

# Constitution.

We, the Church of Jesus Christ, called Baptists, being assembled, through our delegates, at Bellefonte, Boone Co., Ark., on Saturday before the second Sabbath in May, A. D., 1869, agree to form ourselves into an Association for the purpose of instruction, edification and the promotion of the cause of our blessed Redeemer.

Article I. The Association shall be composed of messengers, or delegates, chosen by the churches in our union, who, on presenting letters certifying to their appointment, shall

be entitled to seats.

Art. II. The messengers thus chosen, when convened, shall be known as the "Crooked Creek Association," who shall be not merely an advisory council, but also for the advancement of cause and kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Art. III. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to four delegates, and any church failing to represent herself

shall render the reason to the next Association.

Art. IV. Letters from the churches shall state the number received by experience, baptism, letter, recommendation or restoration; those dismissed by letter, ex-communicated or deceased since the last Association, also the total number in fellowship.

Art. V. New churches may be admitted into the Association, who petition by letter and delegates, adopting or subscribing to our articles of faith, constitution and rules of decorum, the Moderator giving the hand of fellowship.

Art. VI. The Association shall elect a Moderator and

Clerk by the suffrage of the members present.

Art. VII. The Association shall have a fund for support which shall be supplied by voluntary contribution of the churches sent by the hands of their messengers which shall be at disposal for Association purposes only.

Art. VIII Donating or withholding our means for religious purposes shall be at the free volition of any member,

and is no bar to fellowship.

Art. IX. Questions may be sent by churches in their letters or brought in by motion and second, and may or may not be investigated as the Association may determine.

Art. X. The Association shall, in all cases, be governed by a majority of the members, except in the reception of members, which shall be unanimous.

Art. XI. The Association shall have power to withdraw her fellowship from any church in her union who, after due admonition, shall be unsound in her faith and practice.

Art. XII. Some of her ministers shall be appointed by the Association each session to preach the introductory sermon

at the next.

Art. XIII. She may correspond with any association as

she may determine, while in session.

Art. XIV. There shall be a Treasurer appointed by the Association, who shall receive and disburse all funds belonging to her as she may direct.

Art XV. The Clerk shall keep a minute of the proceedings, which shall be printed and distributed among the

churches according to the contributions.

Art. XVI. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if necessary, and signed by the Moderator and attested by the Clerk, before the Association recess.

Art. XVII. Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any time when two-thirds of the churches may deem it necessary.

Art. XVIII. The Association at each session shall deter-

mine the time and place of the next.



# Declaration of Paith.

ARTICLE I. We believe that the Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is and shall remain to the end of the world the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human opinions should be said:

11. We believe there is one and only one, living and true (lod, an infinite intelligent spirit, whose name is Jeliovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and earth, inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, eq. 1 in every divine perfection, and executing distinct at 1 harmonious offices in the work of the redemption.

111. We believe man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression, fell from that holy and happy estate, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners; not by constraint, but by choice, being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil, and therefore under just

condemnation without defense or excuse.

through the mediatorial office of the son of God, who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Himself our nature, yet without sin, honored the Divine lit by His personal obedience, and by his death made full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in Heaven, and uniting in His wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with Divine perfection, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, compassionate and all-sufficient Savior.

v. We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood, by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God, that it brings us into a state of most

blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every bless-

ing needful for time and eternity.

vi. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel, and that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by the cordial, penitent and obedient faith, and nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth but his own determined depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel, which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

VII. We believe that in order to be saved sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind, that it is affected in a manner above our comprehension, by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel, and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith and

newness of life.

VIII. We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseperable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating spirit of God, whereby, being convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession and supplication for mercy, at the same time receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and

relying on Him as the only all-sufficient Savior.

IX. We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners, that being perfectly consistant with the moral agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end: it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable, that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God and active imitation of His free mercy, that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe in the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance, and to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

x. We believe that sanctification is the process by which according to the will of God, we are made partakers of His holiness, and that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Heal-

er and Comforter, in the continued use of the appointed means—especially the word of God, self-examination, self-de-

nial, watchfulness and prayer.

XI. We believe that such only are real believers as eudure to the end, and that their perservering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from the superficial professors, that a special providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. We believe that the law of God is the eternal unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy. just and good, and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to the fallen man to fulfill its precepts, arises from the love of sin, to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Holy law, is one great end of the Gospel and of the means of grace, connected with the establishment of his visible church.

We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congre at 'n of baptized believers associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only scriptural officers are Bishops, or Pastors, or Deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are found in the epistles to Tim-

othy and Titus.

We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion, in water, of a believer, into the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, administered by a legal administrator, to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Savior, with its effects in our death to sin, and resurrection to a new life; that it is pre-requisite to the privileges of a church relation, and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the undying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self-examination.

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or the Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the observance of all means of grace, both private and public, and by preparation for the rest that

remains for the people of God.

avvi. We believe that government is of Divine appointment, for the interest and good order of human society, and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed except only in things opposed to the Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience and the

Prince of the kings of the earth.

XVII. We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of our Lord Jean and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief, are in his sight wicked and under the curse; and this distinction holds good among men both in and after death

XVIII. We believe that the end of the world is approaching; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from their graves for final retribution; that a solemn separation will take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy, and that the judgement will fix forever the final state of man in Heaven or hell on principles of righteousness.

# Rules of Decorum.

+>--

1. The Moderator shall cause each session to open and close with prayer.

2. Ministers present invited to seats are privileged to

speak with us on all subjects, but vote on none.

3. Those who speak shall rise to their feet and respectfully address the brother Moderator.

4. No motion shall be entertained without a second.
