Session held with the Centre Ridge church, Maud, Texas, Oct. 10—12, 1902.

Report of Executive Board.

Report submitted by O. L. Hailey, chairman and J. B. Sellman, missionary, as follows;

To the Texarkana Association;

Dear Brethren: The members of the Ex. Board held a meeting immediately after their appointment at Pleasant Grove last year. They at once re-elected Rev. J. B. Sellman, as our missionary at a salary of fifty dollars a month and applied to the State Board of the General Convention of Texas for assistance to the amount of twenty-five dollars a month. We are glad to report that the request was promptly granted, and our thanks are thus publicly expressed to them and through them to the brethren of the state who have so generously helped us.

Bro. Sellman accepted and began work at once. He has been in frequent consultation with the board, and has done diligent and valuable service on the field, as his report—which is referred to and made a part of our report, will show. Bro. Sellman has been unspairing in his efforts to further all our interests. And the encouraging attendance at our Fifth Sunday meetings is due, in no small degree to his untiring efforts to stir up the churches.

We are of the opinion that no better man can be had for missionary. But if possible we ought to have two men employed for all their time. There is crying need for a missionary in the city of Texarkana.

We are pleased to report that the churches, most of them have made contributions to the support of the missionary during the year, and from some six or eight communities where he has labored. So we come to our annual meeting with a very small debt.

We have held regular Fifth Sunday meetings at which important subjects have been discussed. If a more general representation of all the churches could be secured, the cause could be correspondingly advanced.

We ask the association to take account of this matter and see whether some more general interest on the part of our churches can be aroused.

Concerning the Colportage wagon which we were directed to take steps, we have to say, that as yet, we have not seen our way to secure it, but we have some encouragement to hope that one will be provided soon, if the association will continue its instruction to that end.

We suggest that the association ask the churches again to select some one of their members, who shall be the representative of the Board in his

church. And that such representative meet with the Board in its regular quarterly meetings, to counsel with them, and to co-operate with the Board in their respective churches.

I am very frank to confess to you that I have been wholly unable to please myself. I hoped to be able to present a much better showing for the year's work, than my report will exhibit. I have done however, what I could as I had opportunity and as I thought best for the work in hand, and feel that gratitude demands that I here express to you my kindest regards in placing this important work in my hands, and sincerely hope that the effort put forth; and the work done, will so meet with your approval and good will as that I may be able to merit future favors at your hands, and I feel sure I shall not be criticized for embracing the present opportunity to express to the State Board of the Baptist General Convention, and also to Dr. J. B. Gambrell, Superintendent of State Missions, my profoundest gratitude for the kind words and generous aid, which they have given from time to time as I moved forward, in looking after the interests of this work. And I am sure we shall never know the real good that has been accomplished, until we have crossed the river, entered the gates of pearl, and taken our places with the redeemed of the Lord, in the Paradise of God.

Upon motion of Bro. N. J. Rachel, the next session of the body is to be held with Tennessee church, and upon motion of J. B. Sellman, Bro. R. L. Cole was elected to preach the introductory sermon, N. J. Rachel, his alternate.

Messenger to S. B. Convention.

Upon motion O. L. Hailey was elected messenger to the S. B. Convention and J. B. Lumbley alternate.

Historical Committee.

O. L. Hailey read a partial report on the history of the association, covering the first ten years. And the body by vote publicly expressed their appreciation of the work. Sang, "Standing on the Promises." Prayer by J. B. Sellman, and at 3:30 association adjourned.

First Day--Evening Session.

Met at 7:30 pursuant to adjournment. Sang; "When the Roll is Called up Yonder" and "Come Thou Fount."

Rev. J. B. Lumbley read from the 5th chapter of John. verses 17-47. Sang, "More about Jesus."

Rev. J. B. Lumbley preached the introductory sermon from John 5:39-40, revised version—"Ye search the Scriptures, because in them ye think ye have eternal life, and these are they that bear witness of me. And ye will not come to me that ye might have life." After the excellent sermon the body was led in prayer by Rev. E. A. Stone of Dallas, Texas.

Committee on Co-Operation.

Moderator in the chair. Upon motion of O. L. Hailey a special committee on co operation was appointed, consisting of J. B. Lumbley, R. L. Cole, J. B. Sellman. (See committees.)

Bethsaida Dismissed.

Letter from Bethsaida church presented by O. P. Kent. They request a letter of dismissal.

Upon motion the church was granted a letter to join the Red River Association.

Sylvarena Dropped.

Information having come to hand that Sylvarena church had dissolved, upon motion the clerk was authorized to drop the name from the list of churches.

Stood and sang, "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone?" And the benediction by J. B. Sellman.

Second Day--Morning Session.

Met at 9:00, sang, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" Led in prayer by W. J. Simmons. Sang, "Jesus Lover of My Soul." Body called to order—Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Miscellaneous.

N. J. Rachel moved that the time of meeting be changed from Friday morning to Saturday morning. The motion was lost.

Upon invitation the following brethren accepted seats in the body:—

Committee on Co-Operation.

Report submitted by J. B. Lumbley and adopted as follows:—

We, your committee on Co-operation submit the following report:—

Co-operation is in strictest harmony with Baptist and Bible principles. Each church, being independent, is a complete executive body within itself and comes into and goes out of associations at will, co-operates with other churches in associational capacity, co-operates either in part or in all of the work of the denomination as it chooses, using the association or conven-

tion as an advisory council, through which, with united effort, it joins with other churches in carrying out the commission and commands of our Lord in mission work.

With the increase of population and multiplicity of opportunities, comes greater responsibilities. The greatest question with the people of God is how we may meet these responsibilities. It is plainly taught in God's Word and demonstrated by the work of God's people that a busy life for Christ is best. To be much at work and in many kinds of gospel work is:

1st. Best for the church. Nothing is better for a church than development. Teaching, living, praying and paying are all wholesome exercises in church development.

2nd. It is healthiest for the cause of Christ. God's people must be a willing people in the day of his power. Christ says of himself, "I must work the works of Him that sent me, for the night cometh when no man can work."

3rd. It is the best way to honor God. Not even a cup of cold water can be given in the name of a disciple without bringing a disciple's reward.

We, your committee, therefore recommend that the entire Board of this association be requested to act as a committee on co-operation.

1st. To correspond with churches that may be disposed to work and encourage them in our work.

2nd. To hold one or two day's meetings with such churches as may invite the committee, to help these churches.

3rd. That we use all scriptural and right and laudable means to enlist the association in co-operation in our Lord's work,

Associational Missions.

Report submitted by J. B. Lumbley, as follows:—

Your committee on Associational Missions, submit the following:—

We find in our association a field white unto harvest with but few la-

borers. Our territory is rapidly filling up with immigrants.

It is a sad fact that our work of giving the gospel to the people is not equal to the increase of our population. To add to our sad condition many of our churches are very small and weak, and some of them without pastors. We feel our need of a number of strong preachers in our association. Are we following our Savior's instructions to pray the Lord of the harvest to send more laborers into the vineyard? We have much of the territory, in our association unoccupied. How shall we prove ourselves equal to our responsibilities?

We, your committee, recommend the appointment of one or more missionaries in the association as the Ex. Board may be able to do.

We further recommend that the Executive Board attempt to secure the services of some good revivalist for all or as much of his time as it is possible to give, to hold revivals in weak churches, and labor for the salvation of the lost in our midst.

We further recommend, that the Board arrange for the colportage wagon if possible.

Upon motion to adopt, the body was addressed by J. B. Lumbley, N. J. Rachel, J. B. Sellman, W. J. Simmons, E. F. Friedell, C. T. Wilson, R. J. Grant. A collection was taken amounting to \$20 55. And the report was adopted.

Committee on devotion reported that J. M. P. Morrow would preach tonight at 7:30. A S. S. mass-meeting will be held to-morrow at 9:00 a. m., conducted by C. T. Wilson. At 11:00 O. L. Hailey will preach.

State Missions.

Report read by J. B. Sellman.

We, your committee, to whom was referred the matter of State Missions, beg to submit the following report:—

State Mission means, mission work done in the State of Texas, or in any other state.

We deem this work the most important, connected with all our labors in the extension of the Master's Kingdom.

At this time we have about 250 missionaries busy in various sections of the state, in preaching the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to lost men and women, visiting the homes of the people, organizing churches, Sunday Schools, prayermeetings, selling and giving away good books, Bibles, Testaments, tracts, and in many ways enlarging and developing our interests as a people in the state. Some of these missionaries are doing a general work going from point to point where needed most in the work which they are doing. Others are colporters, handling books, Bibles, Testaments and tracts, sowing the state in gospel and Baptist literature. Others are laboring within the boundary lines of associations, and are known as Associational Missionaries. The work this year has been exceedingly prosperous on all lines universal and unparalleled in the history of the state. Hundreds and thousands have been converted, and brought into the Kingdom of God. When we look at the statistics we are at once impressed with the wisdom and importance of statewide co-operation. In 1896 there were 79 missionaries at work on the field under the State Board. Last year there were 203. This year up to this date there are about 350.

The missionaries under the State Board on last year organized 82 churches; Baptized 2,994 converts, and received as a total into the churches 6,062; 50 meeting houses were built, and much other important work accomplished.

For the months of May, June and July of the present year, the State Missionaries, or those working under the direction of the State Board, supplied 634 stations, preached 7,242 sermons.

Much more than this which I cannot here give. But the figures given will give some little idea of the vast amount of work that is now being done by the State Board of the Baptist General Convention.

The total expense of doing this work, including the pay of superintendent, bookkeeper, stenographer, traveling expenses, postage, interests etc, is about 6 per cent, that is out of every dollar given to this work about 94 cents of the dollar goes directly to the object specified by the giver.

The state mission work now being done by the State Board of the Baptist General Convention is without a parallel in our history as a people. Therefore we would recommend that all our preachers and pastors, deacons and Sunday School superintendents, preach and talk, pray and work for State Missions as opportunity, affords, and that a collection be taken for the work at this time or on tomorrow at 11 o'clock.

Further we would recommend that this association, or the churches of this association heartily endorse the State Board of the Baptist Convention and pledge to the Convention our every sympathy and support, and continue our co-operation.

We would also recommend that we here express our gratitude to the State Board and Eld. J. B. Gambrell for the help given to the association during the past year, 1902. Also we would recommend that constant prayer to God, be made in all our homes and churches for the success of this great work. All of which is submitted.

Sunday Schools,

Upon call for the report, Dr. E. A. Stone of Dallas addressed the body. The report was read by Allen Winham, and after remarks by N. J. Rachel and O. L. Hailey, the report was adopted as follows:

The committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to submit the following report;—

Twelve churches in our association report to this body that they have Sunday Schools. The aggregate number of scholars is 654; the number of teachers is 60; and the number of baptisms from these schools is 20. We apprehend that there are others of our churches having schools, but have failed to report on this subject. We urge upon the assembled messengers to see to it that the letters from these churches each year contain a full and true report of all work done in this capacity during the ensuing year.

Such passages from the Bible as Ps. 78;1-8, Jas. 4:5,7, Hosea, 4:6 and Deut. 37;12, 13, Heb. 8:8 teach us not only that God intended and commanded that the children should be instructed in His statutes but that the failure to do so would be followed by the most awful consequences. This association can have no more important question before it to engage its attention than "How best to direct this work that God's will may be done." Neglect this work and our associational body will be as a plant in an ever-increasing dry land. Foster it and we shall grow in power and influence.

We recommend that our Fifth Sunday programme be more and more given up to the discussion of questions pertaining to the Sunday School.

That each church in this association organize and maintain a Sunday School.

That we have at least one Sunday School institute during this year for the especial benefit of our teachers, and so far as possible to co-operate with Dr. E. A. Stone, the State Sunday Missionary appointed by American Baptist Publishing Society in the development of their great work.

We recommend that the executive Committee of the Association be instructed to take charge in the direction of this work.

Home Missions.

Brethren of the Texarkana Association, it is high time that we should arouse ourselves to the responsibility of the demands that now confront us. The demand was never greater or more needful and the help more urgent than at this time.

Scores upon top of scores of immigrants who have been reared and educated in lands dominated by Catholicism or Mohammedanism are yearly cast upon our shores and being colonized in our very midst and some of the isles of the sea in heathen darkness have been added to our domain and opened up to us which increases our responsibility. And we as a denomination should at once lay hold upon the opportunity that the great and allwise God has given us for honoring him in speaking the glad news of salvation; he has given to the world through his son Jesus. Let this association therefore lay hold of these opportunities and respond more heartily to the demands in this field of labor than ever before.

We, your committee on Publication. beg leave to submit the following report:—

1. We deplore with no little concern the lack of knowledge among the rising generation in reference to the teachings of the Bible. We would therefore, recommend that parents and Sunday School teachers place much stress on the reading of the Bible often in the homes and in the Sunday Schools, so that the young people may become familiar with its truths.

2. We recommend for the use of our Sunday Schools the periodicals published at Nashville, Tennessee, under the direction of the Southern Baptist Convention, as being sound Baptist literature, and well adapted for the use of our schools. And the publications of the A. B. P. Society we also deem worthy of our liberal patronage.

3. We would also recommend that our young people be well supplied with such books as teach our distinctive Baptist doctrines, whereby they may become thoroughly grounded in the faith of our fathers, and remain loyal to the denomination.

4. We would further recommend that each Baptist family supply itself for the use of the family, with one or more religious Baptist papers, and we should be very careful not to patronize any so-called religious paper, which is full of vituperations and deals in personalities in reference to our brethren.

5. Lastly, we would recommend that our Baptist mothers and fathers be careful to place before their children only such literature as is morally pure and elevating in character.

The curriculum of Baylor University is equal to the State School at Austin and her discipline far superior.

Let us then send our sons and daughters to our own denominational schools and thereby increase the great army of christian workers that are being yearly turned out therefrom who are battling for God and our country.

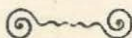


