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PROCEEDINGS.

The Friendship Regular Baptist Association convened with Star City Church, Lincoln County, Ark., September 17, 1887, and was called to order by Eld. A. J. Fawcett, who read the twelfth chapter of Romans, and prayer by Eld. W. A. Forbes.

The former Clerk being absent, Bro. J. W. McPherson was chosen Clerk, *pro tem*.

The hour of the introductory services having arrived, and the appointee, Eld. M. A. Gunter, being present, filled the stand and preached an excellent sermon from 1st Timothy, iv, 8. After which a recess was taken until 2 p. m.

At the appointed time the body was called together by singing. Prayer by Eld. J. H. W. Overton.

The roll of churches was then called, their letters read by Brethren W. T. Smith and W. A. Forbes, and the Delegates' names enrolled.

On motion, proceeded to ballot for officers for the present session, which resulted in the choice of A. J. Fawcett, Moderator, and J. W. McPherson, Clerk and Treasurer.

An invitation was extended to Corresponding Messengers, and Bro. A. J. Oslin responded from Bartholomew Association, and was enrolled.

Brethren W. A. Forbes, Editor of the *Arkansas Baptist*, from Caroline Association, and J. G. McCain, from Liberty Association, were welcomed as visiting brethren, and were enrolled.

SUNDAY, 9:30 A. M.

Sunday School met in mass-meeting, and addresses were made by Elds. W. A. Forbes and W. H. Cash.

SUNDAY, 11 A. M.

The missionary sermon was preached by Eld. A. J. Fawcett at the church. Text—1st Corinthians, iii, 6. And at the same hour, by Eld. J. G. McCain, at the court house. Text—1st Timothy, ii, 5.

After preaching collections were taken up at both places for home missions, which resulted in contributions to the amount of \$57.30.

SUNDAY, 3 P. M.

The congregation assembled in a Missionary mass meeting. Addresses were delivered by Elds. W. A. Forbes and A. J. Fawcett.

SUNDAY, 7:30 P. M.

Preaching at the church by Eld. W. A. Forbes. Text—Romans iv, 25. And at the same hour, by Eld. W. H. Cash, at the court-house. Text—Mark ix, 24.

MONDAY, 8 A. M.

Met pursuant to adjournment.

The Moderator, A. J. Fawcett, opened the exercises by reading Matt. v, 1-16.

Prayer by I. R. Vick.

The minutes of Saturday and Sunday were read and adopted.

The Committee on Foreign Missions made their report, and after some discussion it was adopted.

There was also a collection taken up after the discussion, which resulted in a contribution of \$17.50 for Foreign Missions. [See Report A.]

The Secretary of Sunday-schools made his report. It was read, discussed, amended and adopted, but afterwards reconsidered and combined with report on Sunday-schools.

The Committee on Sunday-schools made their report, which was adopted. [See Report B.]

The Committee on Education made their report, which was adopted. [See Report C.]

Adjourned for refreshments.

Called to order at 1 p. m.

The Committee on Obituaries made their report, which was adopted. [See Report D.]

On motion, proceeded to ballot for brethren to preach the annual sermons at the next session of this body, which resulted in the choice of Elds. A. J. Fawcett to preach the Introductory and J. H. W. Overton the Missionary sermon.

On motion, adjourned to meet with Friendship No. 1, Cleveland County, Ark., on Saturday before the third Sabbath in September, 1888, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

A hymn was sung and the parting hand extended amid tears of joy and love.

Thus closed the fifteenth annual session of the Friendship Association.

REPORT A.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions beg leave to report that Arkansas has only one Missionary in foreign fields—Bro. C. E. Smith—who is preaching in Africa, and that the State of Arkansas only contributes about \$1500 for this work.

Brethren, Missions is a part of our work; therefore, let us be more faithful in the future. We would recommend that each pastor take up a collection for Foreign Missions during the next Associational year. We cannot do our duty outside of supporting the gospel in heathen lands. "Teach all nations," said the Savior to his church; so then it is the duty of the church to preach; she can do this through her means. Brethren, let us do more for Missions. May God help us to give liberally and largely to the support of the gospel in the land of heathen darkness! "Come over and help us!" they cry. Will you help, brethren? We who have the gospel should be willing, and esteem it a great privilege, to send it where it is not. Arkansas is a great State, and a great people; then let us show our greatness by our liberality to Missions.

REPORT B.

Your Committee on Sunday-schools find that there are more Sunday schools reported this year than last. We feel that the churches are taking more interest in this important work than heretofore. We feel happy to say to this Association that our brethren seem to have a great interest in the sal-

vation of the young, and have proven their faith by their works. Brethren, we must preach to the young if we make the gospel a success, and there is no way to reach a great many of them except through the Sunday-school. Every denomination in the world says, "give us your children and we will soon possess the land." Brethren, we would like to capture the world for Christ, and to do this, we must first gain the children, and to gain the children, we must have Sunday-schools.

"I find a lack of faith on the part of the churches of this Association, and more especially among the pastors, judging from experience, that if the pastors would do their duty, there would not be a church without its Sunday-school. We find that out of twenty-four churches there are only thirteen schools reported, with 539 pupils. We have a Sunday-school Convention that is doing a great deal in awakening an interest in this work."

REPORT C.

Your Committee on Education would report that we consider the education of our sons and daughters paramount to everything else. To the extent we fail to educate, to that extent we put our children in bondage, and make them "hewers of wood and drawers of water." We know that it is not possible for all to give their children a collegiate education, but all can send to our common schools, and by taking advantage of that, with what other help we may give them, and with a proper training that is to make them understand the importance of an education.

In the next place, we should look well to the morals of our schools. There are so many of the teachers of the pres-

ent day that are but little more than school keepers, and have no moral stamina whatever. Many of them are dissipated and unreliable in other ways. This class of teachers, because they can be procured for a small salary, are taking the place of professional teachers. Oh! my brethren, let us, by the grace of God, raise a higher standard, and to all who can send to college, we say, by all means, other things being equal, send them to our own college at Arkadelphia. We take pleasure in saying that it is equal, if not superior, to any school of its age. The fact is, it is unprecedented in the history of schools.

Finally, brethren, do not forget the religious training of your children. Jesus, the great teacher, is pleading for our children. Who will not, and who cannot, send them to the school of Christ, the great teacher? Jesus said: "Go teach all nations;" so, brethren, we are simply teachers under the Great Principal of our moral and spiritual school. We ask the parents who read this, to lay the matter to their hearts—more especially the mothers, and hear what Jesus, the noble teacher, says, and consider yourself His assistant, and teach the children He has given you to love Him and to love His blessed Word. Teach them to make the Bible the "man of their counsel," for we cannot afford to educate the head and neglect the soul.

Brethren, by all means, educate. Do all in your power to procure a competent teacher, and one who is a Christian; for no one can fill the place of a teacher properly who is not one. It will not do to send to a dissipated man, a profane man or an infidel, for fear the children partake of his evil habits; and no if the teacher be not a drunkard, a profane man, but a moral man, the children are apt to partake of his morality and rest their souls upon it instead of Christ. So we say, have schools and competent teachers and send to them, if you do have to make a great sacrifice; and by all means, teach them the principles of Christ.

REPORT E.

To Friendship Baptist Association, Convened at Star City, September 18, 1887—Greeting:

DEAR BRETHREN—It becomes the duty of your Executive Board to make a report of the work done this associational year. The Board pursued the same line of policy upon which we acted last year—that of supplementing the salary of local Pastors in the centers of population and influence. The wisdom of this plan is attested by the example of the larger and more experienced missionary bodies, as well as by the success which has attended its practical operation.

Your Board regrets that a greater number of places could not be assisted—that the work could not be more generally extended into the desolate places within your bounds. We

have attempted to judiciously spend your money, and to cause every dollar to do the greatest possible amount of good. Therefore, we continued to cultivate the fields where we had already attempted to sow, hoping, by this means, ere long to reap a harvest of permanent good.

The churches at Star City, Rison, Kingsland and Mount Moriah have all been assisted by your Board.

At Star City we supplemented the salary of the Pastor, Eld. Lofton Quinn, for one-half of his time. Bro. Quinn also preached once a month at a point on Bayou Bartholomew. From the quarterly reports the Board is satisfied that thorough and permanent work has been done at these points.

At Rison Bro. T. J. Varnell was employed for one-fourth of his time. The church at this growing town is numerically weak, and not blessed with a superabundance of the world's goods; yet it is their purpose, at an early day, to build a suitable house of worship. A lot in an eligible and desirable place has been secured, and a subscription raised, which justifies the hope that, at no distant day, the house will be built. With judicious management in the future, your Board entertains the belief that the cause will be firmly planted at Rison.

At Kingsland Eld. J. B. Lumbly was retained as Pastor for one-half of his time. The work at this place has been encouraging from the first. As mentioned in our last report, the brethren and friends have built a neat and comfortable house of worship here. Bro. Lumbly's reports all indicate an upward tendency of the church and Sabbath School. The fruits show that the Board has made no mistake at Kingsland.

At Mount Moriah Eld. I. R. Vick was employed for one-fourth of his time. Some difficulties attended the work here, owing to the distance from the Pastor's residence, the bad roads and the overflows; yet some advance has been in the work here, and your Board regards this, in some respects, a hopeful field, and one worthy of your sympathy and support. It is better to retain this church as a nucleus, to which to build

in the future, than to suffer it to die and allow others to build upon its ruins.

REPORT K.

Your Committee on Associational and State Missions report that we approve of the plan adopted by your board for the past two years—that of concentrating the means in their hands at the center points with the view of supporting these points until they become self-sustaining. We recommend that your board have the right to use the means in their hands to the best of their judgment for the furtherance of the Master's cause. We find that the greater part of the \$300 pledged at our last Association has been paid, which amount has been used as follows:

The said brethren have been acting as Missionary pastors of said churches, and hope that much good has been done through their labors.

The State Board has done a good work in many of the centers of population throughout the State, yet neither yours nor the State Board has been able to meet the demands for help for a more efficient and systematic plan of Missionary work.

We recommend that every church in this Association pay twenty-five cents per member, and that an active agent in each church be appointed by this body to collect said amount and pay the same to the treasurer of your board.

We recommend financial co-operation of your board with the State Board, as heretofore.

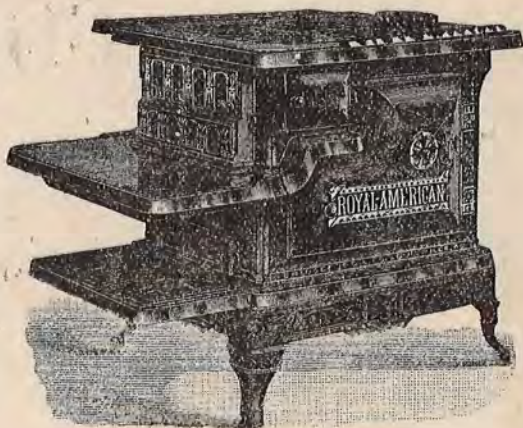
