# PROCEEDINGS.

SARDIS CHURCH, CONWAY CO., ARK., Septembe . 1884.

The United Association met here to-day at 11 o'clock a. m.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. K. Braudaway, from Matt. 5: 16, after which the body was called to order by the Moderator.

Letters from the churches were called for. Brethren B. R. Womack and A. B. Ledbetter were appointed reading cierks. Letters were read and messengers' names enrolled.

The regular order of business was suspended, and petitionary letters were called for None were presented.

An election was held for officers, resulting in the re-election of J. K. Braudaway, Moderator; J. A. Johnson, re-elected Clerk; and G. L. Wright. Treasurer.

The Moderator appointed R.T. Parks, G. L. Wright, W. L. Crawford and the deacons of Sardis church, a Committee on Devotional Exercises. Adjourned till 4 p. m. Prayer led by Brother Mayall.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body met at 4 o'clock p. m. After devotional exercises, visiting brethren were invited to seats. Brethren E. Sosebee and B. T. Hardin, from the Greenbrier Association, responded, and were welcomed to seats in the body. Also, Brother B. R. Womack, editor of the Evangel, and Brother E. D. Landers, of the Russellville Association. On motion, the roll was called and names corrected.

A committee on Order of Business was appointed, consisting of J. A. Johnson, W. P. Melton, A. B. Ledbetter and E. Soscbee On Home Missions—G. L. Wright, F. M. Caperton and E. A. Woolverton. On Foreign Missions—J. Mayall, W. L. Crawford and E. C. Thornton.

On Foreign Missions—3. Mayaii, W. L. Crawford and E. C. Thornbon.
On Sabbath Schools—M. G. Brewer, James Mahan and James Glidewell.
On Ministerial Education—B. F. Barnes, R. T. Parks and Joseph Costley.
On Publications—W. M. Boone, E. D. Landers and W. F. Winningham.
On Temperance—W. J. Williams, H. L. Momitand W. L. Crawford.
On Special Business—J. Mayail, J. A. Johnson and W. P. Melton.

The report of the Committee on Order of Business was called for. Read and adopted and committee discharged. See report A. Correspondence was called for Elder 1. H. Parker. of the Russellville Association, responded, and was invited to take a seat with the body. The matter of laying off the Association into districts, was assigned to the Committee on Special Business. Adjourned till 8:000'clock next morning.

The stand was occupied at night by Brother Landers.

#### FRIDAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Assectiationmet at 8.000 'clock a. m. and engaged for a short time in devotional exercisas, after which reports of committees were called for

The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted their report. The report was read, and after being discussed by Brethren Womack, Sosebee and Mayall, was adopted. See report n On motion, a committee was appointed consisting of Brethren Womack, Sosehee and Mayall, to prepare and offer a resolution declaring this body to be in sympathy with the Educational Board of our State Convention. The committee offered their report, which was adopted. See resolution No. 1.

On motion, aljourned till 3:00 p. m. Prayer led by Brother Nutt.

Brother Womack delivered a very interesting discourse at II a. m., upon the subject of Justification.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met at 3:00 p. m. Prayer led by Brother Woolverton. The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was called for, and after being discussed by Brethren Mayall. Johnson and Nutt, it was adopted. See report c.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was read. After discussion by Brethren Mayall, Sosebee and Braudaway, the report was adopted. See report D. Adjourned till 9:00 o'clock next morning. Prayer by Brother Womack. Preaching at night by Brother Parker, followed by Brother Gillam. Also, at Mr. Williams', four miles off, by Brother Mayall, followed by Brother Nutt.

### SATURDAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Association met on Saturday morning at 9:00 o'clock. Prayer by Brother Barnes. The call for correspondence was renewed. Visiting brethren were invited to seats, and Elder M. D. Early, of Morrilton, accepted. The report of Committee on Publications was called for, The report was discussed by Brethren Early and Sosebee and re-committed. Brother Early was requested to assist the committee.

Report of Special Committee was called for. Discussed by Brother Mayall and adopted

See report E.

Report of Committee on Publications was called for and re-read. After discussion by

Brethren Early, Mayall and others, the report was adopted. See report F.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools was read. After being discussed by Brethren Mayall and Parker, a motion prevailed to adjourn till 3:00 p. m. Prayer by the Clerk. The stand was occupied at 11:00 a. m. by Brother Early.

# AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at 3:00 p. m. Prayer led by Brother Wright. The report on Sabbath schools was, on motion, adopted. See report a. The Committee on Finance reported, which was adopted. See report n.

On motion, the \$4.00 sent up by the churches for Associational Missions, was ordered to be paid over to the Executive Board to meet the expences of the board for the past year. A

collection was also taken up to finish paying our missionary.

The report of the Executive Board was laid on the table, until the report of the missionary was heard. Brother Braudaway, missionary, made his report, which was received and adopted. See report 1.

The report of the Executive Board was re-committed, and board requested to retire and pare their report. The regular order of business was suspended to give Brother Early an prepare their report

opportunity to address the body on education.

The Executive Board again read their report, which was adopted. See report J. On motion by Brother Braudaway, the subject of Associational Missions was taken up. In response to an appeal made by him, the following brethren pledged \$25.00 each for the support of a missionary: J. K. Braudaway, T. Nutt, E. A. Woolverton, E. C. Thornton, G. L. Wright, W. J. Williams, J. Mayall, J. M. W. Massengill, William Hawkins. The following pledged \$12.50: D. B. Norwood, Parks and Ledbetter. Total amount, \$250, before the body adjourned the board employed Elder E. Sosebee to take the field as Missionary.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was heard and adopted. See report K.
The Assembly agreed to hold the next session with the church at Mountain View, twentyfive miles north of Morritton and near Centre Ridge, Conway county, beginning on Friday

before the second Sabbath in September, 1885.

Elected on Executive noard as follows: G. L. Wright, chairman; D. B. Norwood, E. A. Woodverton, M. Sugg, J. M. W. Massengill. T. Nutt was elected to preach the next introductory sermon; B. M. Stephens, alternate. J. Mayail was elected to preach on missions; J. W. S. Leslie, alternate. Appointed corresponding messengers to the following bodies: State Convention, J. Mayall and T. Nutt; Russellville Association, J. Mayail, J. K. Brandaway and T. Nutt, Greenbrier Association, J. K. Brandaway, J. Mayail, D. B. Norwood, T. Nutt, G. L. Wright.

Minutes were read and adopted A motion to adjourn to the time and place above mentioned prevailed. A hymn was sung and the parting hand given. Prayer led by Brother E. Thornton. J. K. BRAUDAWAY, MODERATOR.

The mission sermon was preached at 11 a, m. by Elder J. mayall, followed by Brother Early. A collection was taken up for Foreign missions by Brother farly, but the amount was by some means inisiald by the Clerk. The exercises of the day, and of the entire session, were very impressive. Those present will doubtless long remember the deep spiritual feeling, the great unanimity of sentiment, and the social enjoyment of this session.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

1. RESOLVED. That the United Association is in harmony with the Educational Commission appointed by the State Convention last year at Fayetteville, and that we, as a body, pledge our hearty sympathy and recommend to our churches to do all that they can in furthering the interests of the important work that commission has in hand.

2 WHEREAS, We steel the working of our Sunday school Convent to be inefficient.

therefore,

RESOLVED, First—That the churches of this body be requested to send their pastors and two of their most cardent pembers to a Convention to be held on Friday before the ditherabbath in march next, at Pleasant Spring meeting-house, for the purpose of perfecting a more permanent organization, and to devise the best means for carrying on Sunday school work.

ILESOLVED, Second-That Elder T. Nutt preach the commencement sermon. Elder J.

Miyali, alternate.

3. RESOLVED, That we tender our thanks to the members of Sardis church, and the citizens of his vicinity, for their hospitable kindness shown to us during the present session. T. NUTT. 4. # REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

EXPORT B -Your committee report that no more important subject can come before this body. Baptists have always been friends to education, but the time has come when every considiration makes it doubly accessary for them to give to the subject of ministerial education the closest attention. The minister should be able in all cases, to lead his people. By appointment of God, he is a teacher; he must therefore be able to teach. It is the duty of churches and older ministers to urge young ministers to get an education, in whole or in part; and if providence has denied them the means of educating themselves, the churches ought to hel) them. Young ministers do not know the importance it is to be educated. They should, thelefore, be ursed to go to school. They should attend common schools, high schools, academies, colleges, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, at Louisville, Ky. recommend that the churches of this Association look out the young men among them and encturage them to go to school.
