## PROCEEDINGS:

Pleasant Grove Church, Finch, Greene County, Ark announced in the closing session of the Union Grove Church, Greene County, the Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association met in body, and listened to a very earnest discourse by Elder J. F. Love, of Little Rock, from 12th verse of 51st chapter of Psalms, viz:

"Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free Spirit." and With much eloquence and much force showed forth his ability, by the way in which he handled the subject. Praise be to the Lord for such able-bodied men to proclaim His word to our people.

Then after a few remarks by those aged veterans in the cause of Christ, the body adjourned for dinner, to be together at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. After one of our grand old-fashioned Baptist dinners on the ground, and with shaking and friendly greetings, the body assembled to work in earnest.

The former Moderator and Clerk being absent the roll was called to order, and by motion Bro. G. Lively was elected Moderator, pro. tem., and R. L. Reaves Clerk, pro. tem.

Roll of Churches having representation in the body was called for and thirty-one responded. See statement.

On motion the body went into permanent organization resulting in the election of Elder G. Lively Moderator, R. L. Reaves Clerk, and Elder T. L. B. Thorn, Treasurer.

After permanent organization the body was called to order for the faithful performance of duty.

taken up, after which we adjourned for dinner which was plentifully spread on the ground, to come together at 2:30 o'clock.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Pursuant to adjournment, the body was called together at 2:30 o'clock by the Moderator. After prayer by Bro Faulkner, the Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows and adopted as read:

Foreign missions are a very important work, and reaches that part of the work which other missions cannot reach, as it was God's will that every nation should have the Gospel. We believe God is blessing the work, as it is advancing from year to year, and this year exceeded former year. Number of Missionaries, 138; Native Helpers, 215; Number of Churches, 9; Membership, 9,969; Money Expended Last Year, \$247,629.69. Nevertheless there is room for more work another year, as the harvest is great and the laborers few.

Report of Committee on Orphan's Home adopted as read and Report as follows:

At our last Association there were fifty-seven children in the Home. Since then two have died and two have married, and one at her own request placed in a private home near Searcy, Ark. There are now 32 children in the Home making five more than last year. At present all are well and happy. We are planning to add to our building an addition to cost not less than \$2,000. To do this in addition to the monthly expense will require more sacrifices and larger gifts from our people, for the policy of the Home is to pay as we go and not go in debt for anything, and so far the Home has no debts in her history. From Greene and Clay Counties there are 17 children in the Home. Brethren this is a great work and will reveal the good that is being done. May God bless and prosper us and make us remember the orphans and pray for that noble woman who has given her life for their comfort. COMMITTEE.

The clerk read the proceedings of Saturday, the first day, which was accordingly approved.

On motion J H Renfro was seated as a corresponding messenger. The committee on Pastors and Churches made the following report:

We have twenty-nine churches reported by letters and messengers and twenty report Sunday schools, showing an increase in Sunday school work of twenty-one per cent over last year. We wish to recommend that all the churches organize Sunday schools and maintain same next year. We find that the churches are living beneath their privileges and obligations in regard to Sunday schools and prayermeetings. We find that there is not a church within the bounds of the Association that has a pastor for more than one-fourth time. We believe that there are churches in our Association that need and are able to support a pastor for one-half time, and should do so. We further find that the salary of many of the pastors is entirely too low. It should be sufficient for his support, so that he could devote his entire time to the work of the Master. We therefore recommend that the messengers of the different churches try to awaken a greater interest and liberality in this line; that our pastors may be better prepared to do the work. Comes the committee on Ministerial Education and make the following report:

The time has passed when it was a question whether a minister of the gospel ought to be educated. The educational advantages of our faithful old fathers in Israel were very much limited, and yet God blessed their work, and we honor them for their work. But with the advantages we now have we cannot expect God's richest blessings unless we make good use of our opportunities. Morality and spirituality are the first qualifications of a good gospel preacher, but to these we must add a well trained mind. It certainly requires an educated intellect to understand and present clearly the greatest of all truths—God's Word. "Aptness to teach," says St Paul, "is an essential requirement in a preacher." And this aptness can surely be heightened by mental training. Jesus taught his preachers, the apostles, three years before he felt that they were prepared for the great work. To lead Israel to the promised land, God called a man "learned in all the ways of the Egyptians." He calls the "unlearned, but he expects them to learn. It ought to be a telling rebuke to us, that in some parts of the country the churches are advancing more rapidly than the preachers. To meet the demands of this day, our preachers must be educated. Men and women of intelligence are in the congregation. Who shall be in the pulpit? We are proud of the young ministers we have. Those who are not in school should be encouraged to go; while those in school ought to be encouraged to continue. We would urge all our young preachers to attend Ouchita college, and if possible, the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. In Ouchita we have Ed Cook, while in Paragould we have Ovid Wilcockson, Dallas Faulkner and Chapel Rogers; we must help these brethren. We would recommend that a cash collection be taken and that pledges be made by the churches and individuals present for this purpose. We would urge that the pledges be made much larger than usual, that we may encourage as far

as possible the preaching of the saving gospel of Jesus Christ.

8. We believe that repentance toward God, and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are the duties of every one who hears the Gospel.
9. We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, by which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.
10. We believe that Sanctification, begun in regeneration, and ever progressive, is the process by which we are made to partake of God's holiness.
11. We believe in the preservation of the saints; that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
12. We believe that God's law is the only, the eternal and unchangeable rule of His church and moral government.
13. We believe that a church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, united in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances and obeying the laws of Christ, and that its officers are pastors and deacons.
14. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a properly qualified administrator, into the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.
15. We believe that only such as have been properly baptized and received into the fellowship of a regularly organized Baptist church should partake of the Lord's Supper.
16. We believe that the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath, should be devoutly observed and sacredly devoted to religious service.
17. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of states and nations should be observed, when the laws they seek to enforce are not in conflict with the Gospel.
18. We believe in the future resurrection of the dead.
17. We believe in the final judgment, and that, in that day, the righteous and the wicked will be separated forever.
20. We believe that the righteous will be made happy forever in heaven and the wicked miserable forever in hell.
