We your committee on Ministerial Ecucation submit the following: Dear brethren; as the Commission was given to the church to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," it behooves us, as the light of the world, to see that our preachers are better prepared to meet and refute the "isms" of the day as well as to preach. We urge each of our young preachers to acquire, at least, an English education; and we recomend the colleges of our own state as the proper place for such purposes.


