FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

We, your committee on Sunday School urge first that we use good sound literature. We believe the teacher should be led by the Holy Spirit of God; that he may teach the rising generation to observe the Sabbath, that it is a day for rest and worship; and we recommend the Bible, and the literature published by the Landmark Baptist Sunday School Concern of Little Rock, Ark., as the literature to be used.

Seeing its poisonous effects and realizing it is drawing our men and boys down to ruin, we urge every true lover of the cause of Jesus Christ and humanity to do everything in their power to do away with awful evil. We believe the time has come when our churches should be more strict in dealing with dram drinkers. and we advise our churches to withdraw from all members who aid in the making, selling or drinking of any intoxicating liquors, and we pledge ourselves to favor state wide prohibition.

In the first place it is the duty of the whole church to attend regularly on the ministration of the pastor, and we advise that) the Deacons f each church see after the support of our Pastors better that they may stand on the wall continually.

Our Savior, just before he left this earth, said to his church: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Mark 16-15 to 16. Now, if we cannot go ourselves, we ought to help those that can go. We have some men on the foreign field sent out by the churches of the General Association, and also one native missionary, Bro. Galassi in Rome, Italy; therefore, we urge our churches to do more in this great work in the future than in the past.

I began work late in the fall of 1910, and preached at the following places: Hinchey School House, Bear Creek, Zion's Light, De Soto, Mt. Nebo, Dongola, Burr Oak, Red Hill, Liberty, Salem, Trace Ridge, Pleasant Valley, Pleasant Exchange. Baptisms, 14. Days labored on field, 43. Total collections, \$35.78.

Pleasant Valley church, Searcy county, was chosen as the next place of meeting. Eld. C. T. Cotton was chosen to preach the Introductory Sermon, Eld. C. L. Boyd, alternate.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Two years ago I gave the origin and founder of Baptist churches. I come now to the Church or Kingdom spoken of in Daniel 2:44. "And in the days of these kings shall the God of Heaven set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed, and the kingdom shall not be left to other people but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms and it shall stand forever."

The Prophet Daniel is pointing to the church or kingdom that Christ set up in A. D. 31. Who is head and founder of the church He set up in the land of Palestine?

It is conceded by all historians that churches did exist during all the ages from the Apostles to the Reformation, that held the distinctive principles which have always characterized the Baptists.

Eld. J. H. Grime says in his work: "There has never been a time since the days of the Apostles that the people known as Baptists did not exist."

Dr. Ypeig and J. J. Dermott were appointed by the king of Holland to write a history of the Dutch Reformed church. In preparing said work they say much about the Baptists. They put forth this striking statement: "We have now seen that the Baptists who were formerly called Ana Baptists and in later times Menonites were the original Waldenses. And who long in the history of the church received the honor of that origin? On this account the Baptists may be considered the only religious community which has stood since Christ and the Apostles, and as a Christian society, has preserved pure the doctrine of the Bible through all ages."

The above historian was a Pedo Baptist and ought to command attention by all who want to find the true Church of Christ.

Dr. J. C. Ridpath, a Methodist historian, says: "I should not readily say there were Baptist churches as far back as A. D. 100, though without doubt there were Baptists then as all Christians then were Baptists. Protably the oldest church in the world is Hill Cliff church in Wales which was in existence in 600 A. D. This church is still in existence today and has regular worship every Sunday."

The way of Baptists as traced in history is the way of martyrs and blood from the Apostles to the eighteenth century. (Orchard P. 137). In the ninth century one hundred thousand Baptists were murdered and their property confiscated and in the thirteenth century one million Baptists were murdered. All of this was done because Baptists would not submit to the Catholic church. The Catholics devised the most cruel punishment. The Baptists were burned at the stake, their tongues were pulled out, their eyes gouged out, their arms and legs sawed off, and women were ripped open and unborn children taken from them.

Baptists have suffered terrible things all because they take the Bible as their only rule of faith and practice.

I send forth this letter on its mission of love.
