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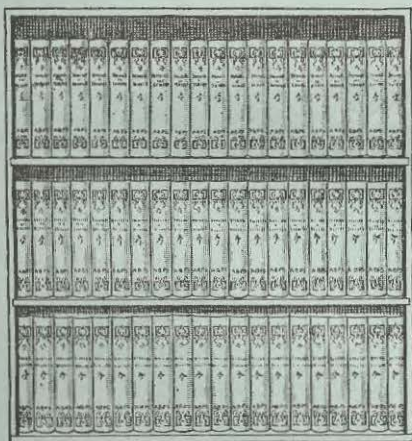

PROCEEDINGS.**First Day---Morning Service.**

The Howard County Association which by prior appointment met at Athens church at 10 o'clock a. m., on the 24th, of October, 1903. The messengers were assembled by singing, the moderator read the 12th chapter of Psalms, prayer led by Brother W. R. Story after which the moderator announced the Association ready for business. The messengers were requested to present letters for their respective churches. A committee of three were appointed to read said letters. Brethren L. M. Byers, J. B. Ball, and D. W. Cornish were appointed. After reading the letters and enrolling names of messengers, petitionary letters were called for. Two were presented asking admittance into this body, one bearing the name of New Mount Carmel, one bearing the name of Pilgrim's Rest, the letter from New Mount Carmel was read and on motion and second was admitted into the fellowship of this body, the moderator extending the hand of fellowship to the messenger of said new church. The letter from Pilgrim's Rest church was read. There being objections offered as to the organization of the church, by motion and second a committee of four was appointed to investigate said objections and report to this body, Rev. E. New Mount Carmel Church received at this session, messengers enrolled: R. J. Rivers, Richard Bert S. R. Gibson and W. S. Byrd. The moderator then proceeded to have the roll called and names of messengers enrolled.

The moderator announced the next order of business was the election of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, by motion the election had by ballot. Brethren J. W. Conger, D. W. Hill and W. P. Taylor were appointed as teller. After the vote was had the report was that J. T. Holt was elected moderator and R. D. Neal was elected Clerk and Treasurer for the ensuing year. After the organization the moderator appointed the following committees:

Divine Service Committee—J. L. Rivers, J. L. Furgerson, messengers, and the pastor of this (Athens) Church.

Finance Committee—J. F. Schirmer, J. B. Ball and I. N. Borum.

The moderator asked for time to select brethren for the other committees. Prof. J. W. Conger was called on to address the audience on the subject of education, and entertained the brethren for 30 minutes with a fine discourse on the importance of an education. The committee appointed to investigate the objection of receiving Pilgrim's Rest church into our fellowship asked for time. Committee on Divine Service submitted report as follows:

Preaching this evening at 7:30 p. m., by Brother W. P. Taylor, of Caddo Association. Sunday at 11 o'clock a. m., by S. H. Milburn; at 3 o'clock p. m., by C. W. Strickland and at 7:30 p. m., by D. W. Cornish.

Sunday School mass meeting, conducted by A. J. Robins, to meet at 9 o'clock a. m.

The report was received as read, and a call was made for corresponding messengers from sister associations:

Sunday's Proceedings.

At 9 o'clock a. m., the congregation assembled at the church. After singing and prayer, the program was announced by Brother Robins. Talks were made on the importance of Sunday Schools by several of the

brethren to wit:—Robins, Byers, Conger and Story.

There seems to be some interest awakened in the Sunday Schools and the probability is the organizing of one at this church in the near future. The messengers from churches with no Sunday Schools were urged to organize one in each of their respective churches. Preaching at 11 a. m., by J. H. Milburn; Subject—Who are the Primitive Baptists. After the sermon a collection for missions was taken, amounting to \$15 00 and turned over to J. H. Milburn as state missionary at this juncture, and before the congregation was dismissed the moderator proceeded to notify the brethren appointed on the various committees of their appointments, as follows:

After refreshments, which were served on the grounds, Brother Strickland preached, subject—the church. Brother Cornish preached at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

Monday, October 26.

MORNING SESSION:—The body was called together at 8:30 o'clock a. m. The session was opened with prayer by the Moderator. By motion and second proceeded to select corresponding messengers to attend the following Associations:

Southwestern—J. W. Hill and J. H. Lewis.

Red River—E. Merrell and A. J. Robins.

Union—W. R. Story and L. M. Byers.

By motion and second proceeded to select place to convene the 1st 5th Sunday or mission meeting, no church having invited, a messenger from Antioch church, asked that the meeting be held with their church, which was by vote granted. By request of Red Colony church, a letter of dismissal in good standing was granted to unite with the

Southwestern Association. Reports from committees was called for by moderator. The committee on Orphan's Home submit their report as follows:

We find from reports that the Orphan's Home, situated at Monticello, Ark., under the care of Brother and Sister Gardner, is free from debt and contains 58 orphans, who are well cared for by Sister Gardner, the founder and matron of this institution. They are taught God's word in the Home, and those large enough are taught in the literary school also, that they may be better able to meet and battle with this life's trials. Therefore let us contribute to this noble institution liberally of our means and prayers. Signed:—T. T. Ebbs, chairman.

A motion to adopt was made, several speeches were made about the Home, the way it was managed and the maner in which the orphans were cared for by Sister Gardner. After the talks were made, by motion a collection was had amounting to \$10.25 for the benefit of the orphans. The report was adopted as read.

The committee appointed to investigate the objection to receiving the church asking admission into this body, submit their report as follows:

After an investigation and prayful consideration report that neither church is linitled to membership in this body, because of the non-fellowship existing between them; and further this committee does not think that Pilgrim's Rest church is le-ally organized and we therefore advise it to disband, and that they (the church) and Cedar Hill church become reconciled before applying to this body for membership. The report was adopted without debate by motion and second.

The committee on obituary submit their report as follows:

We find by referring to the letters coming up from the churches the all devouring sythe of time has visited our bounds and called from us many of our brethren and sisters from the fields of labor to their final rest which is evidence to ns that we too will soon be called from our labors to that rest that remains for the people of God. Therefore we recognize the hand of God in this and all his dealings with us. so we humbly bow to His will.

The report being read a motion and second to adopt was had, the report was adopted as read. Signed—J. L. Baggett, chairman.

Eli Hodge, Committee.

The committee on Home Missions submit their report as follows:

Whereas our Association has withdrawn from the State Convention, we recommend that the churches co-operate in the Home Mission work with the General Association of the Baptist churches of Arkansas, we recommend that the Bible plan of collecting be adopted by every church in this Association, and all money collected for Home Missions be sent to the treasurer of the General Association of Arkansas.

The committee on education submit report as follows:

We your committee believing as we do, and as Baptists have ever done in christian education. Therefore we recommend to our people the schools and colleges within our state, where Baptist influence, and Baptist principles will be instilled into the minds of our boys and girls. We recommend Ouachita college as the best school for young ministers within our state. By motion and second the report was laid on the table to be called up at 11:30 a. m., as the school at this place wished to be present at the discussion.

The committee on the evils of intemperance submit their report as follows:

Owing to the fact that almost all the crime and debauchery that is abroad in our land arise directly or indirectly from the use of intoxicating liquors. Therefore we heartily recommend that each and every Baptist protest against the use of any intoxicant in any way. We all place ourselves on record as being against license. Every lover of the Lord should vote against license, and any and all candidates for office who we know to favor the sale of liquors in any form. Every church should keep its members pure on this question. We therefore recommend church discipline, not only against the drunkard but any one who votes for license or in any way favors the sale of liquor.

By motion and second this amendment was added:

We pledge ourselves as a body not to sign any petition for the pardon of any liquor seller when convicted, we recommend that our churches do the same. Signed:—B. M. Copeland.

The amendment was read, and after it was thoroughly discussed by several of the brethren the amendment was adopted, and the report was adopted as read. The chairman of the mission board submit their report as follows:

We have supplied preaching in all the destitute places in our Association that was possible, we have aided all the weak churches that requested help. We employed Brother J. M. Copeland as missionary 37 days, at a salary of \$40.00 per month. The remainder in your treasury last session \$57.11. We have received from churches and collections \$95.84, making a total of \$147.95 at this session, we have received for associational missions \$41.36, making a grand total of \$189.31; of this sum we have paid out as follows: Rosedale church \$15.00, Mount Zion church \$20.00, Athens church \$10.00, Brushy Creek \$10.00, J. M. Copeland \$49.33 for mission work; total amount paid out \$104.33, leaving in your treasury \$84.78. We recommend that \$50 be paid to Athens church to help pay off debt which is now on the church house. We also recommend a continuation of our present system of work in our Association, believing that much good has been accomplished by this mode of missior work. Thanking you for your forbearance toward the board and especially your chairman, we respectfully sign ourselves,

Motion to adopt was made. After some discussion on the donation to Athens church, a motion to strike out the donation recommended

for Athens church was made. After the amendment had been discussed a motion to amend the amendment by inserting "\$70 instead of \$50 which amount was to be divided between Athens, Ozan No. 1 and New Mt. Carmel churches." After some discussion a vote was had on the amendment to the amendment which was lost. A vote was taken on the report as amended and the report was adopted without any donations.

The committee on literature submitted their report as follows:

We recommend first, the Bible as the book of all books, which should be read and prayerfully studied. We recommend as Sunday School helps the American Baptist Publication Society's works. We recommend the Land Mark Baptist as our state paper.

The report was adopted without discussion.

The committee on ministerial support submitted their report as follows:

We recognize the great importance of preaching the gospel for christianizing the world and feeling that our ministers are often hampered in the discharge of their duties by being obliged to give attention to temporal needs. It is vastly important that the officers of each church adopt some system by which the pastor's salary shall be collected and paid over to him each month, if practicable, or at least at the end of each quarter, that he may thus be relieved of these temporal duties and be better able to give his time to study and church work and thus more effectively glorify God and advance His Kingdom on earth, as no minister can be an efficient preacher of the Word of God without careful preparation and study of the Scriptures. And we do most heartily commend to the brethren the aid and support of our young ministers now striving for an education.

A motion to adopt was made and the report was discussed by several of the brethren after which a collection was called for and taken. \$5.70 was collected and turned over to Prof. J. W. Conger for ministerial education. The previous question was then called for and the report was adopted as read.

At 11:30 a. m. the report of the committee on education was called for and was submitted as follows:

Believing as we do, and as the Baptists have ever done, in Christian education, therefore we would recommend to our people the schools and colleges within our state where Baptist influences and Baptist principles will be instilled into the minds of our boys and girls. We recommend Onachita College as the best school for young ministers within our state.

Prof. Amos and his school arrived and Prof. Conger was called

upon to address the audience on education. He gave a splendid lecture on the use and advantages of an education, the advantage the educated have over the uneducated, etc., after which the previous question was called and the report was adopted as read.

A motion was made to have the report of the committee appointed to investigate the objections to receiving Pilgrim's Rest church into the fellowship of the Association, which was adopted this (Monday) morning, re-read as some of the brethren did not understand the exact wording. The motion carried and the clerk was ordered to read the report, after which an amendment was offered proposing to strike out the words "neither church is entitled to membership in this body because of non fellowship between them." The report was adopted and is as follows:

After careful investigation and prayerful consideration we report that we do not consider Pilgrim's Rest as being Scripturally organized and we therefore recommend that they disband and that they and Cedar Hill church become reconciled before applying to this body for membership.

The committee on prayermeeting submitted the report adopted at the last session which is as follows:

We believe that a well organized prayermeeting where the membership meet to pray with and for each other is a great factor in building up the church and will have its influence in bringing souls to Christ. We therefore recommend that every church in this Association organize and keep up a regular weekly prayermeeting, as we believe that prayer is the key that unlocks Heaven's door.

The report was adopted as read without discussion.

The committee on finance submitted their report as follows:

We find as reported by the churches for Associational misssions, \$41.36; State missions, \$11.92; Foreign missions, \$4.00; Orphan's Home, 50 cents; minute fund, \$36.15.

The committee on destitution submitted their report as follows:

We find a large scope of country east of the Cossatot River beginning at Duckett's school house and running south to Antimony and also around Cross Roads settlement. We also find the portion of country known as Green Plains destitute of Baptist preaching. We your committee feel that the way is being opened for Baptist in this destitution and we recommend that this Association look after this work and that we aid as heretofore the weak churches in the bounds of this Association.

The report was adopted as read.

The committee on State Missions submitted their report as follows:

We recommend that inasmuch as the Peace Committees of the State Convention and General Association have agreed upon terms of union, that we urge the churches to greater efforts for State Missions because of the great need of the Gospel in our state. Thanking God for the good done by the missionaries of both bodies, we would recommend that the mode of work be left to the churches for them to decide.

The report was adopted as read without discussion.

The committee on Foreign Missions submitted their report as follows:

We have nothing in the way of statistics to present to this body, but would call attention to the importance of the different fields as was adopted by the General Association, which are Cuba, Syria and Mexico. We recommend a hearty co operation in this work. We deprecate the manner in which our missionary is being treated in Cuba.

Respectfully submitted, W. R. Story, Chairman.

The report was adopted as read without discussion.

The committee on family devotion reported as follows:

We believe that Bible reading and family altars should be erected in the homes of every Baptist family. Prayer and the reading of God's Word continually are means of growth in grace and is instrumental in bringing our children to Christ. The home altar is the place to train the tender buds of families.

The report was adopted as read.

The committee on nominations submit their report as follows:

We recommend that this Association meet with Liberty church on Saturday before the 4th Sunday in October, 1904, and that L. M. Keeling preach the associational sermon on Saturday at 11 o'clock a. m. T. H. Westbrooks his alternate. We recommend C. W. Strickland, chairman, J. L. Ferguson, D. W. Cornish, L. M. Byers, J. W. Hutchins, J. M. Copeland and N. R. Lewis as members of the executive board.

A motion to adopt was had. Brother A. J. Robins stated that there was a minority report, and a call for reading of same was made, which is as follows:

I submit as one of your committee on nominations, this minority report: I recommend that this Association convene with the Baptist church at Mineral Springs on the date mentioned in the majority report and that the name of W. R. Story be substituted as chairman of of Executive Board.
