Proceedings:

Thursday-Evening Session

THE Liberty Baptist Association met with the Junction City Baptist Church, in its Seventieth Annual Session, Thursday evening, at 7:30 o'clock, p. m., September 23rd. 1915. The Moderator, W. A. Moore, called the meeting to order. The opening prayer was led by A. C. Jones. The opening song service was led by J. G. Muse.

John T, Walters, the pastor of the church at Junction City, delivered the address of welcome. In a few well chosen words the response was delivered by E.J. A.McKinney editor of the Baptist Advance, and the first pastor of the

W. M. Wright moved that the present officers be elected for the ensuing year and that the vote of the body be cast by H. M. Geren. The motion was carried and the vote was cast for the following officers: W. A. Moore, Moderator; Geo. W. Mason, Clerk; B. F. Rogers, Treasurer.

The Moderator requested that the entire body join in prayer, led by H. M. Geren, for givine guidance and a harmon-

ious session.

The Moderator called for the letters from the churches

of the Association.

The introductory sermon was preached by W. F. Warren. Prayer was offered by J. S. Rogers, Secretary of the State Mission forces. The discourse was based on I. Cor. 13. The text "Love Never Faileth."

W. F. Warren made a motion that a committee be ap-

pointed to report on "Order of Business" at the morning session. The committee named was W. F. Warren, J. F. Johnston and Eugene Raley.

The following committee on divine service was appoint-

A motion was carried to adjourn until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock. After various announcements the benediction was pronounced by J. F. Johnston.

STATE MISSIONS

The Committee on State Missions made the following

report:

Your Committee on State Missions would report as follows: As the days go by the great importance of State Missions grows on the student of missions. If the Baptist denomination would become weak and lame and lose its power at home and abroad, let us cease to emphasize State Missions.

State Missions by churches cooperating in the Baptist State Convention includes revival meetings in destitute places and in weak churches, baptizing, reviving and enlisting laggard churches, colportage, projecting and helping to build church houses, and aiding weak churches in supporting pastors, raising church debts, Sunday School and Baptist Young People's Work, encouraging Woman's Work, and whatever else will send far and wide the pure gospel of Christ and upbuild the Baptist Cause in this great State.

In 1914 the churches cooperating through the Conven-

The amount of money needed to put the Executive Board of the Baptist State Convention out of debt for missions at the State Convention at Conway, November 18. 1915, is approximately \$20,000,000

proximately \$30,000.00.

So your Committee would make the following recom-

medations:
First—That agonizing prayer be made daily by all our people for God to lead us out of debt.

Second—That every pastor get all possible information about State Missions and give it out in burning messages to his people.

Third—That he try to give his people a larger vision of State Missions. and faithfully endeavor to secure an offering from every one of his members, and from every organiza-

tion in the churches.

Fourth—That the pastors and active laymen during the meeting of this body get together and make plans to reach every church in the Association for an offering to State Missions by the middle of November. It is the time for a great strong, self-sacrificing heroic pull all over the State. Send all money to J. S. Rogers, Little Rock, Ark.

After the reading of this report, the body went into recess till 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, in order to hear the missionary sermon from J. S. Rogers, secretary of the State Mission Board. After reading several passages from the Bible, he delivered a burning missionary message. The body adjourned till 2:00 o'clock, this afternoon.

Friday - Afternoon Session

The Association was called to order by the Moderator at 2:00 o'clock. Song service was led by L. S. Allen; prayer by E. J. A. McKinney. Discussion was resumed on State Missions. H. M. Geren moved that a committee be appointed to apportion the amount Liberty Baptist Association is asked to contribute to State Missions among the various churches and ask them to try to raise said amount. The following committee was appointed: H. M. Geren, J. A. Moore T. E. Voss, J. W. Cobb, Jordan Peace, W. M. Wright, J. F. Johnston, H. A, Mayfield.

The report was adopted on State Missions,

CHRISTIAN AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

The committee on Christian and Ministerial Education made their report which was discussed by W. M. Wright, E. J. A. McKinney, H. M. Geren, C. Lee Stocks and W. E. Jackson. It was adopted.

Your committee on Christian Education would report as

below:

Without well-equipped Baptist schools all of our Baptist

work would suffer and come to a standstill. We look to our Baptist schools for most of our trained workers in pulpit and pew, as well as on mission fields. Ninety-five cut of every hundred of our foreign missionaries come from our Baptist schools. The Bible is definitely in favor of Christian education. See Hosea 4:6, Matthew 28:20, Ephesians 4:18. So Christian education and its support must be put on the same basis with Missions.

Arkansas Baptists have two great Christian Colleges—Ouachita, for boys and girls, at Arkadelphia, S. Y. Jameson. D. D., President; Central, for girls, at Conway, J. W. Conger, LL.D., President. Last year Ouachita had about 325 students, and Central had about 200. These schools have rendered a service to the Baptist Cause in Arkansas, the value of which can never be estimated. The atmosphere of the schools is religious and reverent, and many students who have gone to them strangers to God have gone forth from them consecrated to God.

We are planning to have three mountain schools soon. One of these, the Ouachita-Maynard Academy at Maynard. W. A. Cummings, A.B., President, is running this year. We must help save North Arkansas by establishing good moun-

tain schools.

The education of preachers is one great object in Christian Education. The denomination that fails to provide for the education of its preachers will die as a denomination. Last year there were 39 young preachers in Ouachita College. They receive free tuition, and some help on other expenses when it is necessary. The Bible Department is arranged with special reference to the preachers, but the classes are open to all, and Bible is required of all who graduate.

Ouachita has been freed from debt. Central has considerable indebtedness yet. We need at least \$10,000,00 annually, to help take care of running expenses at Ouachita, and to pay on the indebtedness of Central. So every Baptist Church in this Association is asked to make an offering this

year for Christian Education.

This committee hopes that all our preachers will preach often this year on the needs and benefits of Baptist schools, and that our people will send their children to these Baptist schools. "Especially" do we emphatsize the importance of educating our young preachers.

ORPHAN'S HOME

The report on the Orphan's Home was read and adopted after being discussed by W. F. Warren, A. C. Jones, W. M. Wright, E. J. A, McKinney, J. V. Jenny, Mrs. McCurry. A motion was made and carried in which the body expressed their appreciations to W. F. Warren for his work in interest of the Orphan's Home.

Your committe on Orphan's Home beg leave to submit

the following report:

Pure religion and undefiled before God the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and the widows in their afflictions and to keep himself unspotted from the world. In the face of this declaration from God's word our duty is plain. We cannot neglect the fatherless and motherless children of our state without being recreant to our trust.

We have 193 children in the Home who are looking to us for support and care. These are our children. Do we love them? If so, let us prove it to them by contributing to their

support.

We commend our Associational Missionary who conceived the idea of sending a car of produce to our Home at Monticello. This car was estimated at \$600.00. The spirit of cooperation on the part of our people made this good work possible.

Your committee recommends:

1. That we send a car of produce each year to the Home

2. That our churches and Sunday schools take annual and monthly offerings respectively, for the Home.

PUBLICATIONS

The committee on Publications made their report. It was discussed by J. V. Jenny, W. M. Wright, E. J. A. Mc-Kinney, A. C. Jones, J. F. Johnston, and adopted as follows:

We, your committee on Publications, beg leave to sub-

mit the following report:

Realizing the urgent need of a revival, of an awakening. of a new interest in the study of the Bible and in religious work. And knowing of the stimulating power of good literature in this direction. We urgently recommend that every home be not only supplied with the Bible, Bible Dictionary, Bible History and Sabbath School Testaments, which are an actual necessity in the home, by that way the home can be liberally supplied with good Baptist literature, such as the Advance, the different Mission Journals. Orphan's Gem, Home Field, and other good Baptist papers, and especially the ones published by the Sunday School Board for the help of the classes. Also realizing the fact that children appreciate and take more interest in something of their own, we earnestly recommend that the subscriptions be given through different members of the family, and that it be seen to that the subscriptions be renewed regularly, also encourage them to get up clubs among their friends. Another thing we wish to call special attention to, is the growing and dangerous power of Catholicism. We believe that every home should contain a copy of the books in which Catholicism is exposed, and take some good anti-Catholic paper.

We also urge that a deligent watch be kept up for all trashy literature, and the misleading publications of the Catholics, Mormons, Holiness, Hollyrolers, Christian Science.

Christadelphian and all such dangerous doctrines, and they be gathered up and destroyed before they have a chance to poison the minds of the young. It may be putting it pretty strong, but we believe it a criminal negligence of parents not to supply their homes with plenty of good books and papers to take up all of the idle time of every member of the family so that there will be no time left for the trashy degrading stuff that is scattered broadcast over our county.

We honestly believe that every one wishing to be a good citizen should denounce the newspapers that carry whiskey and other immoral advertisements, and as Baptists we should denounce the publication of the Pastor Russell ser-

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Committee on Foreign Missions made its report; which was adopted after being discussed by H. M. Geren, J. T. Walters, Geo. W. Mason.

Our foreign mission work is the effort on our part to carry out the last command of our Lord and Master to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. The challenge of the hour to all our churches is the present call of our foreign mission work. The conditions of the world today are giving tremendous emphasis to the fact that all men need a simple New Testament religion. The non-Christian nations are awakening in a wonderful way and inquiring for the path of peace and the way of life. The doors are wide open. The people are more accessible than ever before. The harvest fields are ripe and we should now thrust in the sickle and reap on a scale that will far transcend anything in the past.

The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Va., composed of eighteen local members and eighteen state members representing each state in co-operation with the Southern Baptist Convention, is conducting work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, China, Japan and Africa. In these fields the missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out-stations, 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday Schools with 23,959 scholars and 8,833 students in mission schools, 384 of whom are in theological seminaries and training schools preparing to preach the gospel to their own people. There are 300 missionaries on the fields, 20 of whom

were sent out during the past year, and a total of 651 native workers. Notwithstanding difficult conditions on many of the fields caused by the European war and the injury to the work in Mexico from chaotic political conditions in that country, 5,190 baptisms were reported during the year.

The distressing financial conditions throughout the South created by the war in Europe caused a falling off in contributions to foreign missions last year. Many of the churches made heroic and sacrificial efforts but some of them were not able to keep up their usual contributions. This will make it more difficult for us to maintain the work this year unless God's people meet the situation in a still more heroic spirit. The Convention in Houston asked for an apprisonment of \$624,000 for foreign missions this year. Every dollar of it will be needed to carry on the work successfully. Our supreme task now should be the raising of the apportionment as a minimum in every association and every state. We should not for a moment think of anything less and we must do more than this if possible.

We therefore recommend:

1. That we as an Association undertake to raise for foreign missions our full proportion of the above sum; that this amount be divided among the churches on an equitable basis; that we earnestly urge the churches to contribute the amount asked of them; that each church inaugurate a plan of systematic weekly or monthly giving and remitting for this cause so that the work may be taken care of and debt and interest payments may be avoided.

2. That each pastor in the Association appoint a Committee in each church of which he is pastor to canvass the membership with a view to securing a subscription to the Foreign Mission Journal in every Baptist family within our bounds, so that our people may be more fully informed as to our

world-wide work.

The body took an hour's recess for preaching. J. F. Johnston occupied the pulpit. A Scripture lesson was read by J. T. Walters from John 6. Brother Johnston based his discourse on this miracle—the feeding of the 5000. An earnest appeal was made at the close of the service for a decision to accept Christ,

Various announcements were made. The meeting adjourned till 9:00 o'clock tomorrow morning. The benediction

was pronounced by R. Hester.

Saturday-Morning Session

The morning session opened at 9:00 o'clock with a song service. Prayer by A. R. Britt. The committee on letters read new letters that arrived, since yesterday.

H. M. Geren made a motion to limit speeches to ten minutes for chairmen and five minutes for others to discuss

reports.

A committee composed of A. Worthington, J. T. Howard and Ed Gains was appointed to collect the deficit neces-

sary to publish the Minutes of the Association.

W. M. Wright made a motion to amend the Order of Business by exchanging the places of Associational Missions and Temperance.

J. F. Johnston offered the following Resolutions:

RESOLUTIONS

Realizing the great importance of our Baptist people subscribing, paying for and reading the Baptist Advance.

Resolved: That the Liberty Baptist Association in session, respectfully ask that our Moderator appoint a committee of three brethren to conduct a vigorous campaign to place the Baptist Advance in every Baptist home in Liberty Baptist Association.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The committee on Associational Missions made the fol-

lowing report:

We, your committee on Associational Missions, report that we believe the most imperative and the most sacred privilege that this Association has is to preach the saving gospel of Jesus to the lost of this Association, and to extend a helping hand to any and all weak sister churches who may need our aid. We believe that by thus co-operating we can receive strength by the fellowship, and thereby be able to accomplish more in the service of our Master. Now to the end that the purpose of this Association may be carried out in this section of the state, we recommend:

1. That our churches assist in every way possible in locating Pastors in this Association. We have observed that the Pastor who lives out of the Association, and has the fourth of his time directed in another field, but comes into

our borders to preach once in each month is not able to give us the strength that he would perhaps otherwise add, therefore we conclude that the Pastor who has full time work in the Association, and can attend the Fifth Sunday Meeting and Association is the kind of leadership we need for our churches.

2. We urge that more stress be placed on the Fifth Sunday meeting by the Pastors and churches. We need more of the fellowship and information that comes to us through

these meeting.

3. That the Executive Board be authorized to employ a Missionary for as long a time as in there judgment, he can be sustained.

HOME MISSIONS

The committee on Home Missions made their report.

was discussed by W. M. Wright, and adopted.

Baptists in the South loved liberty of conscience so much that they suffered in Virginia repeated imprisonments for it. and a contemptuous persecution by the State Church, which lasted through more than half a century. God honored this noble passion of our spiritual sir s, and made it more influential than any other cause in bringing the blessing of religious liberty in America. The needs of our own day constitute a call to Southern Baptists to have a like passionate love for lost men and women and for the growth of the new life which is in Christ.

"As goes America, so will goes the World," has become almost an axiom among Christian statesmen. Never did the truth of this saying press home more forcibly to the hearts of thoughtful men than it does today. Most of the other so-called Christian nations of earth are doing their utmost to destroy each other, in the most colossal war which the world has ever seen. Never before was there so great a need that our concern for and support of Home Missions should be at concert pitch.

Christianizing America in our day is a task which has assumed almost tragic importance. It is an immense task. There are in America 50,000,000 persons of responsible age who make no profession of religious faith. In the South there are 18,000,000 such persons without religious faith.

Christianity has a better opportunity today to transform society in the South than elsewhere in America or in the world. Of every 100 evangelical Christians in the South

thirty-nine or forty are Baptists.

In this section the Baptists of the world have their supreme opportunity to win men and save society. Here is the best Baptist field for Home Missions and the opportunity to

create the greatest Baptist base for World Missions.

We challenge Southern Baptists to rise to this opportunity. The Home Mission Board in Atlanta, Georgia, is the great central agency of the Southern Baptist Convention through which our people address themselves as a unit to the task of saving the South. This general agency at many points co-operates with and supplements the indispensable effort of the denomination in each State through State Missions. Our Home Board has the distinction of being by far the most successful Home Mission Board in America, when the number of souls won to Christ by its workers is taken as the standard of comparison. The Home Board reported 38,000 baptisms by its workers last year. The next largest number of baptisms reported by a Home Mission agency was 10,000 by the Home Mission Society of Northern Baptists. Of this large number of baptisms 17,000 were creditable to cooperating agencies, but 21,000 were creditable directly to Home Mission endeavor. The dollar given to Baptist Missions in the South reaches a larger harvest in

souls than any other mission dollar spent in America.

Besides its great work in Evangelistic Missions, the Home Board is conducting a splendid activity in Intensive Missions, developing the Christ-life which was implanted at conversion. Both in its great system of mountain and other schools and in the Enlistment work among undeveloped churches, the Board is doing a great service, looking to the enlargement and enlistment of our thousands of non-cooperating churches. The brethren of these churches have with us the sweet fellowship that is in a common faith in Christ, the Savior.

The Home Board helps to maintain missionary pastors in cooperation with various State agencies, engages in work among the Negroes; is undertaking a great work for Church Extension; conducts foreigner mission schools and foreigner port and pastorial work; conducts a great system of mission schools for Highlanders; has instituted a most inspiring work of Enlistment in cooperation with State agencies; has the most successful Evangelistic Department possessed by any domestic missionary agency in America; preaches the gospel to the Indians in Oklahoma; does a notably successful work in Cuba and Panama.

We earnestly commend to our churches the support of the great work of Home Missions. The intense appeal of secular interests and of pleasure in our modern industrial civilization, calls for an increased effort to turn and hold the faces and hearts of men toward the heavenly city. In all our churches we should carry the work of the Home Mission Board of our hearts in prayer to God and should give freely

to the support of this great work.

1. We recommend that our churches be encouraged to make a larger use of the Home Mission tracts issued free by the Home Mission Board, and that study classes be formed in the Board's study class book, "Baptist Home Mission."

2. We urge that larger effort be made in the churches to get clubs of subscribers to THE HOME FIELD. It is a distressing and lamentable situation that only one Baptist preacher in five gets this magazine, which is only 25c a year in clubs of five or more. Sample copies gladly sent to any

Baptist who will write for them.

3. The Home Board furnishes for 50c a set of fine large wall charts suitable for the church. If these charts were in the churches of the Association they would do a great deal to

teach what Home Mission work is.

4. In order to make effective and definite the obligations of the individual churches to take their full share of Home Mission work, we recommend that this Association assume \$800 as its share of the State apportionment, and that the Executive Committee be authorized to apportion this amount fairly among the churches.

TEMPERANCE.

The committee on Temperance made their report. It was discussed by M. P. Muse, J. F. Johnston, E. J. A. Mc-Kinney.

We your committee on Temperance beg leave to sub-

mit the follows:

It is exceedingly gratifying to us as a Christian nation

to see the rapid progress in the temperance cause in this United tates of ours, most especially in our beloved state, Arkansas.

By referring to our minutes, we see that we as Baptists have been resoluting on temperance since the organization of the Liberty Baptist Association. Sometimes we felt awfully discouraged, seemed to make but little headway, but by constant vigilence and untiring efforts, we have won out in the one big battle for temperance in Arkansas. remember that great reforms work slowly. We remember that liquor a few years ago was sold and trafficked in every town, village and hamlet in Arkansas. We can rise up on January 1st, 1916 and say: "Blessed be the name of the Lord; Bleesed be His Holy name, we have rid the vile stuff from the borders of our beloved state." This is what local option has done. May we voice the sentiment of the Baptists when we say we are local optionists. Local option may be slow in its operation, but effective in the end. Convince a man against his will, he will still be of the same opinion, and what will apply to men will certainly apply to the affairs of the county and state.

We want to commend our last legislators for passing the state-wide prohibition bill. We feel like they were justifiable from the local option standpoint, since about 68 out of 75 counties voted against license. Most especially do we want to commend our late Moderator and beloved Governor Geo. W. Hays, for the initiative and position he took and maintained in the all important questions of temperance and up-

lift of humanity in our great state.

Now since liquor cannot and longer be legalized in our state, we believe in state rights, therefore be it resolved, that we call upon and petition our senator and congressmen to do all in their power to pass a federal law prohibiting the issuance of federal license to anyone in prohibited districts or states where people have voted against or by statutes prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors.

We further commend our legislators for the effective narcotic law. The habit of using narcotics was fast growing among some of our best people. This is the most damnable habit known to individuals in the civilized world. We feel like this law will prove a great blessing to the citizen-

ship of our state.

There is another menace to the youth of our state. that is cigarettee smoking. While we have a law on our statute books against this curse, but it is not effective nor enforced.

We will have to regulate this evil through some other means. We recommend that this habit be denounced by patrons. school teachers, and by our Sunday schools, thereby be forced by public sentiment to do away with this curse.

We further recommend that we as Baptists cast our votes for no man for any public office, who is not sober, honest and upright in his demeanor, and above all have him declare him-

self against liquor in any form whatever.

May we recommend in this report that we as Baptists. since we live in a dry state, we forego the old time custom of ordering our Christmas jug. Let's be consistent; live and practice what we talk and vote.

Muse The report was adopted as follows: The howl has often been made, that the church has too much machinery already. And if that be true, still no objection just can be raised against the laymen's movement, for it only serves the function in the church that the foundation does to the engine And as a firm compact foundation is necessary to the successful running of the engine, so is a strong united membership to the church.

Being the bed rock of the church, her real strength has been proved by the way the foundation has stood the test of financial and spiritual strains. To illustrate: When the genuinness and sincerity of men's religion was questioned, they rose up in masses, independent of the preacher and took a stand for God and righteousness. And today we find men in every locality willing to shoulder the responsibility

of church duties and worldly criticism.

Then again: By whom has the perfect financial plan been wrought out? It has been through the laymen movements. The ministry has preached tithing for more than nineteen hundred years. But it has been only in recent years, since the laymen took hold of it, that much progress has been made.

In brief this movement has proved to the world that there is both joy and service for the laymen as the preachers. Therefore, We your committee recommend that every laymen throw himself fully into the work of the master, attend all religious and denominational meetings possible, and especially meetings of this particular movement.

The committee on Sunday Schools reported. Brief discussions were given by J T Walters and Geo. W Mason. A motion was made to adopt the report as read and defer the discussions until the Sunday school mass meeting at 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning.

We, your committee beg leave to submit the following

report:

A more vital interest is being manifested in this exceedingly important department of Kingdom building. Not only pastors but our laity are emphasizing the fumdamental importance of the school to the church Call it what we will it is the Bible school of the church. It is no new fangled notion, but as old as Abraham in its fundamental principles.

There never has been a great revival of pure and undefiled religion in Old Testament or New Testament, ancient. medaeval or modern days that has not been preceeded by a genuine revi al of Bible study Any effort to maintain a sane evangelistic note must inevitably prove a dismal failure today in any church that neglects the Sunday school. This convention thrills us that the overwhelming majority of all our converts come to us from our Sunday schools Perhaps 90 out of every 100. Absolutely no department of our throbbing life that the Sunday school does not touch and We find records of 35 schools with 2705 pupils (surely the number is much larger this year,) 202 teachers (largest number yet reported,) and \$635.86 collected and disbursed on Sunday school expenses, every one of these schools seems to be using our S. B. C. literature. We are very glad of this. We are sad to know almost a dozen of these churches with no school, and urge that they take immediate steps to organize one. We commend the graded system wherever practicable We suggest that smaller classes would spell a greater efficiency. This would mean more classes consequently more members with special work. We not only recommend that every school be represented at our Arkadelpnia encampment and that every pupil of every school be deligently taught the "Gospel of Giving," but also that, so far as possible every school maintain a training class and at least a weekly teachers meeting. Last but not least, we beg you, without fail, try to secure the service of our efficient Secretary, D. S. Campbell for an institute or other help. He wishes to help you. Already the Lord hath done g eat things for us whereof we are glad, But let us remember there remaineth yet much land to be possessed and that we be fully able to go up and possess it.
