CONSTITUTION.

SEC 1. This Association shall be known as the Clear Creek Association of

Missionary Ba; tists.
Suc. 2 It sh ll be composed of messe gers from Missionary Churches known to be in good standing. Each Church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three messengers; and each additional twenty-five members shall entitie the church to one additional messenger.

SEC 3. The officers of the Association shall consist of Moderator. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session of the

body, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Sec. 4 It shall be be duty of the Moderator to preside over the body

according to perliamentary usage.

SEC. 5 It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a correct record of the proceedings of he body a tend to the publication and distribution of minutes, keep a regular fi e of the printed minutes of each session and deliver the same to h s successor in office.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty fthe Treasurer to take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to the order of the body, or her Executive Committee, and render an account of the same to each sitting of

the body.

SEC. 7. The object of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the Churches, to secure unanimity of faith, and conce t of ac ion in

mission work, and also to cultivate the purity of the Churches.

SEC. 8. This Association shall, in no case, int-riere with the internal regulations of the Churches but will be reque ted to act as an advisory council when necessary. It, however, claims authority over its members, and will withdraw from and disown all Churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming betrodox in faith, or disorderly in practice

SEC. 9. Newly organized Churches, or Churches dismissed flom other Associations, n av be admitted into this body upon application by letter and messengers, at any annual meeting, by their messengers agreeing to the

abstract of principles berewith published.

SEC. 10. Chur hes may be dismissed from this Association by appli ation at an annual meeting, for the purpose of joining my body that we recognize, or for the purpose of f rming a new Association, but any ' burch departing from us without being regularly dismised shall be regarded as disorderly.

SEC. 11. The e shall be an Executive Committee a pointed at each

annual meeting, consisting of one member from each Church, and the fficers of this body by virtue of their relation thereto, be members of said committee. This committee shall have direction of the missiona y operations of the Association, subject to its control, and shall be required to make an annual report of it proceedings. This committee shall have the authority to represent the Association in all mat ers requiring attention while the Association is not in session. Each member of this committee shall constitute a missionary age t for his respective church to collect funds for mission work, and shall report the same to each meeting of the committee, which meetings shall be regularly on the Saturday preceding each fifth Lord's Day in the year. Five membe s shall constitute a quorum.
SEC. 12 The territory of the Associ tion shall be d vided into four dis-

tricts, to be numbered in regular order, and a district meeting ppointed to be held in each district in the order in which they are numbered, on Saturday, at 10 o'clock A. M., preceding each fifth Sunday in the year, in connection with the Executive Committee, at which time and place there stall be delivered a sermon subject to criticism, and also the reading of essays or

exegesis, subject to criticism, on subjects previously given

13. The moderator of the Association, when present, shall preside at each district and board meeting. The clerk of the Association shall keep a record of the proceedings of each district and board meeting, and report

SEC. 14. The annual meeting of the Association shall begin at 11 o'clock a. m., on Thursday before the fourth Lord's day in October of each year, at

which time the introductory sermon shall be delivered.

SEC. 15. This constitution may be altered or amended, except section eight, at any regular meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

- 1 We believe there is one, and only one living and true God, Jehovah, and that in the unity of the God-head, there are three persons, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, are the inspired words of God, constituting the only and all sufficient standard of Faith. Doctrine. Discipline and Practice.
- 3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of that Eternal love, by which God hath, according to his wisdom, chosen his people in Christ before the world was, and hath predestinated them unto the adop ion of thildren, through sanctification of the spirit, and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by his power through faith unto salvation.
- 4. We belie e that man was created oly, but by a willful violat on of the law of his Maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness, and brought death upon his race, who being by natural decent in the unholy image of Adam, are children of wrath by nature, and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life, to attain to a happy state.
- 5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, and in no other way.
- t. We believe that in order to be saved, sinn re must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the Hory Spirit, in connection with divine truth, and the proper evidences thereof are repentance, faith, and obedience unto Christ.
- 7. We believe that such only are true believers as endure unto the end in believes of life, and they are kept by the power of God, through faith unto believe on.
- 8. We believe that the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sered duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought into our souls by the regenerating split of God
- 9. The Christian Church is a congregation of imme sed beli vers, who meet statedly, and have covenants together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privilege in the New Testament appertaining of the Church of Jesu Christ.
- 10. The only officers of a Christian Church are Bishops or Pasto s and Deacons.
- 11. Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Fa her. So, and Holy Spirit, by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good standing.
- 12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance of Jerus Christ, to be obs rved in the Church as such, in remembrance of Christ, and to show forth his death until he comes.
- 13. The first day of the week is the Lord's Day, and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor, and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties.
- 14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment, and that the happiness of the righteous and the misery of the wicked will be eternal.

RULES OF DECORUM.

RULE I. E ch session shall be opened and closed with praver.

RULE II. After the delivery of the introductory sermon, the Association shall proceed to business in the following order:

1. Hear the reading of the letters from the Churches and enroll the names

of their messengers.

2. Give an opportunity for other Churches to become members of the body, and e tend the han of fellows ip to their m ssengers.

3. Elect officers.

4. Receive corresponding messengers and ther visiting brethren.

5 Appoint the followin committee, to-wit: On Divine Service, on Finance, on Mission Work, ou Sunday Schools, on Temperance, on Queries, on Religious Literature, on D strict Meetings and Programme for the same.
6. Hear report of Executive Committe.

7 Elect a missionary and assign him his work.

8 Elect Executive Committee. 9. Provide for corres onden e. 10. Hear reports of Committees.

11. Determ ne place of ho ding next session and who shall preach the introductory s rmon.

12. Provide for publishing minutes of proceedings. 18. Res lutions and other miscellaneous matter.

RULE III. A member not satisfied wi h any decision of the moderator may

appeal to the Association on the same day, but not at any other time HULE IV. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, and in a respectful n anner, address the moderator and on obtaining the floor proceed.

RULE V. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subjet under discussion, or use words of personal reflection, or otherwise gets out of order, when he shall be called to order by the modera-

tor; and, on yielding to order, may proceed again.

RULE VI. Whe a q estion is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous q estion, to postpone to a c iti in time, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which everal moti as shall take preced noe in the order in whi h they are stated, A motio to djourn shall always be in order, provided the previous question has not be nordered, or vote is being taken.

• RULE VII. When a debatable question is before the Association, any member may move the previous question, but before it is put it shall be seconce by at least three members. After the previous question has been moved and the motion prevailed, no further debate shall be allowed only by the mover of the main quest on, who sh ll be all wed ten minutes on which

to close the debate.

RULE VIII Any member desiring to absent himself, shall obtain leave of the Association; and the name of any member absenting hin self without

leave, shall be dropped from the minutes.

RULE IX. These rules shall aprly to District and Board meetings, as well as to Association meetings, except rule No. 2 on order of business After the delivery of the sermon on Saturday, 10 o'cl ck a. m., for criticism, the meeting shall proceed to business in he following order:

1. Inv te all visiting brethren, known to be in good standing, to state in

council.

-2. Appoint the f llowing committees, to-wit: On Divine Service, on Programme for nex: meeting and other committees as occasion m .y require. 3 Hear reports from the Churches through their m mber of the Execu-

tive Committee.

Hear report from missionary.
 Take up programme from committee.

6. Hear reports of committees.

7. Resolutions and other miscellaneous business.

Rule X. These rules may be altered or amended by a two-third vote at any regu ar me ting of the Association.

PROCEEDINGS.

The Clear Creek Baptist Association assembled in its twenty first annual session, in the meeting house of the Red Bird Baptist Church, Crawford County, Ark., on the Saturday before the Second Lord's day in October, 1893, and was called to order at 11 o'clock by the Clerk, John E. Cox. Elder M. A. Gunter, who had been appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon, being absent, by request of Eld. T. R. Eigly, alternate, Eld. J. W. Harris preached the Annual Sermon for the Association. Subject of the discourse, The Establishment and Perpetuity of the Baptist Church Bro, Harris proved by the Scriptures that the Missionary Baptist Caurch was set up or established by Jesus Christ himself.

Bro, M. F. Locke was chosen Molerator until a permanent organization could be affected.

A Committee on D votional Exercise was appointed, consisting of the paster and deacons of Red Bird Church, and Eld. C. R. Johns and Bro. C. C. Waters.

Oa motion, the Association adjourned to 1:30 o'clock P. M. Prayer by Eld. Harvey Beauchamp.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association reassembled at 1:30 o'clock, and was called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by Eld. C. A. Gowin. Elds D C. Hardin, H. Beauchamp and Bro J. S. Renfroe were appointed to read the letters from the Churches. Letters were read from twenty-eight Churches, and names of Messengers enrolled, as found in Table of Statistics.

The Committee on Devotional Exercise reported Eld. C. A.

Gowin to preach at Graphic tonight; Eld. W. M. Hicks at Fine Springs; M. A. Pillars at New Hope No. 2; Eld. T Hudson at the Church.

Sunday 9 A. M.—Sunday School Lecture by Eld. D. Hewitt, 11 A. M.—Preaching by Eld. D. C. Hardin.

The Association then proceeded to organize. Bros. J. W. Cain, J. W. Harris and David Reed were appointed to count the vote.

While the vote was being counted, Eld. D. Hewitt presented the claims of the Arkansas Baptist Eld. D. C. Hardin presented the claims of the Baptist Gleaner. Bro M. F. Locke also spoke in the interest of the above named papers.

The brethren reported the result of the election as follows: Eld. D. C. Hardin, Moderator; John E. Cox, Secretary, and Bro. B. W. Webb, Treasurer.

Bro Hardin took the Chair and thanked the Brethren for the confidence in him and the honor bestowed upon him by his election.

Petitionary letters were then called for and Mount Olivet Church presented a letter by her Messenger, Bro. J. H. Wedge. The letter was read and after some remarks, the Church was received. Dyer Church presented a letter by her Messengers, J. N. Patton, John O. Love and John Manuel. Latter read and Church received, and the right hand of fellowship extended to the Messengers by the Moderator.

On motion, the Clerk was ordered to have the Constitution, Articles of Faith and Rules of Decorum, printed in the Minutes of this Session.

Correspondence called for. Eld J. G. Evans was received from Concord Association.

On motion, Committee on Nominations was discontinued and it was agreed that the place of holding the Association and the brother to preach the introductory sermon, be decided by a vote of the body.

On motion, Bros. M F. Locke, J. W. Harris, Charles Faber and Sisters A. L. Crudup and M. F. Locke were appointed a Committee on Woman's Work,

On motion, Eld. D. Hewitt was received as a representative of our State Sunday School Board and the Arkansas Baptist.

On motion, the Association adjourned until 9 o'clock A. M. Sunday. Prayer, by Eld. C. M. Partin.

Eld. Thomas Hudson preached to a large and attentive congregation at 7 P. M Text, Matt. 28: 19-20

SUNDAY.

MORNING SESSION

The Association engaged in devotional exercise, led by Bro. D. Hewitt, after which the report on Sunday Schools was read. It was moved that the report be adopted. Bro. D. Hewitt delivered a good lecture on Sunday Schools; the importance of the Sunday School as a means of training the youths of our country, and closed by giving some practical suggestions as to how the Sunday School should be conducted. Bro. M. A. Pillers also spoke on the report, after which the report was adopted, as follows:

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, would respectfully submit the following for your consideration: At this time, when

there are so many false teachers abroad in the land who are seeking to deceive if possible the very elect; we are made to feel the importance of presecuting more vigorously than ever our Sunday schaul work that the young may be more perfectly instructed in

the teaching of God's word

We regret to see so few of our Churches reporting any Sunday schools. 'Go teach all nations" is the divine injunction, and we recognize in our Sunday schools an important factor in the training of the young in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Therefore we would most earnestly request the pastors of the several Churches to urge them to organize Sunday schools in every Church that the young and old may be gathered together on every Lord's

day for the purpose of studying God's word.

We would further reccommend, that at least one Sunday school institute be held every year in the bounds of this Association for the purpose of bringing all the Sunday school workers together and to devise ways and means for creating greater interest in the work. We would also recommend that this body co operate with the State Sunday School Board and urge upon our Churches, to do all in their power for the prosecution of the work within our bounds, and that each Church send up a report of Sunday school work next year.

On motion the Association took a recess until II o'clock

Bro. D. C. Hardin preached at 11 o'clock to a large and attentive congregation. Subject of discourse. The importance of strictly obeying the requirements of the gospel. Text, Galatian 1:6-10. At the close of the close of the sermon a collection was taken for State Missions, to the amount of eleven dollars.

The Association reassembled at 2:30 o'clock, Prayer by Bro Lovd.

The report on Associational Missons was read, and on motion

was laid over to 8 o'clock Monday morning.

The hour having come that was appointed to consider the interest of Woman's Work, Sister M. F. Locke took charge of that work, and called on Bros. Hardin. Hewitt and Locke to make short talks. The brethren responded with some very appropriate remarks on the subject.

At the close of their remarks, the brethren vacated the house while the sisters held a meeting to themselves; after which the Association was called to order, and on motion adjourned to 8 o'clock Monday morning. Prayer by Bro. John Burnett.

Eld, J. T. Evans preached at night to a large congregation. Text, Romans 6: 2.

MONDAY.

MORNING SESSION.

Reassembled according to adjournment at 8 o'clock. Song by the congregation and prayer by Bro. G. W. C Lasater.

Minutes read and approved.

The following committee were appointed on Digest of Church Letters: Charles Faber, W. M. Hicks, G. W. C. Lasater, John Burnett and C. A Gowin

The report on Associational Missions was taken up and re-read, and after remarks by several brethren, on motion, the report was amended by striking out that part of the report that recommends the consolidating of the Missionary Work of this Association. The report was adopted as follows:

The command of our blessed Savior is, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," and believing that it is our duty to preach this blessed gospel with our means, your committee would recommend some systematic method of raising money for advancing the cause of the Master in destitute fields. That the pastors of the Churches be requested to preach a sermon on missions, at least once a quarter, and take up a collection, and let each give as the Lord has prospered him. We further recommend that our Board co-operate with the Sunday school work in the Association.

Brethren, the destitution in our Association is going to be occupied, either with error or truth. Are we going to sit idly by and permit error to go in? We believe the Baptists hold the truth and therefore pray you to arouse yourselves out of your lethargy and go forth as one man into the destitute fields of the Clear Creek Association with your means, preaching that truth as it is in our Lord Jesus Christ.

At the close of the collection prayer was offered by Rro. M. F. Locke. Report was adopted.

Bro Moderator, the Committee on State Missions ask leave to submit the following report: The question of Missions is the paramount question of this Association. It is the question that is to save the world from death, if saved it be. It is the one question for the enforcement of which all others should bend, and it is the only question that would probably justify the assembling of this body together and yet, strange and sad as it may seem, the actual work of preaching the gospel to the needy and dying world, has been given but little consideration and less means for a series of years, within our bounds.

Brethren seem to have forgotten or never learned God's plan of saving souls and they seem to entertain the erroneous and

nations opinion and belief that to give to God's cause in the matter of saving souls is to starve their ministers and themselves, forgetful that our God has said that such a course is to rob God and impoverish themselves; and that it is more blessed to give than to receive. And experience comes to the aid of revelation and teaches us that the liberal soul shall grow fat. For the selfish or covetous man or woman is ever four din straightened circumstances financially and religiously, if they fail to trust God and do something for his cause, while the cheerful giver God loves, honors

and prospers.

Twelve hundred dollars paid by the State Mission Board, will keep twenty-four Missionaries in our State field for twelve months and will result in the salvation perhaps of 500 souls. Then dear brethren we come to you with the all important proposition. Will you, or not contribute say five dollars from each church in this Association for the benefit of those noble spiritual heroes who are sacrificing their means, their comfort, their time, the societies of their families and friends to give the destitute of our State tie bread of life. This would probably cost us fifteen cents each Brethren, will you weigh fifteen cents in the side of the scales against imortal souls? I ask will you, or will you do something worthy of a Christian who loves God and His cause, something that will try our God, and as He has commanded us to do, praise Him and see if he will not pour out a blessing upon us such as we have not witnessed in the history of this Association.

And let us by our deeds, which are said to be the fruit we bear, while empty promises are mere leaves which cause us to falsify our profession and disgrace the name we bear as Missionary Baptists.

The Committee on Religious Literature made their report as follows:

Your Committee on Religious Literature would submit the following. That we make a class study of the Bible, and as a help we would recommend the Arkansas Baptist and the Baptist Gleaner as good sound papers; and such books as the Baptist Succession by D. B. Ray, The Little Baptist, Theodosia Earnest, Grace Truman and Southern Baptist Sunday School literature; and all such literature as has truth for its matter and supported by the Bible.

The report on Foreign Missions was read. It was moved to adopt the report. Pending the adoption of the report the claims of Foreign Missions was ably presented by Bro. Hudson.

The report was adopted as follows: Your Committee on Foreign Missions report as follows: Whereas, we recognize our duty and privilege to support Missionary and the institutions connected with our Foreign Mission work, we respectfully and earnestly recommend that one Sunday in the year be set apart, on which every Church and Sunday school of the Association ta e up a colfection for Foreign Missions, and that each one of the 1700 of the brethren and sisters composing the Association, lay by, when convenient, a certain sum of money, and if they cannot personally attend, forward it to the Church on the day on which the collection will be made.

We feel encouraged and thankful to the Lord for the many thousands of members composing our Foreign Mission Churches. Thos. Hupson, Chm'n.

The report on Woman's Work was read and, on motion was adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Weman's Work have had the subject under consideration and would respectfully submit the following report: Since the cause of Christ is always most successful where his love is most felt, and since woman possess in a much greater degree Christian sympathy and love and her nature, inclination and genial qualities adapt her to the work of winning souls; while the regard in which a lovely Christian woman is held by men, gives them a hold upon the sterner sex, that man can't approach unto. As a number of the good sisters in our Association desire to do something worthy of them and to serve their God in such manner as comports with his word, and does not contravene your plans and meets your own idea of co-operation, therefore, the following recommendations are made for the adoption of this body, viz:

That the sisters of the different Churches are requested to organize Ladies' Aid Societies at their early convenience in all such

Churches as have not organized such societies.

2, We recommend that the Association endorse such lady officer or officers as are appointed by the Ladies' State Central com-

mittee or will make other recommendations.

3 We recommend that the following ladies be appointed for the purpose of visiting among the ladies at their respective Churches and assisting them in their work of organizing and other work, supplying them with necessary literature, etc., etc., to wit: Mrs J. L. Locke Mrs. A L. Crudup, Mrs. Frank, Misses Mary Williams, S. C. Howston and B A. Cole

4 That these ladies be requested to make a report of the work done at our district meetings and a full report of the year's work to the meetings of the Associations.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association met according to adjournment at 1 o'clock.

The report on Education was read and after motion to adopt the report was spoken to by Bro. M. F. Locke and Eld. Thomas Hudson. At the close of the remarks the report was adopted as follows:

We, your Committee on Education beg leave to report as follows: We recognize that the day of ignorance is no longer winked at, and to keep from being ignorant, we must educate; whatever may have been said as to our ignorance can no longer truthfully be said. Education and truth on one side have raised us to our now honored position. Again, to be able to expe with atheism, infidelity and all the ism and cism of the world we must educate. Education is of vast importance both in public and private life, but it is more necessary in this advanced age of the world than ever before. Ignorance is the tyrant monster that keeps its victims chained in spiritual darkness, having a form of gottiness, but denying the power thereof.

Hence, we your committee insist that parents should educate their children to the full ability that God hath given them. We further insist that our young ministers avail themselves of the opportunities now offered them in many of our schools and colleges to get an education free of tuition. While there are many good schools in our State, we would recommend the Ouachita College as our State denominational college as the best equipped and the most suitable place to educate our children and our young miristers. Hence we insist that it be given our hearty support and patronage.
