PROCEEDINGS.

The Friendship Regular Baptist Association met with Hickory Grove Church, Lincoln County, Arkansas, Saturday at 10 o'clock A. M., September 17, 1881.

A full delegation and a crowded house were present at an early hour. There was a brief service of song conducted by Bro. D. W. Campbell. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder L. Quinn. Text, Rom., xii, 4. After the sermon the Association was called to order by Elder M. Y. Moran.

Letters from the churches were read and delegates' names enrolled. (See statistical table).

On motion, took a recess of one hour for refreshments, which was abundantly furnished on the ground for the large congregation.

At 2 o'clock, P. M., assembled in the house to perfect organization. Prayer by Elder M. Y. Moran.

On motion proceeded to ballot for officers for the present session, which resulted in the choice of Elders M. Y. Moran, Moderator, and J. B. Searcy, Clerk and Treasurer.

Corresponding Messengers were invited. Bro. S. T. W. Meek responded from Bartholomew Association.

Elder J. F. Griffin was also enrolled from Bartholomew Association.

Elder J. T. Craig was enrolled as a Messenger from Judson Association.

The following committees were appointed:

On Publications-Elders A. J. Wharton, E. H. Owen and Bro. S. M. McDaniel.

On Education-Elders J. B. Searcy, J. S. Craig and E. F. Appling.

On Documents-Bros. U. W. Poss, W. T. Smith and L. B. Owens.

On Nominations-R. C. Rhoden, H. L. Reynolds and Elder E. H. Owen.

On motion, proceeded to take up the question of changing the time of meeting of the Association, which was answered against changing the time.

The query: "Is it scriptural for church members belonging to different churches of the same faith and order to commemorate the Lord's Supper together ?"

Rev. J. T. Cr ig moved to answer the question affirmatively after lively and extensive discussion.

On motion adjourned till Monday, 8 o'clock, A. M.

Preaching at night by Elder E. D. Taylor. Text, Matthew, xii, 18-21.

Sabbath.—At 9 o'clock the congregation met for singing. At 10 o'clock Elder J. F. Griffin preached. Text, I Tim., i, 4.

At 11 o'clock Elder M. Y. Moran preached from Luke, ii, 14. At the close of the sermon a collection for Home Missions was taken, amounting to \$23.95 cash, and \$10 pledged; total, \$33.95.

At 3 o'clock, P. M., Elder E. F. Appling preached a soulstirring sermon from the text, "And I if I be lifted up from the earth will draw all men unto me." At night Elder J. S. Taylor preached. Text, Gal., iii, 29.

At the close of the services, at the suggestion of the Secretary, a free-will offering for the support of Bro. Griffin was raised, amounting in cash to \$21.20; also, a prayer of thanksgiving was offered in consideration of the restoration of Bro. Griffin to his mind and to his former usefulness. Thus closed a happy Sabbath day spent in the service of the Lord.

Monday, 8 o'clock, A. M.—Met as per adjournment. Prayer by Elder J. F. Griffin. The roll was called and delegates answered to their names. The discussion of the query on the communion subject was resumed.

After several good speeches, seasoned with grace and intelligence, the query was finally answered affirmatively.

On motion, took a recess for dinner.

At 12:30 o'clock resumed business.

The committee on Sunday-schools read their report, which was adopted. (See A.)

The report of the Secretary of Sunday-schools was adopted. (B.)

The report on Home Missions was read and adopted. (C.)

The Committee on Publications read their report, which was adopted. (D.)

The Committee on Education read their report, which was adopted. (E.)

The Treasurer read his report which was adopted. (F.)

The Committee on Documents read their report, which was adopted. (G.)

The Committee on Nominations read their report, which was adopted. (H.)

The Committee on Finance read their report, which was adopted. (I.)

The Secretary of Foreign Missions read his report, which was adopted. (J.)

On motion agreed to hold the next session of the Association with Friendship Church, No. 1, Dorsey County, Arkansas, twenty miles south of Pine Bluff, near the Pine Bluff and Warren road, commencing Saturday at 10 o'clock, A. M., before the third Sabbath in September, 1882.

Elder E. F. Appling was chosen to preach the introductory sermon, with Elder I. R. Vick, alternate.

Elder J. B. Searcy was chosen to preach the missionary sermon, and Elder L. Quinn, his alternate.

A series of resolutions were adopted. (See resolutions).

On motion, adjourned to meet at the time and place agreed upon.

A song was sung and the delegates and brethren took the parting hand amidst tears of rejoicing.

Thus closed the Ninth Session of the Frienpship Association. M. Y. MORAN, Moderator.

Your Committee on Sunday-schools would report that this work is one that is of great value to the young. It gives them a knowledge of the scriptures, and they are thus better prepared to comprehend preaching. Besides, in a good Sunday-school,

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all the members of the church are placed in an attitude to work for Christ. We urge the churches to take hold of this work in earnest; that they seek out, not only the children who have parents, but also the orphans and poor outcasts of every community, and induce them to come to the Sunday-school, if happily they may thereby be brought to Christ. We recommend to our Executive Board that they take into consideration the propriety of employing a Sunday-school missionary to travel in our bounds and stir up our people to the importance of this work. Your Committee on Publications would report that we regard the printing press as a great power in the land for good or for evil. Our enemies are on the alert to confront our Master's cause by the use of the printing press. We ought to be strongly engaged with the same great agency to drive them back. We have the truth on our side and we ought to be encouraged in this noble work. Romanists and their descendants are stocking the land with their books and papers. Even the presses of infidels run almost day and night. Let us not sleep while the enemy is sowing tares. We urge that our people give more attention to the reading of good books and papers than they have done heretofore. Also, that they seek to get others to read our literature. We recommend, first, the Bible, unalloyed by human devise or tradition, as our standard by which all other publications are to be tried. We recommend, as hymn books, Southern Psalmist and "Eyer Green" hymns. There are many good and sound religious newspapers; but, as an organ for this Association, we specially and earnestly recommend The Arkansas Evangel as said medium. The Evangel is a paper that Arkansas Baptists have long felt the need of, and, oh! brethren, let us never say fail. The untiring energies of the editors demand our hearty co-operation. The paper is sound in doctrine and full of the spirit of true religion. As an exponent of the teachings of our Savior, we would recommend The Baptist as highly commendable.

Your Committee on Education would report that, we, as a denomination of Christians should never loose sight of the importance of this work. The age in which we live imperatively demands that our children be educated, otherwise they become mere hewers of wood and drawers of water for those that are educated. Mind rules matter, and educated minds rule the world. That parent or guardian who has the means and neglects to educate his children, robs them of their birth-right and leaves them to buy their pottage from others. But, as Baptists, we believe that we are the conservators of "the faith once delivered to the saints." And we claim that the religious principles held by us only need to be understood in order to be appreciated and loved by all pious persons. But if we are unable to express our views from the pulpit, in conversation and discussion, in accordance with the established laws of language, we thereby repel the cultivated mind from the investigation of our doctrines, and create an unnecessary prejudice against us. If we would hold our children in our own ranks, we must educate them, so that they will be able to reason for themselves. Truth never shuns investigation. But ignorance is blind and skulks away from the light. We should not be content merely to hold our children firmly set in the principles of our faith. But we should be aggressive. We should take the torch of truth and penetrate the precincts of error, scattering the darkness and setting the captives free. In order to educate, we

must have schools. We should seek to establish good schools in every neighborhood, and thereby foster the spirit of popular education among the whole people. But we should, by all means, support our denominational schools. Our own *Centennial Institute* has already taken high rauk as an institution of learning, and its influence is beginning to be felt throughout the State. Friendship Association should feel especially proud of this school and rally all her forces to its support. What it now needs and must have, is increased patronage, if it would not succumb to the pressure of these hard times. The present session opened under very favorable auspices, with Prof. W. E. Paxton and Prof. Meek, in charge. A little sacrifice now will help these brethren to tug over the hard times. But, if we withhold the needed support now till they are driven to other fields, we will see our folly when it is too late.
