The Associational Mission Board submitted the following report, which was adopted:

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

The Mission Board of Caroline Association submits the following report:

After organizing, we found that the Association was in debt to former missional ries and no money on hand with which to pay the same. An appeal was made to the churches and pastors of the Association, asking them to raise and forward to the Board the amount that we owed. Failing in this, we employed Brother George W. Thomason for one month, to visit the churches and endeavor to raise the money in that way. Finding that we were still in debt, and the parties that we owed being badly in need of the money due them, the Board, together with some other brethren, borrowed and gave their note for \$115.

Notwithstanding the financial condition of the Association and the resolution passed at its last meeting, we felt that we could not afford to let the years pass without having some missionary work done in the bounds of our Association. We employed Brother M. E. Hudson for two months at a salary of \$40 per month. As

to the work done by him we respectfully refer you to his report.

MISSIONARY REPORT.

I was employed by the Board and began work August 1st. The field is large and the time was too short to accomplish much more than finding the needy places. I find a great deal of territory undeveloped and the seeds of error are being rapidly town. From DesArc to Higginson along the line of the DesArc & Northern railway, there is only one Baptist church, and west and northwest of Jacksonville there is a fine field inviting and claiming our attention. I held meetings at Jacksonville, DesArc and Griffithsville. At DesArc a pastor was called for half his time. I would recommend that the Association help this point to the amount of \$50. At Griffithsville steps were taken toward building a house. They will call a pastor toon. Following is the summary of the work; Sermons preached, 49; addresses made, 8; collected on salary, \$8.78; visits made, 60; received by baptism, 2, and by letter, 1; days of service, 60; miles traveled, 400.

Committee on Associational Missions submitted the following report, which was adopted:

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT.

We, your committee on Associational Missions, submit the following report: The Board began the past year's work with a debt; the pledges from the churches were small; the Board was compelled to carry over an indebtedness of \$115, with interest. From this it will be seen that the work of the Board was necessarily limited.

The report read in your hearing shows an indebtedness of \$201.80, and we recommend that same be raised tonight. For the future, we recommend that the pastors in charge of the various churches of the Association be urged to keep before their respective charges the pressing need of contributions from them in order that this work may be done, remembering that even a small amount from all will do more good than larger amounts from a few.

We further recommend that each church in the Association make it a point to report definitely in its letter to the Association the amount for which they consider themselves pledged for carrying on the work during the ensuing year. We also ask that during the sitting of this Association each church pledge itself in some amount for the prosecution of this work.

We deem that the best work of this Association can be done only through the agency of a missionary; and we recommend that the Association authorize the incoming Board to employ a missionary for the ensuing associational year and that his services be paid for out of the funds arising from the pledges of the churches and the collections taken on the field for that purpose and such aid as may be secured by cooperation with the State Sunday School and State Mission Boards.

Committee on State Missions submitted report, which was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

Among the different systems of cooperative work in our State in which this Asclation has borne a part, that denominated State Missions has been one of the most fruitful and beneficial. Not one of the strong associations in the state but within it evidences of this work. It would be profitable for us to bear in mind what we, with our brethren in the other parts of the State, have wrought and are till doing in our borders. We also rejoice that this work is now being done in othand more needy sections of our State. The Lord is now greatly blessing the work of our brethren under our employment in this work for the present year. The field is growing in importance. The coming of new railroads and the building of now towns and the opening of new enterprises and the peopling of new districts, in-There are many fields in which other denominations are so increasing and fortifying themwelves that our brethren there are unable to cope with them unaided. The successes and blessings with which God has crowned our efforts in these fields this year, and the increasing demands they make upon us for further help seems to be the finger of God pointing to greater sacrifices and efforts for the future. In no field of labor known to us are such prospects of rich harvests promised as in the unoccupied fields In our State now opening to us. The Lord is opening to us new doors constantly in this field, and a deep sense of our duty to follow where he is so manifestly leading should be constantly inculcated. Each church in our bounds should make this a pecial subject of prayer and conversation and our ministry should not fail to do its utmost in this behalf, and some adequate system in each church should be provided for collecting means for this work, so that each, including the poorest, member could be induced to contribute.

This is a part of the great work left by our ascended Lord for His people to do. No one can avoid the obligation and none should slight the work. Moved by love to God and a passion to save the lost, we should consecrate our lives and fortunes to to to be used in this as in other fields in which we are called. In obedience to this command, let us Go, expecting His promised presence and benedictions.

Committee on Home Missions submitted report, which was adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Home Missions would respectfully report as follows: The Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention certainly has a vast and most important field in which to work for the Master, embracing all of the Southern States, part of the Indian Territories and Cuba. The work of the Board has recently been plarged, and perhaps never before have such successful efforts been made for the ottension and permanent establishment of our cause as are now being put forth throughout this vast territory, and never before have the calls for help been more

justifiable. Last year there were 467 missionaries employed, who delivered 49,30 sermons and addresses, and baptized 4,739. Doubtless the reports for the present year will show large increase in the work done and in the success attending the faithful labors of the missionaries.

The Home Board has done so much for Arkansas and for some of the churched in this Association that we cannot but recognize the obligation upon us to do all in our power to help carry forward the work. We are glad to be able to report that the Home Board is furnishing our State Board \$1,500 this year to help the work in Arkansas, and, surely, we cannot fail to recognize our obligation to do what we can for the Home Board.

The order of mission work is, first, in our own hearts; next, to those nearest us, and then on, and on, to the uttermost part of the earth. While the efforts to carry the Gospel to the heathen should be encouraged in every way possible, we cannot but feel that if more attention were given to the work in the home field the contributions for the prosecution of the work in foreign fields would be greatly increased. And we would earnestly recommend that regular contributions be made in all the churches to the Home Board at Atlanta, Ga.

The Committee on Woman's Work made report, which was adopted, as follows:

Under the influence of certain old English laws and unchristian, if not unciviltied, customs which have obtained, women, for many generations, came to regard
themselves as passive and almost irresponsible beings even in matters of religion.
Man alone was the active agency. The husband, as head of the family, assumed
to meet the church obligations of the entire family. The wife too readily yielded
this privilege, and undertook to meet other obligations alone, where the help and
advice of the husband were absolutely essential.

The modern effort to awaken woman and place her once more in the position the occupied in affairs of church in the time of the apostles has, beyond question, met with wonderful success, and God has greatly blessed this work.

That there are still Christian women, and perhaps whole churches of them, that have not yet considered themselves capable or obligated to do more than to allow the grace of God in their hearts is to be regretted.

The whole purpose of organizing woman's societies in the churches is educational: First, desiring that all may be brought to recognize individual responsibility, and, second, that they may become intelligent with reference to the need and the field for Christian work. Again, the Christian association, thus brought about, always developing. "They that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before thim for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name."

If all hearts enlisted under the banner of God could be made to realize that they are called upon by our Lord to give of their substance and of personal service, no missionary enterprise would ever lack for funds and no field would be untouched by missionary effort.

To this end we recommend that each pastor in the bounds of this Association lend his aid and encouragement to the organization of woman's missionary and aid societies where none exist, and that he shall foster and endeavor to enlarge the work of those already organized.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called the "Caroline Baptist Association," and shall be composed of Baptist Churches representing themselves by accredited dessengers. Its object shall be to provide missions, education and Sunday schools.

Art. 2. Every Church belonging to this Association shall be entitled to three Messengers, and every Church having over one hundred members shall be entitled to an additional Messenger for each additional fifty members over one hundred.

Art. 3. The session of this Association shall be annual, at such time and place

as shall be appointed by the body.

Art. 4. Any Baptist Church of the same faith and practice may be admitted as a member of this Association, upon expressing a desire, through Messenger and atters, to work in fellowship with us.

Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treaster, who shall be elected by ballot at each annual session, and continue in office until their successors are elected. A majority of all the votes cast shall be necestary to elect.

Art. 6. This Association has no power to control or in any way interfere with the independence or rights of the Churches, but may advise, when asked by a Church through its letter to the Association, and it may withdraw its fellowship from any Church known to walk disorderly.

Art. 7. This Association may correspond by letter and Messenger with other representative bodies of our denomination.

Art. 8. In the absence of any officer of this Association his place shall be filled pro tempore, by viva voce election.

Art. 9. The Association may, from time to time, adopt such rules and bylaws for its government as may be expedient, not inconsistent with this Constitution.

Art. 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular session by the vote of two thirds of the Messengers present in favor of the proposed amendment.

Amendment No. 1. This Association may provide means to aid in the support of their aged, infirm, needy and superannuated ministers who have devoted their lives to the ministry, and who have been engaged in their last regular ministerial work for at least one year within the bounds of the Association. The Association may appoint a Board and adopt such bylaws and regulations as will be necessary for carrying out the provisions of this amendment.

BY-LAWS

FOR DIRECTION OF THE BOARD ON AID TO SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS

SECTION I. The Association shall appoint a Board on Aid to Superannuated Ministers, consisting of three members, which board shall be located in or near the same locality. Said board shall hold office from the time of appointment until the annual session of the Association. Should a vacancy occur on said board, the ma-

jority may select a member of any Missionary Baptist Church, a member of this Association in good standing to fill such vacancy. The board shall organize once a year by electing a president, secretary and treasurer. Said board shall provide such stationery as will be necessary for their use as a board and any other necessary expenses that may be incurred in carrying on the work intrusted to them, and shall be paid out of the funds in their hands; and they shall be required to make a report to the Association each year of all monies received and disbursed.

- Sec. 2. The board provided for in Section 1 of these bylaws may raise means through the churches of this Association, or raise contributions from other sources and in such manner as will be legitimate. They may purchase lands, make improvements under direction of this Association. The title to such lands shall be made to the Moderator of the Association and his successors in office.
- Sec. 3. The Association shall at its annual meeting decide who shall be placed upon the list of Superannuated Ministers and direct what amount of aid shall be furnished by the board, and decide whether or not such beneficiary can labor in the ministry, and, if so, to what extent. Provided, that if some minister, within the bounds of Caroline Association, who may come under the provisions of the constitution of this Association, may from continued sickness of himself or his family, or for other good and sufficient causes, become a charge upon the community in which he may at the time reside, the board may render such aid to such minister as the circumstances may require or their ability will admit of. Provided, further, that for good and sufficient cause the board may discontinue their aid to such ministers and report their action to the Association at its next session.
- Sec. 4. The board provided for in Section I of these bylaws shall in all cases, where it is possible, work in harmony with the mission board of this Association in supplying and giving work to such infirm or superannuated ministers as they find such ministers are capable of performing. And in no case will this board be permitted to make pledges beyond their financial ability as such board, nor shall they involve the Association in debt.
- Sec. 5. The Board on Ministerial Education shall aid such ministers as are adopted by the Association for education to the extent of the funds in their hands. Loans shall be made to such ministers, and their individual notes taken to the President of the board of education and his successors in office, with interest at 6 per cent from due until paid. The board shall not loan more than sufficient funds to meet the actual needs of such beneficiaries and not more than will be necessary for five months at any one time. They shall divide the funds in their hands in equal proportions as the demands of the beneficiaries may require. And the board shall provide such stationery and printed matter as will be required to carry out the requirements of the Association.

13. We believe that a Church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, united in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinance and obeying the laws of Christ, and that its officers are pastors and deacons. Acts 2:41-47, I 1 m. 3:2-8.

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, by a properly qualified administrator, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Matt. 28:19, Mark 16:16, Romans 6:3-4.

15. We believe that only such as have been properly baptized and received inthe fellowship of a regularly organized Baptist Church should partake of the 1 87d's Supper. Matt. 26:26-27, I Cor. II:20-23.

16. We believe that the Lord's day or Christian Sabbath should be devoutly blerved, and sacredly devoted to religious services. Mark 16:9, Acts 20-7, 1 Cor. 101.2, Heb. 10:25.

17. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of states and nations should be obeyed, when the laws they seek to enforce do not conflict with the Gospel.

- 18. We believe in the future resurrection of the dead. Dan. 12:2-1, I The 4:16.
- 19. We believe in final judgment; and that, in that day, the righteous and wicked will be separated forever. Acts 17:31, Matt. 25:32-33.

20. We believe that the righteous will be happy forever in heaven, and the wicked miserable forever in hell. Matt. 25:34-46.

Thanking God for the light we have received, and for the revelation of Jewin which we now enjoy, and hoping that God, for Christ's sake, has pardoned our sing and having been baptised on a profession of our faith in Christ Jesus into the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, we do, this day, before God and the world, and with deep joy and great solemnity, enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We therefore covenant and agree, that, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, we will walk together in love and Christian fellowship. We promise to labor for the advancement and final triumph of the Church; to sustain her worship by attending the house of God and supporting the ministry; to guard her ordinances, enforce held discipline, and defend her doctrine.

We also pledge ourselves to walk circumspectly in the world; to be hones just and faithful in our business relations; and, as God may give us help, we promise to live righteous and holy lives.

We further promise to watch over each other in brotherly love; to visit the sick; to pray for each other and the world; to aid the poor and needy, and to perform such other kind offices as may be well pleasing in the sight of God.

RULES OF DECORUM

- The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with reliquious exercises.
- 2. All exceptions to the decision of the Moderator shall be by appeal to the body, whose decision as expressed by a majority of the vote, viva voce given, shall be final.
- 3. In case of a tie vote, the Moderator shall give the casting vote, and he shall not be allowed to vote in any other case.
- 4. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speaking as other members, but when rising to speak shall call some other member to the chair.
- 5. No member shall speak but once on the same subject, more than twenty minutes at a time, except by leave of the Association, provided the mover shall have the privilege of opening and closing the debate on his motion or resolution.
- 6. But one member shall speak at a time, and if more than one rise to speak at the same time the Moderator shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 7. Any member desiring to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, and in speaking shall confine himself to the subject under discussion, and no one shall use any disrespectful or discourteous language, calculated to wound the feelings of any member, or to disturb the harmony of the body, and the appelation of "Brother" shall be used in every reference to a member of the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the
