MINUTES,

Jones' Creek Church, Scott co., Ark., Saturday, October 17th, 1885.

The delegates composing the fifteenth annual session of the Concord Baptist Association of Western Arkansas assembled at 11 o'clock.

Introductory Sermon was preached by J. N. Pen-

nington. Text, 1 Cor. 15:58.

AFTER DINNER. The association was called to order by the Moderator, L. F. Patterson. After the reading of the 2nd chapter of Eph., united in prayer with F. T. Hale.

Letters from the churches were read by Brethren James and Tate.

The election of annual officers resulted as follows; R. P. Claborn Moderator, W. L. Compere Clerk, H. H. Mouser Treasurer.

New Churches received; Ross Creek, Union and Mt Gilead. Right hand of fellowship was extended to their messengers.

On motion, a letter of dismission was granted Dutch Creek Church, in order that she might become a member of a new association to be organized in Yell county, on Sat before the 1st Sab. in Nov., 1886. By request of her delegates, the Mod. appointed to attend the organization; A. A. Spiller, T. J. Condry and J. N. Pennington.

Correspondence received from Ouachita Association; Eld. Jesse Green and Dr. Hardin. Hand of fellowship extended.

Ordered that regular appointment of committees be carried out. Adj. till 8 o'c. Monday morning.

Preaching at night, at the church, by H. H. Mouser; followed by J. M. Lindsey. At Whitlock's School House, by J. W. Miller; followed by J. H. York. At Mt. Gilead, by J. J. Holland; followed by Wiley Ayers.

SABBATH. Prayer meeting at 10 o'c., at the close of which, the audience was entertained for a short time by a speech by Prof. Chas. D. James, on the subject of educaton in general and Buckner College in particular. Missionary Sermon at 11 o'c., by L. F. Patterson. Text, Acts, 26:19. After the Sermon, a collection, amounting to \$13.85 in cash and \$8.50 in pledges, was taken up, to be appropriated to the missions of Concord Association.

REPORT ON FORE GN & INDIAN MISSIONS.

Our Master said, "Go teach all nations," "preach the gospel to every creature." This his church must do, for none other will; neither bad men nor good angels are commissioned to this work. The heathen are lost and cannot be saved without the gospel. "Neither is their salvation in any other" but Jesus. Acts 4:12. And the heathen have never heard of Jesus. And in Jer., "they shall teach no more every man his neighbor and every man his brother, saying 'know the Lord'; for they all shall know me, from the least of them unto the greatest of them."

Let us feel for, pray for, labor for, talk for, and collect money for the heathen. Let us give the Lord's money to send the gospel to the heathen, and if the Lord will accept, let us not withhold our children to carry the gospel to them. Let us remember the golden rule — do to them as we would have them do to us.

APPENDIX.

The following is a copy of the communication presented by Bro. Washburn to our Association;

"Resolutions passed by the Concord Asso iation, assembled with Cedar Creek Church, on the 28th day of Sept., 1885.

Whereas, In consequence of the unfortunate division in the Concord Association, there now exists two separate and distinct bodies, each claiming to be the Concord Association; and,

Whereas, It is essential to the good of the carse of Christ and the success of the Church, not only that brotherly love and fraternal affection should pervade the entire body of the Baptist people, but that unity of action and concert of effort should be maintained among Baptists throughout the country; and,

Whereas, There are at present a large number of brethren in both bodies now claiming to be the Concord Association, who have no true knowledge of the foundation of the division, while many others have not so much as heard of it except by mere mention, all of whom entertain the warmest christian feeling and brotherly love each for the other, not only worshipping together, but siking together around the Lord's table with every expression of filial affection; and,

Whereas, The said unfortunate division is a great calamity and highly detrimental to the best interest of our Master's cause and ought not longer to exist; therefore,

Resolved, by the Concord Association a sembled with the Cedar Creek Church, that each and every church formerly in union with us. and now associated together as the Concord Association appointed to meet with the Jones' Creek Church, on Sat. Lefore the 3d Sabhath in Oct., 1885, he and they are hereby cordially invited to assemble with us by delegation, in the same manner and under the same rules and ratio of representation as formerly and before the said division, laying aside forever everything connected with the said division. And, he it further

Resolved, That we, the Concord Association assembled with Cedar Creek Church, do hereby pledge ourselves that, laying aside all remembrance of former difference, we will receive such delegation with all proper expressions of welcome and brotherly recognition. The above mentioned meeting to be with the Charleston Church, on Sat. before the 4th Sabbath in September, A. D. 1886.

Resolved, further. That this body appoint a committee of five to meet with the body above mentioned at Jones' Creek Church, on Sat. before the 2d Sabbath in Oct., 1885, and deliver to them a copy of these resolutions; and, that the Clerk be instructed to have these resolutions spread upon the minutes, and a copy of the minutes sent to each church composing that body."

Of the "committee of five" above mentioned, only Bro. Washburn was present. The above communication, having been read before the Association, was referred to a committee consisting of J. J. Holland, H. H. Mouser, L. F. Patterson, J. W. Miller and A. H. Farmer. This committee made the following report:

Whereas, The churches that separated from us on account of the Kregel difficulty have sent us the foregoing proposition for reunion, by the hands of Bro. A. G. Washburn; and,

Whereas, The proposition invites this body to meet those churches in Charleston, next September, and organize with them. Now, therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That we are devoutly thankful for this evidence of their desire for reunion, for which we have prayed and labored. However,

Resolved, 2nd, That we regret that there are difficulties in the way of accepting the present proposition. First, the Charleston Church has not invited us to meet with her; and again, we regard that church as being in disorder in the endorsement of F. L. Kregel, which we understand still remains on her records; and again, that she holds certain brethren as excluded whom we hold as perfectly regular. Resolved, 3d, That we are ready for union with any of those churches, except the Charleston Church, and would gladly unite with her if her records were corrected so as to withdraw the endorsement given F. L. Kregel in 1880, and so as to rescind the act of exclusion of certain members who were known as the Minority Church.

Resolved, 4th, That an honorable basis of settlement was proposed by a council over which Dr. A. S. Worrell presided, in Greenwood, in 1883, that recommended the Majority Church to withdraw her endorsement of F. L. Kregel; and, on such withdrawal, the Minority Church was recommended to withdraw her act of declaration of non-fellowship for the Majority; and, on this withdrawal, the Majority was advised to rescind her act of exclusion of the members of the Minority.

Resolved, 5th, That we endorsed the Minority as the regular Charleston Church; and that, to avoid confusion, that Church dissolved, and her members joined other churches, which action we heartly approved as manifesting a christian spirit; but before they dissolved they promptly accepted the above mentioned basis of settlement, and spread it on their church book. All this we approved. And when the Majority will accept the same settlement we shall rejoice. But we cannot lend our influence to destroy brethren whom we are sure did only their duty in the Charleston Church trouble.

Resolved, 6th, That, if the Charleston Church will remove the above named difficulties and furnish the Moderator of this Association with a transcript of her action, at any time before March, 1886, then the officers of this Association may call on the churches to send messengers to meet with the Charleston Church, Sat. before the fourth Sabbath in Sept., 1886, to organize the Concord Association, and with any and all churches that have been members of Concord Asso.

Resolved, 7th, That, if the Charleston Church with not remove the above named difficulties, and any of those churches still desire union with us, any and all of them are hereby cordially invited to send messengers to meet with us at Pleasant Hill Church, on Sat. before the third Sabbath in Oct., 1886, the basis of representation being the same as heretofore.

Resolved, 8th, That our Clerk is hereby instructed to have these resolutions printed in our minutes, and send five copies of our minutes to each of those churches, that they may see this, our answer to the

above named proposition.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Association;

Resolved, That Eld. L. F. Patterson is hereby requested to visit the Charleston Church, and assure them that the desire of this body is for union.
