PROCEEDINGS

THURSDAY-EVENING SESSION.

The Liberty Baptist Association met with the Baptist church at Wesson, Arkansas, in its Sixty-sixth Annual Session, Thursday evening, 7:30 o'clock, September, 21, 1911. The body was called to order by Moderator G. W. Hays, for preliminary organization. He read Matthew 6, and made appropriate remarks. E. J. A. McKinney of the Baptist Advance offered the opening prayer. L. S. Allen of Wesson led the opening song, "O. For a Closer Walk With God."

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION

Rev. H. C. Rosamond made a motion that the body dispense with the reading of the letters for the present, and go into the permanent organization and that all who know themselves to be messengers to vote. The motion was carried unanimously.

H. C. Rosamond-made a motion that the following officers be re-elected for the ensuing year: -G. W. Hays, Moderator; Geo. W. Mason, Clerk; B. F.

Rogers, Treasurer.

The Moderator called for the church letters to be filed with the clerk before the close of this session.

ANNUAL SERMON

At this point, the Moderator introduced H. M. Geren of El Dorado, the one appointed to deliver the annual sermon. He read for his evening lesson, Matthew; 26. Theme—Glorying in the Cross, Gal. 6:14.

At the request of H. C. Rosamond, at this point, this body held a season of prayer for the recovery of Mrs. Harvey Jean, who was active in the construction of the church at this place and who was very sick. Bro. Rosamond led in a fervid prayer.

E. J. A. McKinney announced that the Baptist Advance would be sold at one dollar per year when

paid within 30 days after due.

The body adjourned till 8:30 a.m. tormorrow. H. M. Geren pronounced the benediction.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The following report was submitted on State Missions.

Surely the sentiment of this committee and not only the committee but of all Arkansas Baptists was expressed in the words of Dr. J. T. Christian when he said the time has fully come for the trucks to be fully cleaned and all other issues held in abeyance and the full right of way given to State Missions until the meeting of the State Convention in November in Pine Bluff. Your committee is in full and hearty sympathy with every denominational enterprise fostered by the convention. But the time has fully come when State Missions must be taken care of.

The needs of the board are great and urgent. We began the convention year with a debt of approximately five thousand dollars. To clear all debts and to pay all missionaries in full we must have \$25.000, in addition to what has already been raised. This is a big job, but our people delight in doing large things. The work of State Missions is done on the following lines: First. State and district evangelists who give all their time to revival work. Second. All parties who sell books and hold meetings

as opportunity affords. Third. By supplementing salary of pastors of weaker churches on needy fields in order to maintain the work on a good basis. The Lord has graciously blessed the labors of our State Board as will be seen by the following:

FRIDAY...AFTERNOON SESSION

After a helpful song service conducted by J. D. Crawford, the Moderator called the meeting to order at 2 o'clock p. m.

VISITORS RECOGNIZED

The following visiting messengers were welcomed; E. J. A. McKinney, Editor Baptist Advance; L. S. Ballard, Editor of the Missionary Baptist.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The committee on Foreign Missions made the fol-

lowing report:

The Foreign Mission Board is in the glorious work of world evangelization. It is appointed by Southern Baptists for the stupendous task, Splendid opportunities are before us. China, with 440,000,000 of people, is passing through a marvelous transformation. Now is the time to give these millions the gospel. Japan is leading the Orient. Shall we lead Japan to Christ? Mohammedanism threatens to submerge Africa. Shall we turn back the tide by the power of the gospel? South America, Mexico and Italy are sick and tired of Romanism; they are ready to receive the message which we have to give. Vast open doors which we have not yet been able to enter lie before us. We have sent out 273 missionaries, thirty of them sent out last year, and they have gathered around them 581 native helpers, and are training hundreds of others. The Missionaries re-

ported 3,618 baptisms last year and will soon report tens of thousands converts each year, if the present rapid growth continues. There are seven Women's Training Schools with 149 students and nine Theological Training Schools with 212 students. There are fifteen medical missionaries treating many thousands of patients and opening the way to the hearts and the homes of millions of people. We have seven hospitals and twelve dispensaries in which the missionaries assisted by five missionary nurses and many native helpers treated 40,716 patients. The printing plants are sending out the Bible and millions of pages of religious literature in the languages of the people. The work has grown so rapidly that it cost last year far more than our people were willing to give. If we meet the actual necessities of the missions now, we must greatly enlarge our offering. The total receipts for last year were \$510,008.97. a small gain over the year before. An accumulated debt of \$89,600 now rests upon the work. This should be paid off this year. To do so and maintain the work as it nowis, will require at least \$600,000. Will the churches give it? It is a condition that calls for greatly enlarged giving but it is absolutely imperative unless our people are willing to let this great cause suffer. Let us raise this amount and even more that we may make an advance in the work.

We recommend:---1. That all our people help; by sympathy and prayer; by subscribing for and reading the Foreign Mission Journal; by distributing tracts which can be had for the asking: by self-denying sacrifice by all, and by liberal gifts from the wealthy; by sending in their gifts now and not waiting for the season of pressure in March and April.

Home Missions

The report on Home Missions was introduced and ably discussed by W. M. Wright, the new pastor of Camden Baptist church, E. J. A. McKinney and

Capt. A. C. Jones.

Your committee is glad to report that notwith. standing nearly half of the states fell behind in their contributions over the previous year, the blessings of heaven have marvelously fallen, both upon the work and the workers. During the year just closed there were 26,866 baptisms reported by the missionaries. and a total number of additions made to the churches of 49,297. These, of course, are the visible results but as is the case with all the work of the Lord, there are many things which cannot be tabulated. importance of this work cannot be over-estimated. It is fundamental to all missionary endeavor. Strong at home, we are enabled to exert a tremendous influence abroad. It comprehends all missionary activ-The foreigners are coming to our shores at the rate one million a year. What shall we do with them? The answer of the Baptists through the Home. Mission Board is, let us evangelize them, and this we are doing through the evangelistic department of the Home Board. The board is also doing a great work among the Indians, Negroes, Mexicans and the Cubans. to say nothing of the work in the Canal Zone and the mountain regions. There was never before so much need of Home Missions in the South as now, and there never have been richer opportunities than those which beckon Southern Baptists to redouble their efforts for saving America. Last year Arkansas

Baptists gave only \$6.612,58 to this work, just about half the amount we gave the previous year. We are asked to give \$15.000 this year. What shall our answer be? The average contribution to our Home Mission work was less than fifteen cents per member last year, and more than 11.000 Southern Baptist churches gave nothing whatever to our missionary and benevolent activities. This condition is a reproach to the denomination, and ought to be speedily remedied. Therefore, we urge the pastors in the Association. through preaching and the wise distribution of literature, to keep their congregation informed and thoroughly alive to the needs of Home Mission endeavor. In view of the fact that more than one-third of all the money collected for Home Missions came in during the last week of the Conventional year. causing great anxiety to our secretaries and deep concern to our Baptist Zion. We recommend that we endeavor to systemize our gifts so as to prevent such conditions as far as possible.

The following reports of the Executive committee on Associational Missions and that of the special Associational Missionary, J. P. Crawford, were submitted and approved.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

In obedience to the instructions of this body at its last session, this committee met in a few days after the Association adjourned and elected Rev. J. P. Crawford as missionary for full time at a salary of

agreed to pay \$25 per month, one half the salary. Bro. Crawford began work November, 1st. He lost the month of January from sickness, hence has served ten months as missionary. Your committee instruct ed Bro. Crawford to handle books, and the chairman of your committee has purchased over \$300 worth of books from our State Board. Bro. Crawford reports \$146.50 collected on the field, and has sold books to the amount of \$293.80. The profits on these books about \$135.00. Books on hand about \$37.00. The amount collected by Bro. Crawford and the profits on books amount to \$280.00. The State Board is due Bro. Crawford about \$60. In view of the fact that the churches have sent in so little for the support of this work it is apparent to your committee that they are not in harmony with the work and hence will not support the work.

REPORT OF NEW COMMITTEE

The Baptists have two general bodies, one composed of representatives from our churches in the East. North and West. The other is the Southern Baptist Convention, and includes all the territory from Maryland to New Mexico and South with Cuba and Panama. The Baptists of each state are organized into a State Convention, and each State is subdivided into Associations. The term Associational Missions applies to mission work done within the bounds of an association. So far as your committee can learn, very little mission work has ever been done by Liberty Association prior to one year ago. Some of our churches have contributed liberally to Foreign. Home and State Missions, Orphanage, Education, Etc. But very little has ever been contributed to evangelize the destitute places in the bounds of this body. At our meeting one year ago a special committee was appointed to consider the advisability of do. ing mission work in our bounds. That committee recommended that a missionary be put in the field at once, and a number of pledges were made by churches for his support. Your Executive Board reports that very few of these pledges have been paid. That is especially true of our larger churches. The Executive Committee elected Rev. J. P. Crawford and he went to work the first of last November, devoting all his time to the work. The State Board paid \$25 per month on his salary, and Bro. Crawford has made the balance of his salary from collections from churches and profits on books sold on the field. He reports collections on the field to the amount of \$146.50, and the profits on books sold is about \$135.00. It is very evident that this is a very important work and this Association should keep a missionary in the field for all his time. This can be done with ease if our churches will respond to the calls for this work, so far very few have responded with help for this work. Your committee urge the importance of the work. We also suggest the advisability of instructing the Executive Board to continue this work in the future by securing the very best man they can. also recommend that said missionary be required to report to the Association an itemized account of all money collected by him.

MINISTERIAL RELIEF

The following report on Ministerial Relief was submitted and adopted.

In compliance with the request of your Moderator made one year ago. We submit the following on Ministerial support:

The Baptists as an organization, have never made any definite or tangible arrangements to care for aged and decrepit preachers and their wives. Those who have spent their lives in the interest of the cause, when disease has taken hold of their bodies and we can no longer use them in active service we relegate them to the rear to let them do the best they can so long as God lets them live. We think the time has fully come when we should provide a fund for these old veterans. We recommend that every church in this Association take up a collection in December each year for this cause, and forward to Bro. O. J. Wade, Little Rock, Ark., who is treasurer of this fund, or so long as he should act in that capacity, and we further ask that the messengers of this association to the State convention try to have adopted a similar resolution, making December the time all over the State to take this offering. Make this a definite cause, as well as Ministerial education, State Missions, Offerings, etc.. thereby giving our ministry the assurance that when they get old they will not be forgotten.

PUBLICATIONS

The following report was submitted and adopted on Publications:

The home, today, needs, as never before, to be closely guarded from the entrance of poisonous literature. Books may destroy or make alive the souls of our boys and girls. Character is determined by the kind of literature that enters the home. We would urge our people to encourage the reading of the Bible more. There is a great awakening in religious life, due to a more careful study of God's Word. The Bible should be studied daily in the home. It is a deplorable fact, that in many Baptist homes, the Bible is still a dust-covered volume and a lost book in the lives of their children. With this book in our hands we can take this world for Christ. Our Baptist people need religious information: A few cents spent each year will bring you the Baptist Advance of Little Rock, which will keep you in touch with the great achievements of the Baptists of this State: or the Home Field of Atlanta, Ga., will thrill you with the great work and the still greater need of Home Missions; or Foreign Mission Journal, Richmond Va., will fire your soul with zeal for a lost world as you learn of the success God is giving us in the uttermost parts of the earth. We would urge our churches to be loyal in their support of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn., in its Sunday school literature. Besides the lesson helps and the new graded lesson system, they handle many books, dealing with every phase of the great Sunday school movement. Every pastor, superintendent and teacher should use these freely. A new era will dawn on our work when our leaders "study to be approved a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." Our Sunday school and church leaders need more of

the spirit of investigation to know what our Sunday School Board and what our various Mission Boards are doing to keep the churches informed along every line of work for the advancement of the Kingdom.

ORPHAN'S HOME

The report on Orphan's Home was submitted and after an enthusiastic discussion was adopted:

We, your committee on the Orphanage beg leave

to submit the following report.

Monticello, a town of 5000 inhabitants, and one of the most beautiful in the State. It is under the very efficient management of Brother and Sister J. N. Williams. There are in the Orphanage at present 130 children and applications are turned down almost daily on account of lack of room. The truck farm owned by the Orphanage and worked by the larger boys is getting to be a paying investment. During the last year there has been a revival among the larger boys and girls, many of them having been baptized into the Monticello Baptist church. The religious atmosphere of the home could hardly be surpassed. The needs of the home are great, the most important of which is the boys domitory. There is some debt on the home. It is hoped that this debt will be liquidated before the meeting of the State Convention at Pine Bluff. We urge therefore that

all the churches make an offering to this worthy cause.

Your committee is gratified to note the increased interest and growth of the Sunday School work in our Association during the past few years. We note that four years ago only sixteen churches reported Sunday schools. Our tabulated report shows us out of the 40 churches in the Association we have about 30 well organized Bible schools with an enrollment of 1484. There is no greater field for service than in the teaching service of the church. We feel that the pastors, board of deacons and every member of the church should support, aid and encourage every phase of the Sunday school work. The possibilities of developing christian character in the Bible school is unlimited. Feeling the importance of this work. we your committee, recommend that our associational missionary give special attention to those churches that have no Sunday school and urge the orgaization just as soon as possible. We further recommend that our schools use our new literature—Southern Baptist Convention Series.

That our Executive Board be empowered to instruct our Associational Missonary to give special attention to churches without Bible schools.

WOMANS' WORK

The following report was offered and adopted on Woman's Work.

In the 11th verse of the 68th Psalm, Revised Version] we have these words: "The Lord gave the word, great was the company of woman that published it." We feel grateful to God for the fulfillment of this Scripture, for in the average church today, the women are bravely helping to shoulder the burdens, both financial and spiritual, and are "holding up the hands" of their pastors in a very substantial way. The plans of having an Associational superintendent in each association to supervise the work of the women among young people and children, and organize societies and bands where there are none, is proving a good one. And we bespeak the sympathetic co-peration of all the pastors of the Association in this great and rapidly developing work. The well organized woman's societies. are 'adopting systematic Bible study, using text books recommended by the State Central Committee, and this in itself is proving a source of great spiritual blessing and development. The societies are also observing regular monthly missionary programs, and are hereby learning much of the mission fields at home and abroad. This brings them into closer touch with the missionaries and teaches them better how to pray for and stand with those who represent them in the "regions beyond." The thought of personal service is also be-

ing stressed, and each wide awake society is follow. ing the scriptural injunction to the best of its ability: "Whatsoever thy hands findeth to do. do it with thy might," The prayer life is also being developed, especially through the use of the Missionary prayer calendar issued at W. M. U. headquarters, which has a special object of prayer for every day in the year. Who can estimate what the united prayers of our Southern Baptist Women concentrated on a defiuite object, can accomplish in the kingdom of our Lord and Master? He "whose ear is not heavy that He cannot hear," alone knows what it means to the work and the worker. The organization of the Y. W. A's, is another important feature of our Woman's work; for it is from the ranks of the young women that fu-ture leaders and workers are to be drawn, and in pro-portion to the thoroughness of their present training will be their efficiency in the work hereafter. they study and assimliate the facts as set forth in the fascinating mission study text books recommended by our Southern Educational Secretary, will they become, not only thoroughly missionary in spirit, but many of them will later on, we trust and believe, of fer themselves actually for service on the foreign field. The woman's meeting this morning was the most successful in our history 9 churches represented six societies and about 40 ladies present. The following is our report, \$1584.65, but the most important part that means better service, more cheerful lives consecrated to our Blessed Lord and are willing to do the small things for him can never be told. With sincere and humble gratitude before our Lord do we acknowledge the kindness and consideration shown us and our work by the brotherhood of this Association and it encourages us to greater efforts, striving ever to do the woman's part to be the handmaiden of

our Lord and a help to our brethren.
