talking and noise and disturbed the meetings whenever chance permitted. Mr. Hulsey stayed there for two years and built a church—the first church in that section of the country. His salary for the first four years of his ministry was 50 cents in money, one side of meat, and a sack of flour.

In the early days of his married life while he was carrying on his work, going to school and preaching, Mr. Hulsey had cleared some land by moonlight and homesteaded a little farm of his own. He made his living on this farm while he preached.

After four years of preaching he was recognized by the board of the Southern Baptist Missions of Atlanta, Ga., and from that time on was helped financially by that board. These early missionaries were not paid very often in cash, but more often by donations from wealthy people. One person, Annie W. Armstrong, is beloved among all pioneer missionary preachers for her liberal donations.

Mr. Hulsey and his family came to Mount Ida in September, 1914. He and his wife are the parents of ten children, seven boys and three girls. Of those ten children seven are still living.

Mr. Hulsey was the first Baptist minister to preach anywhere in this part of the county. He built the Baptist churches in Mount Ida and Norman. A unique incident in relation to the Baptist church in Mount Ida is the fact that there has never been a debt against the church. It was paid for as it was built. For a time Mr. Hulsey was president of the board of the Mount Ida Baptist Academy. He took care of the finances of the academy for seven years. This school was run on the order of a public school.

Mr. Hulsey declared there had been many changes in Mount Ida and the state since he came to Mount Ida 20 years ago. He is not of the order who declare they'd rather have the good old days back. He glories in the modern inventions and would not have olden days brought back. He loves the youth of today.

It is such people as he and his wife who have made Arkansas the great state it has become. The world honors such Christian characters who have helped carry on and made the country a better place in which to live.

Mr. Hulsey's life has been a monument to Christianity. A great and noble man, recognized by his good deeds.

The Concord Baptist Association met according to previous appointment with the Baptist church at Farnersville, Union Parish, La., on Saturday, the 10th day of October, 1863.

The Introductory Sermon was delivered by Elder A. J. Felly, from 1st Timothy, 4th chapter, 16th verse, to a large and attentive congregation.

After forty minutes intermission, the delegates repaired to the Male Academy. The Association was called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by S. C. Lee.

Called for letters from the churches composing this body; and, on motion, Brethren George Newton, Joseph Baker and W. L. Spears were appointed to read them.

The following churches presented letters through their delegates: Spearsville, Liberty (Union), Rachab, Bethel, Mount Vernon, Shiloh, New Hope, Pisgah, Saints Rest, Pisgah (Union), Hebron, Rocky Springs, Liberty (Ouachita), Sardis, Concord, Elant, Salem, Zion Hill, Farnersville, Fellowship, Hopewell, Walnut Creek and Pleasant Grove.

The letters being read, on motion of J. L. Mayes the Association proceeded to elect Moderator and Clerk, (Elders Cobb and Coffin appointed tellers,) which resulted in the re-election of S. J. Fuller, Moderator, and S. C. Lee Clerk—the latter acting previously as Clerk *pro tem*.

The Moderator, after returning thanks, declared the Association organized and ready for business.

Called for petitionary letters. None.

On motion and second, read the letter from Bro. Coleman, the former Clerk, giving his reasons for non-attendance, and also setting forth the financial condition of this body.

On motion and second, the Moderator appointed the following Committees, viz:

On Arrangement of Business—A. C. A. Simmons, J. L. Mayes, A. J. Felly and J. M. Hart.

On Preaching—George Newton, M. W. Goldaby, M. Oakes, and the Pastor and Deacons of this church.

On Domestic Missions—J. E. Woodward, A. Kitchen, Wm. Phillips and S. C. Lee.

On Support of the Ministry—Wm. Thompson, Wm. Colvin and Geo. Newton.

On Documents—Joseph Baker, W. L. Spears and J. Milner.

On Sabbath Schools—A. J. Felly, J. L. Mayes and Wm. Hunt.

On Finance—W. L. Spears, S. W. Ramsey and J. F. McAdams.

On motion, called for correspondence, and received from the Liberty Association a letter by her messengers, S. F. Cobb, J. P. Everett and A. W. Johnson; and from Red River Association Bro. McFarland appeared as a messenger. Said correspondence was received and made welcome among us.

Returned correspondence, as follows:

To the Liberty Association, to convene with Spring Hill church, Union county, Ark., on Thursday before the first Sabbath in October, 1864. Wm. Hunt, A. C. A. Simmons, J. L. Mayes, S. J. Fuller and S. C. Lee.

The Churches will not receive as many as they desire, owing to a want of funds to pay for printing. I have requested Bro. W. to send the churches according to numerical strength. The Tables are usual, and will so continue until Church Clerks send up full returns. We now present the Minutes to the brethren and sisters of the Association, hoping they will be found correct and meet their approbation. My protracted illness will, I trust, be a sufficient apology for the great delay in preparing the Minutes.

Appointed the next session of this body to be held with Rocky Spring Church, near Snow Hill, in Claiborne Parish, La., commencing on Saturday before the second Sabbath of October, 1884.

The Committee to whom was re-committed the report of the Committee on the Support of the Ministry, made their report which was received and the Committee discharged. (See appendix.)

On motion and second, proceeded to elect by ballot brethren to preach the several annual sermons, which resulted as follows: Introductory, by S. C. Lee; alternate, J. L. Mayes. Missionary sermon, S. J. Fuller; John L. Mayes, alternate. Temperance Lecture, A. C. A. Simmons; alternate, A. J. Peddy.

The annual reference, relative to changing the time of holding the Association was next taken up and passed over informally.

On motion and second, the Treasurer is hereby authorized to call upon the former Treasurer (Bro. Coleman) for \$128 16 balance in his hands belonging to the Association.

On motion, Elkers Joab Pratt and J. M. Hart, be and they are hereby appointed a Committee, who shall have the right to associate with themselves one other Minister, whose duty it is to visit the several churches in this Association that have failed to represent themselves the two last years, and report at our next annual session the result of their labors.

To Red River Association, to convene with — church on Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in September, 1864, A. C. A. Simmons, A. J. Peddy, Wm. Colvin and J. L. Mayes.

To Bartholomew Association, to convene with — church, on Saturday before the third Sabbath in September, 1864, Elder S. O. Lee.

To Louisiana Baptist State Convention, to convene with — church, on Saturday before the first Sabbath in July, 1864, J. L. Mayes, S. O. Lee and George Newton.

On motion, agreed to correspond with North Louisiana Association, to convene with New Friendship church on Saturday before the third Sabbath in October, 1863, and Elders S. J. Fuller and A. C. A. Simmons were appointed messengers to said Association.

On motion and second, this Association agreed to drop correspondence with the Columbia Association for the present.

[The Association doubtless intended to continue correspondence with the Ouachita and Central Associations, but no one volunteering, the Association passed them by without appointing messengers.]

The Committee on Preaching reported the following order of service tomorrow, (Lord's Day): A. C. A. Simmons to preach Missionary Sermon, at 11 A. M.; S. T. Cobb, of the Liberty Association, to preach at 2 P. M.; S. J. Fuller to close.

On motion, adjourned until Monday morning, 9 o'clock.

SABBATH EXERCISES.

Elder Simmons preached Missionary sermon from 2d chapter of Psalms, 72nd and 8th verses, to a large and orderly congregation. The speaker handled his subject in a masterly style, and we thought before he was done that the congregation was deeply impressed with the importance of his subject. The sequel proved us right, for a collection was taken up and \$537 50 was contributed. Some present would have contributed but were not prepared, therefore an opportunity was afforded on Monday, and \$81 50 was contributed, making the aggregate \$690.

Elder Cobb filled the stand at 2 P. M. from Romans, 3d chapter, 24th verse. Elder Joab Pratt preached to the blacks at 11 A. M., with marked effect. Elder J. L. Mayes addressed them at 3 P. M. from John, 6th chapter, 37th verse. We learn much interest was manifested by them, and we trust hereafter ample arrangements will be made for them, that the bread of life may be broken to them as well as unto us.

At candle-light Elder Elias George addressed a full house upon the subject of Temperance. All present appeared well pleased with the old veteran's address. Altogether, we believe the day was profitably spent, and will redound to the glory of God.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Your Committee to whom was referred the subject of Domestic Missions, and advise as to what course in our judgement ought to be pursued, would respectfully submit the following:

There are certainly many points of destitution in our midst. Many are deprived of hearing the Gospel. It is certainly contemplated in God's word that the Gospel shall be preached to the poor. How shall they believe on him whom they have not heard: how shall they hear without a preacher; and how shall they preach except they be sent? So we discover, our duty in the premises is plain. Let us send the Gospel to every family in our bounds.

We, therefore, concude and recommend that the Association had better employ a Minister to travel in our bounds; "provided" a zealous and efficient minister can be had. We believe the funds necessary for carrying out the views herein set, can easily be raised.

SUPPORT OF THE MINISTRY.

Upon this subject, all Brethren must agree, for the Scriptures are too plain to be misunderstood. Is it not written in the law of Moses, "thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn?" And also in Timothy, "if we have sown unto you spiritual things, is it a great thing we shall reap your carnal things?" Do you not know that they that minister about the altar live of the things of the altar, even so hath God ordained that they that preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel.

These and other passages teach us our duty too plain to be misunderstood. Paul, in addressing Timothy says: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." To accomplish this requires close application. As the most of our ministers are men of moderate means, how is this to be accomplished? Let the churches give them ample support for themselves and families. When this is done, the minister belongs to the churches, and much of the destitution can be supplied which hereto-
