## PROCEEDINGS.

### FIRST DAY.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elds. J. J. Hughes and A. Nelson, the appointees, from the words "Worship God," Revelations 22d Chapter, and last two words of 9th Verse. #### OBITUARY OF ELDER JOHN NEIGHBORS.

CIRCULAR LETTER-SUBJECT, BAPTISM AND THE RESURRECTION.

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Text: 'Else what shall they do which are baptised for the dead. If the dead rise not at all? Why are they baptised for the dead?'

There is nothing else so highly valued by the people of God as he resurrection of His dead and the consequences. If the dead do not rise what shall we do? No disaster of a physical nature could weigh in the balances equal to the supposable surrender of the Christian hope in the *new life*, anticipated through the power of our Lord.

"How say some among you that there is no resurrection of the dead ?" 1st Corinthians, 15th Chapter, 12th verse. Now if the dead do not rise, why should we be partakers of the figure of the ressurrection? Why should we be buried by baptism in the water, if there is no hope of a new life after this life shall cease? "Know ye not that so many of us as were baptised into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death?" Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we should also walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall he also in the the likeness of His resurrection." Now we do not bury a man until he is dead. Neither do we baptise a man until he professes to have died to sin.

Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance, and think not to say within yourselves, we have Abraham to our father: for I say unto you, that God is able of these stones to raise up children unto Abraham. And now also the axe is laid unto the root of the trees: therefore every tree which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire. When a man dies to sin he becomes a willing subject to the law of Christ—having believed with all his heart that Christ is the son of God and his Savior. He is then a fit subject to be buried by baptism into this death (in a figure). "Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him." Romans, 6th Chapter, 8th verse. "Put off thy shoes from thy feet, for the place where thou standest is holy ground." Acts, 7th Chapter, 33d
