, therefore it becomes our duty to help pay the expenses of these young men while in school. This we have done in the founding of Ouachita College, in free tuition. Now we recommend that our pastors and churches pray that God may send more laborers into His harvest and that they take a collection each year for this work, as they do for missions, orphans' home, etc. Also, that we take a collection on the adoption of this report.

There is no mission work of as much importance as Association Missions. If all the Associations in the state would occupy their respective fields, it would be a near cut on State Missions. Therefore, we would suggest to this Association to supply home needs first.

Report of the Mission Board.

In accord with the instructions given your Board at the last session of this Association, to find a strong, suitable man as missionary evangelist and to get help to pay his salary from any source we would be able, your Board to correspond with several brethren who seemed to uitable for that work. After considerable corresindence we were unanimous in the opinion that either Id J. T. Howell or Eld. S. L. Holloway would be satistory for the work. It was decided therefore to employ ther of them that could be gotten, and to ask the State board to join us in paying their salary on the following main, to-wit: The missionary was to do missionary evanelistic work, hold meetings, strengthen the churches, and to as nearly as possible collect his salary and exmes on the field, and the deficit to be paid by your and and the State Board on the ratio of two dollars paid on to one dollar paid by them.

At the December meeting of the State Board we laid any request before them, and they readily and cordially arread to the proposition, and assured us that when we builded on the man we wanted, and employed him, we had count on their assistance on that basis.

To our great disappointment, neither Bro. Howell nor Holloway would agree to take the work. So as condorable time had passed, we then decided to make no effort until the spring opened up and then try to be ready up push the work vigorously.

At a later meeting Bro. G. C. Taylor was chosen and expected the position, but after further consideration deded to not undertake the work. So it was not until about the first of May that we were able to close an arimprovement for the type of worker you instructed us to employ. At this time we arranged with Bro. J. T. Howell to take the work at a salary of \$125 per month and expenses, he to spend the rest of the year in evangelistic and developmental work.

We rejoice to announce that God has signally blessed the work of our missionary. He has done a marvelous work under God. For the details of his work, its results and the amount collected on the field, we refer you to his report herewith submitted.

Believing that the work would be very greatly helped buying a gospel tent to belong to and be used by your Association in its mission work, we bought a tent, some modine lamps, etc., at a cost of about \$125. An appeal as made to a number of friends of the work for help to raise this money, and about \$75 was raised and paid on it, b aving a balance of \$50 yet due. So we made a note for this amount at the Citizens' Bank in Arkadelphia, which remains yet unpaid. We recommend that a collection be taken at this time to pay that note. We believe that when you hear the report of our missionary read you will gladly rejoice at God's blessings on the work done within our Association this year. We believe this work should be pressed with vigor another year.

REPORT E. Schools and Colleges.

It is of the most vital and far-reaching importance that we maintain and strengthen and patronize our Baptist schools. Baptists have stood for the best in education through all their history. They must continue to do it or suffer loss. We earnestly recommend that this Association give to our Baptist colleges unstinted support, and that we all as ministers, laymen and women, individually and in church capacity, hold out to all our young people the imperative necessity of securing a good education, and that we continually impress upon them the vast advantages of securing their education in our own Baptist schools.

REPORT G. Home Missions.

It was the beloved I. D. Tichenor, D. D., who said: "I'm the sake of our country, for the sake of our children who gather like olive plants around our table, for the sake in humanity, for the glory of the Master, and for the redemption of the world, let us strive to make this nation a people whose God is the Lord." That work done by our Home Mission Board is a most potent factor in world wide mangelization, and no one questions. It has been clearly demonstrated that if we would save the world, we m st mue the home land. We must multiply churches, build up the waste places, and win the lost in our own land, that their powers and gifts and prayers united with ours may make it possible for us to support larger forces in all foreign lands. Then too, we must do much foreign misnon work at home among the million and a half immiarapts who come to our shores annually. Save them, that they may help in the salvation of those nations from whence they come, and not become a menace to our own In the year 1909 the Home Board maintained 1,182 Innel. missionaries, who baptized 27,426 persons and added 52,no members to home mission churches. Into this work unt year was put by Southern Baptists, \$329,475.

Last year the Board was instructed by the Convention in plan its work on a \$400,000 basis. This year the Board reports no debt, but the receipts for the year 1910 are \$333,-

634.43. The Board had in its employ 1,240 missionaries, who report in the aggregate 20,913 baptisms and 18,905 received by letter. Total additions for the year. 39.818. For a number of years the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located at Atlanta, Ga., has had its heart set on helping to make Arkansas .a great Baptist state. Arkansas Baptists are under lasting obligations to the Home Board for its timely and telling help for many years Last year the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Board received from this source \$7,000 on the cc-operative plan of work and their pro-rata share of office expenses. Every church in Red River Association, as well as the state, ought to show its love for and loyalty to this great and growing missionary agency that is helping to build the kingdom high, and long and high and mighty in our beloved Southland

The General Association is doing Home Mission Work in several of the states. They have had a number of missionaries at work during the last year, but your committee has not the data at hand, to enable us to give statistics of work done, but from general information we understand that they are having good results and doing a good work.

The great missionary enterprise is one. There is a divine unity throughout its length and breadth. It is one in purpose; one in power, and one in plan. The one great purpose, the glory of God in the salvation of the world. The one great power is the gospel of our Lord energized and galvanized by the spirit of God. The simple plan is for the man who knows the power of Christ's resurrection and the joy of His salvation to go, in the power of God, and tell the man who knows it not, in such a way as to win him.

The nearest circles of this work we call District Missons; the next circles we call State Missions; the widest circles, those that reach the outermost rim of the earth, we call Foreign Missions. These separate names are used merely for convenience. They are one in importance and in our duty to each.

Southern Baptists are doing mission work in nearly

every section of the earth. We have not covered the ground; we have merely made a beginning. We have now upwards of 800 workers on the various filds. Last year there were more than three thousand conversions and additions to the churches.

The general policy of the Board is to set American missionaries at the various stations, and then, as rapidly as possible, build around them a force of converted and trained native workers. This policy has been proved wise by the results.

During the last fiscal year Southern Baptists gave \$500,000 for this work. This is much less than one cent for each heathen, and about thirty cents each for our people. Arkansas Baptists gave of this amount about \$12,-000, which is less than twelve cents each. Red River Association gave a little upwards of \$500, which was less than twenty cents each.

Reports from the field show unmistakable evidences that the world is opening to the gospel and inclined to give us a chance. The many vices of heathen need our own church life, and the command of our Lord urges us to go forward.

Your committee recommends that

(1) Every family provide itself with the state paper and the Foreign Mission Journal, that we may know what is being done and planned.

(2) That every church seriously and prayerfully set itself to make an offering this year which shall average at least fifty cents per member.

(3) That all encouragement and help be given to every agency which makes for mission study and advancement.

(4) That a day be given in each church this year for the consideration of this work and for prayer in its behalf. Respectfully submitted,

There are hundreds our baptists who take no active part in their King's moress; this we believe to be a result of not having training in their early christian life. Strip the corn stalk of shoot just as it is put forth and you destroy that for which the grain of corn was planted; deprive a young thru tian of his or her training in church work, and you ob God's Kingdom of the most active and efficient sevice of that one. So far as we have been able to find out there are only two country B. Y. P. U. in the Association. Having icen some of the results of B. Y. P. U. work and rollizing its great need among our people we urge, 1st That the churches organize Unions for the training of their manager members.

2nd. That the pastors together with the older members stand by the Union and help it that it may live and advance in the training of its members.

3rd. That the Union send representatives to the nummer Assembly, which meets annually at Arkadelphia.

4th. That the Unions be invited to send messengers to the next meeting of this body to consider the advisability of organizing an Associational Union.

Digest of Letters

Thirty-two churches reported this year 3023 members. They reported for all purposes \$13,442.09, an average 1,446-per member.

Of total sum reported, one church, 1st Arkadelphia, 16657 members, gave of this amount \$8100.78 leaving 141.31, to be distributed among the remaining 31 1600 ches and 2366 members; an average of \$2.25- per member.

This is an average per church for all purposes \$420.06-. Louving 1st Arkadelphia and her work gives an average, or church \$172.30-.

We gave last year to all Missions, \$1,973.54; an averper church, of \$61.67; per member, \$0.65-.

The Association gave to other benevolent objects, excluding building and repair items, Minute fund and Incitiontals, \$7,741.00; an average of \$2.56- per member; per hurch, 241.90-.

Of the 32 churches, 29 report Sunday Schools, where 1005 pupils are being taught the principles of God's Word. None of these churches report, 64 Baptisms; an average of more than seven additions to each church reporting; a reolding possibility of Sunday School work.

For further extension of these comparisons and averarea, the Clerk would refer the reader to the published tibles.

As seen by the Clerk, the future looks hopeful.
