MINUTES.

The Clear Creek Baptist Association met this day with Zion Church, Crawford county, in its twenty-seventh Annual Session, and was called to order at 11 o'clock by J. E. Cox, former Secretary.

After song services and prayer, Bro. J. F. Crawford preached the introductory sermon from Romans 8th chapter and 3rd verse. Subject: "The Relation of Law to Salvation." At the close of sermon Bro. H. S. Been, of Concord Association, closed with a few appropriate remarks.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet at 1:30 o'clock p. m.

Prayer by Bro. S. S. Sims.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment at 1:30 o'clock p. m. Singing by the congregation and prayer by Bro. P. C. Mays, Concord Association.

On motion Elder M. A. Pillars was elected Moderator pro tem.

The Moderator appointed Brethren G. W. Barham and P. C. Mays to read letters from the Churches.

Letters were read from the Churches as found in the table and names of messengers enrolled.

The Association then went into an election of officers for the ensuing year. Brethren P. C. Mays, H. S. Been, and Frank Spillers were appointed tellers. While the vote was being taken the Association was addressed by W. W. Gardner in the interest of the Orphans' bome. The tellers reported that Elder M. A. Pillars was elected Moderator and Elder J. E. Cox re elected Clerk, and Bro. W. S. Webb, Treasurer. Bro. Pillars thanked the Association for their confidence in him.

Corresponding messengers called for. Elder H. L. Been and Bro. C. F. Spillers were received from Concord Association, as messengers, and Elder P. C. Mays as a visitor. A corresponding letter was read from Russellville Association, but no messenger.

Elder W. W. Gardner, representing the Baptist Orphans' home at Monticello present; also Bro. R. H. Thompson, from the Arkansas Valley Association. These brethren were invited to seats. Brethren M. E. Henderson, William Campbell, John Watkins, C. C. Watters and J. W. Cain were appointed a committee on divine service.

On motion the following committee was appointed: On Ministers Institute, to meet a like committee from Concord Association; Elders W. M. Hicks, J. H. Blaylock, L. Dyer, J. E. Cox and Bro. M. H. Wagner, committee.

The committee on divine services reported Bro. H. L. Been to preach at the church tonight and W. W. Gardner to morrow at 11 a. m.

A letter was read from Van Buren church and referred to a committee.

On motion adjourned to 7 p. m.

EVENING SESSION.

The Association re-assembled at 7 o'clock, and after sermon by Bro. H. L. Been, the following committees were appointed:

On motion the Association adjourned to meet at 8:30 o'clock Friday morning.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Association re-assembled according to adjournment at 8:30 o'clock. Engaged in devotional exercises, led by Bro. O. W. White. The Association resumed business promptly at 9 o'clock, the Moderator in the chair.

On motion the following brethren were appointed as Committee on Queries: J. W. Cain, M. H. Wagner, H. W. Moore, L. Dyer and J. F. Crawford.

A committee on the letter from Van Buren church was appointed as follows: B. F. Wafford, G. W. C. Lasater and M. H. Wagner.

A petitionary letter was read from Sweet Home church.

On motion the church was received and the right hand of fellowship was extended to the messengers.

Called for reports—Report on Relgious Literatue was read and after being spoken to by several brethren, the report was adopted as follows:

We your committee on Religious Literature would recommend that we first study the Bible prayerfully, as it is the Book of books, and in connection that we take and read the Arkansas Baptist, our state paper, in order that we know the workings of the Baptists in the State, and be posted as to the progress of the same, as it is a good paper and sound in the faith. We also recommend the Baptist Flag, edited by Bro. J. N. Hall, as it is sound in faith and doctrine. We would further recommend that we have colporters, and that they distribute promiseuously Baptist literature in our Association.

For Sunday school literature we would recommend the Southern Baptist, and also the American Publication Society.

The report on Orphans' Home was read. A motion to adopt the report was made. Spoken to by several brethren. Pending the adoption of the report, a collection was taken amounting to \$12.56. Report adopted as follows:

ORPHANS' HOME REPORT.

Your committee would submit the following: It is with pleasure that we can report to you that the Baptists have an Orphans' Home at Monticello, in this state. We have 80 acres of land donated to us by Miss Hannah Hyatt. We now have a building 20x60 feet with six large rooms, and paid for, and full of children. We have eight children in each of three rooms—five beds in each of these three rooms. There are twenty-six children now being cared for and educated. Thirteen of the number have been baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ. What are our needs? More room. The Board is trying to put up the main building—so we can take care of one hundred children. Brethren, our Board must depend upon the Baptists of Arkansas, and they appeal to us to help in this one among our greatest works for the Master, and your com-

mittee would recommend that there be a systematic effort among the churches of this Association to raise money for this purpose. We would suggest that each pastor organize a committee in each of his churches for the furthering of this cause.

A Petitionary letter from the Union Town church was presented by the hand of her messenger, J. F. Rhoden. The letter read, the church received and the hand of fellowship extended to the messenger by the Moderator.

The Association suspended business for preaching. Bro. W. W. Gardner preached at 11 o'clock. Text, Genesis 22nd chapter and 7th verse. Subject: "The Testing of Abraham's Faith."

Or motion the Association adjourned to meet at 1:30 p.m. Benediction by J. E. Cox.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met according to adjournment. prayer by Bro J. W. Cain.

The report on State Missions was read and adopted as follows:

We your committee on State Missions submit the following as our report: The commission given to the Apostles by our Saviour authorized them to go into all the world and to preach the Gospel to every creature.

To preach the Gospel in all the world, we must have a beginning point. Since Arkansas is in great need of the Gospel of Christ, we are justifiable in recognizing the State as a mission field. Hence the propriety of a State Mission.

Resolved 1st, That we should take into consideration not only the moral standing of the people, but the financial standing of the people, also.

Resolved 2nd, That we oppose high salaried missionaries. We should reach the destitute of the state with the Gospel, and reach them with as little burden as possible in the way of missionaries' salaries.

The report on Sunday schools was read and after some remarks was adopted.

We your committee on Sunday Schools would submit the following: That our pastors and the churches and superintendents put forth a more vigorous effort. That we call a Sunday school convention at a time and place to be agreed upon, and that we teach our children the true Word of God, and that our Sunday schools and churches assist and co-operate with our Smnday school missionaries and colporters in their work in some way that will help and encourage them, that we may do more in the next associational year than we have in the present.

The report on Home Missions was read. After a motion was made to adopt the report, some considerable discussion for and against the report was had. A motion was made and carried to amend the report by striking out the word "tenth." The report was then adopted as amended.

We your committee on Home Missions respectfully submit the following report: Jesus Christ the Head of the Church says: "That the church is the pillar and the ground of the truth;" I Tim. 3:15, and Jesus commissioned this church to preach the Gospel to all the world and to every creature; Mark 16:15.

Therefore as the church has the authority to do this work none other but the church can scripturally and by the authority of Christ do this work.

And we find that in the early history of the churches that the churches sent out those whom they thought best and proper to preach; and that the churches paid their wages and expenses; the Lord has said that they who preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. In view of these facts, we your committee would submit the following:

First, that it is the duty of the churches to select the preacher to preach the gospel, and also to appoint the field and direct the work, and

Second, that the burthen of the preaching of the

gospel may be borne by all alike. We recommend that we give liberally as the Lord has prospered.

The report on temperance was read by Bro. H. L. Been. A motion was made to adopt the report. After being discussed at length, the further consideration of the report was postponed until after services tonight.

On motion Bro. J. A. Peeters was appointed corresponding messenger to the Fayetteville Association.

On motion adjourned to meet at 7 p. m.

SECOND DAY-EVENING SESSION.

The Association re-assembled according to adjournment at 7 o'clock.

The stand was filled by Bro. M. W. Pendergrass. Text, Eph. 2nd chapter and 8th verse.

Bro. J. H. Blaylock closed the services by a few appropriate remarks.

After services the report on temperance was taken up and re-read, and after being ably discussed by the brethren, a motion was made to change the report by striking out the word "temperance" and inserting the word "prohibition." The report was then unanimously adopted.

We your committee on Prohibition would report that we regard the use of intoxicating liquors and native wines, as a beverage, a very great curse and detrimental to the health and peace and prosperity and morals of all people, and also a great hindrance to the prosperity of God's Zion. We also regard the moderate dram drinker as an educator in the primary department of the school of drunkenness. We therefore recommend that every Baptist totally abstain from the use of intoxicating liquor as a beverage, and we further recommend every Baptist vote against the manufacturing and sale of them. We

further recommend that every church promptly withdraw from every one who may be found to be intoxicated to any degree.

The report on Queries was read, and after being spoken to by several, the report was adopted.

We your committee on Queries submit the following as our answer: We find the following from Zoar church: "Should a church pay its pastor a stipulated salary? If so, please give Bible proofs. Second, Should the church require all its members to give to the support of the ministry according to their means, and all other expenses of the church?" Our answer to the first query, yes. Paul says in I Corinthians 9th chapter and 14th verse: "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they that preach the gospel should live of the gospel." See II Corinthians, 2nd chapter, 7th and 8th verses; also 12th chapter 12th and 13th verses. Second, we believe that the church should require each member to give as the Lord has prospered him. I Cor. 16th chapter and 2nd verse.

On motion adjourned to 8:30 Saturday morning. Renediction by Bro. Pendergrass.

THIRD DAY __MORNING SESSION.

The Association met at 8:30 o'clock.

Devotional exercise, led by Bro. T. R. Early.

Elder J. S. Spires, from the Arkansas Valley Association, was invited to a seat with us.

The report on Obituaries was read and adopted. (See report in another place).

The report on Foreign Missions was read, and after some

able speeches urging the importance of giving the gospel to every creature, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The committee on Foreign Missions respectfully submits the following report: Whereas, Christ's commandment is to go into all the world and preach his gospel to all people; and the Missionary Baptist church being a missionary church by profession, and the only one that teaches an obedience of all things commanded by Christ. We earnestly recommend that each pastor in our Association preach, at least, two missionary sermons and take up collections for foreign missions; and we beg the churches to do all in their power to increase the amounts for missionary purposes.

The report on nominations was read by Bro. J. H. Blaylock, and after some remarks, a motion was made and carried to strike out the word "Ozark," and the three churches asking for the Association were put in nomination, as follows: Ozark, Rehobeth and Mulberry.

The vote was cast in tavor of Mulberry. The report was then adopted: Mulberry as the place of holding the next session, W. M. Hicks to preach the introductory sermon and S. S. Sims, alternate.

A resolution was offered to change the Constitution—Section 14—by striking out the words "Thursday, 11 o'clock" and inserting the words "Saturday, 10 o'clock."

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association re-assembled according to adjournment at 1:30 p.m. After singing by the congregation, the Association was led in prayer by Bro. Spires.

The report on Associational Missions was taken up and adopted as follows:

We your committee on Associational Missions report the following: We see from the reading of the letters, that the churches are doing practically nothing for the spread of the gospel in our midst. Brethren, this ought not to be. It seems to us that our brethren are spiritually dead. We would recommend that a missionary be kept in the field all the time, and it could be done if each member would pay 50 cents. We would recommend that the churches select the best members for the Board.

We would further recommend that the members of the Board bring this matter before the churches and make a strong effort to take this country for Christ.

Report of Executive Board read and adopted as follows: To the Clear Creek Association:

DEAR BRETHREN: We your committee of the Eastern division report that we employed Bro. J. E. Cox as our missionary to begin the work the first of April, and continue until the first of October. The Board agreed to pay him \$100 for his services. Bro. Cox agreeing to give four days of each week for three weeks in each month; the work to be done at North Liberty, New Canaan and Mountain Top. Bro Cox took the field and worked faithfully and reports the following:

Days labored, 71; miles traveled, 574; preached 68 sermons, visited 66 families; witnessed seven conversions; baptized six; organized one Sunday school; sold seven Bibles, value, \$24.25; 27 Testaments, \$9 20; 37 books, \$7.20; give away one Bible, 25c; eight Testaments 80c. Total value, \$41.70. We have paid Bro. Cox \$66.56, leaving a balance of \$33.44.

Resolved further, that the Brother Clerk have 600 min-

utes printed and retain the money left for his services.

A collection was taken to increase the minute fund, amounted to 80c.

Bro. W. M. Hicks made a report of his work as a volun-

teer missionary, which was received, and a motion was carried to take up a collection for him tonight. [I cannot give the report or the amount collected, because it was not furnished me.—Clerk.]

On motion the Association adjourned to meet at Mulberry, Crawford county, Saturday at 10 o'clock, before the Second Lord's day in October, 1900.

The congregation sang the old familiar song, "How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord," and the brethren and sisters took tha parting hand, some of us, no doubt, for the last time.

The Association was then led in prayer by Bro. M. A. Pillars.

Thus ended a very pleasant and profitable meeting.
