## PROCEEDINGS.

### First Day—Morning Session.

The Howard County Association met with Antioch Church at 10 o'clock a. m. After singing, the moderators read the third chapter of Colossians. Prayer by J. H. Milburn. The moderator declared the Association organized and ready for business. By request of the moderator the messengers presented their credentials from the respective churches. Brethren J. W. Hill, D. W. Cornish and A. J. Robins were appointed as a committee to read the letters. The committee proceeded with the reading. When the hour of 11 o'clock a. m. the time appointed to have the Associational Session preached arrived, it was moved, by L. M. Webb, that the Association suspend business for preaching. The applier, C. W. Satchland, being present, had the services opened with song and prayer. After prayer he read several portions of scripture, with comments on each. He used as a text the first Epistle of John. His theme was love and obedience.

After preaching, the Association was, by motion, adjourned, for refreshments, to meet at 2 p. m. At 2 o'clock p. m. the Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer was offered by Brother J. L. Baggett. The committee proceeded to read the letters and enroll names of the messengers as follows:

After all letters presented had been read, the moderator called for petitionary letters. The roll of members was called.

The moderator announced the next order of business was the election of moderator and clerk for the ensuing year. On motion, by Brother Story, the rules were suspended and R. D. Neal was instructed to call the roll of this body for J. T. Holt for moderator for the ensuing year, which was accordingly done, and J. T. Holt was declared duly elected moderator of this Association. On motion, by D. W. Cornish, the rules were suspended and J. T. Holt was directed to cast the vote of this body for R. D. Neal for clerk for the ensuing year, which was accordingly done and R. D. Neal was declared duly elected clerk of this Association.

The moderator called for business and the following resolution was offered by Brother A. J. Robins:

Whereas we are dissatisfied with the present existing character of the State Conventions and its methods of state relations work, therefore be it

Resolved, That this, the Howard County Association, withdraw from said State Convention, and be it further

Resolved, That this Association co-operate with the General Association of this state in prosecuting state relations work, believing it to be more in accordance with the Gospel plan.

Brother Robins moved its adoption without discussion. The question was called and the resolution was adopted, as read, by a large majority.

By motion and second the Association selected Pleasant Grove Church as the place to hold the first fifth Sunday meeting.

The moderator appointed the following committees:

**Devotional Services**—O. B. Stone, J. T. Burns, the pastor and deacons of each church.

**Finance**—Joseph W. Hill, Willie Brown and J. M. Harper.

There were three churches petitioning for the next annual session of this Association, to-wit—Pleasant Valley, Liberty and Athens. After considerable speech making by the members of each church presenting the claims of their church as strong as possible, the vote was had and Athens was declared the choice of this body.

By motion this association selected corresponding messengers to the following associations: Red River, J. M. Copeland, A. J. Robbins; Union, W. R. Story; Southwestern, J. W. Hill, J. T. Holt and T. H. Westbrook.

The committee on Divine services submitted a partial report as follows:

Rev. D. W. Cornish will preach at this church at 7:30 o'clock this evening. Prayer meeting, conducted by Brother Gordon Harris, at this church, at 9 o'clock a. m., tomorrow, the 26th. Dr. J. H. Milburn will preach at 11 a. m. Rev. Thomas Bennett at 8 o'clock p. m.

The committee on arrangements proceeded to assign the messengers to their respective homes, after which the Association adjourned to meet at 8:30 o'clock a. m. Monday the 27th. Prayer offered by Rev. E. Merrill.

### **Sunday Services.**

At 9 a. m. Brother Gordon Harris, having been appointed to conduct the services, assembled the congregation by song and proceeded with the prayer services, which lasted until 10 o'clock. The usual form of services on such occasions were observed. After the service was concluded the seats were moved to the grove, as the house was too small to hold the great concourse of people.

At 11 a. m. the congregation was assembled by singing. Brother J. H. Milburn rose to address the great mass of people, the majority of which were standing, as the seats were insufficient to seat one-third of the crowd. His subject was the design and mode of baptism. He preached under very difficult circumstances. After the sermon, which was closed about mid-way by the congregation stampeding on account of a shower of rain) a collection, amounting to \$27.15 was taken for associational missions. The congregation was dismissed for refreshments.

### Third Day—Morning Session.

The messengers met at 9 o'clock a. m., after singing and prayer offered by Brother John Hubbard, the moderator announced the body ready for business. By motion and second Brother R. M. Copeland was called as a messenger from County Line church, and Brother J. T. Corbett from County Line. The moderator called for reports of committees.

The committee on Orphans' Home submitted their report as follows:

Resolving from reports that the Orphans' Home, situated at Most cells, Ark., under the care of Mrs. Hester Hyatt Oardner, is one of the best institutions of the Baptist denomination in the state. We find that there are fifty five orphans now in the home, which is a beautiful brick building, but not yet completed, with a good, nice farm for the boys to learn to farm. These children are under the parental care of Sister Oardner. They are taught God's word and everything else that tends to make children better. But these things all cost money. Therefore brethren let us come to their aid. Help in this work by earnest prayer and money. Let us give liberally and do all we can for this noble institution.

The committee on State Missions submitted their report as follows:

We your committee recommend, that inasmuch as the Association has advised the withdrawal of the churches from the State Convention, that we refer the matter of doing state mission work to the churches, believing that they have the wisdom and sovereign right to decide the question, but do recommend that every church pray for and contribute to the evangelizing of the state, for to neglect to promote the Gospel in every part of our growing state 's to imperil the peace of our homes and churches and the salvation of our children, because of the false teaching of others, and further it would be refusing to carry out that

part of the constitution of our land and nation. "We go into all the world and preach the gospel."

The committee on ministerial support submitted their report as follows:

We remember the fact that preaching the gospel is the most noble calling that has ever engaged the heart and mind of mortal man. There is nobility in accomplishing the great work which God has committed to the work of study and preaching. Now that he may be able to do this he must have the hearty and proper support co-operation of the membership of all the churches he serves. He must be paid enough to send all the temporal wants of himself and family. We remember that those ministers who paid monthly or quarterly. The scriptural fact that they that preach the gospel shall live of the gospel. We therefore recommended that volunteers and brethren who are not paid and for each other that each may faithfully discharge their respective duties on this, and all other lines of duty. Signed,

Inasmuch as infidelity, skepticism, romanism and many other false theories have discarded the Bible and religious worship and teaching from many of the schools and colleges throughout our country. And since we believe the Baptists are the only people who have held to and taught the whole truth advocated by Jesus Christ our great teacher and Savior, and believing that the future of our doctrine is the evangelization of the world and the preservation of our doctrine are largely dependent upon educated and trained men and believing that our denominational schools and colleges are the places to secure this needed Christian education and training. Therefore we recommend to our brethren and people generally the affiliation of our colleges and academies as conducted by our brethren throughout the state. We would call especial attention to Onaschita College for both young men and women, and Central College for young men only. We pledge our support to the same. We especially recommend

Quinn's College is the place for our young students to receive a thorough college education and training.

We believe the subject of family devotion is one of great import. We believe that it is the duty of every Baptist family to erect and maintain a family altar. Reading God's word and praying with and for the family is a source of growth in Grace and instrumental in bringing up our children in the nurture of the Lord.

The committee on evils of intemperance submitted their report as follows:

We your committee would emphasize the direct and positive teaching of the Bible on the question of temperance. In this report we call attention to the one question of drinking and add in the selling of intoxicating liquors. The liquor question is the great question of the day, inasmuch as it affects the individual, the home, the church, the state and our Christian civilization. We protest against any Bag that being a drinker of intoxicating liquors, even in a moderate degree, for if we can stop the moderate use of liquor we will prevent drunk savans, and all its consequent evils. We all place ourselves on record as opposed to license. Every lover of the Lord Jesus should vote against, not only license, but against the candidates for office who are known to favor the sale of liquor. Every church should keep its membership pure on this question and recommend church discipline, not only against the drunkard but those who vote for license or in any way favor its sale. We also enter our protest against the too free use of the pardoning power in favor of the violators of the liquor law.

The report of the executive board was submitted as follows:

That we have inquired carefully as to the destitution in our association and find that there is but a very small portion without a



before church, and we have arranged for preaching there, looking to an organization of churches. However we feel every word of action required under the work of our denomination, who will help that they may become self sustaining. We have granted help to the poor, of every age who have applied during the year, and believe such good has come to those churches, and to us as a result. We therefore recommended a continuation of our present plan of work, primarily restrictions to be taken and sent up by the churches to the board. We urge our people, and especially our preachers who are asked by the board to preach our H. B. Sunday meetings and report on the work done which will be helpful to all. We have received from the churches, with the collections \$120.00, of the session \$28.50 and by a total of \$148.50 of which sum we have paid as follows: Supply salary and gas on to Providence church \$20.00, Dorset church \$15.00, Providence church \$15.00, Eden church \$15.00, Barnstable church \$15.00, Cedar Hill church \$5.00, that church being without a pastor, three months of the time. We have paid for aid in building Protestant savings and churches that resulted in \$42.00. We have forwarded to foreign missions \$25.00. Total amount expended \$120.00, leaving to raise Treasury \$27.50, desiring to have to add this body to the sum of so they will not lose. Thanking you for your interest towards us, we respectfully urge our people from Executive Board.
