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# MINUTES

Hopewell Church, Atkins, Ark., October 2, 1915. Pursuant to adjournment at last meeting, the Russellville Baptist Association convened at 10:00 o'clock a. m. in its thirty-fifth annual session. The moderator being absent, the association was called to order by S. B. Barnett. Prayer by J. A. Myers.

W. W. Robbins was elected temporary moderator and, the clerk being absent, S. B. Barnett was elected temporary clerk. W. F. Hall and Ardis Tyson were appointed reading clerks.

Letters were presented and read from the following churches: East Point, Dover, Hopewell, Clarksville, Pottsville, Big Piney, London, Knoxville, Oakland, Union Grove, Atkins, Cross Roads, Lamar, Providence, Trinity, Pittsburg.

On motion the temporary organization was made permanent.

R. L. Loyd, who was appointed last year to preach the introfluctory sermon, being absent, S. B. Barnett was asked to preach, which he did, using as a text Matt. 16:19.

#### **Foreign Missions**

The committee on Foreign Missions made their report, which was discussed by W. E. Atkinson, A. A. Neal and J. S. Rogers, and was adopted. It is as follows:

Our foreign mission work is the effort on our part to carry out the last command of our Lord and Master to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. The challenge of the hour to all our churches is the present call of our foreign mission work. The conditions of the world today are giving tremendous emphasis to the fact that all men need a simple New Testament religion The non-Christian nations are awakening in a wonderful way and enquiring for the path of peace and the way of life. The doors are wide open. The people are more accessible than ever before. The harvest fields are ripe and we should now thrust in the sickle and reap on a scale that will far transcend anything in the past.

The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Virginia, composed of eighteen local members and eighteen state members representing each state in co-operation with the Southern Baptist Convention, is conducting work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argen-Ina, China, Japan and Africa. In these fields the missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out stations, 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday Schools with 23,959 scholars and 8,833 stu-dents in mission schools, 384 of whom are in theological seminarles and training schools preparing to preach the gospel to their There are 300 missionaries on the fields, 20 of whom own people. were sent out during the past year, and a total of 651 native work-Notwithstanding difficult conditions on many of the fields caused by the European war and the injury to the work in Mexico from chaotic political conditions in that country, 5,190 baptisms were reported during the year.

The distressing financial conditions throughout the South created by the war in Europe caused a falling off in contributions to foreign missions last year. Many of the churches made heroic and nacrificial efforts but some of them were not able to keep up their usual contributions. This will make it more difficult for us to maintain the work this year unless God's people meet the situation in a still more heroic spirit. The Convention in Houston asked for an apportionment of \$624,000 for foreign missions this year. Evory dollar of it will be needed to carry on the work successfully. Our supreme task now should be the raising of the apportionment as a minimum in every association and every state. We should not for a moment think of anything less and we must do more than this if possible.

We therefore recommend:

That we as an association undertake to raise for foreign missions our full proportion of the above sum; that this amount be divided among the churches on an equitable basis; that we earnestly urge the churches to contribute the amount asked of them; that each church inaugurate a plan of systematic weekly or monthly giving and remitting for this cause so that the work may be taken care of and debt and interest payments may be avoided.

2. That each pastor in the association appoint a committee in each church of which he is pastor to canvass the membership with a view to securing a subscription to the Foreign Mission Journal in every Baptist family within our bounds, so that our people may be more fully informed as to our world-wide work.

#### **Publications**

The committee on Publications made their report, which was briefly discussed and adopted. It is as follows:

First, we recommend the reading of the Bible in a systematic way. For instance, take up one book and finish it; have stated hours to do the reading; sum up each chapter before beginning another. In this way the great truths are brought out and better understood; in this way we see the relations of chapter to chapter and book to book.

We recommend the following literature: The Baptist Advance and The Baptist as Baptist papers, and Southern Baptist Convention literature for Sunday Schools and Baptist Young Peorle's Unions. We also wish to call attention to the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia. Ardis Tyson,

The Association met at 9:00 a m. pursuant to adjournment. Devotional services were conducted by T. D. Frasur

#### Sunday Schools

The committee on Sunday Schools made their report, which was ably discussed by Mrs. W. T. McCurry, W. E. Atkinson, J. S. Rogers, W. W. Robbins, Ardis Tyson, and others. The report was amended. As amended it is as follows:

We earnestly urge that all churches having no Sunday School organize at once. We heartily endorse the training of the young minds in the ways of the Lord.

We find that almost all the churches report thriving Sunday Schools. We find that one of the greatest factors in a good School In a well informed corps of teachers. We heartily endorse the weekly meeting of the teachers and the preparing of the lesson that it may interest those who do not attend often and cause them to attend regularly.

We recommend that our preachers, superintendents and teachors in our Sunday Schools be requested to attend the Summer Asnembly at Ouachita, and also that we instruct our Executive Committee to hold one or more institutes within the bounds of our Association with trained and competent instructors.

We urge that all Sunday Schools take offerings for foreign missions.

# Missionary Sermon

The missionary sermon was preached by J. S. Rogers, general secretary of the Baptist State Convention. He announced as his subject, "A New Testament Program for Arkansas Baptists." He discussed it under three headings: Benevolence, including hospitals and orphanages; Education, including denominational schools and colleges; Evangelism, including associational, state, home and foreign missions, though he only discussed state missions.

At the close of the sermon a cash collection was taken for associational missions amounting to \$16.35. H.S. B. Oliver added \$1.00 later, mäking \$17,35. - 11 11 1ME

Adjourned till 2:30 p. m.

The Association met at 2:30 p.m. Devotional services were conducted by J. C. Hendrick.

#### **Associational Missions**

The report of the Executive Committee appointed last year to

have charge of the associational mission work was read by M. E. Burgess, and on motion the report was received. It is as follows:

The Committee, with the co-operation of the State Board, employed two missionaries, Bro. W. W. Robbins and Bro. D. B. Moore—Bro. Robbins at a salary of \$1,000, \$400 to be paid by the State Board and \$600 by the Association; Bro. Moore at a salary of \$600, to be paid by the State Board. These two missionaries have labored faithfully and the Lord has blessed their work. Under their ministry there have been 152 conversions and 214 additions to the Baptist churches throughout the Association. We have paid Bro. Robbins in full and have a balance of \$19 71; \$6 00 of this is in the treasury and \$13 71 in the hands of the former clerk, Bro. Womack. M. E. Burgess,

The committee on Associational Missions made their report, which was discussed by W. W. Robbins, W. E. Atkinson, O. H. Reid, C. L. Boyd, J. C. Forrest, F. M. Taylor, E. B. Greener, and J. H. Moore and then adopted. It is as follows:

The work of our Associational Committee this year has resulted in much good

1. The activity shown has stimulated some of our churches to a renewal of effort in the preaching of the gospel, teaching in the Sunday Schools and training our young people for service.

2. Many churches which were hopeless have been led to call pastors and to begin strong evangelistic efforts and to represent in this association.

3. A number of churches have begun to contribute to our different departments of work and are enthusiastic in the work.

This has been done with the small efforts which your Committee was able to make More could have been done if our people had contributed generally.

We recommend that each church be requested to take a collection at once and urge each member to contribute, as a basis for associational missions for next year; that the moderator appoint a committee of three to act as an Executive Committee for this work; that subscriptions and pledges be taken here; that said Committee employ such missionaries as the funds may justify, and that said Committee co-operate with the State Mission Board.

#### **Ministerial Education**

The committee on Ministerial Education made their report. which was adopted without discussion. It is as follows:

That the education of preachers is a wise course for Baptists in proved by many New Testament facts. Jesus gave large time to the training and teaching of the twelve Apostles. Paul was the best educated man in his day. Our Baptist fathers from the days of Paul till now have believed and practiced the doctrine of ministerial education.

This Association honors and loves our preacher brethren who gould not go to school much and who have done and still will do great things in the kingdom; yet we must urge all of our young preachers as far as possible to get the best education they can. We recommend Ouachita College and our Seminaries.

Your committee would urge also that all of our pastors be requested to preach on this subject and that all of our churches make annual offerings for the education of our young preachers and send the money to J. S. Rogers, Little Rock. J. S. Rogers,

#### **Christian Education**

In some way the report on Christian Education was misplaced and was not read. However the clerk was by motion instructed to say in the Minutes that this Association considers education to be one of the greatest factors in our denominational life and that it most heartily endorses Ouachita College at Arkadelphia and Central College at Conway and pledges to them its support both in patronage and finance. The benefits of these schools to Arkansas Baptists can never be overestimated.

President J. W. Conger of Central College delivered a great address on Education.

In order to finish the business at this session several reports were read and adopted without discussion. They follow:

#### **Home Missions**

The Home Mission Board in Atlanta, Georgia, is the great central agency of the Southern Baptist Convention through which our people address themselves as a unit to the task of saving the South.

We find that our Home Board is doing a great work along evangelistic lines. It reported 38,000 baptisms by its workers last year and is doing a great work among undeveloped churches, building church houses, supporting mountain schools, etc.

We earnestly commend to our churches the support of the great work of home missions. E B. Greener,

#### **State Missions**

The report on state missions was not read. The following facts were furnished by request by Secretary Rogers and are given here for the information of the brethren:

State missions by the churches co-operating in the Baptist State Convention includes revival meetings in destitute places and in weak churches, baptizing, reviving and enlisting laggard churches, colportage, projecting and helping to build church houses, and aiding weak churches in supporting pastors, raising church debts, Sunday School and Baptist Young People's Work, encouraging Woman's Work, and whatever else will send far and wide the pure gospel of Christ and upbuild the Baptist cause in this great State.

In 1914 the churches co-operating through the Convention

perved the kingdom as follows: missionaries employed, 47; days hoored, 10,123; miles traveled, 65,827; appointments, 74; sermons, 5,490; other addresses, 898; total sermons and addresses, 6,388; pervices in homes, 1,812; conversions, 1,458; baptisms; 1,270; additions, 804; total additions, 2,074; amount raised for state mismons, \$12,262 75.

The amount of money needed to put the Executive Board of the Baptist State Convention out of debt for missions at the State Convention at Conway, November 18, 1915, is approximately \$30,000. Send money to J. S. Rogers, Little Rock, Ark.

#### **Orphans'** Home

The crying need and appeal of the many orphans of our state thould find a hearty response among the Baptists of Arkansas in both prayerful and financial support. Two hundred and thirtyix children are now being cared for in the two homes, one at Monticello with 196 children and one at Texarkana with 40 children. Both institutions are in need of funds and assurance of ample income. Men and women who have been contributing have not only been caring for the physical need of unfortunate humanity, but their contributions have been converted into real character and Christian manhood and womanhood.

We recommend that our Sunday Schools set aside one Sunday in each month as Orphans' Home Day and that the collections of that day be forwarded to the Orphans' Home.

#### Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Russellville Baptist Association. Art. 2. It shall be composed of Messengers sent from Baptist Churches, how to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less, shall be utilied to three Messengers One hundred members shall entitle a church to fur Messengers. And churches with more than one hundred members shall be utilided to one Messenger for every succeeding hundred.

Art. 8. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be deted by ballot, unless otherwise ordered by a two-third vote, at each annual mation, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

Art. 4. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body, acding to parliamentary usage. The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the printing and publication of the Minutes, keep a regune file of the printed Minutes of every session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to an order from the body.

Art. 5. The objects of the Association shall be, 1st. To promote fellowship mong the churches, secure unanimity of faith, and cultivate the piety of its mbers. 2d. To labor for Domestic and Foreign Missions; and for the establiment of Sabbath Schools in all the churches. 3d. To encourage the circulain and reading of Baptist Literature. 4. And a special object shall be to enmore and provide assistance for the Education of the rising Ministry, and for the purpose to establish an institution of learning in our midst, as soon as practicable.

Art 6. This body shall, in no case, interfere with the internal regulations the churches, but will act as an advisory council, whenever it may be necesury. It claims, however, authority over its own members—the Messengers of the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principle of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in mattice.

Art. 7. Newly organized churches or churches dismissed from other Assolations may be admitted into this body upon their petitioning by letter and Mossengers at our annual meetings, and by their Messengers agreeing to the Instruct-of principles herewith published.

Art 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Association upon applications, at an annual meeting, for the purpose of joining any body which we recgrize, or for the purpose of forming a new Association; but any church desiring to withdraw from this Association, is requested to do so by applying for a letter.

Art. 9. A quorum to do business in this Association shall consist of at must two thirds of the Messengers who may assemble at its session.

Art. 10. This Constitution may be altered, or amended, at any regular meeting of this Association, by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the mem-

#### **Declaration** of Faith

1. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true centre of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried.

2. We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth, inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

3. We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defence or excuse.

4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the Mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Saviour.

5. We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

9. We believe that Election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the pel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascerit with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost dilligence.

10. We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to will of God, we are made partakers of his holiness; that it is a progressive that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of in off-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer. 18 We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptizthe believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; arving the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws; and exercising the first, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word; that its only scriptand officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion in water of a beter, into the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost: to show forth in solman and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the lits effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is premainted to the privileges of a church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in the hememory of the church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to momemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn all examination.

15. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christan Babbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations; by the devout observance of all the mans of grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that maineth for the people of God.

16. We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the Interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayof for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed, except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the hteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the out in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death

18. We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last buy, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to and retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked all be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.
