MINUTES OF THE

SIXTY-FIFTH SESSION

OF THE

BARTHOLOMEW REGULAR BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- 1. The Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association convened in its sixty-fifth annual session with Prairie Grove Baptist Church, Drew County, Arkansas, at 10 o'clock, Saturday morning, October 2, 1915, and was called to order by Moderator Z. T. Wood, of Monticello. Prayer was led by Bro. N. C. Denson.
- 2. The Constitution of the Association and the Rules of Decorum were read by the Moderator.
- 3. Committee on Divine Service was appointed by the Moderator, as follows: The Pastor, Deacons and Messengers of Prairie Grove Baptist Church.
- 4. Associational letters from the various churches composing the Association were called for. Brethren Hill Adcock and J. T. Fowlkes were appointed to read the letters, and nine letters were read and messengers present enrolled.
- 5. The hour for preaching having arrived, the reading of the letters was suspended. Eld. T. M. McGee, of Montrose, who had been selected to preach the Introductory Sermon, took charge of the service. Prayer was led by Bro. Otto Mathis. Bro. McGee then read as a scripture lesson 1 Cor. 9:1-14 inclusive, using as his text the 14th verse of the scripture read, his subject being "The Support of the Ministry." After the sermon prayer was led by Bro. T. M. McGee.
- 6. The reading of the Associational Letters and enrolling of messengers was resumed and continued till dinner was announced.
- 7. Motion carried to take recess for one hour, and the Association was dismissed with prayer led by Bro. G. D. Moore.

AFTERNOON SESSION.—(Saturday)

- 8. The Association reconvened at 1 o'clock p. m., and was led in prayer by Bro. T. G. Morgan.
- 9. The reading of Associational Letters and enrolling of messengers was resumed, and continued until all letters presented were read. A list of all the churches reporting by letter at this session of the Association with names of messengers present will be found at the end of these Minutes.
- 10. Motion carried to go into the permanent organization. Bro. S. R. Smith, of Promise Land Church, was nominated for Moderator, and by motion the rules were suspended and he was elected by acclamation. By motion the rules were again suspended, and Bro. E. L. Compere, of Hamburg Church, was elected Clerk and Treasurer.
- 11. Bro. S. R. Smith took his seat as Moderator and made a short talk, thanking the Association for the confidence expressed toward him and asking for the co-operation of all the messengers during the session.
- 12. Associational Letter from Magnolia Church was read and messengers from that church were enrolled.
- 13. Petitionary letters were called for. Letters from the following churches were received: Chicot, Jarvis Chapel, and Blissville. By motion these churches were received into the Association and their messengers ordered enrolled. The messengers from these churches then came forward and the hand of fellowship and Christian greeting was extended to them by the Moderator on behalf of the Association.
- 14. The following brethren were appointed by the Moderator as Committee on Order of Business: J. B. Luck, J. B. Ware and J. T. Fowlkes.
- 15. Eld. E. J. A. McKinney, of Little Rock, editor of the Baptist Advance, was introduced as a visiting brother.
- 16. By consent the Association took recess so that the Ladies' Aid and Missionary Union of this Association might use the building for their annual meeting. At the close of the Women's Meeting the Association resumed its session. Full report of the Women's Meeting will be found elsewhere in these Minutes.

- 18. Committee on Order of Business reported, the report being read by Bro. J. B. Luck. By motion the report was adopted as read.
- 19. By motion the Association took recess until 7:30 o'clock p. m., and was dismissed with prayer led by Bro. J. T. Fowlkes.

EVENING SESSION.—(Saturday)

20. The Association reconvened at 7:30 p. m. Eld. F. P. Turner preached at this hour, reading as scripture lesson John 3:1-17 inclusive. Prayer was led by Bro. E. J. A. Mc-Kinney. Bro. Turner then preached, using as his text 2 Kings 10:15. After preaching an opportunity was given for the unsaved who desired to be prayed for to come. Two came. Prayer was led by Bro. Turner. Announcements were made and the meeting was dismissed with prayer led by Bro. W. J. Bell.

MORNING SESSION—(Sunday)

21. The Association reconvened at 9:30 o'clock a.m. Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. J. T. Fowlkes. Prayer was led by Bro. C. D. Wood, Jr. Bro. Fowlkes then read the 24th Psalm and led in prayer.

- 22. Letter from Parkdale Church was read and messengers enrolled.
- 23. The report of the Committee on Temperance was called for and was read by Bro. G. E. Holt, as follows:

Report of Committee on Temperance

Faul gives temperance as one of the qualifications of a minister of the Gospel, and commanded the Church at Ephesus to "be not drunk with wine," because therein was excess. Peter gives temperance as one of the seven Christian graces to be added. Solomon said, "wine is a mocker," and "look not upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." He also asked and answered the following questions: "Who hath woo? Who hath sorrow? Who hath contentions? Who hath babbling? Who hath wounds without cause? Who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine;" and God says, "woe to him

that putteth the cup to his brother's lips."

Intemperance is the greatest evil of the day. It causes 5,000 suicides, 10,000 murders, 60,000 fallen girls, 100,000 paupers, 3,000 murdered wives, 7,000 other murders, 40,000 widowed mothers, 100,000 orphaned children, 100,000 insane, 100,000 criminals. 100,000 drunkards who die yearly, 100,000 boys who take the place of drunkards. Untold crimes, misery. woe, want, shame, disgrace, riot, revelry, death, eternal destruction of souls in hell; and it costs \$500,-000,000 to do this annually. Therefore, we recommend that each church in this Association put forth every effort in their power to rid our state of the accursed liquor traffic, by electing the right kind of men to office in municipal, county, state and nation. As the love of money is the root of all evil, so is the dram drink the root of all drunkenness, therefore we recommend that our churches brand the dramdrink as the curse that it is.

- 24. Letter from Midway Church was read and messengers enrolled.
- 25. The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was called for and was read by Bro. J. B. Luck, as follows:

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools

At the meeting of the Association in 1913, the records show that there were 67 churches in the Association, with 37 Sunday schools. Some of the churches did not report that year, and there may have been more than 37 schools. The reports that year showed an enrollment of 2990 pupils.

At the meeting in 1914, there were 69 churches in the Association with 45 Sunday schools, and an enrollment of 3797 pupils. This shows some gain, but still there were 26 churches in the Association

without Sunday schools.

This year 61 churches have reported to the Association showing 52 Sunday schools, and an enrollment of 3956. Doubtless there are a few churches whose letters have not yet come in that will swell this total to some extent.

These figures are given to show just what part our Sunday school work is playing in the general

work of the Association.

The Sunday school is for all the people of the community, old as well as young, but it is nevertheless true that the largest part of its membership comes from the young people, say from five to twenty years of age. Probably ninety per cent of all conversions take place between those ages. Is it not then of utmost importance that the influence of the gospel be thrown around our young people in every way possible, so that they may be led to Christ during those years when they are easiest reached?

The reports in 1914 show that in the 26 churches where there were no Sunday schools there were only 67 baptisms, while in the 43 churches where there were Sunday schools there were 274 baptisms. Those figures are significant. They mean that the churches that have schools are reaching more lost men and women than those that do not have schools. Sinners are more easily reached where they have been under the influence of the Sunday school. Spiritual strength in the church is stronger because it has fed more freely from God's word.

We appeal especially to the pastors of the churches to use their utmost efforts to organize schools in their churches. In failing to do this they are leaving unused one of the most powerful means of bringing people to Christ that they have at their disposal.

We desire also to call attention to "Teacher Training". In many of the associations in this state training schools and institutes are being held, with very beneficial results. These schools usually last from three days to a week, and Sunday school teachers are given instruction in methods, just as the day school teacher is given instruction at the annual teacher's institute. These Institutes are found very beneficial, and we believe that if the schools in this Association would organize for that purpose they would be greatly benefitted. In addition to the institutes, the teacher who desires to do so may take a course in teacher training at home, and with no expense whatever except the cost of the books, which is very slight. For information regarding the teacher training course, etc., address D. S. Campbell, Little Rock, Arkansas.

We believe in the Sunday School. We believe that every church in the Association ought to maintain one. We believe that it is one of the greatest factors in the advancement of our denominational ideas and doctrines. Baptist Sunday Schools teach Baptist doctrines. The Sunday Schools of other denominations teach their distinctive doctrines. If we sit idly by while other denominations are building their Sunday Schools, the inevitable result will be that they will increase while we will decrease.

We desire to recommend:

1. That pastors give special attention to the organizing and maintaining of Sunday Schools in their churches.

2. That each church make a special effort to

maintain a live Sunday School.

3. That every teacher in this Association take a course in "Teacher Training" if possible.

McKinney would preach to the overflow congregation out under the trees. Prayer was led by Bro. Tull, after which he preached, using as his text Matt. 5:13. After the sermons, cash collections were taken for Associational Missions amounting to \$36.18.
- 27. By motion the Association took recess till 1:30 p. m., and was dismissed with prayer led by Bro. B. L. Bridges.

AFTERNOON SESSION .- (Sunday)

- 28. The Association reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p. m. Prayer was led by Bro. Otto Mathis.
- 29. The report of the Committee on Orphans Home was called for and was read by Bro. Z. T. Wood, as follows:

Report of Committee on Orphans Home

The Baptists of Arkansas are maintaining two Orphanages, one at Texarkana on the western border and one at Monticello in the southeastern corner of the state. The home at Monticello was established in 1896 on the old homestead of the late Reverend Benjamin C. Hyatt, by his daughter, Hannah, who donated this patrimony to the Baptist churches of the state that they might have a place in which to gather the parentless, helpless and homeless children of the state, that they might be reared, educated and afforded the comforts, as nearly as could be, that other children who have not been so unfortunate enjoy. This home has reared, educated and turned out about 400 children, who for the most part are honoring us by making good and useful citizens. We have now in the home at Monticello 196 children whom we are thus striving to care for. The home at Texarkana was established in 1906, and has now 33 of these unfortunate children whom we are caring for and giving the same advantages and comforts. These homes are not asylums for the temporal needs of these alone, but they might be classed as life saving and rescue stations as well, for in them they are taught the word of God and their relationship to Him and to society, as a result of which, almost without an exception they become Christians.

This work should and does appeal to every Christian heart. God's word and humanity teach us that it is our duty to help the helpless and care for the widows and the fatherless. While we are accumulating some property and doing all we can to make these homes self-sustaining, yet our observation and experience teach us that this cannot be done even as well as our children at home can have these advantages and support themselves. Remembering then that everything we do for these children must be paid for at the market price, besides the salaries of superintendents, matrons and teachers, and that the burden is too great and the demand unjust for one or a few persons to be required to bear, and realizing that it is not only the duty but a blessed privilege for everyone to have a part in this great and good work, we recommend that the collections be taken at this hour that everyone present may have the opportunity of contributing personally and directly to this worthy cause.

The following pledges were made, to be divided proportionately between the two homes: Enon, \$10.00; Flat Creek, \$10.00; Ladelle, \$5.00; Mt. Pleasant, \$10.00; New Union, \$12.50. By motion the report was adopted.

30. The report of Committee on Ministerial and Christian Education was called for and was read by Bro. C. D. Wood, Jr., as follows:

Christian and Ministerial Education

The subject of education lies at the basis of all civilization. Without it progress is well-nigh impossible. The world is making wonderful strides in this field.

In the past the educated man was the exception, in the future the uneducated man will be the exception. It is entirely possible for education to be a curse. The purpose and ideal held before the young and the atmosphere in which they receive their education will determine whether it shall be a curse or a blessing. If under Christian environment and if properly related to the Kingdom of God, education is one of the greatest blessings of life.

If we expect to have our young people educated under Christian environment we must maintain Christian schools. We recommend therefore that our Baptist people support our Baptist Schools by prayer, offerings and patronage.

Since this is an age of educated people it is imperative that the leaders in Spiritual things be educated. There are many young men whose hearts have been touched by the Spirit of God, and upon whom God has placed the responsibility of preaching the Gospel, whom we may assist in securing education. We recommend that the churches of this Association make offerings regularly to this cause, and that our young preachers be encouraged to secure for themselves the very best preparation possible for their life work.

C. D. Wood, Jr. Chas. Sawyer. The report was discussed by Brethren C. D. Wood, Jr., Otto Mathis, J. F. Tull, F. P. Turner, L. M. Webb, C. E. Hollis and J. A. McKinney after which motion for its adoption carried.

- 33. By motion the Association took recess till 7:30 p.m. and was dismissed by prayer led by C. D. Wood, Jr.

EVENING SESSION—Sunday

- 34. The Association reconvened at 7:30 o'clock p. m., Bro. Z. T. Wood taking the chair by request of the Moderator. Prayer was led by Bro. T. M. McGee.
- 35. Eld. Frank Somervell then preached, using as his scripture lesson Numbers 21:1-9 incl. After the sermon prayer was led by Bro. Somervell and then by Bro. W, C. Kimbro.
- 36. Report of the Committee on B. Y. P. U. work was called for and was read by Bro. J. F. Tull, as follows:

Report of Baptist Young People's Union

The Baptist Young Peoples Union is not a society within the church but is the church training its young people for service. It takes Baptist young people in the formative period of their lives, right at the time when they are capable of their widest development and at the time when an appeal can be made to the best that is in them and leads them into the active service of the Lord.

The B. Y. P. U., when it really answers its purpose, is a remedy for all church ills, leading the the young people into a deeper spiritual life, instructing them in Baptist doctrine and history, cultivating them in the habit of daily Bible reading, and enlisting them in the great work of reaching the lost world with the Gospel.

Baptists are today suffering more from lopsided development than from any other affliction that has ever pestered our denominational life. We have been long on disciplining and baptizing, but

woefully short on training our converts.

It is clear to the minds of your committee that the denomination which is strongest on training its young people for service will be longest on the field. Baptist will be bound to brace themselves at the point of training their young people, else there will occur in the near future a fearful leakage from our field to the profit of other denominations.

There are 11 unions in Bartholomew Association, namely: Collins, Crossett, Dermott, Hamburg, McGehee, Monticello East End, First Monticello, Montrose, Prairie Grove, Warren and Wilmar. This is an increase of four over last year and shows a very gratifying growth of interest in this all important work.

Your committee would respectfully urge and recommend that every possible effort be made to create sentiment looking to the organization of B. Y. P. U. in every church within the bounds of our association.

MORNING SESSION—(Monday)

- 38. The Association reconvened at 8:30 o'clock Monday morning. Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. T. M. McGee.
- 39. A letter from Shady Grove Baptist Church of Bradley County was read asking that a letter of dismission be granted to that Church in order that she might unite with Judson Association. By motion the request was granted, and the Clerk was instructed to prepare and forward the letter at once, which was done.
 - 40. Report of the committee on Foreign Missions was

called for and was read by Bro. T. M. McGee, as follows:

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions

Your committee on Foreign Missions desire to submit the following:

The Master said: "Go ye therefore and teach or diciple all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things, whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."—Matt. 28: 19-20. Again, it is said: "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth."—Acts 1:8. The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Va., has been interested with the management of this work.

This Board is conducting work in Italy, Brazil,

Mexico, Argentina, China, Japan, and Africa.

In all the fields these Missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out stations, 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 23,959. They also have 8,833 enrolled in Mission schools. In addition to this they have 384 in theological seminaries and training schools, preparing to preach the gospel to their own people.

We have 300 missionaries on the foreign field, 20 of whom were sent out during the past year.

Notwithstanding the difficulties and hinderances caused by the European war and the Mexican war, the foreign missionaries reported 5190 baptisms. The financial depression throughout the South brought about by the wars above referred to has caused a falling off in the contributions. There were only 19 churches of this Association reported on anything for foreign missions this year. These 19 churches reported \$677.82.

Your committee respectfully recommends that every pastor in this Association preach on Foreign Missions at each of their respective churches and give the people an opportunity to give something to world-wide missions.

F. M. McGee, G. M. Kelley. Motion made to adopt the report.

Report of the Committee on Home Missions was called for and was read by Bro. H. L. Veazey, as follows:

Report of Committee on Home Missions:

In the language of Dr. B. D. Gray, "Man's alloted time, three score years and ten, can be credited to the Home Mission Board." Seventy years ago its work began with the organization of the Southern Baptist Convention.

A glorious history we have had, the time embraces the most stirring period of human history and the chief part of our country's progress.

While this has been a very hard and trying year financially every place of work seemed to have a special favor of God. The Board has tried to maintain all of our missionaries and eyangelists but have not supplied all vacancies made by resignations of some workers. They have tried to hold what we have if they could not make advancement.

"As goes America, so will go the world," is a statement that we find in the religious meetings throughout our nation. Never before did these words mean quite so much as they do today, as most of the so called Christian nations are doing all they can to destroy each other in the most colossal war the world has ever known. Christianizing America is a task that presents a call that can not be questioned and that the South has the solution to the problem is evident to any close student of today. America has 50,000,000 persons of responsible age who have no religious claims. In the South there are 18,000,000 such persons without religious faith. Of every 100 evangelical Christians in the South, 39 are Baptist, the fact of which makes our responsibility great indeed; under the head of "Departmental Work" let us glance at some of the things we are doing.

Cuba. We have here 40 missionaries, 27 churches 26 other preaching stations, Baptist College at Havana and 9 other schools in the island. This island has nearly two million population, mainly Spanish. The main religion is Catholic, but it has had very little moral effect on the people.

The Canal Zone.—This is the work we have been

carrying.on in the strip of country 47 by 10 miles where the U. S. has been digging the Panama Canal. People in great numbers have been here from all parts of the world. We were first to begin work here. We have five churches with a membership of 518.

Mountain School.—We have 34 of these schools with 156 teachers and 5218 students. Dr. A. E. Brown is superintendent of the work.

Evangelism.—Dr. Weston Bruner is secretary of this work. We had last year 27 evangelists and their labors resulting in 12,673 baptisms and 17,057 additions to the church.

Enlistment.—We have about 25,000 Baptist churches in our territory. Forty per cent of this number gives practically nothing to missions. Of our 25,000 churches about 20,000, of them are in the country towns with less than 2500 population. Of these 18,000 have only once a month preaching and most pastors are non-resident preachers. Let's pray for enlistment.

Church Building.—This has changed very little from last year. We have 3,689 homeless churches and 4.310 inadequately housed. We are attempting to raise \$1,000,000 to relieve this situation.

Indians.—There are now in America, 300,000, about one third of these living in Oklahoma. With these we are having fine results. Twenty thousand Indians live in New Mexico but we do not work with them.

Negroes.—In the South there are about 9,500,000 negroes, and of these about 2,400,000 are Baptist. The Home Board has cooperated with State Boards in doing a great work for these people this year.

Foreigners.—This problem of dealing with the foreigners is so great that no one can do it justice without spending much time before the alter and reading the open Book. It is estimated that more than two-thirds of the million a year of immigrants who flock to our shores come from nations who have a religion of the closed Bible and that two-thirds of them are at least nominally Roman Catholics.

Southern Baptists regard Roman Catholic lands to be in great need of the pure Gospel. We can readily see that these figures alone give us work that calls for heraes.

Report of Committee on State Missions was called for and was read by Bro. F. P. Turner, as follows:

Report of Committee on State Missions

Arkansas has a white population of 1,200,000. Among these we now have between 115,000 and 120,000 white Baptists or about one person out of every ten among Arkansas white people is a Baptist. Our strength, though, is by no means equally proportioned over the state. For example in Union county 225 people out of every 1000 is a member of a Baptist church. While in Madison county fewer than 50 out of every thousand are Baptists. On the basis of our best developed sections of the State baptistically Arkansans should not have fewer than 270,000 white Baptists. It is a fact that the people are strongly inclined to our faith in many of the most needy sections of the State. The growth of Baptists in comparison with that of other denominations in the State bears out the conclusion that this statement is correct.

The greatness of the needs and the opportunities set before us bring us great responsibilities, and make it imperative that we go forward in giving the Gospel and preaching the whole truth to all the people. This work is big enough to command the attention of all our people and to employ all the energies of all our Baptist people, whether Convention or Association and we would urge our churches and every member of our churches to give his support to State Missions under the plan that seems best to him. No church should be laggard in this work. We would also urge that each church take a worthy offering for this work during the next thirty days. Contributions for the State

Association should be sent to Brother J. A. Smith, 201 Donaghey Building, Little Rock and for the State Convention to J. S. Rogers, 410 Hollenberg Building, Little Rock.

The State Convention reports 51 missionaries and already reports up to Aug. 1st of this year 1904 additions under the labors of their missionaries and reported over \$12,000 for the work collected in Arkansas.

The State Association reported last year for missionaries 308 additions and collections amounting to \$1577.06 for State Missions. Both need our best efforts in meeting the obligations for the year.

Report of Committee on Associational Missions

We, your Committee on Associational Missions are glad to report as follows:

There has been one man, Brother Otto Mathis, on the field during the summer months, having worked altogether 3 months and 11 days, visited 11 churches, held 10 meetings preached 148 sermons witnessed 107 professions of conversion, 71 baptisms, 31 additions by letter, 5 additions by restoration, a total of 107 additions. He collected on field for Associational Missions \$161.65.

The destitution of our field is great. The nature of our needs is principally supply work to pastorless and destitute churches rather than strictly untouched territory.

Bro. Otto Mathis was employed, his work commencing June 19, 1915, at a salary of \$100.00 per month. While he has been actively on the field only a little more than three months the Lord has wonderfully blessed his labors, as is shown by his report, which is as follows:

The elements of consecration and frankness and scholarship that go in to make up our publications have no superior in the publications of the other religious denominations in Christiandom.

Our commentaries on the Scriptures, our systematic theologies, our homiletics, our books, our prayer service, our church, Sunday schools and B. Y. P. U. manuals, mission journals and tracts, Sunday School literature and religious papers are the best in the world.

We have two denominational papers published in Arkansas. The Baptist Advance and The Baptist. Those wishing to do business with the Baptist Advance may address that publication at 410 Hollenberg building, Little Rock, Ark. Those wishing to do business with The Baptist may address that publication at 201 Donaghey building, Little Rock, Ark.

While the hearts of your committee are thrilled at the thought of the abundance and richness of our publications, they are on the other hand made sad at the thought of so many of our people's failure to profit by them. Our books, journals and papers may be had for as little money as those of any other denomination and our tracts for the asking, and yet many of our Baptist homes in this as well

as other associations practically miss it all. We recommend that our churches send for and distribute mission tracts and that each home represented by the membership of our churches take at least one mission journal and one of our denominational papers.

Since the beginning of time woman has been an important factor in the affairs of humanity. The women of Arkansas and the Southern Baptist Convention have, in the last few years, had much to do with all the activities of the church work.

More and more it is recognized that women can do not only the gleanings, but "bigger things," when

opportunities are given them.

We would urge all the pastors to work for the organization of a W. M. S. in their church or churches, and thus help by their work and influence to increase the work, which is growing in uselulness and efficiency. The women ask only to be of humble service when and where they can.

Report on the State of Religion

Your committee finds that 61 churches out of 72 have reported; 476 persons have been baptized, and 342 have been received otherwise, making a total gain of 818.

The losses have been: By letter, 220; by death, 54; by expulsion, 70, making a total loss of 344. When our losses are all substracted we find a net gain of 474—an increase over last year of 199. The

· 61 churches reporting show a present membership of

6261 an increase of 421 over last year.

Out of 61 churches reporting there are 52 Sunday Schools with a membership of 3956. If bare figures indicate anything, then, we are decidedly on the upgrade.

Four new churches have been organized, and there is a wide-spread spirit of evangelism among

our people.

The weakest feature of all our work is the nouuse of pastors by the churches for protracted meeting work.

Report of Committee on Baptist Hospitals

The Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., is governed and operated by a joint board composed of representative men from Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee. The original plan is to build three wings, one of which is complete and in service and accommodates 120 patients.

The last two years there were more than 1000 patients treated free, and many others at reduced

rates.

The present wing was built at a cost of \$240,000 on a lot worth \$50,000. Arkansas Baptists and many of their friends have given liberally of their money, time and influence to its building and support; and the Baptists of Arkansas should continue in their support of it. Many people are drawn into Catholocism by the treatment received in their hospitals, and, strange as it seems to some of us, many Baptists and other Protestants patronize Catholic hospitals, and give their money and influence to them.

We urge the people to patronize not Catholic

hospitals, but Baptist hospitals.

Motion was made and carried to adopt the report as read.

Mrs. Tull of Monticello, made an excellent talk on Y. W.

A. work, stressing the need of Sunbeams and Y. W. A.'s in every church. She spoke of how necessary it is to have trained workers, and how much more efficiently the work could be carried on if the workers were trained. Mrs. Hawkins also spoke along this line, emphasizing the importance of Y. W. A. work.

CONSTITUTION

- Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches who, on presenting their credentials, shall be entitled to seats.
- Article 2. This Association shall be called Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association.
- Article'3. Each church composing this Association shall be entitled to three delegates.
- Article 4. The object of this Association shall be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's Kingdom, particularly in the bounds of this Association.
- Article 5. This Association shall never possess any power or authority over any church, but may act as an advisory council.
- Article 6. New churches may be admitted into this union by signifying their wish by letter and delegates, provided they are deemed orthodox.
- Article 7. The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, and any member shall be eligible to the offices aforesaid, so long as the Association shall call him.
- Article 8. Every church shall be furnished with Minutes, and every other benefit of the fund, in proportion to the money advanced.
- Article 9. Amendments in the Constitution may be made at any session of this Association, when two-thirds of the members present shall deem it necessary.
- Article 10. Any church coming heterodox in faith or practice, after her reception, the Association shall withdraw from said church, the Word of God being the standard of orthodoxy.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- I. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- II. We believe that the Scripture composing the Old and New Testaments is the word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and order.
- III. We believe in the doctrines of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and the sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- IV. We believe that man was created upright but by transgression fell from that state; consequently he and his posterity became dead in trespasses and sin.
- V. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability to recover from the fallen state in which he is by nature.
- VI. We believe that sinners are justified by the righteousness of Christ through faith in his name.
- VII. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace.
- VIII. We believe in the final resurrection of the dead and the general judgment and that the felicity of the right-eous, and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- IX. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel but one who is regularly baptised, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.
- X. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Church of Christ, and that believers are the only subjects, and that immersion only is Baptism.
- XI. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and devotion.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by a majoril of the members present.
- 3, It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is kept according to the rules of decorum.
- 4. Any member being dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association, provided it be done the same day.
- 5. One member only shall speak at a time, who shall address the Moderator, and upon obtaining the floor, shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or makes use of personal reflections.
- 6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on any subject without obtaining leare of the Association.
- 7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt a member while speaking.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded after time given for debate, shall be put to the Association unless previously withdrawn: and the Moderator shall announce the decision to the Association.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of members present.
- 20. No appellation but that of brother shall be used by members in addressing each other while in session.
- 11. The moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as other members, provided the chair is filled. but shall not be allowed to vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 12. The names of all members shall be called as often as the Association may deem necessary: and no member shall withdraw himself from the Association without leave of the Association.
- 13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each session and oftener if necessary.
