BUCKNER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

25th Annual Session.

The 25th Annual Session of the Buckner Baptist Association of Western Arkansas met pursuant to adjournment with Poteau Church, Scott county, Arkansas, on Saturday the 19th day of October, A. D.,

1895, at 9:30 o'clock a. m.

Devotional exercises began by song and prayer, after which at 11 o'clock a. m., the Annual Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder James Edmonson, of Hackett City, Arkansas; as an introductory to the service read a part of the 20th chapter of Acts of the Apostles; text, Acts 20:28. From this Scripture an excellent discourse was delivered on the "Duties of Preaching the Pure, Unadulterated Gospel of Christ.

After preaching a committee on Divine Service, consisting of Pastor and Deacons of Poteau church with Brother James P. Stephens was appointed.

Committee on enrollment consisted of the following Brethren, A.

G. Washburn, B. D. Barnes and J. W. Condry.

Bro. Patterson asked to be excused from preaching Missionary Sermon and that Bro. Hulsy be appointed. Request was granted.

On motion, adjourned until 2 o'clock p. m. Benediction by Bro. J. Edmonson. 2 o'clock p. m. Came together by singing; the Moderator read the 34th Psalm. Prayer by J. C. Hall.

Committee consisting of Brethren J. Smith, J. B. Williamson and John O. Mitchell was appointed to read church letters. Motion to go

into election of officers was sustained.

Bro. L. W. Wright was appointed to take vote for Moderator; Bro. James Smith for Clerk; and Bro J. B. Williamson for Treasurer, which resulted as follows: For Moderator, G. W. Evans; For Clerk, J. B. Williamson; For Treasurer, G. H. Council.

Hicks. Finance—G. P. Watkins, J. T. Mathus, J. C. Estinger. Circular Letter—C. Burns, J. S. Young, J. W. Middleton.

Letter from Sister Compeer read to the Association. Motion by Bro. Smith to appoint an hour for prayer for Bro. Compeer's recovery sustained. Moved that Bro. Patterson conduct the prayer meeting from 10 to 11, Sunday carried. Petitionary letter from Salem Baptist

church read and on motion was received, also a petition from Shiloh Baptist church read and on motion was received. The hand of fellow-

ship was then extended to the representatives of said churches.

On motion by Bro. R. P. Claborn H. J. Rippey was seated. Bros. Richie, Dardanelle Association, J. A. Finney, Concord, L. W. Wright and J. W. Hulcy, Short Mountain were seated. A letter from Macedonian Association read. A motion to seat Bro. Martial as messenger lost. The Moderator was given until 11 o'clock services on Sunday to announce committees. Adjourned till Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Benediction by Bro. L. F. Patterson.

Saturday night.—Preaching by Bro. Richardson; text, John 17:11. Sunday morning.—According to previous arrangement the Association came together at 10 o'clock a m., and spent one hour in prayer for the recovery of Bro. Compeer, the meeting being conducted by Bro. I. F. Patterson, and was characterized by an earnestness of purpose that showed in an unmistakable manner with what esteem Bro. Compeer is held in the hearts of the members composing the Buckner Association. At the close of the prayer meeting adjourned five minutes; came together by singing. Bro. Hulsv read the first chapter Ephesians; prayer by Bro. L. W. Wright. Song, "Must Jesus bear the Cross alone." Text, II. Thes. 2:13. Bro. Hulsy was in the Spirit and spoke with great power encouraging the believers and cheering them on to deeds of love in the Master's cause. Bro. L. W. Wright followed in a short pertinent talk after which a collection was taken for missionary purposes amounting in cash to sixteen dollars and twenty-nine cents and subscription to twenty-two dollars and seventyfive cents, making a total of thirty-nine dollars and four cents. For foreign missions one dollar was afterward collected. Adjourned with benediction until 3 o'clock p. m.

3 o'clock p. m.—Came together by singing; sermon by Bro. Tyler, text, Daniel 2:44, followed Bro. L. F. Patterson. Song, "Oh! for a

closer walk with God" and benediction.

Night Service.—Preaching by Bro. J. H. Byers; text, Acts, 12:24,

followed by Bro. J. P. Hall.

Monday morning.—Assembled at 8 o'clock; Moderator read the 84th Psalm; prayer by Bro. L. W. Wright; minutes read and approved; roll corrected. Glendale and Pleasant Valley churches were each gaanted a letter of dismissal. J. K. Odum from Concord Association seated Bro. J. P. Duncan from Ouachita. Motion to appoint a committee on ordained ministers and licentiates, sustained, J. H. Anderson, S. D. Turner, J. W. Ramy were appointed on said committee. Report of committee on foreign missions discussed by Bros Patterson, Edmonson and Claborn after which a contribution of \$7.50 was made and report adopted. Motion that speeches be limited to five minutes sustained. Report of committee on Religious Literature read and adopted; discussed by Bros. Edmonson, Washburn and Wright. On motion the report was amended so as to include the Mission

Journal. Committee on nominations reported; an amendment was made to insert Dayton in lieu of Palestine. Amendment lost. Report adopted as originally read. Committee on Finance reported and report adopted. Committee on Preaching reported that Bro. Washburn preach at eleven o'clock. Five minutes recess.

Came together by singing, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" Read 5th chapter of Luke from 1st to 11th and part of 2nd chapter Ephes., and 28th chapter of Matt., to verse 18. Song, "We are traveling Home." Text, John, 2:5. The sermon was delivered with power accompanied with a general outpouring of God's Spirit. Adjourned one

and one-half hours for dinner.

Came together at 1:15. Moderator read the 14th chapter of John; prayer by Bro. Claborn. Moderater appointed A. G. Washburn, J. H. Anderson and J. H. Byers a committee on education. The committee on Temperance reported and report was discussed by Bros. Claborn and others after which it was adopted.

On motion Bro, Bennings was seated. Committee on ministers' names and post offices reported. Report received and adopted. Treasurer's report received and adopted. Committee on Circular Letter recommended that Bro. J. C. Williamson be appointed to read the

circular letter.

On motion Bro Walker, alternate, was seated from New Home church. Committee on Deceased Ministers reported. Pending the report Bro. Evans presented the children of Bro. Ledbetter as objects of prayer. On metion Bro. Patterson offered a special prayer for Bro. Ledbetter's children and the preservation of his wife, after which quite a number of Brethren participated in a discussion of the character and accomplishments of Bro. Ledbetter. Report then adopted.

Committee on preaching reported as follows: Bro. Wright to preach followed by Bro. Hulsy at 7 o'clock tonight. Committee on Education reported. Motion to advertise Buckner College in the minutes sustained. One page was given. Bro. Hall's report of his Missionary

work was read and adopted.

Night Session.—Bro. Wright read seven verses 20th chapter of Matthew. Song, "I love thy Kingdom Lord." Text, Matt. 20:1.

After preaching the business of the Association was resumed.

Committee on Domestic Missions reported. After discussion report was amended to read all the year. Bro. Williamson moved to refer the matter to the Executive Board and that delegates report to Clerk before the fifth Sunday. Sustained. The committee on Sabbath Schools reported and report was adopted. Motion by Bro. Patterson to appoint a committee to organize a Sunday School Convention was sustained. Chair appointed, Bros. J. B. Williamson, M. A. Strozier, B. D. Barnes. On motion by Bro. J. B. Williamson the thanks of this body were tendered to Poteau church and community.

Articles of Faith.

We believe there is one, and only one, living and true God, Jehova, and in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
 We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the inspired

words of God, constituting the only and all sufficient standard of Faith, Doctrine, Dis-

cipline and Practice

3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of eternal love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen His people in Christ before the world was, and hath predestinated them unto the adoption of children through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by His power through Faith unto Salvation.

4. We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his Maker, he tell into a state of sinfulness, and brought death upon his race, who being by natural decent in the unholy image of Adam, are children of wrath by nature, and with-

out natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, and in

no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth and the proper evidences thereof are Repentance, Faith and obedience unto Christ.

7. We believe that such only are true believers as endure unto the end in holiness of

life, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and

also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of Go I.

9. A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges in the New Testament appertaining to the Church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of a Christian Church are Bishops or Pastors and

Deacons

11. Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance in Jesus Christ, and to show forth His death till He comes.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's Day and should be observed as a day of

rest from common labor, and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties

14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Constitution.

Art. I. This Association shall be known as Buckner Baptist Association of Western Arkansas.

Art. II. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing Each church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional messenger

Art. III. The officers shall be, a Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors

are chosen.

Art, IV. Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body

according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the m nutes, keep a regular file of the

printed minutes of the sessions of the body and deliver them to his successor in office.
Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding
them subject to the order of the Association or its Executive committee; and render an

account of the same to the annual session of this body.

Art. V. The objects of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation; and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches, and to aid in this last object, several days of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

Art VI. Sec. 1 This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regu-

lations of the churches; but will act as an advisory council whenever it shall be neces-

Sec. 2. It however claims the authority over its own members, the messengers from the churches and will withdraw from and disown churches that depart from the principies of this compact by becoming herotodox in faith and disorderly in practice.

Art. VII. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and messengers at our annual meetings, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles here-

with published.

Art. VIII. Churches may be dismissed from this Association upon application at an annual meeting for the purpose of joining any body we recognize, or for the purpose

of forming a new association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed, shall be regarded as being disorderly.

Art. IX. There shall be an executive committee consisting of five members from the several churches and the officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of this committee. The committee shall have direction of the missionary operations of Association subject to its control and to make an annual report of its proceedings at each session of the Association. Besides the special object entrusted to this committee, it shall have the authority to represent the Association in all matters requiring attention while the Association is not in session. This committee shall hold regular meetings on Saturday preceding each fifth Lord's Day in the year at such places as may be designated by the committee. The committee shall meet for organization immediately journment of the Association. Three members shall constitute a quorum. The committee shall meet for organization immediately after the ad-

Art. X. It shall be the privilege of the Association in addition to its powers already granted to conduct missionary operations within or without its limits and for this purpose to choose a missionary or missionaries as means may allow, designate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through their treasurer out of the funds to be sent up

along with the fund for publishing the minutes to every annual meeting.

Art·XI. The annual meetings of the Association shall embrace the Lord's Day, and shall begin at 11 o'clock A. M., on Saturday before the third Lord's day in October of each year, at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association shall adjourn at 11 o'clock A. M., for preaching.

Art. XII. This constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Art. VI, Sec. 1, at any regular meeting of the Association by the two-thirds vote of the members in attendance.

Rules of Decorum.

1. This Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. An Introductory and Missionary sermon shall be preached by ministers chosen at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon of either to be preached by an alternate, to be chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

Visiting brethren in good standing may be invited to seats but not to vote.

A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association on the same day but at no other time. But one member shall speak at the same time, who shall rise, address the Moder-

ater and on obtaining leave shall proceed

6. No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the sub-

ject or use words of personal reflection and then by the Moderator 7. Every motion made and seconded shall come under consideration unless withdrawn by him who made it. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided be-

fore another is introduced. When a question is taken up after allowing time for debate the Moderator shall

take the voice of the Association by yeas and nays or otherwise.

9. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

10. No member shall speak twice on the same subject without permission of the

Association. 11. The appellation of Brother shall be used in the Association by members in their addresses one to another a.id all titles unknown to the Scriptures such as "Rev.," "D.-D.," "Parson" and the like shall not be employed nor appear upon the minutes. 12. The names of the members shall be called as often as the Association may

direct.

13. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member provided that he appoints another to his seat during the time but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.

14. Any member violating these rules shall be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.

15. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this body by a majority of the members present.

Remarks on Church Letters.
