CONSTITUTION

As Amended at 1933 Session and 1943 Session

Article I.—NAME

The name of this body shall be Pulaski County Baptist Association.

Article II.—OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to aid the churches in their divinely appointed work of spreading the Kingdom of God throughout the whole world by every Scriptural means.

Article III.—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist Churches, which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Constitution and desire to co-operate with this Association, who shall be entitled to seats upon the presentation of letters from their churches or other satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof above one hundred.

Section 3. Messengers from churches desiring to affiliate with this Association shall present to the Association petitionary letters or other evidence setting forth the Articles of Faith on which the churches were organized together with satisfactory evidence of the regularity of their organization. They shall be received into the Association only by unanimous vote as cast by the body.

Article IV.—AUTHORITY

This Association shall never exercise any legislative or ecclesiastical authority over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the rights and absolute independence of the churches of Christ.

Article V.—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the opening of each annual session by a majority of all the votes cast at such meeting. Provided, however, that the Moderator shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all sessions of the Association or call some one to occupy the chair temporarily in his absence, and may exercise the same privilege of discussion as any other member of the Association.

Section 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Association and shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of each session as he may be directed by the Association.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of every kind entrusted to his care, and shall disburse the same upon the order of the Association and shall make an itemized report of all such funds to the Association before the close of each annual session.

Article VI.—ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD

Section 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of one lay member, elected by each co-operating church, together with the pastors of such churches, and the officers of the Association and the Superintendents of W. M. U. Work. Seven members of said Board shall constitute a quorum to transact business, after notice has been given all members of the Board of such meeting.

Section 2. This Board shall co-operate with the churches in this Association in informing and arousing the churches in gathering and disbursing of funds for all of the causes fostered by this Association and shall transact all of the business of the Association in the interim of the annual meeting of the Association.

Article VII.—MEETING

This Association shall meet annually on Monday night after the second Sunday in October at 7:30 o'clock.

Article VIII.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual session of the association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any annual meeting, provided that the substance of Article IV shall never be abrogated.

RULES OF ORDER (BY-LAWS)

As Amended at 1933 Session

- I. Each Session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- II. The following shall be the order of exercises:
 1. Body called to order by the Moderator or, in his absence, by brethren in the following order of precedence: clerk, treasurer, pastor of entertaining church.
 2. Devotional Service.
 3. Presentation of letters and the enrollment of messengers.
 4. Permanent organization.
 5. Introductory Sermon.
 6. Petitionary Letters.
 7. Reception of visitors, corresponding messengers from other bodies and introduction of new pastors.
 8. Appointment of program committee which shall recommend a schedule for all reports and other matters to come before the body, subject to the Association's approval.
 9. Appointment of committees as follows: (1) Association Missions; (2) State Missions; (3) Home Missions; (4) Foreign Missions; (5) Colleges and Schools; (6) Religious Literature; (7) Bible (Sunday) Schools; (8) Ministerial Education; (9) Orphan's Home; (10) Christian Stewardship; (11) Hospitals; (12) Woman's Work; (13) Young People's Work; (14) Digest of Letters; (15) Obituaries; (16) Resolutions; (17) Finance; (18) Temperance; (19) Nominations.
- III. Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator. In discussion all personalities shall be avoided. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without special permission from the Association.
- IV. Mell's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard in deciding questions of parliamentary practice.
- V. The minutes of the preceding day shall be read and approved at the meeting of each morning session and at close of the Association meeting.
- VI. Such offerings may be taken at the annual meeting of the Association as the body may direct.
- VII. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present, or suspended by unanimous vote.
- VIII. The Associational Board shall meet monthly at such time and place as the Board itself may determine.
- IX. A doctrinal sermon shall be preached during each annual session at such an hour as each program committee shall provide.
- X. The second night of the Association shall be known as B. Y. P. U. night, and a program planned accordingly in connection with Associational B. Y. P. U.

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY

Monday, October 4, 1943

Evening Session

1. On Monday, October 4, 1943, at 7:30 P. M., the TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL SESSION of the Pulaski County Baptist Association met in the auditorium of the Reynolds Memorial Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, with more than 300 messengers and visitors present.

2. At 7:30 P. M. Otto Sutton, Moderator of the Association, called the body to order for the transaction of the business.

3. The Congregational singing was conducted by Robert McMillan and such songs as "Blessed Assurance", "Standing on the Promises" and "Christ Receives Sinful Men" were a blessing to all. The Singing was the very best.

4. The opening Devotional was led by Harvey Elledge, Baring Cross Church and he read, very impressively, the Sermon on the Mount as spoken by Jesus. He led in Prayer.

5. Prayer was offered by Deacon Thompson, Pulaski Heights Church.

E. Bellue, Pastor of Broadway, North Little Rock.

7. In the matter of election of Officers, Otto Sutton, Calvary Church, was re-elected Moderator and H. W. Ryan, Pine Grove Church, re-elected Vice-Moderator. Taylor Stanfill was re-elected Clerk and Deacon I. E. Taylor of Pulaski Heights Church was elected Treasurer.

14. The morning Devotional was brought by R. F. Weeks, pastor of First Baptist Church, Douglasville. He read from the Eleventh Chapter of John and urged that all cares be taken to Jesus and left with Him. He led in prayer.

15. The Committee on Benevolent Institutions reported. The report was given by the Chairman, L. H. Roseman, who discussed the report briefly and Mrs. Rudisill and Miss Cobb from the Hospital personnel were presented.

BENEVOLENT INSTITUTIONS REPORT OF BAPTIST STATE HOSPITAL

The Baptist State Hospital is closing its twenty-third year of service to the sick and afflicted. The hospital continues to show a decided increase in the amount of work being done. This past year there were admitted 7,965 patients, and in addition the hospital treated 1,099 out-patients for minor injuries and illnesses. There were 71,282 patient days of caring for the sick rendered. This is more than 16,000 patient days increase over the previous year. Our charities amounted to over \$50,000 for the year ending June 30, 1943.

There was a decided increase in the number of babies born this year over last. The number for the year ending June 30 was 844. Many of these are children of service men, and a small flag is placed at the foot of the baby's bed, showing he has the honor of having a service man for his father. The hospital provides most helpful literature on infant care for each new mother. This service is greatly appreciated.

At the last meeting of the American Hospital Association held recently at Baltimore, a Baptist Hospital Association was formed, composed of the heads of Southern Baptist Hospitals. This is certainly a step forward in the Baptist Hospital World. Of course, the Baptist State Hospital belongs to the American Hospital Association and the Protestant Hospital Association, also the Arkansas Hospital Association.

This new organization will hold its first meeting in New Orleans next January. Mr. John Dudley, Administrator of our Baptist State Hospital, has been elected as secretary of the new Southwide Baptist Hospital Association.

World conditions today are demanding a large increase in the number of trained nurses. Our government is stressing the need for nurses to care for the sick and injured in our armed forces. Then, there is the local need to be met as the trained nurses are inducted into the services of our country. Many of the Baptist Hospital's graduate nurses are now serving on foreign fields. An earnest appeal is made for young ladies between the ages of 17 and 30, with High School education, good health, and pleasing personality to enter training for the nursing service. Pastors and friends of young people are asked to recommend young ladies who are anxious to secure training in a profession that offers so many avenues of service.

The Hospital has secured the services of Miss Elma Cobb as Student Secretary for the School of Nursing. She directs the religious life of the students and acts as religious director in visiting patients who are in the hospital.

The blessings of God have manifestly been upon the work of our hospital, and we look unto Him for wisdom and direction in carrying on the work for another year.

REPORT OF BOTTOMS' BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto me." Matt. 25:31-46

People in trouble need assistance. May we keep alive within us sympathy for the unfortunate and concern for all who are in trouble. The name the Baptists of the State have given their enterprise for the care of dependent children is the Bottoms' Baptist Orphanage. The orphanage is directed by a Board of twelve men and women who have been elected by the Convention. Mr. C. R. Pugh is the Superintendent and Mrs. C. R. Pugh the Assistant.

The work of conducting an orphanage is much alike from year to year. Eighty-five children have been cared for. Two girls graduated from high school this spring. A number of our boys joined the armed forces of our country, some in the Navy and others in the Army and defense work. One of our boys is a prisoner of the Japanese Government in the Philippines.

Health: No serious illness; just the usual ailments such as toothache, earache, a few with sprains and a broken collar bone.

Farm: Mr. Culp is our farmer and has put in some hard work trying to produce an abundant crop. Plans were made on a large scale. About ninety acres were planted in corn, hay, potatoes and some vegetables, hoping all would be favorable to a good crop but the late freeze and continued drouth prevented the growth of the seed.

Dairy: It is impossible to grow enough feed for our dairy herd and we have to supplement this by buying dairy feed. Enough butter and milk was produced for the children during the summer but not enough to store for winter use.

Orphanage Truck: We contemplate that the orphanage truck will go out and pick up supplies as usual. Watch the Arkansas Baptist for schedule and dates. It will be impossible for our truck to make the second trip because of gas and tire restrictions. We trust that the chairman in your association will contact each church and have supplies located at one of the towns on the schedule the week the truck is in that district and not your association.

Religious Activities: Conversions, 12; baptisms, 12; church members, 45; study courses, 8; seals and certificates, 150; number attending and taking part in Daily Vacation Bible School, 35; girls attending G. A. Conference, 5; girls attending G. A. Camp at Ferncliff, 4; boys attending R. A. Camp at Ferncliff, 3; tithers, 45; gifts to all missions, around \$80.00.

Needs: We will need all you can spare to share. Canned vegetables, fruit, syrup, potatoes, onions, rice, cheese, cocoa; anything to eat. If we had not received a good supply last fall of these things mentioned the children would not and could not have had enough to eat because of the points and prices.

Appreciation: We who labor with your orphan children are deeply grateful for your gifts of food, clothing and cash. The gifts you make through the Co-operative Program and the love offerings from individuals and organizations make it possible for us to give the children special treats occasionally. In these days of suffering and sorrow let us not forget the words of our Saviour when He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

16. The Work of Associational Missions was presented by Taylor Stanfill and the report was adopted. The following Program of work was adopted to be followed for 1943-44.

REPORT OF MISSION COMMITTEE AND SUPERINTENDENT

At the 27th Annual meeting of this body, held at Calvary Baptist Church, Little Rock, we were named as a Committee to direct the work of Associational Missions for the Associational year of 1942-43. We are glad to make the following report of our stewardship.

At the first Meeting of the Board and Workers Conference, held in November, at High Street Baptist Church, a "10 Point Program" was suggested and adopted. We selected 10 things we wanted to accomplish during the Associational year. These things were emphasized and checked at each Associational meeting and all the churches were kept informed of the work. Progress was very satisfactory.

Early in the Associational year correspondence was carried on with the Home Mission Board, relative to the City Mission Program as sponsored by the Home Mission Board. Later, Dr. S. F. Dowis, Superintendent of this work came to Little Rock and conferred with members of this committee at a dinner meeting. The City Mission Program was explained to members of the Executive Board of this Body in session and the Board voted heartily to ask the Mission Committee to continue correspondence with the Home Board and perfect arrangements with the Board at Atlanta for Little Rock to be included in the City Mission Program. Dr. Dowis again visited Little Rock, in March, 1943, and the plans were perfected and Rev. Taylor Stanfill was selected as Superintendent of City Association Missions for Greater Little Rock Area and Pulaski County. He was officially elected to this position by the Home Mission Board of Atlanta, Ga., in regular meeting, April 1, 1943, and began his duties that day.

The work had gone steadily on to this point, embracing first half of the Associational year.

The Committee met with the newly elected Superintendent and the decision was to continue on a Ten Point Program for the remaining 6 months of the Associational year, as follows:

Tentative Program

1. It was decided that efforts should continue in the establishment of new Missions and Chapels. At that time we had 8 mission stations and chapels on record. Plans were made to co-ordinate and report this work and we now have 15 mission stations and chapels. Immanuel Baptist Church sponsors 8; First Baptist Church, Little Rock, sponsors 3; Baring

Cross Baptist Church, North Little Rock, sponsors one and three rural churches have one each—Graves Memorial, Zion Hill and Pine Grove. The 15 Mission Stations and Chapels have an average attendance in Sunday School of 500 with additions to the churches regularly through these places of worship.

2. A second point of work was that of Revival meetings. This was emphasized all through June, July, August and September and to date more than 45 revival meetings have been conducted in the county. Total additions through these meetings is not known. Nearly all the churches conducted at least one revival meeting and all the Mission Stations and Chapels will have revivals before the calendar year is over.

3. A third part of our task is to conduct religious services in all the public institutions in the county, as jails, penal institutions, schools, etc. This work has not been co-ordinated and results have not been tabulated. However individual churches are doing work for Christ's Glory in all the Institutions of the county. We hope to be able to work out a system of services for all the institutions and that regular reports will be available of this work.

4. The Committee secured a full time team to do Vacation Bible School work for June, July and August. Rev. and Mrs. Chas. Hampton were selected for this work and they did a fine piece of work in 6 or 7 rural areas. More than 20 Vacation Bible Schools were conducted in the county this summer. Complete figures of this work will be found in report of Rev. Ralph Davis, in Report of Church Organizations.

5. The Organization of Bible Classes for Bible Instruction in Homes, Instructions, Housing Areas was stressed and the Committee believes this to be a very profitable work.

6. A Tract Ministry was emphasized and many of our churches have a Tract Ministry in the building, beside the many people who make it their business to distribute religious literature.

7. Regular and enlarged contributions through the Co-operative Program and to the work of Associational Missions were kept before all the churches and we note an increased total through the Co-operative Program from all the churches in the county and the support of the Associational work has been entirely adequate.

8. Point Eight of the Tentative program called for a full time ministry, as far as possible, to all rural churches. The Committee suggested pastor supplement in many instances and we are happy that practically all the churches, which now have pastors, have a full time ministry.

9. Definite co-operation with the already existing Associational Organizations was followed and these organizations have been in charge of the workers meetings from time to time. Through these organizations a fine spirit was manifest in group schools, simultaneous and individual schools for definite study and training. It has been one of our best years in Teacher Training and Training Union Work, especially in Study and Training.

10. It was the policy of the committee to sponsor or lead the monthly meetings of the workers of the Association. These meetings have been held each month on the first Friday night, with one exception and the spirit and attendance has been far above previous years.

This is the end of this TENTATIVE PROGRAM ARRANGEMENT and this body will present definite program of work for the Associational year of 1943-44. The past efforts will be helpful to us. Perhaps corrections should be made in some instances.

Personal Report of Superintendent

Days spent on the field, 168; spent 10 days at Ridgecrest and 5 at Siloam Assembly; Traveled in the county 5,796 miles in my own car in six months; Visited 32 fields; Surveyed 12 fields for work; Two religious surveys or census; Conducted or attended 32 Conferences and committee meetings, directly relating to this work; Attended 17 Associational conferences or Committee meetings; Conducted 8 funerals; Participated in 2 ordination services; Participated in 15 special services; Conducted 4 revival meetings; Preached 114 sermons; Conducted 19 prayer meetings; Taught 16 Bible Classes; Witnessed 54 additions to churches for baptism and 51 by letter—105 additions to the churches, and saw 180 re-dedications.

A Personal Word

The spirit and attitude of all the brethren has been very helpful and encouraging. We give thanks to the Lord for the "PREACHER BRETHREN." We appreciate and love them and pray for them.

18. Time having arrived for report of Committee on Church Organizations Ralph W. Davis, Chairman, prepared and read the report printed below.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH
ORGANIZATIONS**

In view of the conditions which have existed in the past year, we are able to bring an encouraging report of the various organizations of our churches. According to the reports from the State department there are 918 Sunday Schools in Arkansas with an enrollment of 114,970. According to the minutes there are 424 churches which have reported a Training Union, and there are at least 200 other churches which have a Training Union that did not report through the Associational Minutes. In 1942 there were 184 Vacation Bible Schools held in Arkansas.

At this time we are primarily interested in the report of the work done in Pulaski County during the past year.

Sunday School

There are 60 Sunday Schools in Pulaski County Association. During 1942 there were 13 Standard Sunday Schools, and during the first nine months of 1943 the following 7 Sunday Schools have been reported as Standard Schools: First, N. L. R.; Central, N. L. R.; Reynolds Memorial; Immanuel, Little Rock; and three Immanuel missions: Bethany Mission, N. L. R.; Riverside Mission, Little Rock, and Broadway Mission, N. L. R. On October 1, 1943, there were 32 Standard Sunday Schools in Arkansas.

During the past 12 months, from October 1, 1942, to September 21, 1943, there were 1,219 Sunday School Study Course awards granted to the churches in our Association. During the first nine months of 1943; 962 Sunday School awards were granted to the following 26 Sunday Schools:

Reynolds Memorial, 56; Broadway Mission, 8; Immanuel, L. R., 359; First, L. R., 96; Calvary, L. R., 4; Pulaski Heights, 11; Second, Little Rock, 32; Baptist Tabernacle, 46; Woodlawn, 12; Baring Cross, N. L. R., 36; Central, N. L. R., 75; Hebron, 7; Geyer Springs, 5; Jacksonville, 6; First, N. L. R., 26; Douglasville, 13; Levy, 9; Mt. View, N. L. R., 43; South Highland, 16; Nall's Memorial, N. L. R., 8; Iron-ton, 34; High Street, 24; Bellevue, 5; Sweet Home, 9; Worrell's Memorial, 12; Graves Memorial, 11; Total, 962.

Training Union

In Pulaski County Association our number of individual unions in the Training Union was 260, with an enrollment of 3,440, according to the 1942 minutes. Last year only seven churches report no Training Union work.

During the first nine months of 1943, there have been 1,007 Training Union Study Course awards granted to the following 24 churches:

Reynolds Memorial, 25; Immanuel, L. R., 123; Bethel, 18; Pulaski Heights, 22; Baring Cross, N. L. R., 167; First, L. R., 119; Hebron, 9; Central, N. L. R., 40; Woodlawn, L. R., 20; Jacksonville, 25; First, N. L. R., 129; Levy, 28; Sylvan Hills, 18; Second, L. R., 25; Douglasville, 65; South Highland, 74; Iron-ton, 7; Hanger Hill, 20; Bellevue, 20; Worrell's Memorial, 26; Graves Memorial, 4; Shady Grove, 17; High Street, 4; Life Line, 2; Total, 1,007.

Vacation Bible Schools

The Vacation Bible School report for Pulaski County Association is very encouraging. In 1939 there were 16 Vacation Bible Schools conducted, in 1940 there were 12. In 1941 we led the State with 19, but in 1942 we held only 11. However, we broke all records this year with 22 Vacation Bible Schools conducted in the following churches or missions: Baring Cross, N. L. R.; Central, N. L. R.; First, N. L. R.; Tabernacle, Woodlawn, Immanuel, Reynolds Memorial, Second, Geyer Springs, Calvary, Hebron, Ironton, Life Line, Levy, Pulaski Heights, South Highland, Friendship, Bethany, Riverside Mission, Highway Missions, Pine Grove, Sunset Terrace, Hanger Hill, and North Point.

The success of this work has been due, in part, to the work of Bro. and Mrs. Hampton of Arkadelphia who were employed by the Association to conduct Vacation Bible Schools during the months of July and August.

19. The Program now called for a Gospel Sermon and arrangements had been made for the Executive Secretary of Arkansas Baptist State Convention, B. L. Bridges, to preach the sermon. He read Psalms 6:16 and preached a wonderful sermon on "OUR BAPTIST HERITAGE."

SECOND DAY**Tuesday, October 5, 1943****Afternoon Session**

20. After a bounteous lunch served by Reynolds Memorial Church and a fine Christian fellowship, the afternoon session came to order as C. E. Lawrence led in congregational singing of "On Jordan's Stormy Banks I Stand" and "Amazing Grace." J. T. Summers of Trinity Association led in prayer.

21. The afternoon devotional was conducted by M. E. Faulkner, Pastor, Ironton Church. He read from Luke 2:41-51 and emphasized the necessity of our being about our Father's Business. He led in prayer.

22. The Chairman of the Committee on State, Home and Foreign Missions, Thomas L. Harris, Pastor, First Baptist Church, North Little Rock, made the report for the committee and it was adopted. All agree that the Missionary message given by Brother Harris as he spoke to the report was the best ever heard in our Association.

MISSIONS**Foreign**

We come to the closing scenes of one of the happiest years we have witnessed in carrying out the Commission of Our Lord. While the world is in the throes of a death struggle to determine whether the rights, that our fathers fought so valiantly to secure, shall endure. Our task of carrying the Gospel to foreign lands has never suffered quite so much, because of the conditions occasioned by the ravages of war. Yet we are getting ready for the greatest effort we have ever attempted as soon as conditions abroad will permit. On March 12, this year, our Foreign Mission Board paid the last payment on the debt that ten years ago was more than a million and a half dollars. We now have 481 missionaries and 78 workers who are retired. During the last year we have given near a million dollars to World Emergency Relief, and in this matter we have barely begun. While we have returned 40 missionaries from war torn fields there are still 52 missionaries interned in Japanese controlled countries. Many of our fields of labor are now closed, but we believe that when this horror is ended we shall have opened to us a larger and more glorious opportunity than we have ever known.

Home Missions

Our great and ever expanding program of Missions in the home land was never stronger or more blessed. During the year the burdensome debt that at one time reached the staggering proportion of nearly two and a half million dollars, has been paid. More than six hundred thousand dollars of this amount was received from Hundred Thousand Club.

There are now 435 workers in the employ of our board, 13 of them were added this year together with 43 new stations. The Board has added new departments, one of which is the department of City Missions. One of these cities chosen for this work is Little Rock with Bro. Taylor Stanfill as missionary. The next department to be added will be one to help the country churches.

Dr. J. W. Beagle, Phil. 4:19, who has for years been Field Secretary in charge of Missions in the home land, retired this year.

State Missions

Our program provides for 5 State Evangelists with 3 at work at present, and 28 Associations are receiving aid from our State Board to keep missionaries on the field. The State Evangelists now working are Rev. J. I. Cossey of Northeast District, Rev. O. M. Stallings of Northwest District, Rev. Elmer F. Cox of North Central District.

We are operating two centers for soldiers: one in Little Rock, and one in Fort Smith. In these Centers we offer everything for the comfort and spiritual help of our young men in the service of our Country. We certainly should take advantage of the opportunity offered by the thousands of Japanese who are located in the Relocation Centers at Rohwer and Jerome. These people are more than 90% of them loyal to their adopted country. Every one of them that we win to Christ becomes a potential missionary to his own people here and in the native land.

The many defense plants in our State offer challenges to the churches and leaders in the vicinity of these plants.

The budget that will come before our State Convention this Fall, for your consideration, is the most challenging we have proposed for many years. We trust every possible church will make special preparation to study State Missions in your Sunday School on October 24 and that you will take a special offering for State Missions that the great program may even still be enlarged for the glory of God.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Facts and figures seem to justify the conclusion that Southern Baptists have led all other denominations in the field of Christian Education. We should be truly grateful to God for his blessings upon our efforts to teach all ages the Word of God and to lead people to believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and seek His way of life.

The program of Christian Education is broad and inclusive. Teaching in the Christian home, instruction in the Sunday School, training in the Training Union, higher education in the Christian College and other kindred means all constitute the program of Christian Education. Wherever and whenever Christian knowledge and experience is entered into, Christian Education is at work.

As Christian churches we face many perils—some old and some new. Lower moral standards, juvenile delinquency, divorce, religious indifference, neglect of home and children due to the employment of both father and mother in industry, the tragic increase of liquor consumption,—these and a multitude of other problems call forth and challenge the compassion and love of the friends of Christ. The basic and prime objective of Christian Education is the destruction of sin in our midst and salvation from sin. We believe Christ is the only answer.

Therefore, may we prayerfully resolve to strengthen our Sunday Schools, our Training Schools, our churches, our Christian homes, our Christian colleges, our publication and distribution of Christian literature and periodicals, and our evangelistic efforts. Every possible means for bringing people under the teaching and preaching of the Word of God should be strengthened in every possible way by our Baptist churches. It calls for a crusading spirit. This is the comprehensive program of Christian education.

26. V. E. Bellue, Pastor, Broadway Chapel, North Little Rock, prepared and read the report on Stewardship which was adopted and printed as follows:

REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP

Your Committee on Stewardship reports as follows:

Jesus had much to say about stewards and stewardship. By this He meant one who managed the affairs of another. The word really means housekeeper. So the steward wasn't owner but manager under the supervision of his master.

In the parable of the wicked husbandmen He reveals God's attitude toward the wicked steward.

To the rich young ruler Jesus said, "Use all that you possess to lay up treasure in Heaven which you can enjoy throughout eternity."

In the parable of the unjust steward He tells us to use all that we have in making friends that will love us and welcome us upon our entrance into the everlasting dwelling place.

In the parables of the talents and the pounds He states truths that apply to both classes of stewards: the good and the bad. From these and other of His teachings we glean several great truths about stewardship:

1. God owns all. Because of this we are only managers under His supervision.

2. The amount of goods that each was entrusted with was determined by ability. Some have less ability than others. God expects less of one who has little ability than of one who has much ability.

3. All were free to choose how they would use what God had given. God doesn't restrain us in any way to use it contrary to our wills. But His love in our hearts moves us to will what He wants. Thus we are stewards by His grace and our choice.

4. Each had to give an account of the way he handled his lord's goods. No one knew when he would return. So they were forced to be always ready.

5. All were to show a gain at their lord's return.

6. The lord praised the one with two talents as he did the one with five because he had done all that he had the ability to do. The work was as hard for the man with two talents as it was for the man with five because of the difference in ability.

7. The one who refused to use his talent had it taken away and he, himself, was rejected from being a servant and cast out of his lord's presence because the way he had managed his lord's affairs proved that he was not his master's servant. We don't purchase salvation by our stewardship but

we prove by our use of God's gifts whether we are His servants. It is a visible test by which we gain the assurance that we are the children of God. By this we know we are the children of God: we love the brethren—God's elect ones. We love to the extent that we are willing to give. Thus we prove our kinship to the Father who loved to the extent that He gave His son for ones He loved.

We believe that the tithe is the minimum amount that we are to give to the spreading of God's kingdom since it is the only specified amount given by revelation.

As good stewards we are to use not more than ninety per cent for ourselves. But we are to use even this in a way that will make us most useful in God's kingdom. We are to use at least ten per cent to make God's kingdom most useful and helpful to ourselves and to others.

WORK AMONG ARMED FORCES

"Time's scythe has swept another year,
And bound it in its sheaf,
And, in all our life book God's strong
Hand hath folded down another leaf."

Another year has become history, and been consigned to the past.

It has taken its toll from our friends. There has been sadness and sorrow, parting and pleasure. But we do not forget the many blessings and joys that have come to us and to our Baptist people through service to our men in the armed forces.

Many men have come to the Center for Soldiers—men to whom the story of redemption from sin, through Christ, was a new story. They have gone away from there praising God for the great gift of salvation, and thanking the Baptists of Arkansas for operating a place where men may come and enjoy the fellowship and friendship of Christian people.

Many men have gone to camps in other States and put into effect programs and plans that they learned in our Center here in Little Rock. As we read letters from these boys telling of such meetings and souls being born into Christ's Kingdom it thrills our very soul.

Your Director visits the camp most every day inviting the men in to the Center, and varied is the service rendered to the soldiers and their wives, from finding rooms and jobs for the wives, to altering the soldiers' clothes. The W. M. U. members of our churches in the country have rendered much valuable service to the men by going in groups to the camp and altering and repairing garments, also by serving on Sunday lunch at the close of our afternoon service, thereby making it possible for the men to attend church and Training Union. Our statistical report shows the work done, the hours we work are from 10 to 14 hours each day. Every hour has been one of service to the men.

Truly God has set before us as Arkansas Baptists a great task and brought the unsaved to our very door.

Since the last Associational meeting at Calvary Church, in 1942, a total of 19,012 soldiers have been our guests at the Center and we have witnessed 63 conversions, altered 2,470 garments and conducted 121 services.

The Young People's Organizations number 70, with a membership of 493; tithers 78, and 24 Study Classes completed. Total gifts to all causes were \$2,828.44.

The amount of money given is not the most important thing by any means. But the training given to our women and young people is all important.

Today of all days we need to train our young people in Christian living. Therefore let us be about our Master's business. For we are laborers together with God.
