






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Review of 1923 Football Season

Gridiron reminiscences are among the most pleasant to all college students. The thrills which come from this all-important phase of college life are unequalled. Unlike many other college activities the "old folks" are as much interested in football as the young, and especially if they have a son who is a gridiron hero. Consequently, future Ouachita families will center many of their fireside talks around this section of the college annual.

The season opened on the home field October 5 with Dallas University, when the Tigers defeated the visitors 3-0. The Tigers far outplayed the visitors, but fumbled often. The Tigers made 12 first downs to Dallas' 3.

The next game, with Mississippi A. and M., was fought with a loss of 6-o. Considering the weight and ability of the great A. and M. team, this was a good fight for the Tigers. The Tigers played a brilliant game with the A. and M. last year. tying them 7-7.

On October 27, Ouachita lost a hard-fought, but brilliant, game with Baylor. The Tigers made 14 first downs against 15, and completed 7 passes. The score was 3-0 in favor of Ouachita at the end of the first half, but at the end of the game Baylor came back with 16 points in her favor and the Tigers still had 3.


Probably the hardest fought game of the season was with Arkansas University on November 3. The Tigers, hurt by injuries received at Baylor, fought the University to a scoreless tie on a muddy field at Fayetteville.


The Tigers defeated College of the Ozarks, 14-6, on Friday, Nov. 16, on the A. U. Williams Field.

The next game was an overwhelming defeat for Hendrix. The feature of the game was the Tigers' brilliant passing, flanked by long end runs and hard line plunges. The score was 37-7.

Ouachita rooters could hardly believe their eyes when they saw the Tigers go down in defeat on Turkey Day. It was the first time in over a decade. But somebody said that the law of averages holds good in football as well as elsewhere. We have no alibi, but here are the facts: Ouachita made 19 first downs to Henderson's 7, completed 13 passes with a gain of 400 yards, and lost the game on breaks, with a score of 26-6.










The story of Frank Turberville hardly needs retelling in Arkansas. Hailed as possibly the greatest athlete that Ouachita ever produced, he blazed a brilliant path through state athletics. Four-year letter man in football, three years all-state, captain and outstanding star, a great player most feared and prepared for by opposing teams,; tireless, powerful, and always fighting, he was a veritable football machine. He was an ideal captain, knowing the game thoroughly, and always setting the pace. Certainly Ouachita has never produced a greater football player than "Tubby."

The next season will be the fourth for "Hos." He will make a great captain, being a heady and great player, and always dependable. He was one of the leading figures in the line, breaking through and nailing a man again and again. His "old pepper" is one of his most valuable assets. The honor of being captain of the '24 Tigers stamps him as a truly great player.

"Bill" started the season at half, but after the injury to Perry, was shifted to fullback. He is one of the type of men that always work and put out their best. Handicapped the entire season by a bad knee, he yet played brilliantly, carrying the ball well on plunges and end runs, and always being there with the interference. He has made three letters, and graduating this year, will leave a big gap in the Tiger backfield.








"Sammy" placed last season as an all-state tackle, and made his third letter in football. This is sufficient proof of his qualifications. He was always in the thick of the fight, giving his best. There was no doubt from the time the season opened but that he would land an all-state berth. He has finished at Ouachita and his place will be hard to fill.

Brother of the famous Sam, "Bee" brought home some fame of his own. He and King, as the other guard, time and again drew applause and favorable comment for the aggressive style of their playing. He starred in the Arkansas game, and also made the second all-state team. He has made three letters, and will be one of the mainstays of the line next year.

The "Major" came to Ouachita in the fall of 1920, and played on the Tigerettes for two seasons. He made his letter in '22, and last season was his best. He was one of the regular tackles, playing in every game and always reliable. He finishes by graduation this spring, and it will be hard to fill his place next year.








"Bang" is one of the most dependable and steady players that ever wore a Tiger uniform. At bucking the line he knows but few equals. His tackles are hard and accurate. In addition to bucking the line, he carried the ball beautifully, running very low and hard. He has played three seasons with the Tigers, besides three in high school, and he knows football from A to Z.

Selph has made two football letters in as many years at Ouachita, and last season pulled down an all-state position by practically a unanimous vote. He is truly a great quarterback, one of the triple threat men so often heralded in fiction, but so rarely seen in reality. He passes with uncanny accuracy, carries the ball well either through the line, or around the ends and kicks consistently. His two remaining years should be filled with great achievements.

"Peewee" is a peewee in name only, for he boasts 188 pounds of thew and muscle which he can throw with pile-driving force against the line. He is the ideal rock crusher type of fullback. He played brilliantly up to the mid-season when he suffered a dislocated vertebrae in the Little Rock College game, causing his right side to become temporarily paralyzed. He was virtually assured of an all-state position up to that time, but was unable to play but very little afterwards. Time and chiropractic specialists have cured the injury, and his two remaining years should be highly successful.









Coming to Ouachita in 1921 from the Russelville Aggies, "Lee Fohl" immediately caught on with the Tigers. The season '23 was his third and last in a Ouachita uniform. He was always a steady and heady player, and had a higher average on receiving passes than any other man on the team.

"Crip" came back to Ouachita in 1922 after an absence of two years. He was ineligible for the varsity, and played quarter on the Tigerettes. Last season he was eligible, and played as the understudy of Carey Selph at the quarter position. His specialty was skirting the ends and broken field running, and his kicking was always good.

"Shug's" specialty is pulling down passes. He came to Ouachita last year and played on the Tigerettes in the fall of '22. He was graduated to the varsity last season, and immediately made good. He is rather light, but makes it up in fight and skill. He is the third of the Shugart brothers to star in Ouachita football, and bids fair to uphold the family record in his two remaining years.







This versatile linesman was the leader of the reserve material. He played any position in the line except end, although originally a center, and played them all exceedingly well. When given a chance he always made good. He came to Ouachita in 1920 but did not go out for football his Freshman year. He played two years on the Tigerettes, subbing on the varsity, and last season came into his own. His graduation leaves a hole in the line for next season.

After three years playing at end on the Tigerettes and subbing on the varsity, "Theo" won the "O" last season. Coach Jennings saw the making of a great guard in him, and he promptly developed him in the new position. He starred in the guard outplays, and rose to his height in the Arkansas game where he repeatedly broke through and threw opposing backs for losses. He made the all-state second team.

Dildy came highly tooted from Nashville High School, and immediately started in to living up to his reputation. He is a very big man for an end, weighing close to 190. This helped him in breaking up interference, and at the same time did not hold him down when he sprinted for a pass. With his natural ability and Coach Jennings' expert tutelage, he should fill his remaining three years with glorious deeds.








"Jake" came unheralded to Ouachita last autumn, but when he stepped on the gridiron people began to take notice. A veritable Hercules in build, he threw his 185 pounds against the line with great speed for so big a man. An injured knee sustained early in the season caused a long lay-out that had a bad effect. When finally able to go back in, he was placed at end, where his uncanny ability to pull down passes, made him a highly valuable man. He has three more years that should be very bright.

Jack came from Arkadelphia High School last autumn, where he had played at end. He ran at end for a time on the Tigerettes and on the varsity, and was then shifted to tackle, where he found himself. Always willing to listen to instruction, and full of the old fight, he offers wonderful possibilities during his remaining three years.

THOMAS McDaniel, Tigerette Captain Quarterback

"Mac" came to Ouachita in '22. He played on the Tigerettes last year and showed up well, especially in the final game of the season, when the Tigerettes upset the dope bucket and beat the Dragons. "Mac" runs hard and is aggressive, which makes him a good Tigerette captain. We should hear a lot from "Mac" in his remaining two years.







Frank "Tubby" Turberville is playing his fourth and last year as a Tiger, and we only hope his sensational fielding and daring base-running comes up to his records of past years.


"Bill" Walton is playing his third and last year on the Tiger ball club, and we are expecting much from him in the outer garden of the '24 Tigers.

With the old men of last year and the splendid new material which we now have, we feel able to successfully compete with any college in the Arkansas Athletic Association.



















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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
