## • The Progress and Dangers of Romanism.

The most oppressive and intolerant form of heathenism that has ever scourged the nations is what is commonly called Roman Catholicism.

Down through the Middle Ages it drenched this old earth in the blood of millions of the best men and women that ever lived. It did the same during the age of the Reformation. The horrors of the Spanish Inquisition and St. Bartholomew's Day are known to every common reader of history. The bloody crusades against the Waldenses—who are our Baptist ancestors—are familiar to every student of Baptist history.

Today we have the Inquisition in America as far as it can be operated. Godly and patriotic men who lecture on the cruel persecutions and vile corruptions of this monster system are kidnapped and mobbed.

The fearful conflict is already on. For a number of years immigration from Europe has been mainly from Catholic countries. That has vastly increased this terrible menace to our free schools and our liberties. About one-seventh of our population is now

Catholic. Yet Rome is so active in politics that a vast majority of the federal appointments to office have been given to Catholics.

Now, the thing for all patriotic Americans to do is to vote for no man that can be swayed or used by Romanism to advance or favor its special interests in any way. Also, we should vote for men for our legislature who will labor for a law to unbolt all the convents and similar institutions.
