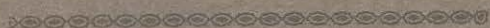

The Proceedings

The Greenbrier Baptist Association met in regular session with Pleasant Grove Church Nov. 22, 1918, at 10:45 a. m. After a song Rev. D. B. Moore, General Missionary of the State Mission Board, led in prayer. All the officers being absent, Prof. A. J. Meadors and W. C. Hamil were elected Moderator and Clerk pro tem respectively.

Conway.—L. M. Sipes, A. J. Meadors, W. G. Mathis, W. C. Hamil. Later, Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Conger, Dr. J. J. Stephens, Mrs. O. O. Florence, and Mrs. W. G. Mathis.

Palestine.—W. W. Lovil.

Suphur Springs, No. 1.—T. W. Day. Later, G. W. Brewster.

Wooster.—Frank Patton, Alf Pearson, Earl Bass.

As permanent officers A. J. Meadors was elected Moderator, W. C. Hamil Clerk, and G. E. Owen Treasurer.

At the eleven o'clock hour the introductory sermon was preached by Bro. Claunch from Mal. 5:10—"Prove me now."

Rev. W. E. Roberts brought the letter from Center Point. Vilonia's letter came by mail next day.

Rev. E. F. Simmions of New Liberty came but the letter was sent later.

J. E. Langley was seated with the letter from Friendship, and B. F. Bass from Happy Hollow.

After the Moderator announced the usual committees the body adjourned for dinner.

AFTERNOON.

Moderator called order at 2:15. Song; prayer by W. E. Roberts. Report on Sunday Schools was adopted after speeches by Supt-

G. C. Turner of Pleasant Grove, Missionary W. G. Mathis, W. C. Hamil, and D. B. Moore. Among other interesting things mentioned was the movement on foot at Pleasant Grove to build several Sunday School rooms started by a \$100 gift from Deacon R. L. Turner and family.

Dr. Conger spoke on Christian schools and was granted the privilege of handing his report to the clerk later.

Report on religious literature was discussed by D. B. Moore and W. G. Mathis and adopted as was also the report on State Missions after discussion by L. M. Sipes, D. B. Moore, A. J. Meadors, W. G. Mathis.

Adjourned. Prayer by W. C. Hamil.

EVENING.

Order was called at 7 by a song and Bro. Moore led in prayer.

Moderator was directed to appoint a committee to revise the constitution and Articles of Faith and report next year. Later he announced the committee to be W. C. Hamil, L. M. Sipes, and W. G. Mathis.

On motion a committee was appointed to re revise the list of ministers co-operating with this body.

It was made the duty of the Executive Board to make a digest of the report if found too voluminous to print with the funds available.

Report on Foreign Missions was adopted. At this juncture we paused to hear a good sermon from Dr. Otto Whittington on a phase of mission applicable to the present State Mission Campaign.

We adjourned after Dr. Stephens led in prayer for the two Turner boys, no win their country's service, whom the brotherhood feels the Lord is calling into the ministry.

SATURDAY.

Convened at 9:30. Song; reading and prayer by E. F. Simmons. Report on temperance was read by Ezra Webb, discussed by W. G. Mathis and A. J. Meadors, and adopted. a speech by Br. Whittington.

Home Misison report was read by Bro. Mathis and adopted after

During discussion of report on nominations, on motion of Pastor Sipes, Vilonia was stricken out as place of next meeting and Conway inserted.

Report on Association Missions was read by W. G. Mathis. Pending its adoption, and as a part of it, the report on Woman's Work was read by Mrs. Conger, discussed by herself, Mrs. Florence, Bro. Meadors, and Mrs. Mathis; and Bro. Mathis read and discussed his

report as Missionary. Among other recommendations one was made that a woman worker be employed next summer.

Rev. Otto Mathis of Forest City, representing the State Mission Board was introduced.

At the eleven o'clock hour Missionary W. G. Mathis preached the Missionary sermon from Lu. 24:4-6.

AFTERNOON.

Reconvened at 2 p. m. by singing. Prayer by W. C. Hamil. Report on Association Missions was further discussed by brethren Mathis and Meadors and adopted with the understanding that the various recommendations be referred to the Executive Board.

Miss Czerda Turner read the report on Young People's Work which was adopted after discussion.

Reports of committees on Obituaries and Resolutions were adopted as was also the one on Ministerial Education after speeches by brethren Mathis and Whittington.

On motion of Bro. Mathis all business unfinished at adjournment was left to the Executive Board.

Bro. Mathis was requested to write up this meeting for the Advance and the local papers.

Report of Finance committee was read by G. E. Owen and adopted.

Treasurer's report was read by Treasurer Owen and referred to the auditing committee, G. C. Turner and R. F. Adams, and the Executive Board.

Thus ended a very successful meeting of our Association considering the very severe weather.

Adjourned to meet with Conway Church at 10 a. m. Thursday before the fourth Sunday in October, 1919.

HOME MISSIONS.

Jesus said "Go into all the world and preach the gospel," "beginning at Jerusalem," hence the great importance of Home Missions. While we are in favor of Foreign Missions we are also in favor of beginning at home. Our Home Mission Board at Atlanta, Ga., is doing a great work for our home land, especially in the army camps. We have contributed to the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., etc., which was our duty. Now let us show our loyalty to our Lord by giving liberally to Home Missions, holding up the hands of our faithful Home Board; for if we thoroughly evangelize our home land we will be better equipped to carry the gospel to all the world. Only by organizing our home forces can we hope to reach a wicked and sin cursed world.

The following figures, taken from the Home Mission Board's report last year, give some idea of the work that is being done through

this Board: Number of workers, 1,498; churches and stations supplied, 5,106; mountain schools, 36; pupils in these schools, 5,190, of whom 110 were preachers; built or improved 505 meeting houses; Sunday Schools organized, 634; churches organized, 213; baptisms, 30,982; total number of additions, 51,949. For this work the Baptists of the South gave directly \$589,987.

YOUNG PEOPLES' WORK.

We think the need for training of young christians for church work is great and further that the Young People's Societies take the place of other gatherings which may be fore the detriment of the young christians, and that the cause of the weakness, especially in the country churches, is from the lack of trained workers.

Therefore we recommend that each church organize a Young People's Society whose special end will be for the training of the young christian in church work, and that each pastor in the Association be urged to make an address to the young people of each church of which he is pastor, encouraging them to organize a Young People's Society. And we further recommend the use of the Baptist Young People's Union literature and methods for use in these societies as being the best obtainable.

REMARKS IN LETTERS.

CONWAY: There have been a few deaths but do not know exactly how many. Our enrollment is 554. At least 100 of these should call for letters as they are away.

FRIENDSHIP: We are weak and going to try to build a church. We want the help and prayers of all the Christian people.

HAPPY HOLLOW: We ask that one-half the money contributed by our church for Orphans Home be sent to Texarkana Orphans Home.

NAYLOR: Owing to our depleted condition we have no pastor for next year and ask that the Missionary preach for us as often as practicable.

SULPHUR SPRINGS NO. 1: Our financial table is incomplete owing to lack of records. We have contributed to most of the causes.

PLEASANT GROVE: We wish to make special mention of the fitting contribution of the intermediate class for the first quarter to H. & F. Missions \$4.15. Second quarter to Christian Education \$8.57; Third quarter to State Missions \$1.15.

Also the Senior class, which was just organized the beginning of the third quarter, contributed \$3.75 toward cost of a sweater for Lewis Irby, who is in the army, and for State Missions, \$5.00.

NEW LIBERTY: The Emanuel Baptist Church disbanded and lettered her membership to us. We have obtained by deed the site and house of worship formerly held by the Cumberland Presbyterians at Beryl, where we now meet.

STATE MISSIONS

"Go ye into all the world" is the scope of Missions as commanded by Jesus in the great Commission for greater convenience and efficiency the Master also suggested a division of field when He said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judaea, and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." (acts 1:8,) Judaea may well stand for State Missions. Judaea the special home of the Jewish among whom christianity began. Judaea was the key field with which to eventually unlock the door to the whole world. The same is true of State Missions today. State Missions is scriptural and primary. Arkansas did well for State Missions last year, raising more than \$40,000 together with the great evangelistic work done over

the state and among the soldiers. This year is a great challenge to Arkansas Baptists. Conditions at present demand greater effort together with greater expense than ever before. Hence we are asked to raise \$50,000 for State Missions this year.

This is as little as we could think of doing. Therefore we, your committee, heartily recommend that special efforts be made throughout our Association by the churches, pastors and our missionary to raise our share of the \$50,000, and thus gratify our Lord in our offerings.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Baptist school is the training camp of the denomination. Here we prepare officers to marshall the forces of the great army of our people. From these schools come our trained workers in pulpit, in pew, in the laymen's movement, in all of our missionary enterprises, in the Sunday School, in the Woman's Circles, in the young people's organizations. We would have to close our foreign mission and home mission work as well as our Sunday School propaganda, if we did not have the Baptist colleges to train our workers; hence, the Christian college makes an appeal for support and contributions, along with the appeal of our Missionary and Sunday School Boards.

One of our chief weaknesses is, at present, the lack of emphasis upon ministerial preparation. Ouachita College was founded primarily for this purpose. We should have at least a hundred young ministers in this institution and our churches should rally to their support in liberal contributions.

The past year has been one of prosperity for both of our colleges. Ouachita, co-educational, at Arkadelphia, under the Presidency of Chas. E. Dicken, has had a good enrollment and should have our sympathetic co-operation and prayerful support. Central College, for young women, in the very heart of our own Association, has had a great year. Every room in the building has been full. Not a case of serious discipline occurred. The present year has opened with the largest attendance in its history. The college has an unusually strong faculty and this year could have added a hundred more students, if building facilities had been adequate. It is a special obligation upon the part of Greenbrier Association to foster this institution within their own bounds.

COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

I have succeeded, by the splendid co-operation of a number of brethren, in organizing our Sunday Schools into a Convention known as the Greenbrier Baptist Sunday School Convention. It is to meet every year in July. Its officers are: W. G. Mathis, President, L. A. Jefferies, Vice-Pres., Miss Bina Ford, Sec'y. The County is divided into two districts: Eastern and Western. The Eastern District's president is Rev. A. F. Bush, Sec'y., Elchard Moore. The western district: Rev. W. C. Hamil, Pres., G. C. Turner, Sec'y.

INSTITUTES.

The Missionary assisted Bro. Hamil in an institute at Pickle's Gap, which seemed in every way a success. Also, a successful Evangelistic conference was held in Conway for an impetus to our Evangelistic campaign for the summer.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. I would recommend that an evangelistic conference be held again next spring or summer just preceeding the summer's Evangelistic campaign, and the Executive committee and Missionary arrange program, time and place for same.

2. I would further recommend that a vigorous Sunday School, B. Y. P. U., and Woman's Missionary Union campaign be put on in

the Association for the purpose of putting one of the above named organizations into each church that is now without them, and that our state workers be called out to assist on such a campaign.

3. I would recommend that right soon aggressive measures be taken to raise the funds for the prosecution of the work next year. That the Executive Committee, Pastors and Missionary be called together at the instance of the Committee to plan such measures.
