2. That the election of the missionary man be referred to the Association Board; and that the election of the woman worker be referred to the Association Board in conference and co-operation with the Associational Committee from the Woman's Missionary Union.

3. That the salaries and expenses of the two workers be apportioned among the Churches, by the Executive Committee of the Association Board, and that, as far as possible, these amounts be provided in the Churches independent of the 75 Million Campaign Fund.

4. That each Church be requested to name someone, whose duty it shall be to see that the apportionment in that Church be in the hands of the Association Treasurer on or before the first of each month.

Devotional service was led by J. H. Reynolds, who read Hebrews 12:1, 2. Prayer by F. A. Whitely of Bigelow.

Reports not being ready on motion Association adjourned until 10:15 pending preparation of reports.

Report of Young People's Work was read by I. E. Taylor and discussed by him, E. W. Otey, A. A. Walker, H. P. Riley and Otto Whittington, and adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

The outcome of the B. Y. P. U. participation in the recent 75 Million Campaign demonstrated the value of training such as the B. Y. P. U. gives. Reports come from leaders of B. Y. P. U.'s all over the South, that members of this organization were ready for the campaign and went into it with zeal and faith. Since the purpose of the campaign was enlistment in Christian living and giving it would have been a disappointment had not the B. Y. P. U. members been among the first to volunteer for any and all services. Why? Because the B. Y. P. U. workers had been

trained for enlistment. That is a part of the everyday work of the B. Y. P. U.

Thus week-by-week training in the B. Y. P. U. showed itself in the campaign activities.

In B. Y. P. U. circles it is a well known fact that all A-1 Unions are from 75 to 100 per cent up in giving. Hence it is reported from all states that B. Y. P. U. members gave, and gave gladly.

It is also gratifying to report that there was a large increase in B. Y. P. U. membership and attendance during the past year. This is due, we believe to a large degree, because of the fact that more of our churches are realizing the importance of this kind of work.

We recommend, therefore:

1. That a Senior B. Y. P. U. be organized in every church in this Association and where possible that a Junior Union also be organized.

2. That representatives be sent to the Summer Assembly at Arkadelphia each summer.

3. That all our pastors, deacons, and leaders encourage, as much as possible, the importance of our young people connecting themselves with the B. Y. P. U.

4. That each pastor should see to it that all of our young church members should have a great deal of instruction in Bible study and in Baptist doctrines.

Report on Home Missions was read by A. H. Autry, discussed by him, and adopted as follows:

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

In 1919 the missionaries of our Board baptized one convert for every three received into our churches. Regularly they baptize from twenty to twenty-five per cent as many converts as the entire number who enter our churches. For fifteen years its Evangelists have averaged 450 baptisms per year per worker, a record far out-stripping that of any other similar agency. Its system of Mountain Schools is larger than any other and is the acknowledged standard in adaptability. Its Enlistment work is rapidly bringing a more adequate standard of spiritual instruction and effectiveness in hundreds of churches. Its Church Extension work has grown from infancy to strength in a period of only a few years.

Every loyal Baptist will rejoice in the admirable efforts of our Board, to meet the crucial needs of these days, by enlarging its work. At its annual meeting in Atlanta in June, after long and painstaking efforts to reduce the appropriations as far as possible, the brethren of the Board found that \$2,875,000.00 were necessary for work of the present year.

We commend to our people the admirable Mission Study Books of the Home Board, through which a true view is presented of the large problems we confront, and recommend that pastors, superintendents, mission society leaders and others write often for the large and splendid assortment of free tracts about its work and the needs, which our Home Board gladly furnishes on request. We urge the churches to pay up on the 75 Million Campaign.

Report on State Missions was read by Otto Whittington and that on Foreign Missions by A. A. Walker, and motions were made to adopt both. Missionary Secretary L. E. Barton then preached from Isaiah 42:1-4, taking as a subject, "The Optimism of Jesus." Following the sermon the State and Foreign Mission reports were adopted as follows:

### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Every Baptist Church should be intensely Missionary in faith and practice. No church can live long or do the will of God if it neglects to maintain a Missionary spirit and fails to take some part in God's plan to save the world.

Every Baptist Church is vitally interested in the Lord's work within our own state. The unparalleled and pressing need of our destitute sections, the great number and the inevitable and awful destiny of the lost within our borders, the matchless and growing opportunity of the ever widening and whitening field of service before us, all constitute an eloquent and heart-stirring appeal from God that should make the hearts of the most backward of us burn with a holy passion for lost souls. Arkansas Baptists are a great people, they have a great state, and their plans should be commensurate with the plans of God and the needs of the field.

The work of State Missions is carried on by the churches through the Executive Board of the Baptist State Convention. The report of this Board to the Convention last year showed the following results: Workers employed for full or part time 120, days labored 21,870, sermons and addresses 15,253, conversions 3,083, baptisms 2,281, additions 3,902, subscriptions to the Baptist Advance 905, money raised by missionaries \$50,005.00.

For the first six months of this year the following are some of the items of State and Association Mission work: Workers for full or part time 262, days of labor 16,703, institutes and conferences 285, sermons and addresses 6,605, conversions 1,381, additions 1,421, volunteers for the ministry and mission work 90.

Surely these wonderful reports set out facts and figures that will stir the churches in our association to pay up subscriptions to the 75 Million Campaign in order that State Missions may have all obligations paid December 1. All over the State there is sore destitution. If the destitute sections are to be cared for next year by State Mission workers, if associational boards are to be aided in paying their missionaries, and if weak churches are to be helped in paying their pastors, we must take care of our State Mission obligations. The association urges all our pastors and churches to do their utmost. Send all money for the 75 Million Campaign (except for Association Missions) to Dr. L. E. ### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We have wrought at this task of Foreign Missions through our Foreign Mission Board for seventy-five years. The Seventy-Five Millions is the diamond anniversary and celebration of the organization of the Convention and the creation of the Foreign Mission Board.

The Southern Baptist Convention was born in the year 1845. In 1870, at the close of the first twenty-five years, the Southern Baptists had eleven missionaries on the field, 250 converts in mission churches, and contributed \$21,938 during the year for the support of this work. In 1895, at the end of the second twenty-five-year period, Southern Baptists had eighty-one missionaries on the field, 3,493 converts in mission churches, and contributed \$129,348 during the year for the support of the work.

Today we have under appointment 341 missionaries, and 56,023 church members on the field, and have during the past year contributed \$2,161,698.29 to this work. During the last twenty-five years we have made our greatest progress in institutionalizing our work and in framing up out of experience and long brooding upon foreign mission problems an ordered and more scientific administration. Schools, hospitals and publishing houses have been found indispensable to rapid evangelization, the conservation of our gains and the development of Christian character on the fields.

We, your committee, from the information that we have at hand, find no place for the sounding of a pessimistic note, but, to the contrary, we feel it our duty to say to you, "Thank God and take courage." Let us first of all consecrate our lives to the service of our God, and then concentrate all our efforts to building up and the strengthening of the cause for which our Lord gave His life, and then let the spirit of continuation in the work inspire us to do more in the future than we have done in the past.

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional service was led by A. J. Ashburn, who read and commented on Romans 12:1, 2.

On motion, Section 2 Article IPI of the Constitution was amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Each Church shall be entitled to three Messengers, with one additional Messenger for every fifty members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred.

Report on Orphans' Home was read by Mrs. L. P. Coleman, discussed by her, I. E. Taylor, and W. F. Dorris, and adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF ORPHANS' HOME

Since the establishment of our Orphans' Home at Monticello, approximately one thousand children have been cared for.

There are now about 60 children in the Home. They are received at any age up to 13 and are released at 18.

There are enough cows on the farm to furnish milk and butter for one meal each day. There are also a number of cattle and hogs to be slaughtered for food this fall and winter, and a good crop has been produced this year on the farm.

Indications are good that the year will close with a cash balance on hand in the maintenance fund.



The buildings and equipment are sadly inadequate. Our Five Year Program provides for proper construction and maintenance, and we recommend that the State Board proceed early to ascertain just what is necessary in the way of reconstructing the plant and what changes, if any, are needed in the matter of management in view of our enlargement program.

We recommend further that our Sunday Schools continue to contribute one Sunday's collection each month to the Orphans' Home.

We urge all the churches to pay their pledges to the 75 Million Campaign promptly that our orphans may be cared for properly.

Because many of the churches and W. M. U. Societies do not provide clothing for any individual child, we further recommend that a list of general needs be given out by the management, so that the smaller societies and churches may be encouraged to send boxes, or any other help that may be suggested by those in charge.

The report on Colleges and Schools was read by G. D. Faulkner, discussed by J. G. Lile and adopted as follows:

## COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS.

People are what they are, very largely, because of the teaching they have. If we had been under the influence all the while, of infidel parents and teachers, not many of us would be serving the Lord Jesus Christ. We should have Christian teachers in every school of the land. If we are concerned about the spiritual welfare of our children, if it is our purpose to help our young people to become useful Christian men and women, we must stand loyally for our Baptist Schools and support them with our means and our patronage.

Ouachita College, at Arkadelphia, has property values in buildings, grounds, and equipment, worth about \$250,000.00. The endowment is about \$112,000.00. New buildings to cost about \$250,000.00 are now in course of construction.

In Central College, at Conway, we have property worth about \$125,000.00, and new buildings to cost about \$100,000.00 are to be constructed right away.

In Mountain Home College, at Mountain Home, our Junior College, we have property worth \$60,000.00 or more.

The property values of our academies at Maynard, Blue Eye, and Hagarville, average about \$12,000.00 for each school.

A Baptist college is to be built at Jonesboro soon and Baptist academies open their first sessions this fall in Montgomery, Newton and Union counties.

Our colleges and schools are all well patronized, so well that additional buildings are absolutely necessary, and yet only a very small percent of our boys and girls are attending Baptist schools. We urge upon our people the duty of sending their children to our own schools and colleges.

The most hopeful sign of progress in all our work is the prosperity of our Baptist schools and colleges, and the ever increasing interest of our brotherhood in this work, manifested by the enlarged patronage and the liberal contributions through the 75 Million Campaign.

Let us pray for our schools and support them.

## MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, your Committee, beg to report that we have not and are not looking to this important part of our great work as we should or even as we could.

We consider this one of the most important works of our denomination. The Scriptures invoke study of the word—"Study to show thyself approved of God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." We need standard bearers well equipped who can better lead against the many foes of the church of Christ.

Every other institution demands trained leaders. Why should we not be as much interested in our God ordained institution, the church.

Many of our men whom God has impressed to enter the ministry see no way of equipping himself. He has no means except a brain and a heart afire for God. Let us furnish the money to

put him in school. Ouachita College and our two seminaries are places especially prepared to train them.

We therefore recommend that we support these institutions and that the churches pray to God to call from their membership young men whom he would to enter the ministry. We recommend that the clerk be instructed to obtain and print in minutes as far as possible a list of young preachers and others preparing for religious work from this association and now in school.

Report on Religious Literature was read by A. M. Rodgers, discussed by him, and adopted as follows:

### REPORT ON PUBLICATIONS.

The Bible holds first place in our literature. When we know what the Bible teaches on any subject that settles it. There is not the slightest excuse for our people to be in ignorance of the teachings of the Bible. We urge regular, systematic Bible study by all our people, and that parents teach the Bible to their children.

We believe that every home should have a good supply of the best books, including books on subjects of general interest as well as books on religious subjects and especially on Baptist doctrines. Such books can be had from the Baptist Book House, 405 Donaghey Building, Little Rock, Ark.

Another matter of the very greatest importance is to see that every Baptist home has a Baptist paper. It is estimated that 600,000 Baptist homes in the South are without a Baptist paper. In Arkansas, among the Baptists who are in sympathy with the Convention there are not less than 16,000 or possibly 18,000, such homes without a Baptist paper. If the Baptist Advance could be put in all such homes it would be a mighty help to our cause.

A special effort is being made all over the South to put a Baptist paper in every Baptist home. This campaign was approved by the Southern Baptist Convention, and it was recommended by 75 Million Commission in its report to the Convention. We believe that if we are to go on through the five years of the 75 Million Campaign with success we must get Baptist papers into the homes of our people.

The Baptist Advance is the property of the Baptist State Convention. It is our paper. It promotes all the work in which we are engaged. It ought to go to every Baptist home in the state. We recommend that special effort be made by pastors and churches to see that every family represented in their resident membership gets the Advance.

On the first of September the Advance had about 9,000 regular subscribers. This number ought to be doubled in a short time.

Also Home and Foreign Fields, published by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., and Royal Service, published by the Southern Baptist W. M. U., Baltimore, Maryland, are of very great value, and we recommend that our people subscribe for and read them.

Report on 75 Million Campaign was read by Mrs. J. S. Compere, discussed by A. M. Rodgers, Mrs. J. S. Compere, J. H. Reynolds, Otto Whittington, E. Weber, and adopted as follows:

## 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN.

The Southern Baptist Convention, which met in Atlanta, Ga., May, 1919, inaugurated the greatest forward movement ever undertaken in an organized way by Southern Baptists, known as the 75 Million Campaign. This effort to raise a subscription of 75 Million Dollars to be paid in one-fifth each year for five years was eminently successful, reaching in its grand total nearly ninety-three million dollars throughout the Southern churches.

Some twelve million dollars were paid in within the first five months of the drive. This campaign was the response of Southern Baptists to the universal need so acutely emphasized by the new world conditions since the great war. It was a noble effort to systematize and budgetize all our Kingdom work. It was a plan to take care of all our missionary and benevolent causes, according to their relative importance, providing for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Christian Education, Ministerial Relief, Orphanages, State Missions, and Hospitals.

Arkansas' quota in this effort was \$3,200,000. There were some insuperable difficulties and conditions which made complete victory impossible, but it was a great triumph for our people to raise on the general subscription some two and a half million dollars, and about a half million on extras, such as the Pine Bluff Hospital, the Jonesboro school and several mountain schools.

Two chief things remain to be done. One is the enlargement of the campaign subscriptions in churches that have not been enlisted and the working of new material coming into the already enlisted churches. The other tremendously important and most pressing thing is to secure prompt payments on the pledges already made. Let the churches remember that all the objects to which they have heretofore made special offerings are to be cared for from the campaign funds, and must suffer seriously and irreparably if the churches delay or forget to redeem their promises.

We recommend that every church, through its treasurer, or by its own organized plan, or by special committee, if necessary, immediately inaugurate a systematic and most patient and persistent effort for the collection of the full annual quota, or one-fifth of its campaign subscriptions.

WOMAN'S WORK.

When Jesus was upon this earth in human form he sympathized with the needs of the people, for one day when a great crowd had gathered about him to hear him preach he took the five barley loaves and two fishes, the lunch of a little lad, and fed them. Today, my friends, we bring to you not what we have done, for that is so little, but we have come to tell you of some of the needs and to ask you to help us. During this past year we have met with children in Little Rock, 8 to 10 years old, who didn't even know that there was a Savior, one who loved them and would save them. Does your missionary reach them? If he did he would give his entire time to the slums of Little Rock and still never reach the heart of the homes that need him. Most, we feel, that the time is here when Pulaski Association must have a woman worker of her own, and for this we ask. Our enlisted women have done wonderful, ten societies from 27 churches contributing more than \$17,500, \$12,000 of this for the 75 Million Campaign.

We, your committee, pledge our hearty support and prayers to this work.

## DR. J. B. SEARCY

Born in Barbour County, Ala., June, 1838. Spent a part of his early life in Mississippi, where he was converted and baptized. Came to Calhoun County, Arkansas about 1855. Moved later to what is now Cleveland County. Began preaching in 1858 and hence had been in ministry 62 years. Served as Chaplain in Confederate Army. Taught school much during early ministry. Pastor of a number of country churches in Southeast Arkansas in early ministry. Later, pastor at Warren, Monticello, Dardanelle and Hope, Ark.; Monroe, Louisiana, Corinth and Biloxi, Mississippi, and again in Arkansas, at Malvern, First Church and Third, now Tabernacle, Church, Little Rock. Was financial agent Ouachita College for several years. Long Arkansas' representative to collect funds for Ministerial Education and Home and Foreign Missions. Helped found and edit Western Evangel, which was later called the Arkansas Baptist. Jointly edited, with E. J. A. McKinney, Baptist Advance for a period. Married three times, first wife dying young; second marriage was to Mrs. Atkins of Lincoln County; third to Mrs. Woodall of Little Rock, who survives him. Has three children; Reuben, Searcy, now in Mississippi; Mrs. W. T. Lowery, Blue Mountain, Miss.; and Mrs. J. C. Clarey of Warren, Arkansas. Held many places of honor among his brethren and was Moderator of Pulaski County Association at time of his death, September 14, 1920.
