### Foreign Missions.

If the Bible teaches anything at all it is world-wide evangilization missions—foreign missions—missions of all kinds. It is the very design of Christainity in the world. It is the very spirit of Christainity. The impulse of every regenerate heart is missionary. The man who opposes missions is in that particular, anti-christain. The very spirit and practice of Baptists all down the ages has been missionary. The work of our Baptist missionaries and colporters during the latter part of the Middle Ages made the Reformation a possibility. It made all the good there was in the Reformation a possibility. Such has been the teaching and work of regular Baptists from the days of the Apostles till now. There never were people claiming to be Baptists of any kind who opposed missions until after the opening of the 19th century. So let every man now who claims to be a real Baptist-a regular Baptist-a genuine primitive Baptist, be out and out, both heart and purse, in favor of foreign missions. If he will not do this he should seek some other name and some other eccleastical affiliations. Let him have another camp and another sign. We earnestly urge all preachers to educate the people on the great matter of foreign missions by preaching, by securing and distributing tracts, by getting people to buy and read Baptist histories and missionary books. This will do great good on all lines. Other things being equal, any Bantist will be a much better man by reading such Baptist histories as those of J. M. Cramp and W. A. Jarrel. He will be better by reading good missionary literature. The lives of such men as Carey, Yates, and Judson will do good. So let us educate the people on these great lines of of truth and work.

We feel that it is deplorable that so many churches report no Sunday school, and feel that we are not living up to our privilge along the line of Sunday school work.

We feel that it is our duty to educate and train our children and recomend the Association take such action as they deem best looking to better work and organization along this line, and that the churches reporting Sunday schools give more complete statistics.

### Temperance Report

Believing intemperance to be one of the chief foes of mankind, this Association places itself on record as being unalterably opposed to the liquor traffic, that producer of drunkeness with all its attendant evils. The saloon stands against the state, the home, the church and everything that promises good to the people.

We rejoice in the promise of the temperance cause, particularly in our state. Through "local option" the number of drink shops have been reduced, and at present they number less than three hundred. However these saloons, existing mainly in our cities, are a menace to the whole commonwealth and the time is here for another step—state-wide prohibition. The question is to be submitted to the voters on Sept. 9, in the form of "Act No. 2." This will provide for full relief from this foul curse, and it should be supported by every lover of decent citizenship and clean government.

We warn our people against the efforts of the whisky force to confuse and mislead them, by misrepresentation of facts and appeals to prejudice. Their sole object is to persuade our citizens to allow them to leave the saloons fastened, like a leech, to the state.

May the Holy Spirit help us to vote for "God and home and native land," by bidding the saloon to "Go."

Twenty-two hundred Baptists in Washington county ask that you use your influence and vote to secure the passage of a law prohibiting the shipment of intoxicants into prohibited districts.
