MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

No minister can be what he ought to be unless he studies to show himself an approved workman unto God. No minister ever was such without it. The man who ignores this fact is guilty of folly. He does need to improve himself and equip himself intellectually and spiritually all he can. This means education. This can be done in different ways. In fact, no one way alone is as good as a combination of several ways. A man with only limited common school training can take his English Bible, a good work on the doctrine, a good Baptist history and a few dollars' worth of good, sound books, and become a right good minister of Jesus Christ. But every man who can do so had better avail himself of all the advantages of a good college and theological seminary education so that he may have the very best mental training, that he may use the scriptures in their original languages, that he may be a close and accurate thinker, that he may thoroughly set forth the doctrines and the facts of God's Word, and that he may refute thoroughly the many heresies that he may meet. The best school for number one good theological training our Baptist world offers to our young ministers is the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Ft. Worth, Tex. Its teaching is so sound that after one gets all the training the schools may give him, he needs to get all the help and improvement from good books that his time and money can furnish him. In all his study and thinking, he should be exceedingly careful to be orthodox. He should know something. The needs of our age demand just such men. Let every Baptist preacher strive to be such as far as he can. Baptists have all the truth. Their schools are inferior to none. So let our ministers equip themselves to fully use their glorious store of doctrines to the great glory of God! Let them do this to a correct and full carrying out of the Great Commission to evangelize the nations. And let them be careful, in all their work, to educate themselves to the common people and for the common people.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We the Fayetteville Baptist Association have this to say on the matter of foreign missions:

(1) Missions is a fundamental doctrine with all regular, primitive Baptists. This is especially true of foreign missions. The very purpose of Christianity in the world is world-wide evangelism. The Great Commission is world-wide evangelism. Baptists alone have a pure, primitive Christianity in all things—the faith, the true faith, the whole faith, nothing more and nothing less, that was once for all delivered to the saints. Baptists alone have the Great Commission. It was given to no other people. No other creed can carry it out. So let us do our best with our prayers and with our sentiments and our money and our efforts to evangelize the nations.

(2) Let us in this great God-given work be careful not to get swept off our feet by the modern, delusive, hurtful, sickly,

sentimental unionism so much in the air of late. So far our Southern Baptists have always kept the right course in this matter. May God ever keep them that way. Let us forever keep out of all entangling alliances with all man-made churches in this work of foreign missions.

(3) In this work, it should be insisted that much care and pains-taking be used to send no missionary to the foreign field except such a one who is exceedingly sound in all the doctrines and practices of our ancient, holy faith. Send no man tainted with rationalism, the higher criticism, Arminianism, Unitarianism or any other loose or hurtful tendency. The churches should help in this matter very greatly by being far more careful in ordaining men to preach.

We are glad to report an increase in the Sunday School work over last year's report among the churches in the association, yet we are sorry to report 9 churches making no report on Sunday School work which we feel that we are not living up to our privilege along the line of the Sunday School work. We feel that it is our duty to educate and train our children and
