SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

Red River Baptist Association

Held with the Sweet Hill Baptist Church, Arkadelphia, Arkansas, October 10, 11, 12, 1914.

Promptly at 10 o'clock a. m. on Saturday morning the River Baptist Association convened in its Sixty-Sixth Session with the Sweet Hill Baptist Church at Arkliphia, Arkansas, former Moderator W. A. Forbes in chair.

After the reading of a portion of 15th chapter of Cor. Moderator and prayer by T. J. Davis, the Moderacalled for the letters from the different churches to be and on the Clerk's table, and appointed Brethern D. P. and G. J. Bennett as Reading Clerks.

We have no means at hand for getting Sunday School tics. We do not know how many of our churches reunday Schools but judging from observation and inmade among the brethern we believe there has been progress over previous years, made in this work,

We note with pleasure that some of the Messengers this meeting are returning to their homes to-day to after their Sunday Schools. This leads us to believe that our people are beginning to realize, more than ever,

the importance of the work.

While we are glad to report progress in this line of our work, we must confess with sorrow that there is yet a great deal to be done before our fondest hopes are realized. The need for trained workers is sadly felt, men and wo men, trained in heart and interest. Teachers who have been to the cross and who know their Lord and Savior and delight to tell the story to a lost world.

We believe much good can be accomplished by holding Sunday School institutes or teacher training schools, and we would recommend that our Sunday School workers undertake to have at least one such gathering of the workers in each locality every year.

We believe that one of the greatest hinderances to the Sunday School work is a lack of interest on the part of the parents, especially the fathers. Some of our brethren seem to believe that church work is small business, suitable only for women and children. Brethren, the Lord business is the most important business that men ever gaged in. We therefore recommend that the brethren take their children to Sunday School instead of sending them.

The Orphans Home at Texarkana was burned last year, but now they are building a better home for those children down there than the one that was burned.

In our own midst Ouachita College has done a aple did work along this line. Several hundred young press ers have had their training wholly or in part here; God alone could estimate the significance to our denominational life this work has had.

During the past few years there have been about young preachers here being trained for greater efficiency. In spite of the fact that many of them have entered school after the period when the mind learns most rapidly, the men have averaged well in their work as students school. This, too, while they have had to lose time going to their appointments, and in preparing sermons for Sunday work.

From the day He called the humble fishermen of Gall lee, the Master has usually seen fit to go among the pour and lowly to call his ministers. As a result, most of the here have had to struggle against fearful odds to be financially, to stay in school.

To help them in this work, it has been the policy of the school to assist in a limited way to meet their expenses. During the past year, owing to the awful stress of the College debt, but little funds were provided by our people for this work. As a result, many of them had to quil school, and have not been able to return. Brethern this is lamentable. The indications now are that it will law worse this year than last. Wheelen Springs is a newly organized church. They have a membership of 39. They have good Sunday School. They are planning to build a house in the near future. They have secured a deed to their lots. They have called your Missionary as pastor and he expects to serve them.

The Board agreed to pay me \$50.00 per month, asking the State Board to pay half of this amount. Hence one half month would be \$25.00 and half of this would be \$12.50 less 52 cents, which would be \$12.30 for me.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD

TO THE RED RIVER ASSOCIATION:

Your Board of Missions soon after the last meeting employed Brother A. McPherson for one fourth of the time until the 1st of July. After which he was employed for full time.

In another meeting we employed Brother John Bledson and Brother W. A. Forbes to hold meetings at any con venient place. Brother Bledsoe being sick, Brother Acu was sent to take his place at Boswell. Their reports of work done have been read before you.

Also a letter was prepared and sent to the clerk or pastor of each church requesting a presentation of the work of the Association to their respective congregation and for a collection for the various branches of our work.

REPORT-"L"-Foreign Missions

When the Lord of the Harvest gave his farewell mand to his little church to "Go into all the world appreach the Gospel to every creature" he gave them a transit inconceivable as to magnitude. And were it not that added the gracious assurance "Lo I am with you, even us to the end of the world"—the task would have been to great for them to attempt. Even at the close of 19 even uries much of this task is yet to perform.

Southern Baptists are trying to bear their part in the work, not only in their home land, but also in the Foreign Field. We are doing Foreign Mission work in four fields Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Argentine and in three part fields—China, Africa and Japan.

These fields contain about half of the inhabitant the Earth; and to try to occupy this vast territory we have only 300 of our missionaries in the entire field. In dition, there are also 635 native workers. In all that territory there are only 380 churches, and 833 out and with 30,000 members, but God is graciously showing approval of their efforts by greatly prospering the Last year there were 5282 Baptisms.

In our offerings to this work during the past 40 years we have given from \$50,000 to about \$600,000. For the past few years the increase has been at the rate of about 10 per cent per annum.

It is a sad fact that only a small part of our Happing forces are contributing regularly or to any extent to the important work. Two important tasks confront us in gard to the matter of enlistment of interest and help this work.

1st—To enlist the unenlisted.

* 2nd-To get the enlisted to bear a larger vision of the work. Jesus said "Lift up Your Eyes; Behold and we the Ripe Unto the Harvest." The emphasis should be on the uplifting of the eyes to get the larger vision work.

CONSTITUTION

Art. 1. This union shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the Red River Association.

Art. 2. This association shall be composed of delefrom the churches in the union. Each church shall ntitled to three delegates, who shall be required to has satisfactory evidence of their appointment by be several churches before they take their seats.

Art. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organthemselves into a deliberative body by the appointnet of a moderator and clerk, who shall be chosen by allot at each annual association and continue in office and their successors are chosen.

This association shall not interfere with the Art. 4. wights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall mund them as independent in matters of internal govnon-t, and shall act as advisory counsel, assuming no . In fority except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently emplied by the nature of the com-It nevertheless claims authority over its members, delegates from churches and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from, and disown, all becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should therefore, regard all churches united under this multitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal means shall be to promote the declarative glory of God, av extending the kingdom of grace on earth through the mindium of preaching the gospel, and the means in acmordance with the gospel to cultivate union and fellowwith all the churches of Christ, especially those united in this constitution.

Art. 5. Newly constituted churches and churches missed from other associations of the same faith and the may be admitted into this union by sending three legates, their number in fellowship, number baptised, number baptised, excommunicated, reetored deceased since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be and minuted.

Art. 6. This association shall have a fund to be suplied by voluntary contributions of the churches. All the mey thus contributed shall be transmitted from the hurches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and 24

hold his office during the pleasure of the association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the association, and present annually for inspection in the minutes, a clean and succinct statement of all receipt and expenditures.

Art. 6. This association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

Art. 8. The association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from churches unless they have endeat ored to solve the same and have failed: nor of any difficuty between the churches unless they have pursued the direction in the XVIII chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them; then the association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its own direction.

Art. 9. It shall be the duty of the clerk of the association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body and deliver over the same to his successor in office.

Art. 10. This constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of this association by the concurrinvoice of two-thirds of the members present, provided such alterations or amendments be approved by the chuches comprising the association.
