PROCEEDINGS.

October 4, 1890.

The messengers composing the nineteenth session of the Union Baptist Association met with the Church at Shiioh on Saturday before the first Sabbath in October, A. D., 1890.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. A. W. Tiffin. Text: 1st Timothy it, 16. After preaching, the congregation was dismissed till 1 o'clock, at which time the Association met for permanent organization. After devotional exercises, was called to order by Bro. James E. Askew, the former Moderator.

The letters from the different churches were then called for and read by Brethren O. G. Quinn and W. A. McKee, who were appointed reading clerks. After the letters were read, the body proceeded to election of officers, which resulted in the re-election of James E. Askew Moderator, and R. H. Mitchell Clerk.

Called for petitionary letters. Letters from the following churches were presented and read, and, being found orthodox, on motion was received into the Associational compact, and the right hand of fellowship extended by the Moderator, namely: Pleasant Hill No. 2, Laneburg, New Liberty, Liberty and Woodiawn.

On Sabbath, prayer meeting at the church at 9 o'clock a. m., conducted by Bro. O. G. Quinn. At 11 o'clock a. m. a missionary sermon by Eld. J. B. Searcy.

On motion, adjourned till 8 o'clock Monday morning.

SABBATH:

At the hour announced the brethren engaged in a prayer meeting conducted by Bro. S. F. Snell.

At 11 o'clock Eld. J. B. Searcy preached to a large, attentive congregation. Text: Mathew xxviii, 19. Theme: "The Spreading of the

Gospel." The sermon was concise and very pointed. At the close of the sermon a collection was taken up for Foreign Missions, amounting to \$37.00.

Eld. Z. T. Rodgers filled the stand at 2 o'clock p. m., and preached a fine sermon on same topic as Eld. J. B. Searcy.

Eld. J. W. Erwin preached at the church at night.

Eld. J. B. Searcy preached at Buckner at night.

The preaching was all excellent.

MONDAY WORNING.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. After divine services by Eld. A. W. Titlin the body proceeded to Daginess.

The Committee on Education made their report, and, on motion, was recommitted (to be amended).

The Committee on Destitution made their report, and, on motion, was recommitted.

The Committee on Foreign Missions made their report, and was spoken to by Eld. J. B. Searcy and others. and, on motion, was adopted.

REPORT ON-FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions would respectfully report that this branch of our religious work is rapidly on the increase. The reports from all our mission fields the past year are more encouraging than heretofore. Besides our missionaries in Africa, Mexico and Brazil, during the last year we have established a mission in Japan, which promises to be very fruitful. Within the last year Brazil has thrown off the monarchial yoke and become a republic showing that the tyranny of priest-craft has about run its race, and now toleration is offered to the pure Gospel of Christ. These new missions and important changes call loudly for an increase in the number of our missionaries. And to add to this interest the Lord seems to have put in the hearts of a great number of promising young men and women a desire to go to a foreign field. All these things demand an increase in our deliberations. We are asked for \$150,000 this year. Arkansas is asked for \$3,000 of that amount. We think Union

Association can and will pay \$200 of that amount. The plan heretofore adopted, of having some one in each church to represent this work, we have found to be a good one, and recommend its continuance. In addition, we respectfully ask the several pastors to urge this matter upon the membership, and thus co-operate with the brother or sister appointed to collect this fund. We would especially urge that collections be taken in our churches as early as possible, so as to save the board the expense of borrowing money. What we do let us do quickly.

We feel confident that if this plan was adopted by the churches, and strictly adhered to, there would be less complaint on this important subject.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, heg leave to report the following: The immoderate use of food or drink is hurtful to physical, mental and moral nature, and, when indulged in, becomes intemperance. The use of Intoxicating liquors, wines or fermented cider, by the members of the church, except it be absolutely as a medicine or for sacramental purposes, is intemperance of the most pernicions type, and should not be tolerated by the churches. The church which remains indifferent to the fact and retains in her fellowship a member who Indulges at any time in the unnecessary use of such things, is a disorderly church, from which this Association should withdraw fellowship. The habit of dram drinking, under the misleading of society and medicine, is an inexcusable sin for which a member should be brought under the discipline of the church, under the charge of intemperance. The good of the local option laws of this State are so manifest that we feel encouraged, and, as Baptists, the only custodians of the Apostolle teachings and practices, should do all in our power under the guldance of the Holy Spirlt, to foster and maintain, by precept and example, every legislative enactment against the monster Rum, until he is driven from the land. We' deplore and oppose political alliance with the church but as the people of God we should stand up and bodily fight for the right in the maintainance of laws against the rum Respectfully submitted, traffic.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education would report that never in the history of our denomination was there so much attention given to this work, and never were the results so satifactory. Baptists have been stigmaiized with ignorance, but it is a fact that to-day not only our ministry but our membership would not suffer in comparison with others from the standsoint of intelligence. But as we claim to be the champion of the truth, we ought to take the lead in education. We believe that all that is necessary for pious people to appreciate our principles is to have an intelligent knowledge of them; hence, the more cultivated our ministry and membership, the more effectively they can advance our cause. Now we have at Arkadelphia by far the best school in the State, and we urge our people to send their sons and daughters there to be educated. As a matter of course we encourage home schools also. Brethren, we, as your Committee, recommend that the churches composing Union Association send Brethren W. J. Walthall and T. A. Middlebrook to the Ounchita College this ensuing year, as they desire to go. Submitted.

REPORT ON OUACHITA COLLEGE.

We, your Committee on Ouachita College, would report: 'That this school, which is the pride of the denomination in the State, continues its onward spid forward course. One year ago the rush was to get into the new building; that we have accomplished, and three bundred and nine oupils enrolled during the year. Now the push is to finish the "Young Ladies Home." A large and beautiful brick building, which is now nearing completion, and which, when finished, will be a home for the young ladies for years. The lift session has just opend with a much larger attendance than any previous session; we confidently expect to enroll 350 pupils this year. The people of Arkabelphia have nobly donated the cost of the Young Ladies' Home, which will be a clear gift to the denomination of over \$25,000. There yet remains a considerable debt on the main building, most of which has been subscribed, but much of it remains unpaid. All our people should contribute to this school, and our people who have sond and daughters to send to school ought to send them here at home, rather than another state, so as to support Prof. Conger J. B. SEARCY, Chairman. and his noble faculty.

CLERK.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

- 1. We believe in the existence of one only living God, and that He has made Himself known to His people under the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Ghost, the same in essence and divine in perfection.
- 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Oid and New Testament are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
- 3. We believe that God hath chosen us in Christ Jesus, before the foundation of the world, that we should be hely and without blame before him in love, having predestined us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ.
 - 4. We believe in the doctrine of Original Sin.
- 5. We believe in man's inability to recover himself from his fallen state.
- 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.
- 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Spirit.
- 8. We believe that true believers will be kept by the favor of God. and that they will never smally fall away.
- 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are New Testament ordinances; that true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances; that Immersion only is Baptism, and that it is pre requisite to the privilege of the Lord's Supper.
 - 10. We believe in the Ressurrection and the General Judgment.
- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked and the joy of the righteons will be everlasting.
- 12. We believe that no person has the right to administer the ordinances except such as are called of God, as was Aaron, and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery, and in fellowship with the church of which he is a member.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the Union Association of regular United Bapticis.

- ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers sent up by the churches belonging to the same, and each church be allowed three (3) representatives, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their respective churches before they are allowed their seats.
- ART. 3. The mersengers, when convened, shall organize the nowaves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and a Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot, at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.
- ART. 4. This union of churches shall not interfere with the right of the churches of which it is composed, but it shall regard there as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall act as an advisory council, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact; nevertheless, this Association claims authority over its own members, the messengers from the churches, and the right to withdraw from any church when found heterodox to faith, or disorderly in practice.
- ART. 5. Any church of the same faith and order may be admitted into this Union by petitionary letter and messengers to the annual meeting, by said messengers agreeing with the Abstract of Principles as set forth by this body.
- ART. 6. The churches in this Union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communication, specifying the names of their messengers, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, ex-communicated, restored, or deceased, since the last session, and any other information that the churches may deem important.
- ART. 7. This Association shall, at each session, appoint a Treasurer, whose duty it shall be to hold all funds sent up by the churches, or otherwise collected, also to disburse them as ordered by the Association, and shall present annually for insertion in the Minutes a clear and succinct statement of all the receipts and expenditures.
- ART 8. This Association shall furnish the churches with the Minutes of each session.
- ART. 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of each session of this day, and deliver the same to his successor in office.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. When the Messengers of the several churches shall assemble at the

place appointed for the session of the Association, the Moderator shall open the business by praise and prayer, in person or by proxy. If the Moderator or Clerk be absent, the Association shall appoint one pro tem.

2. Immediately after the opening of the session the church letters shall be read by persons whom the Moderator shall appoint, and the names of the Messengers enrolled by the Clerk.

3. When the Messengers' names are enrolled and called by the Clerk, the Association shall then elect by ballot a Moderator and Clerk, a

majority of votes governing the election.

- 4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before they are entertained by the Moderator. When motions for amendments to motions are made the last one made shall be first in order, and so on in inverso or ler to the original motion, but the mover may, at any time, withdraw his motion.
- 5. Any person wishing to make a motion, or to speak on any matter before the Association, shall rise to his feet and respectfully address the Moderator. If he be in order, the Moderator shall signify the same by calling the name of the person so rising, or otherwise, and no one, thus in in order, shall be interrupted while in speaking unless he depart from the subject, or use personal reflection, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same subject without leave from the Moderator, except to explain some of his preceding remarks.
- 6. Whenever sufficient time has been allowed for the discussion of any subject before the Association, the Moderator shall take the vote of the Association, and declare the result, the majority governing in all cases.
- 7. No member shall vacate his seat without the consent of the Moderator, while the body is sitting.
- 8. When one member shall speak to or of another he shall call him "brother."
- 9. The Moderator shall have the names of the Messengers called whenever it may be necessary.
- 10. The Moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members by calling one to fill his seat while speaking, but not until others have spoken, who may desire to speak.
- 11. The Moderator may invite visiting ministers, in good order, to seats in council, who may speak but not vote.
- 12. The Moderator shall be the judge of order, subject to an appeal to the Association.

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
