The Mt. Vernon Baptist Association met with the Good-Hope Baptist church, Woodruff county, Arkansas, October 17, 1890, at 11 o'clock a. m. The former Moderator being absent, at the suggestion of the clerk, Elder W. H. Paslay was called to the chair.

The introductory sermon was preached by L. K. Obenchain from 1st Corinthians, 16th chap. 22d verse. After an intermission of an hour for refreshments the Association assembled for business. Song: "How Firm a Foundation," &c. Prayer by Elder E. P. Minton, of Jonesboro.

The Moderator appointed the following Conmittee on Devotional Exercises: J. B. Hodges, W. F. Ligon, Pastor S. D. Johns and deacons of Good Hope church, after which the body proceeded regularly to the election of officers. It was agreed to elect all the officers at one ballot.

Committee on Devotional Exercises reported that J. S. Edmonds preach to night. Elder W. H. Paslay was elected Moderator; L. K. Obenchain, Clerk, and R. G. Hewlett, Treasurer.

Petitionary letters were read from Cotton Plant and Rama churches, which were duly received as members of this body, and the right hand of fellowship extended to the messengers. Order of business of last year adopted for the present. Visiting brethren were invited to seats, whereupon Elder E. P. Minton was enrolled from Mt. Zion Association; also, D. Rooks; Elder T. Hudson, corre-

sponding messenger from Velvet Ridge Association.

The following were appointed corresponding messengers: To Mt. Zion, S. D. Johns, J. S. Edmonds; Caroline Association, W. H. Paslay; to the State Convention, S. D. Johns, J. S. Edmonds, J. W.

Cooper, L. K. Obenchain.

On motion, Elder J. S. Edmonds was elected messenger to the Southern Baptist Convention, and W. H. Paslay, alternate. Suspended regular order of business for half an hour for devotional exercises. Elder C. E. Smith, missionary from Africa, being invited to a seat, was called upon to conduct the service. Business of Association resumed. Address of welcome by Elder S. D. Johns; responded to by W. H. Barnes, D.D. Adjourned to meet tonight after service. Song, Doxology. Benediction by Moderator.

FRIDAY NIGHT.

The time having arrived for service, Elder J. S. Edmonds preached an interesting sermon to an appreciative audience from Acts 16:20., after which the Association resumed business.

PUBLICATIONS.

Your committee would submit-that the Arkansas Baptist should receive the general and hearty support of the members of this Association as our state Baptist paper. And that our Sunday Schools should use our own denominational literature, abundant supplies of which may be obtained at almost nominal prices from our own Kind Words publications at Atlanta, Ga.; or from the American Baptist Publication Society, at Philadelphia or St. Louis.

The Moderator appointed the following Committee on Obituaries: J. P. Farrar, Sr.: John Langston and S. D. Johns, 'Committee on Religious Exercises reported that W. H. Barnes, D. D., preach to-morrow at 11 o'clock. It was agreed that the Committee on Temperance report to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock. Adjourned to meet at 8:30, and spend half an hour in devotional exercises, conducted by Eld. J. S. Edmonds: Prayer by W. H. Barnes, Benediction by S. D. Johns.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Met pursuant to adjournment. After devotional exercises the body was called to order by the Moderator. Song 48 in Gospel Hymns. Prayer by S. D. Johns. Special order.

- TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report the following: That the Bible teaches temperance in all things, and condemns intemperance in all things; and, taking the Bible as our standard to govern us in all our actions, we are persuaded that it is the duty of every man; first, that he owes it to his God; second, to himself; third, to his country; to give his influence religiously, politically and socially to the destroying and removing from our fair land the accursed traffic called alcohol and your committee recommend to the Messengers

of this Association to abstain from every appearance of this traffic, and, by their practice, lead others to do the same; thereby glorify God and exalt humanity. J. S. Edmonds, Ch'r. Committee.

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

Your committee will submit: First, that no more important subject in the line of Christian work will engage the attention of this Association than that heading this report. It is one of vital interest, and is associated with all departments of Christian effort -to preach the Gospel at home and It is to this object, mainly, that our contributions for missions -association, state, home and foreign -are intended to be appropriated. To be spent in supporting the preacher of the Gospel while preaching Jesus Christ to the religiously destitute, both in our own and in foreign lands. ing our duty in supporting the missionary, we should not forget the fact that the men who preach to us -to our churches at home -- are in the same line of Christian calling, office and labor, and have the same rights and claims guaranteed to them by the Scriptures that the missionaries have. It is just as true in regard to the one class as the other, that God hath ordained that they that preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel: 2 Cor., 9. Second, the Apostle Paul, in this chapter, (2 Cor. 9) treats at length the subject of ministerial support. By various illustrations and declarations he sets forth God's plan upon this subject: He asks-"Who goeth a warfare at any time at his own charge; who planteth a vineyard and eateth not of the fruit thereof; or who feed tha flock and eateth not of the milk of the flock. Say, I these things as a man; or saith not the law the same also. For it

is written in the law of Moses: Thou shalt no muzzle the mouth of the ox that treadeth out the Doth God take care of oxen! Or sait! he it is altogether for our sakes. For our sake no doubt this is written: That he that ploughet! should plough in hope, and that he'that threshet in hope should be partaken of his hope. If w have sown unto you in spiritual things, is it a grea thing that we shall reap your carnal things! D ye not know that they which minister about hol things live of the things of the temple, and the which wait at the altar are partakers with th altar! Even so hath the Lord ordained that the that preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel. Third, we submit that God's plans are always th best in all cases, and under all circumstances, fo all parties concerned. Fourth, therefore much los is sustained by a failure to carry out his plans. I failure in this case involves a loss of ministeria labor to the cause of Christ, and of ministeria efficiency. For no preacher who has to toil on th farm, or spend his time in the school room, or be en gaged in any other secular pursuit for a support in whole or in part, can be as useful as a preacher a he might be under other circumstanges. And you committee think that it would not be difficult t show from the Scriptures that the church member ship that fail to carry out God's plans to the ful extent, sustain, as a consequence, not only a spiri loss, but, in many cases, a financial loss as well. W would therefore exhort the churches of this Asso ciation to come up to the full measure of their dut. in supporting those who preach to them the price less Gospel—the unsearchable riches of Christ—a we consider that for a church to act otherwise is to be unfaithful to themselves, to the world, their pas tor, and their God. And we fear that for a church to promise a stated salary to its pastor, and fail, un der ordinary circumstances, to pay it, is to be guilt, of the lie charged against Annanias, viz: Lying to the Holy Spirit.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After refreshments the Association assembled for business. W. A. Clark, D. D., editor of the Arkansas Baptist, and Eld. Milam making their appearance, were invited to seats. Letter from Pleasant Grove church was read, asking assistance to build a house of worship. On motion, the matter was referred to the Executive Board.

STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on this subject would report that Bro. B. G. Manard was appointed by the State Board to act as Secretary of State Missions during the present conventional year, and from his reports that have been published from time to time in the Arkansas Baptist, he seems to be doing a grand work in awakening an interest in State Missions and raising funds for this purpose. As regards the points that are being aided by the State Board, and the amounts appropriated, your committee are not posted, and have no means of learning. This we regret, but would recommend the churches of this Association, as they have opportunity and

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ability, to aid in this work as one that demands the support of all Baptist churches within the State of Arkansas.

Resolved. That the chairman of our Association Board be instructed to report the funds spent by us for Association Missions to the Secretary of the State Board, so that we may be credited for the same by the Home Mission Board of the Southera Baptist Convention.

R. G. Hewlett in the chair. Remarks, were made by W. H. Paslay, J. S. Edmonds, and, after taking a collection amounting to 814, was adopted.

HOME MISSIONS,

By Home Mission, in this connection, is meant the work of the Home Mission Board of the South ern Baptist Convention located at Atlanta, Ga. The field of this Board includes the territory with in the Southern States, the Indian Territory, and the Cuban Mission. This Board has done a great work within the States of the South in the past, Arkansas included, and therefore it has special claims upon us that we should be ready to meet when called upon. This Board calls upon this State for one thousand dollars to aid them in their work during the present year. We think this demand should be complied with, and then we would return a small part of the aid rendered our cause in this State in its hour of great need. If this State gives this Board \$1,000 they will spend it within this State and give us \$2,000 more, making \$3,000 they will spend within the State of Arkansas,

After speeches by S. D. Johns, R. G. Hewlett, J. S. Edmonds and W. A. Clark, and an agreement to take collection for Home Missions to-increow, the report was adopted.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

After one Lord had finished His work and suf-

fered a cruel death, and had arisen from the tomb, having conquered the last enemy, death, He said to his disciples, "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth. To ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing these in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo I am with you even unto the end of the world." In obedience to this command, the Southern Baptist Convention are doing work through its Foreign Board, located at Richmond, in three Pagan fields and in three Roman Catholic fields. Following are partial statistics of our work:

I. PAGAN FIELDS.

1. China. Main stations, 7. (From these centers much outside work is done). Missionaries, male and female, 36. Native workers, 27. Population of China more than 200,000,000 (two hundred million).

2. Africa.—Main stations, 3. Out stations, 1. (Each main station is a large city). Missionaries, male and female, 10. (Three of these are at home on account of ill health). Native workers, 2. School teachers, 4. Church members, 54. A native, self-supporting church has sprung up from the mission, numbering nearly 100. Day schools, 2; with about 200 schelars. Sunday Schools, 3; with about 150 scholars. Name of country, Yoruba; population niore than 2,000,000. Population of Africa estimated at 200,000,000.

3. Japan - Missionaries, 4. This field has only

recently been entered.

II. ROMAN CATHOLIC FIELDS.

1. Italy.—Stations, 12. Missionaries, 3. Native preachers, 12.

2. Brazil.-Stations, 5. Missionaries, 9. Native

preachers, 2.

3. Mexico.—Stations, 11. Missionaries, 19. Native preachers and colporteurs, 3.

There is scarcely a nation or a tribe in the world that is not now open to the missionary, and the Macedonian cry is coming up faster than or Board can enter the open doors, because of the war of means. ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS,

Your Committee on Associational Missions would respectfully submit the following: When we contrast the religious status of our territory with what it was a few years ago, we have every reason to thank God, and take courage. We now have prosperous churches, where a few years ago the sound of the Gospel was not heard; but there is still considerable destitution within the bounds of our Association which needs the pure word of God. We are also glad to note an increased disposition on the part of our churches to aid in supplying the Gospel to these hungry and starving souls. Brethren, let us remember that the Bible teaches us that the liberal soul shall be made fat. While we are feeding others, our own souls are feasting. Since

orir last Association two new churches have been organized, and our ministerial force has been increased, and we are in a better condition to advance our lines than we have hitherto been. As the Lord is prospering our present mode of operation, we would recommend a continuation of the same plan.
