

PROCEEDINGS.

NEVADA COUNTY, ARK., }
October 1st, 1887. }

The Sixteenth Session of the Union Association met according to adjournment with Mount Zion church, Nevada county, Ark., on Saturday before the first Sabbath in October, A. D., 1887.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. W. R. Burham,—Text—Romans, 8th chapter, 1st verse. Theme—"Final preservation of the saints." The sermon was eminently scriptural and practical. After preaching, the congregation was dismissed till 2 o'clock, at which time the association met for permanent organization. After devotional exercises by the Moderator, was called to order by Jas. E. Askew, the former Moderator. The letters from the different churches were then presented and read by Brethren B. W. Bourland, B. P. Haynes and W. A. McKee, who were appointed reading clerks. After the letters were read, the body proceeded to elect officers, which resulted in the choice of Bro. Junius E. Askew, Moderator, and R. H. Mitchell, Clerk.

On motion, the order of business of last session was adopted.

Called for petitionary letters. Letter from Scriptural Ground ch. was presented and read and on motion referred to a committee of five for investigation—committeemen: A. C. Jackson, L. A. Reese, J. J. Haynes, B. P. Haynes and W. R. Johnson. A letter from Enon church was presented, asking admittance into the body, and being found orthodox in faith, was, on motion, received into the Associational compact. Also a letter from the Bluff Springs church was presented, asking admittance into the body, and being found orthodox in faith, was, on motion, received into the Associational compact.

On motion, suspended the regular order of business to take up miscellaneous business. On motion appointed a committee of seven to investigate the troubles now existing in Antioch church, granting them the power of taking evidence. Committee men, A. Patterson, W. R. Johnson, J. R. Sullivan, J. W. Ghormley, John Nichols, L. H. Hitt, Jr., O. C. Kidd.

The committee on divine service reported: That Eld. M. D. Armstrong preach to-night at Boston, and Eld. W. J. Wallhall at the stand to night, and Eld. O. C. Kidd on Sabbath,

11 o'clock.

On motion, adjourned till Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock, resolution by O. C. Kidd.

SABBATH.

At the hour of 9 o'clock the brethren assembled at the church

and engaged in a prayer meeting, conducted by Bro. J. W. Hudson. During the time Bro. A. W. Tiffin made some fitting remarks on the duty of prayer, after which the brethren united their petitions to a Throne of Grace, and many hearts were made to burn with the love of God.

At half past 11 o'clock a large congregation assembled at the study room, addressed by Eld. O. C. Kidd, from the 9th verse, of the 10th chapter of John.

The text "Christ the Door." The sermon was concise and full of gospel light, and was delivered with much earnestness, and many christian hearts were made to rejoice under the power of the Gospel. At the close of the services a collection was taken for foreign missions amounting to \$37.35.

At 3 o'clock p. m., Eld. L. H. Hitt filled the stand and preached an excellent sermon.

Text—John, 3d chapter, 7th verse. Eld. J. J. Haynes preached at night from the 1st chapter of John. The brother dwelt very ably on the Divinity, Christianity and office of Jesus.

MONDAY MORNING.

8:30 o'clock the Association met pursuant to adjournment. Religious services by the Moderator and prayer by Eld. J. J. Haynes.

On motion, suspended the regular order of business to elect a treasurer.

On motion, Bro. T. A. Rees were elected treasurer by acclamation. Resumed order of business.

Roll called and the names of absentees erased.

Call for reports of committees.

Resolved, That this body tender to the brethren and citizens of this vicinity its thanks for the hospitality manifested by them toward messengers and visitors during the session of the association.

The next meeting of the Union Association will be held with Providence church, No. 2, Hempstead county, Arkansas, between Hope and Emmet, commencing on Saturday before the 1st Sabbath in October, 1888. Eld. J. W. Erwin to preach the introductory sermon, A. Patterson his alternate.

On motion, adjourned to time and place specified. A parting hymn was sung and the parting hand extended, as we took leave of each other to return to our respective homes. Thus closed a pleasant and harmonious session of the Union Association. Prayer by Bro. O. C. Kidd.

APPENDIX B.

OUACHITA COLLEGE.—We, your committee on college work sub-

mit the following in this paper as directed by the body at last session

1. Statistics of the last scholastic year, ending June 2nd, 1887. Pupils in Literary Department, 104; Pupils in Music Department, 36; Pupils in Art Department, 18; Pupils in Elocution Department, 17; Total, 265. Names reported, 51. Net number of pupils enrolled, 214.

The above is taken from the Annual Catalogue.

2. WORK.—The work in every department was thorough. President [redacted] and his able Faculty are abreast with all the modern improvements of teaching. The work is strictly systematic and is executed with dispatch and promptness.

3. PROGRESS.—As to progress, our College has no parallel in the history of our denominational colleges. It has surpassed the most sanguine expectations of its warmest friends in the State, and a wonder to our brethren out of the State. At the closing exercises of the first year's work, many hearts were thrilled with joy as they realized the grand success of the progress and work.

The present session has opened with the brightest prospects. Number of pupils, 175; music pupils, 40; elocution, 8; art, 8; boarders 65. There will be about one hundred boarders and about 275 scholars enrolled during the present year. Eld. J. B. Sourey is the financial agent, and the work on the new building will commence about the last of October. Brethren, I will now close this report by asking you, the Union Association to continue your support (to this noble institution of learning in our State and midst) by sending your sons and daughters, and as far as possible your means and influence.
