AFTERNOON SESSION.

Three p. m Body called to order by singing No. 163, Harvest Bells. Prayer by Eld. L. E. Finney.

Visiting brethren were invited to seats with us. Visitors; Eld. W. A. Clark, editor Arkansas Baptist; Eld. W. W. Gardner, agent Orphans' Home, and Eld. G. C. Taylor, agent Central College.

Reports of committees being called for, El i. W. H. Paslay, as a member of the Executive Board, made the following report:

Dear Brethren: Acting upon your instruction, we employed Bros. Watson and Howell to labor in the western part of the association and Bro. H. J. Smith in the northern and eastern part, principally in the bottom east of the St. Francis River. While there has not been as many conversions this year as in former years, yet we think work has been done in the way of encouraging and strengthening weak churches and in securing their co-operation in our associational work, one or two churches have been reinstated and one organized in a very destitute portion of our territory north of Palestine which we think with proper culture will grow and fill a long-felt want in that portion of our association. We have a new pastor added to our list-Bro. Finney, of Colt, whom we trust will supply that part of the field with the pure Word of God. The greatest obstacle we have to contend with, is from some of our preachers who, like the dog in the fable, will not eat the provender themselves, nor suffer others to do so. They will not co-operate with our associational work, nor supply the churches in their locality. They object to our employing and paying missionaries to work in their fields, and yet say they can not preach unto them for want of a support. We would advise these churches to co-operate and employ a good, zealous, consecrated preacher, and do what they can to support him, and if there is a deficit, ask the board for help. In view of the situation, we would suggest to the association that we change our plans somewhat, and instead of employing men to preach for twosor three months and leave the field vacant and disorganized, that we assist these weak churches in sustaining a pastor or pastors. The people must have the gospel preached unto them. The command is given to the churches, and as churches are composed of individuals, it becomes the duty of every Christian to aid in this work of evangelizing the world. While we have done much, much more remains to be done. We hope this subject will be thoroughly discussed by this body, and that the Holy Spirit will direct and

bless our future efforts. We here append the report of our missionaries, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Moved by L. Slaughter that the report of Committee on Associational Missions be taken up in connection with above report. Motion prevailed, and the said committee made the following report through their chairman, Eld H. C. Rosamond:

Baptists are great believers in apostolic practices. We believe that the command to preach the gospel to every creature is binding upon everyone of us. It was given to the churches. The church that does not do all in its power to preach the gospel to every creature, has no right to expect the blessings of God to rest upon it. Are not many Baptists guilty of the charge? "Ye have robbed me in tithes and offerings." Our revivals are meager, because our contributions are meager. We are not doing what we should for the conversion of our neighbors. God's Word affirms that the liberal soul shall be made fat, but it also affirms that there is that withholdeth more than is meet; it tendeth to poverty. We believe that our financial and spiritual poverty is the result of our covetuousness. Baptists have plenty of money, but they need to be taught that all we have belongs to God, that we are God's stewarts, and are responsible for the way we handle his funds. There is very much destitution in the bounds of this association. Are we not responsible for this destitution? Is it not bur imperative duty to take this rich territory for Christ? It is time for every Baptist to awake out of sleep and occupy the field. In view of these startling facts, your committee recen mends that every paster in the bounds of this association be requested to preach frequently on missions and take collections in each church he serves. 2. That each church be requested to make earnest efforts to get, at least two contributions yearly for missions from every member in that church. 3. That some one or more members be appointed in every church to see that an effort be made to induce the members to adopt some systematic plan of giving to the Lord. 4. We also recommend that our board be instructed to adopt the recommendations embodied in the report of our retiring board and expend the most of the available funds in assisting weak churches in sustaining pastors. 5. That the association discourage the organization of so many weak churches, but that we concentrate our efforts and build up the organizations now existing. 6. That the association advise our churches not to employ any man as pastor who is not thoroughly missionary in his preaching and practice. .

We, your Committee on Temperarce, beg leave to submit the following report: We believe that one of the greatest obstacles with which we have to contend as a denomination, is that home-wrecking, poverty-making, souldestroying evil we call rum. Our advance along all lines of Christian work, which is the result of more teaching and better teaching, demands that we array our forces against this evil as we have never done before. The little brown jug which each of our ancestors is reputed to have kept under his bed, has produced a generation of drunkards. The intemperence being practiced by a great many who profess to be followers of Christ, is producing a harvest of men without a particle of influence. As long as Baptist churches tolerate an occasional toddy, the dram drinkers and those who actually go away from home and get drunk, it is worse than useless to pass resolutions on temperance. Paul says temperance is a fruit of the spirit and temperance in strong drink is certainly total abstinance. If the money spent by the Baptists of Mt. Vernon Association for tobacco was given to the mission work, we could put competent men in the home field and send a neat surplus to the foreign work. Is not the tobacco habit in nearly, if not every case, gross intemperance?

In this age of many books, it is of great importance that parents makcareful selection of the material read by the rising generation. If we do not get good books and papers in the hands of our children, the mongers of cheap and pernicious publications will furnish them with that which poisons the mind and degrades the soul. Your committee urges the brethren of this Association to supply themselves with Landmark Baptist books and papers, so that we may the better represent the bone and sinew of that sect everywhere spoken against. As such a publication, we commend the Arkansas Baptist, of Little Rock; the Foreign Mission Journal, of Richmond, Va.; the Home Fields of Atlanta, Ca., and the publications of the Sunday-school Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, of Nashville, Tenn. But above all we urge the careful study of the Bible, which is the Word of God. AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator, and after singing and prayer by S. L. Pine, the Committee on Orphans' Home made the following report through their chairman, Eld. J. B. Wise:

Your committee submit the following: Three years ago Miss Hannah Hyatt conceived the idea of becoming a burden bearer, that she might lift to usefulness and to heaven all the dependent orphan children in our State. For this purpose she gave to us her real estate, upon which to build a home, to be under the control of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. We now have an elegant brick building, with six large rooms, occupied by eighteen children, in that home, looking to us for their support and education. The morals of the home are all that anyone could expect. The children attend Sunday-school and church services regularly. A literary school is taught in the home of the same grade as the public schools of the State. The teaching of this day-school and the supervision is given without any cost to us. Our present building is full, and we must have more room. We have to look to the friends of orphan children, and especially to the Raptists of our own State, for enlarged facilities to care for this class of the Lerd's poor, which we always have with us. Let us give the home our prayers and our financial support. Let us respond as an Association to this noble work and build up a home of which we will be

provid and that will be honoring to God. We recommend that a report on the Orphans' Home be made a part of our regular program.

Therefore, we would ask all of the churches in this Association to help sustain the work by liberal giving to this part of missions. We think that each church should pledge itself, when sending messengers to an Association, the amount they will give for the ensuing year. Let there be a move all along the line for the coming year that may redound to the glory of God and the salvation of many precious souls.

L. Pine. An amendment was made and passed authorizing the delegates to fill vacancies that may occur from members of this Association who may be there.

Motion made that Eld. H C. Rosamond be elected as messenger to the Southern Baptist Convention, and Eld. J. B. Wise as alternate. Motion prevailed.

Committee on Home and Foreign Missions made the following report through their chairman, Eld. S. L. Holloway:

"He that believeth and is haptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damped." Mark 15: 16. "How shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?" Rom. 10: 14, 15. These Scripture quotations, with many others that might be presented, show that the only way of salvation is faith in Jesus Christ, and that the true spirit of the religion of Christ is a missionary spirit. His last and great command was to preach the Gospel to every creature; and this command is just as binding upon us as it was upon the apostles. Therefore, every consideration of our duty to God, for his glory and to our fellow-men for their future happiness, makes it imperative upon us to send or carry the Gospel to those who are without it. Our missionary boards are prosecuting their work with earnestness and vigor and are sending the glad news throughout their respective fields according to the means placed at their command. We have missionaries on all the continents and on many islands of the sea. God has shown his approval of their work by the success he has granted them and by the open doors which are presented to us. Never before have such opportunities been offered to our people. We believe that God has broken the power of Catholicism in the West Indies and in the Philippine Islands. We believe, also, that the present complications in China indicate that he is breaking the power of superstition, lifting the veil of ignorance and opening the way for the Gospel in that bright land as perhaps he has never done before. These conditions bring great opportunities, with commensurate responsibilities, to all God's children. Our people usually act when they are properly informed. Therefore, we recommend and urge that our pastors teach the importance of the subject and place in the hands of our people such literature as will give full information on the subject. Our Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal will do it.

The proper education of mind and heart prepares us not only for the duties, trials and responsibilities of this life, but for the life to come. No school nor college that fails to emphasize and develop the moral element in education can be called an all 'round developer of character. It is lacking in that characteristic which will enable girls and boys to meet the duties of

College, with its well-equipped buildings, its able president and faculty of twenty-two teachers, its matriculation, so far this year over 300 students, and its long roll of alumnize and alumni, who have gone out from its walls to bless mankind with their labors, as a college that meets all the requirements of a Christian education, and may the time soon come when it shall be the great Baptist university of Arkansas. Central College for young ladies, with all the modern improvements in building, and with and efficient corps of eleven teachers, claims our warmest support. Away up in the mountains of northwest Arkansas, in Baxter county, where the air is pure and living is cheap, is located Mountain Home Baptist College, holding out its helping hands to all boys and girls wanting to be something and to make something out of themselves in life more than mere camp followers. We, your committee, respectfully submit the foregoing.

for the higher education of our young men and women; and,

Whereas, In our judgment there has arisen a necessity for training schools or academies, which will better prepare our boys and girls for a collegiate course, and for the duties and pursuits of life; be it

Resolved, First, That such a training school or academy be established by

and in the bounds of this association;

Second, That a board of trustees, composed of brethren who are members in good standing of the churches of this association be appointed, to whom shall be entrusted the work of securing a location, procuring suitable buildings, the employment of teachers, and whatever else may be necessary for the establishment and conduct of such a school;

Third, That the trustees be required to make a full report in writing each year to this body of the condition of the school, with such recommendations as in their judgment may seem best for the successful promotion of the

school:

Fourth, That the board of trustees shall consist of nine brethren, the terms of three of them to expire each year and their successors to be elected by this body in annual session assembled;

Fifth, We hereby instruct the board not to accept and locate said school, without it is a free gift, and this association will not pledge itself for any amount of money.

Motion made by S. L. Holloway that the resolution be

sdopted, after discussion by brethern S. L. Holloway, W. H. Paslay, L. P. Anderson, J. B. Wise, J. B. Sanders, S. H. King and G. R. Robuck. The motion prevailed

Committee on Ministerial Education, made the following report through their Chairman, Eld W. H. Paslay:

The advantages of an education of intellectual training are too apparent to admit of arguments. No lawyer or physician would think of entering upon their profession without suitable preparation. If necessary for these avocations, how much more so for the minister, the highest, noblest and most responsible position entrusted to men? God calls men to this great work. Yet they are commanded to study the Word, search the Scriptures, so that they may be able to rightly divide the Word of Truth. Those who teacherror have taken every advantage to array their sophistries in attractive garments, so as to hide their false teachings. So that it requires an expert to detect their falacies. Truth needs no adorning, but the minister of the gospel should be able to disrobe error of its deception, expose its deleterious influences, and lead men's minds out into the light of God. In view of these facts, our ministers should possess all the advantages that a thorough education can give. The education of a minister must be general in its character. Since he has to meet and counteract error in its diversified forms, ready for an attack from any quarter, I am glad that our denomination has recognized this necessity, and have made preparations for the education of our ministers. We no longer bear the stigma of being an ignorant, bigoted sect, but our ministers are the peers of any class of leaders. We do not say that a man ean not preach and be able to do a great amount of good without a finished or collegiate education; yet he will labor under great disadvantages and often

suffer shame, when he feels himself unable to meet and expose the errors of the enemies of truth. The minister is emphatically a teacher of the people, and how can be teach what he does not know? The blind leading the blind. We recommend and urge upon our young ministers the duty of educating themselves. Tuition is free in our colleges, and with the proper grit and a little help from the churches, any preacher can acquire a moderate education at least. We recommend that our churches raise the usual amount for this noble work, and that they refuse to ordain any man to the ministry who is totally unprepared to teach or instruct the people.

We are sorry to note a decrease in our Sunday-school work, there being now only about 35 per cent of the churches in our association maintaining Sunday-schools. Some of these schools too have a very short life of it. lasting only two or three months during the summer. Of the enrollment in Sunday-school we find the average attendance is only about 25 per cent. These are not encouraging facts, and should arouse our people to put forth more effort along these lines of the work. Baptists should accept the well-known and long established principle, that education forms the common mind, and give more attention to the instruction of their young people. This indifference to Sunday-school work is a gross neglect of one of our most important duties. Can we expect a steady growth of our denomination and the maintainance of Baptist doctrine in its purity, when we so shamefully neglect the training of our own children? Again we urge Baptists to do more Sunday-school work, and hope that our next report will show not a decrease, but an increase.
