## MINUTES

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The 37th annual session of Red River Baptist Association

met with Arkadelphia church, Sept. 26, 1885.

The introductory sermon was preached by Bro. N. J. Price by previous appointment—text, Romans, 4th chapter and 16th verse.

At 1:30 o'clock, the body was called to order by Bro. Copeland, Moderator. Read 8th chapter of Romans. Prayer was

then offered by Bro. Jenkins, of Denton, Texas.

Letters from the churches comprising this body was presented, and Bro. Jones, of Prescott; Z. T. Rogers and R. G. Edwards, were appointed to read. Two letters claiming to be from Providence church, the one represented by Bro. N. J. Price, J. M. Price and A. J. Fomby, were received; the other was not, and the letter returned to Bro. Coleman.

Messengers names enrolled and the rell was called.

Moderator appointed Bro. Haris, of Shover Spring, and Bro. Jones, of Prescott, to take the vote for Moderator and Clerk, who reported Bro. Copeland re-elected Moderator, and T. A. Heard, Clerk.

The delegates from Clear Spring church, having misplaced the church letter, by motion was received and their names

enrolled.

Bros. Goodin, Deaton and J. V. Browning, in connection with the messengers of this church, were appointed a committee on divine service.

Called for petitionary letters—received none.

Dr. A. B. Miller, pastor of the 2nd Baptist church of Little Rock, and Bro. A. W. Files, treasurer of said church, were invited to address the association in the interest of their church, asking aid to help build a meeting-house, after which a collection of \$82,50 was raised in cash and pledges to be paid by 1st of January

Committee on divine service reported: Bro. Miller, of Little Rock, to preach to-night; Bro. G. W. Reeves, of Fort Smith, to-morrow at 11 o'clock, followed by Bro. Early of Mortiton; Bro. C. M. Haris, of Shover Spring, at 11 o'clock at the L. Church; Bro. Collins of Mississippi, at the Colored Baptist

church, at 3 o'clock; Bro. Bell, at 7 o'clock, followed by Z. T.

Rogers

Called for correspondence and visiting brethren. T. J. Butcher, of Union Association; Wm. Daniel, of Saline; A. B. Miller, of Carolina; P. H. Hill, of Pine Bluff; M. D. Early, of Russellville; O. S. Jones and W. E. Atkinson, of Union. Letter from Caddo river and letter from W. A. Forbes, from Mason City, Mo. Alltho brethren were cordially invited to seats in his body, also Bro D. D. Corbin.

The following resolutions were read by Bro. Atkinson, of Prescott, and after being ably discussed by Bros. Atkinson, Ear-

ly and Conger, were adopted:

RESOLVED—1st. That it is the sense of this association, that the establishment of a first class college in our state is

necessary to our denominational prosperity.

2nd. That we are in sympathy and hearty accord with the effort now being made by the Arkansas Baptist convention, to establish a school of high order, at some suitable place in our state, for the purpose of educating our children.

3rd. That we will encourage the establishment of such a school with our means, to the extent of our ability, and when established we will support it with our patronage and our in-

fluence.

Reported that Dr. J. R. Graves, of Memphis, was passing on the train for Little Rock, and prayer was offered by the body in his behalf.

On motion, adjourned to Monday morning, at 9 o'clock.

Prayer meeting conducted by Bro. Early after Sabbath school. Subject of prayer was for greater interest in the Sabbath school. At 11 o'clock the pulpit was occupied by Bro. Reeves, of Fort Smith; at 3 o'clock, Bro. Weeks, of Prescott; at 7:30 o'clock, Dr. Womark, editor of the Arkansas Evangel. The word was preached from the Bible, substanciating the doctrine of the Baptist church, and many made to rejoice. Collection for state mission, \$44.

SECOND DAY.

Monday morning—Met pursuant to adjournment, after singing hymn, "Near the Cross." Prayer was offered by Bro. Gunter.

The body was called to order and proceeded to business. The following committees were announced by the Modera-

Bro. H. H. Coleman read and offered a resolution. The Moderator decided it out of order. Bro. Coleman then appealed to the body. Bro. Horn was then called to the chair and the resolution was then re-read, and the Moderator was sustained by a majority vote of the body.

Bro. Tillman Howel asked permission to talk to the associ-

ation, which was willingly granted him.

Bro. Early proposed that a prayer be offered that brotherly love prevail in this body, and by request a fervent prayer was made by him to that end.

Report of the committee on education was read, and its great importance was fully discussed by many of the brethren and the following report was adopted:

Your Committee on Education respectfully submit the following re-

port: -

We recognize knowledge as the world's great civilizer, and education as the handiwork of religion. We, Baptists, as followers of our Master, have more to fear from ignorance and less to fear from a broad and liboral culture of mind and heart than any people under the sun. We feel that it is our imperative duty as Christians to foster our institutions of learning, and that the education of our children is one of the greatest responsibilities resting upon us. In the language of Dr. Mayo, "Every state, city and county has under it an open slough, through which the all-pervading national barbarism, home and foreign, that rolls its foul and festering subterranean tide from Maine to Mexico, disgorges its hideous malaria. The fumes of this malaria of evil and wickedness will make the head sick and the heart feint judges every good man and will make the head sick and the heart faint, unless every good man and woman continually cast in labor and prayer, without ceasing, as disinfectants." We know of no way to dry up the sources of every sort of folly and wickedness except God's original method, to put a wise, good man in place of every foolish one; to put a good mother in every family, a good minister in every church, a good teacher in every school. We desire Gou's blessing upon our efforts to educate our children, and especially do we desire His blessing upon the great enterprise of building a State college, at which the Baptists of the future may be trained.

Report on destitution read as follows, and was adopted: We, your committee, report that their is destitution in the boundaries of this association, to wit: The northwest portion of Pike county and the northeast portion of Howard. Bro. D. S. Howell asked leave of absence, which was granted. Bro. Coleman, Chairman of committee on Obituaries, read

the following which was adopted:

3d. That the Pastors all be requested to act as financial agents to

raise funds and thus co-opperate with the board.

The above report was adopted and the following brethren was appointed to consist of the home mission, board, E. Merrell, Chairman, S. S. McDaniel, D. D. Corbin in the western portion, and T. A. Heard Chairman, H. J. P. Horn and J. L. Bozeman, in the eastern part of this association.

Bro. J. T. Hall presented his report on Sabbath School,

and the following was adopted:

We, your Committee on Sabbath Schools, make the following our re-

We find the Sabbath school cause greatly neglected in our Association, and not that interest, zeal and effor put forth by the churches and ministers as should characterize us as true lovers of the Lord Jesus Christ. Bretnren, this is a great, grand and glorious work of God in the hand of the churches in training the young, the rising generations, and lead them to Christ. This can be done best and most effectually in the Sabbath school.

Only eight churches in this Association report Sabbath schools, and

some of them only part of the time.

Brethren, think for a moment of the vast numbers of children in the bounds of this Association who are deprived of the holy and blessed influence of the Sabbath school, many of them unable to read God's word and deprived of the privilege of hearing the gospel preached, and so many, oh, so many of us making no effort to point them to Christ. We have nothing new to ecommend, but trust God will put it into the hearts of his children to rise up and do their duty-go labor in His vineyard and do what our hands find to do.

Resolved by this body that a vote of thanks be heartily tendered to Arkadelphia church friends for kind manners in

which this body has been sustained.

Ordered that the Clerk have 700 copies of these minutes printed and distributed to the churches, and be allowed \$15.00 for his services.

Bro. Frank White. of Benton, occupied the pulpit at 11

o'clock and preached a good sermon.

While singing a hymn the parting hand was extended by the brethren and adjourned to meet with Ozan church on Saturday before the 4th Sabbath in September, 1886.



#### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

We believe in one true and living God.

We believe that the Scriptures, comprising the Old and New Testaments, are the words of God, and the only rules of our faith and prac-

We believe in the doctrine of election according to foreknowledge of God, the Father, through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the doctrine of Original Sin by the fall of Adam. 5 We believe in man's incapacity of his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

6 We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the im-

parted righteousness of Christ, only.
7 We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall

finally away.

8 We believe that baptism and the Load's supper are the ordinances of Jesus Ohrist, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism and that immersion is the Apostolic mode.

9 We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

10 We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the gospel but one who is regularly baptised, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the presbyter.

11 We believe that none but regularly baptised members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

to commune at the Lord's table.

12 We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

ARTICLE 1. This Union shall be konwn and distinguished by the name and title of "The Red River Baptist Association."

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of delegates from the churches in the Union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

ART. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who

shall be chosen by ballot at each annual Association, and continue in

office until their successors are chosen.

ART 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed: it shall regard them as indpendent bodies in matters of internal government, and shall act as advisory counsel assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied from the very nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its own members, the delegates from the churches, and injustice and propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the spirit of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith, or disorderly in practic should, therefore, regard all churches united under this constitution. with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the Kingdom of Grace on earth through the medium of preaching the Gospel and the means in accordance with that Gospel to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially with those united in this Coustitution.

ART. 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this Union by their sending up three delegates to the annual meeting of this Association with a petition for admission, and by their delegates agree-

ing to the abstracts of principles herewith published.

ART. 6. The churches in this Union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association, a written communication, specifying the names of their delegates, their number in fellowship, number haptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored or decea-ed, since last session, and all other information which the churches may

deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly

ART. 7. This Associationshall have a fund to be supplied by the voluntary contributions of the c'urches, all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee of Finance, to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association; he shall retain and manage the funds, agreeably to the order of the Association, and present annually, for inspection in the Minutes, a clear and succinct statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

ART. 8. This Association shall furnish the churches with the Minutes

of every session.

Arr. 9. The association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same, and have failed; nor of any difficulty between the churches, unless they have pursued the directions in the 18th chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them Then the Association shall take such ART. 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep

a regular file of the printed Minutes of each session of this body, and

deliver over tile same to his successor in office.

1. This Constitution may be altered or amended at regular meet ings of the Association, by the concurring voice of two thirds of the members then present; provided such alteration or amendment be ap-

proved by the churches composing the Association

When the delegates of the several churches shall assemble at the place appointed for the session of the Association, the Moderator shall upor the business by praise and prayer in person, or by proxy. If the former Moderator or Clerk be absent, the Ass ciation shall appoint one,

Immediately after the opening session, the church letters shall be found by persons whom the Moderator may appoint, and the names of

the delegates enrolled by the Clerk.

II. When the delegates' names are enrolled and called by the Clerk the Association shall then elect by ballet, a Moderator and Clerk, the plurality of votes governing the election

4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before

they can be entertained by the Moderator. When motions, or amendments to motions are made, the last one made shall be first in order, and so on in inverse order to the original motion, but the mover may at any

time withdraw his motion.

5. Any person wishing to make a motion, or to speak of any matter before the Association, shall rise to his feet, and respectfully address the Moderator, and if he be in order, the Moderator shall signify the same by calling the person or otherwise, and no one, thus in order, shall be interupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or for personal reflections, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same subject, without leave from the Association, or to explain some of his former remarks.

6. Whenever sufficient time has been allowed for discussion of any subject before the Association, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association, and declare the result, a plurality governing in all cases,

except those provided for.

No member may vacate his seat without the consent of the Modera-

tor, while the body is in session.

8. When one member shall speak to, or of one another, he shall call him brother.

9. The Moderator may have the names of the delegates called when-

ever it is necessary.

10. The Moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members, by calling some one to fill his seat while speaking, but not until all others have spoken who desire to speak.

11. The Moderator may invite visiting ministers in good order to seats

in the council, who may speak, but not vote.

12. The Minutes of the Association may be read as it may think nec-

essary.

13. The Moderator shall be the judge of order; the objector may appear to the moint of peal to the body, a majority of whom shall determine the point of order.
