THE PROCEEDINGS

Greenbrier Baptist Association met in 37th regular session with New Liberty church, Beryl, Arkansas, Thursday, Oct. 23, 1920, at 10:30 a. m. Missionary J. E. Claunch led devotional xercises, and Bro. J. H. Gipson preached the annual sermon with "Hope" as his theme.

Moderator Meadors being absent the association was convened by the clerk.

Pastor E. P. J. Garrett of the First Baptist Church, Conway, was elected Moderator pro tem.

Messengers from the following churches were seated: Lollie, Sulphur, Mt. Vernon, Oak Browery, Wooster, Vilonia, New Liberty, Conway, Cadron Ridge, Mayflower. (For list of messengers see table.)

Visitors and correspondents were seated as follows: Caroline Association, J. H. Gipson and A. D. Gray, and Bro. and Sister J. W. Wilson, Dr. J. S. Compere of Little Rock, Editor Baptist Advance, Dr. W. F. Dorris superintendent of Montjeello Orphans Home, Prof. J. G. Llye of Arkadelphia, Endowment Secretary of Oauchita College, Mrs. J. G. Jackson of Little Rock Corresponding Secretary of W. M. U. Auxiliary to Baptist State Convention.

Adjourned for dinner.

Afternoon

After devotional services at 2 p. m. E. P. J. Garrott was lected Moderator, W. G. Hamil, Clerk; G. E. Owon; Treasurer, Moderator appointed Mrs J. W. Conger on W. M. U. committee, of which Mrs. O. O. Florence was Chairman, and she made the report on Women's Work. Mrs. Florence spoke on the reort and called for reports from different W. M. U's. Good reports were made by Mrs. Cavin for New Liberty, Mrs. M. M. Hall for Mt. Vernon, Mrs. Charley Jones for Conway and various brethren for Pickles Gap, Wooster, Cadron Ridge, Old Liberty, Oak Bowery. All reports were good except from Cadron Ridge and Oak Bowery.

Report of Field Worker, Miss Fay Adams, for 2½ months in summer was read by Mrs. Florence. At this juncture the Moderator appointed the deacons of New Liberty Church as committee on divine services. After speeches by Mrs. Florence and Mrs. Jackson, the W. M. U. standard of excellence was udopted. Mrs. Charley Jones was elected Associational Supt., as Mrs. Conger indicated that she could not serve longer, and Mrs. M. M. Hall, of Mt. Vernon was elected Young Peoples Leader.

Committee announced Bro. J. A. Batson to preach tonight. The usual committees were announced by the Moderator. See names signed to reports.) After singing and prayer Bro. Dorris spoke in behalf of the orphanage and Bro. Compere on religious literature. Adjourned to 6:30. Prayer by Bro. Compere. Night

W. E. Roberts in the chair. After singing and prayer, Bro. T. W. Day led a devotional talk and Bro. J. A. Batson preached, followed by old-fashioned handshaking. Then the following reports were read, discussed and adopted: Old Ministers Relief, Orphans Home, Publications, and Ministerial Education. Adjourned. Prayer by Bro. Claunch!

Friday Morning

Bro. Garrott in chair. After singing and prayer, letters from Pickles Gap and Harmony were read and messengers seated.

Bro. Claunch read report on Foreign Missions and after discussion by brethren Claunch, Simmons, Garrott, Gibson, Gray, Barton and Roberts, was adopted.

Letters from Pleasant Grove and Old Liberty were read and messengers seated. Letter from Palestine was read: no messenger.

Bro. Garrott read the report on Sunday School, and it was adopted after due discussion.

On motion of Bro. Roberts the missionary sermon was de-ferred till night and Dr. L. E. Barton General Secretary of Arkansas Baptist State Convention, was heard at eleven o'clock on kingdom interests in our State, the 75 million situation being the central theme.

Letters from Friendship and Happy Hollow, were read and messengers seated just preceding Dr. Barton's speech as with also report on State Missions. Report on Association Mis-sions was made special order for 2 p. m. Adjourned. Prayer by Bro. Claunch.

Afternoon

Letter from Acklin's Gap read; no messenger. Report on nominations was read and adopted, also report on B. Y. P. U. Oak Grove letter was read and messengers seated. R. F. Adams read the report on Association Missions, and MissionaryJ. E. Claunch read his report. The congregation sang "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow." Prayer by Bro. E. F. Simmons. Bro. Simmons read his report of one meeting he held separate from Bro. Claunch. Bro. G. E. Owen, Treasurer, read his report as did the Finance Committee. After considerable speech-making in an effort to formulate a plan to pay debts and continue the work, these reports were adopted.

President D. S. Campbell read the report on Christian Education which was discussed by brethren Campbell, Lile, and Baston, and adopted. Bro. T. W. Day read and discussed the r port on 75-million campaign and it was adopted. Then followed the reports on Hospitals, Temeprance and Home Missions: all adopted.

On motion all unfinished business was left to the Executive Board.

After a vote of thanks to New Liberty Church and com-munity for their hospitality the association adjourned to meet with Mt. Vernon Church Thursday before fourth Sunday in Oct. 1921, at 10 a.m.

Bro. Claunch preached a good sermon to a good crowd at night.

During Saturday and Sunday B. Y. P. U. rallies were held at Vilonia and New Liberty, Bro. Edgar B. Parker, leading, which resulted in the organization of an Associational B. Y. P. U. with E. B. Parker, president; Myrtle Honia, secretary.

It is to be regretted that the messengers to the Association had to hurry back home necessitating haste in the proceedings which was determined to the cause.

As shown in the above paragraphs every department of our denominational work was duly considered and reports adopted, but owing to lack of necessary funds the Executive Board ordered that only the recommendations in the reports be printed in the minutes. Reports that offered no recommendations are left out entirely Much valuable information is thus sacrified but it is unavoidable.

Since the last association I have traveled 1767 miles; preached 158 sermons, had in my meetings 348 conversions; haptized 141; total additions 178.

In 13 months on mission field there was 514 conversions, 222 baptized and 314 additions.

I am only reporting one meeting as the rest of the work I did was with Bro. Claunch, and he will make the report for both of us.

I will just say I was indeed surprised of the need on the field and also of the co-operation of the other side of the Baptists. They are big hearted people, only in the ruts and thank God some of them are climbing out. The meeting at Sulphur was the only one held by myself.

I think we had a great meeting—33 conversions, 16 additions of the Church, 12 by Baptism. At the close of the meeting I ordained a deacon, laid plans to build a Church, they called a pastor, and I think they are in good shape.

Covenant and Articles of Faith: Those Found in a Pendleton's Church Manual

Constitution

- Art. 1. This Association shall be known as Greenbrier Baptist Association.
- Art. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers and ministers from Baptist churches co-operating in the Lord's work.
- Art. 3. Each church co-operating with this Association shall be entitled to three messengers until the church numbers one hundred, then four, then one for each additional fifty.
- Art. 4. This Association shall be considered an advisory council to devise ways and means of promoting the Redeemer's kingdom, and shall have no power to legislate for the churches or "lord it over God's heritage."
- Art. 5. Other churches may be admitted to co-operation with this body when they signify a wish to do so by letter and messengers, provided they be deemed orthodox, which shall be determined by their abstract of faith.
- Art. 6. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session and hold office till their successors are properly qualified, and shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Board.
- Art. 7. The Clerk shall keep a regular file of minutes of the Association and turn the same over to his successor in office.
- Art. 8. It shall be the duty of each church co-operating with this body to contribute such funds as shall be its prorata share of the expenses of the work undertaken from year to year.
- Art. 9. It shall be the duty of each church to send to each annual meeting of this body a letter containing a brief history of her progress since last session consisting of such particulars and statistics as are usual in such bodies.
- Art. 10. Any church may make any proper query asking advice of this association.
- Art. 11. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a full and fair record of the proceedings of this Association and to superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes. For his service he shall receive such remuneration as the Association may from time to time think proper.
- Art. 12. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and account for all moneys paid to him for use of the Association, according to its order.

Art. 13. This body shall elect annually an Executive Board of Ten including the officers of the Association who shall be "ex-officio officers" of the Board.

- Art. 14. At each session the Moderator shall appoint the chairman of the various committees to report the following year and they shall be ex-officio members of the Association.
- Art. 15. This constitution may be amended at any session of this Association when two-thirds of the members present and voting shall deem it necessary.
