Whereupon J. T. Watson arrived and preached the introductory sermon, after which the Association adjourned till 1:30 o'clock.

Amend Art. 10 by inserting after the word "Association" in the first line the words 'through its executive committee." Instead of 'their treasurer' insert 'its treasurer." If it is for want of money the American Baptist Publication Society, through Brother J. S. Thomas, will furnish literature free until the school becomes self-sustaining. Bro. Autry truly said in his address that "a Sunday school was the church at work." Resolved that every church be urged to organize and maintain a Sunday school. We heartily endorse our state Sunday school work done, and especially the work done by Bro. R. C. Medaris. State Sunday School Evangelist, and would respectfully ask every church to contribute to support this branch of our deneminational work.

Association AL Missions—That after 30 years mission work in this Association we find there is a vast amount of destitution. We commend the brethren for past efforts and feel the need of more determined efforts in future. God calls for us to labor in his vineyard but there are too many standing idle. We fear that the brethren do not feel as they should the responsibility resting upon them concerning this important work. We recommend: 1. That all our ministers whose time is not wholly employed in pastoral work spend their time in holding meetings in destitute places and that they report the amount and result of their work to the next Association. 2. That a suitable member in each church be appointed to take collections for mission and that they begin collecting funds immediately. 3. We understand that about sixty counties in Arkansas are to-day without licensed dram-shops, while in many of the licensed counties saloons are confined to one or two townships Certainly we ought to thank God and take courage Sebastian county is the only territory within our bounds that has saloons, and the greater part of it is under prohibition. Fort Smith is the enemy's stronghold, but we believe that the good people there by the aid of the country vote will yet gain a complete triumph. We are for the home and against the saloon and that in this we join hands with all good citizens of whatever name or order; Resolved that we reaffirm the past record of this association on the temperance question and that we advise our churches to continue in membership no person who publicly advocates the saloon business; or who invests money in it; or who suffers his property used for it in any way. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—Soon after your meeting one year ago we agreed with your missionary, Eld. J. N. Pennington, that his salary should be forty dollars per month, provided that amount could be raised—he to take collections on the field, we to aid in such way as to us seemed best. On account of the hard times we advised him in the spring to discontinue the work, but in his zeal for souls he was unwilling to take such a course except so far as compelled by circumstances. He worked all told during the year 140 days, which he reports to us as follows: Miles traveled, 1251; sermons preached, 136; prayer-meetings attended 78; religious addresses, 103; conversions witnessed, 43; baptisms witnessed, 25; receptions by letter witnessed, 15; churches organized, 1; Sunday schools organized, 2; ministers ordained, 1; families visited, 282; churches visited, 22; congregations visited, 52, contributions received on the field, \$22.70. From all these figures it appears that our mission work during the year has not been a failure, as nearly one-third of the total number of baptisms reported from all the churches, was in connection with the work of our missionary. Especially do we commend him for his faithful and persevering devotion. A great deal of

the time he has been sick, and there has been much sickness in hi family during the year. Just recently he was bereaved by the death of a loved daughter. In the judgment of your committee he deserves our praise for his work and our hearty sympathy for his misfortunes. Contributions from various sources have been as follows: Booneville church, \$3.35; Booneville Ladies Aid Society; \$4.00; Mill Creek, \$1.35; Pilgrim's Rest, \$1.05; Oak Bower, \$.55; Friennship Hall, \$1.00; Vesta; \$2.50; National Springs, \$.65; Pine Mountain, \$4.75; Laidies Aid Society, \$2.50; E. A. Seely, \$1.; Prairie View, \$5.; Fort Smith, \$40.; New Harmony, \$1.5 Grand Prairie, \$.85, all of which we order paid to Bro. J: N. Pennington. We recommend that the associational mission work for the coming year be done during the summer and fall months, as many evangelists being put in the field as the financial outlook will permit. W. P. CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This association shall be known as the Concord Association.

Art. 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist Churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional messenger.

Art. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session and shall continue in office until their

successors are chosen

Art. 4. Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body

according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2: The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the primed minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to order from the Association or its executive committee, and

render an account of the same to the annual session of this body.

Art. 5. The object of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation; and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches, and to aid in this last object several minutes of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

Art. 6. Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will act as advisory council whenever it shall

be necessary.

Sec. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice

Art. 7. Newly organized churches or churches dismissed from other Associations may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and messengers at our annual meeting and subscribing by their messengers to the abstract of

principles herewith published.

Art. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Association upon application at annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.

Art. 9. Sec. 1. There shall be an executive committee consisting of the officers of this body with 5 members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting. The duty of this committee shall be to superintend the missionary operations of the Association and represent it in all matters requiring their attention when

the Association is not in session.

The committee shall report annually at each meeting of the Association. Three members of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Upon appointment said committee shall come together and arrange their meetings and take such other steps as may be to the interest of the cause of Christ.

Sec. 2. The regular committees of this Association shall be a committee on foreign missions, documents, religious literature, ministerial support, Sunday schools, ministerial education, nominations, temperance, obituaries, queries

and finance.

Art. 10. It shall be the privilege of the Association, through its executive committee, in addition to the power already granted, to conduct missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to chose a missionary or missionaries as means may allow and designate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through its treasurer, out of any funds in his hands except the money sent for publishing the minutes of every annual meeting.

Art. 11. The annual meeting of the Association shall embrace the Lord's day and shall begin at 10 o'clock, a. m., on Saturday before the fourth Lord's day in September at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association shall adjourn at 11 o'clock, a. m. for preaching.

Art. 12. This constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Art. 6, Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Association by the two-thirds vote of the members who are in attendance.

Amendment 1. Art. 13. No person shall serve as Moderater of this body more

than two terms in succession. Amended 1882.

Amendment 2. The constitution shall be published annually in the minutes of this Association. Amended 1893.

Amendment 3. Missionary sermon is placed in hands of Divine service com-

mittee. Adopted in 1894.

Amendment 4. Each church is expected to send to each annual meeting of the Association by the hands of its messengers, a sum of money to be used for printing minutes. Adopted in 1895.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one and only one, true and living God, Jehovah, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons—the Father, the Son, and the Holv Spirit.

2. We believe that the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, constituting the only and all-sufficient standard of faith, doctrine

and discipline or practice.

3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of tha Eternal Love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen his people in Christ before the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth and doth keep them

by his power through faith unto salvation.

4. We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his Maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness and brought death upon his race who being by natural descent in the unboly image of Adam and children of wrath by nature and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace, through faith in Jesus Christ

and no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with the divine truth and the proper evidences thereof are faith, repentance and obedience to God.

7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the scripture teaches that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating spirit

of God.

9. A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges of in the New Testament appertaining to the church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of Christian churches are bishops or pastors and

deacons

11. Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order. The Lord's Supper is a positive commentoration ordinance of Jesus Christ to be observed in the church as such, in remembrance of Christ and to show forth His death till He comes.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business and devoted to relig-

ious duties.

14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. An introductory and missionary sermon shall be preached by ministers chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon on either to be preached by an alternate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be closen to deliver a temperance audress.

3. A committee of arrangements consisting of five members, besides the Moderator and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report the order of business.

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may be invited to seats

but not to vote.

5. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make an appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address the

Moderator and upon obtaining leave shall proceed.

- 7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject or use words of personal reflection, and then by the Moderator.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him who made it. Every case taken up shall be decided or withdrawn before another is introduced.
- 9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association by year and nays or otherwise.
- 10. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

11. No member shall speak more than twice on one subject without

permission from the Association.

12. The appellation of "brother" shall be used in the Association by the members in their addresses one to another. Letters that are unknown to the scriptures, such as "Rev," "Parson" and like shall not be employed or appear on the minutes.

13. The names of members shall be called as often as Association

may direct.

- 14. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.
- 15. Any person violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.
- 16. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this Association by a majority vote of the members present.
