CONSTITUTION

Adopted October 17, 1961

(Section 8 (a) Amended October 15, 1963)

(Section 5 Amended October 14, 1968)

1. NAME

The name of this association shall be the North Pulaski Baptist Association, cooperating with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with the association to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's Word, the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolence, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth. To co-operate with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world missions program.

3. MEMBERSHIP

The body shall be composed of messengers elected from the churches and missions affiliated with the body. When such messengers are approved by the association they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

4. ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith set forth in New Hampshire Confession as the doctrinal beliefs of the church shall be the doctrines adopted by this body.

5. OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be moderator, moderator-elect, clerk, treasurer and historian. These officers shall be nominated and elected by the association, preferably before the last session of the annual meeting. They shall serve until the close of the following annual session of the association or until their successors shall be elected and installed. Election shall be by secret ballot unless another plan is adopted by unanimous consent. The term of moderator shall be for one year. The moderator-elect shall serve as assistant to the moderator for one year and shall at the time of the annual association meeting assume the office of moderator. The association will at that time elect a new moderator-elect. The duties of these officers shall be those usually incumbent upon such officers.

If the association employs a superintendent of missions and/or an educational director, these workers shall be considered as officers of the association. Such additional officers shall be elected as the association shall deem necessary to its most effective work.

6. AUTHORITY

The association is an autonomous body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business; it may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreement with the body, or whose churches are not. However, this body shall never exercise any authority over, or give direction to, any church or churches which are affiliated with it or which may have been affiliated with it; but the association will stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

7. ORGANIZATIONS

This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, music, library, and other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of the association, with their full staffs of officers and programs necessary for the promotion of the work. The chief officer of each organization shall be elected, or approved by the association and shall function as an officer of the association.

8. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Association shall have an executive committee consisting of the pastor of each church (where he is a member of the church) and one lay member from each church. Nominations for membership in the executive committee may be made by the church, but members must be elected by the association. The officers of the association, namely moderator, moderator-elect, clerk, treasurer, and historian, shall be ex-officio members of the executive committee and should serve as respective officers of the committee, unless the association directs otherwise. All other officers and chairmen of standing committees are to become ex-officio members of the executive committee. Ex-officio members will not have the right to vote unless they are also members of the executive committee elected as representative of their respective churches.

The executive committee shall attend to all matters of the association between sessions; promote all progress authorized by the association; and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled. The executive committee shall not have the power to create or initiate any new work or project not contained in the reports and recommendations of the previous meeting of the association.

The executive committee shall hold regular monthly or quarterly meetings.

The executive committee shall not have power to entitle a church to affiliation with the association or have representation on the executive committee, but may invite a church to sit with it in counsel without vote, pending the seating of the messengers of that church by the association.

8. (a) The legal title to all property owned by this Association, both real and personal, shall be held in the name of the designated trustees, which shall be vested in them by virtue of their office and which shall be transmitted to their successors. The Trustees shall be three in number and shall be named by the Association to serve for a term of one year or until their successors shall have been named and qualified. In the event a vacancy should occur by reason of the failure of the Association to make such selection, by death, by disability, by removal from the community or otherwise, the Executive Committee may fill the vacancy. By direction of the Association, or of the Executive Committee.

the trustees shall be clothed with authority to act on behalf of the Association in the acquisition and disposition of Associational property, and specifically shall have authority to execute notes, bonds, debentures, deeds of conveyance, mortgages, pledges and other security instruments and any and all related documents incidental thereto; and to represent the Association in all legal matters. All persons dealing with said trustees may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or the Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustee to act in its behalf, and a certified copy of any such resolution duly executed by the Associational moderator and the clerk shall be conclusive evidence thereof.

9. MEETINGS

The association shall hold annual meetings of the body at such time and place as it may determine. The executive committee may have power to change the stated time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity. The association may hold such quarterly meetings as are deemed wise for the promotion of its work. It shall promote such regular meetings of its worker's council, its promotional organizations, and its standing committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association.

10. COMMITTEES

The association shall have the following standing committees named by the moderator and his officers before the close of the annual session to serve until the close of the next annual session, namely, program committee, nominating committee, credentials committee, budget committee, and such additional standing committees as seem needed. All organizations of the association shall name their own committees.

11. AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any regular annual session of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such change has been given at the previous annual meeting and provided it is read in the first session of the annual meeting and voted on before the last session.

By Laws

(Section 2 amended October 11, 1971)

1. In parliamentary procedure the body shall be governed by *ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER* or Kerfoot's *PARLIAMENTARY LAW*.

2. The fiscal year for the association shall be from the first day of October to the last day of September inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period.

3. The annual meeting of the association shall be in the month of October. The exact days and place shall be recommended by the nominating committee, or other committee authorized by the association, and approved by the body. The executive committee may be authorized to make such adjustment in the time and place of the annual meeting as may become necessary because of circumstances which develop after the close of the annual meeting of the whole body.

4. All officers of the association must be members of churches within the association, in good standing, and recognized for their knowledge of a loyalty to Southern Baptist doctrines and programs.

5. Duties of the officers shall be as follows:

THE MODERATOR shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the association and the executive committee, and direct the affairs of the association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. (He may for good reason ask other officers or members of the body to preside at times.)

THE MODERATOR-ELECT may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the sessions of the association council. He shall preside over other meetings in the absence of the moderator and shall assist the moderator in such ways as he may direct. The moderator-elect will have the privilege of attending the assembly of his choice as preparation for the office of moderator.

THE CLERK shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the executive committee, and of all recommendations of the associational council. At each meeting he shall be prepared to read all minutes of the previous meeting. All records for at least one year shall be on hand at each meeting. They shall be kept in a fireproof safe between meetings.

THE TREASURER shall receive all funds of and for the association, not otherwise designated, shall disburse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specific instructions of the association and upon receipt of a bill or voucher properly authorized. He shall keep accurate records of all monies received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the executive committee and annual meeting of the association and have the same approved. The executive committee shall have the treasurer's reports audited at the close of the fiscal year, and reports the same to the annual association, for approval.

THE HISTORIAN shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and individuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal year and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adoption. These records shall be kept in fireproof safe or vault.

6. The following associational organizations shall be maintained and promoted by the association for the benefit of the work in the churches; associational Sunday School organization, associational Training Union, associational Woman's Missionary Union, associational Brotherhood, associational music organization, associational Church Library Council, and such other as may be deemed wise for the attainment of the objectives of the association. All officers of these organizations shall be members of churches affiliated with the association and in good standing.

Unless the association shall direct otherwise, the chief officers of the organizations shall be chosen by their respective organizations, submitted to the nominating committee of the association, and elected or approved by the association. Their duties shall be understood to be in line with the functions set forth in the promotional literature for their respective organizations, as produced or approved by the state or Convention-wide agencies functioning in a like area.

7. The following committees, other than the standing and special committees, shall be maintained by the association as needed for promotion of its work

among the churches: committee on evangelism, missions committee, and such other committees as may be needed. The chairman of these committees shall be elected or appointed by the association, and other committee members shall be chosen in number and manner designated by the association and in accord with the needs of the work. The qualifications required for members of such committees shall be the same as for all other officers, and their duties shall be prescribed by the association.

8. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to the regular meetings of the executive committee and/or to the association. The committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and committees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

9. A place shall be made on the order of business of the association for miscellaneous business at each session of the association.

10. A sermon on doctrines and one on missions shall be provided at each annual meeting. Addresses on assigned topics relating to phases of our Baptist work shall be provided for by the program committee.

11. Messengers to the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise, address the moderator, and be recognized before he begins to speak. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any one subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

12. The by-laws may be amended at any regular session of the association by a majority vote of messengers present, provided such amendment has been read to the body not later than the second session, and is voted on before the last session.

COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSION COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association in Annual meeting, through the Nominating Committee, shall elect a standing committee, known as the Missions Committee. This Committee shall be composed of NINE members. Members of the Missions Committee shall serve for a term of THREE years. Each year THREE members shall complete their terms and shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of at least one year.

Section 2. The Officers of the Association and the elected Associational Organization leaders, shall be ex-officio members of the Committee with all rights of discussion and voting.

Section 3. The Missions Committee shall have the responsibility of selecting and nominating any paid agents of the Association, and to recommend their employment to the Executive Board in regular meetings, or properly called special meetings.

Section 4. The duties of the Missions Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To plan a program of mission work for the Association. This is to be an active and aggressive program of planning. This committee should present a challenging and progressive program of work.

(2) To see that the plans for Associational work are promoted effectively.

(3) To plan a program of benevolences. This should be a well thought out program including all such needs. Plans for promoting the activities should be initiated by this committee.

(4) To plan a comprehensive program with regard to Christian Education. This committee should ascertain the needed projects, set the emphases, and actively promote the work.

(5) To correlate the activities and projects of the Association with the adopted cooperative program. This committee should actively work toward the end of keeping all our Baptist programs under direct supervision in cooperation with the cooperative program plan. These projects should be clearly thought through and planned in connection with the budget committee each year.

(6) To work toward the establishment of new units of mission work in the Association. To facilitate this phase of the work the Chairman of the Missions Committee shall appoint a special committee of THREE from the membership of the Missions Committee. This shall be known as the Missions and Survey Committee. The duties of the committee shall be:

- (a) To survey the entire Association to determine the areas where new churches or missions should be established, and to locate property in such areas suitable for building sites.
- (b) To recommend to the Missions Committee expenditures toward securing such property. The Missions Committee will then study their findings and recommendations and bring to the Executive Board for final action those projects they endorse.
- (c) To solicit the assistance of sponsoring churches in establishing work in areas which have been approved by the Executive Board.
- (d) To assist and advise all groups desiring to establish Baptist Churches and Missions in the territorial limits of North Pulaski Baptist Association to the end that all such works may secure the most desirable and strategic locations to serve the people of this association.
- (e) To survey areas to be served by each proposed new work and recommend to the Missions Committee the nature and extent of any assistance that the Association should provide in each case. The Missions Committee would in turn study their recommendation and submit to the Executive Board a final recommendation in each instance.
- (f) To recommend to the Missions Committee all salary supplements to pastors of missions and needy churches. Requests shall be made in writing on a standard form. Commitments for supplements shall be made in writing on a standard form. Commitments for supplements shall be made for periods not to exceed one year. They may be renewed by recommendation of the Committee in deserving cases. Maximum aid will be limited to three years. After the first year the aid shall be reduced 25% of the original amount for each following year.
- (g) That all recommendations of the missions committee concerning pastoral aid and disposition of property be published one month prior to presentation to the Executive Board on the Associational page of the Arkansas Baptist State Paper.
- (h) Regarding Pioneer Mission Work, it is recommended that any approval of aid of Pioneer Missions also have the approval of the Home Mission Board.

(7) This Committee shall never exercise any authority over the churches. Its sole function shall be that of advising the local congregation, desiring to establish a new work, in the matter of securing the most strategic location and assist them in securing the sponsorship of a mother church, if desirable. Any group desiring association assistance in securing property and for Pastor's salary supplements would be expected to counsel with this committee in locating their work. If a church forms spontaneously or a local church establishes a new mission without counselling with the Missions and Survey Committee, no attempt will be made to tell them they cannot do so. The Association must then decide whether or not to welcome the new church into the fellowship.

(8) The Missions Committee should correlate the activity of the Associational organizations. Plans should be made together so as to avoid conflicts.

(9) The Chairman of the Missions Committee will appoint committees within the committee when such are needed to carry out the duties of the Missions Committee with regard to the above items.

PROCEEDINGS

of the
TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION
NORTH PULASKI BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
OCTOBER 18, 1982

AFTERNOON SESSION

1. The Twenty-first Annual Session of the North Pulaski Baptist Association met with the Cedar Heights Baptist Church, North Little Rock, October 18, 1982. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James Hays, at 2:10 p.m. and he welcomed the messengers to the church.

2. Glen Blevins, Associational Music Director, led the messengers in singing "Blessed Assurance." Accompanist was Bob Thurman.

3. Dr. Harvey Webb, pastor of First Baptist Church, Jacksonville, brought a devotional thought from I Peter 1:3-7 and led in prayer.

4. Ron Ford, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, declared that all those who knew themselves to be duly elected messengers and those who might register later, constitute the body of this Twenty-First Session.

5. Brother Ford read the petitionary letter of Unity Baptist Church for membership in the Association and moved that they be accepted. Motion was seconded and carried.

6. The program as printed was adopted as the order of business.

7. New pastors and staff members introduced were: Holland T. Ball, pastor of Military Road Baptist Church; John Shurmantine, Associate Pastor/Education Director, Marshall Road Baptist Church; Jerry Bradley, Youth Director, Crystal Valley Baptist Church; Craig Snyder, Associate Pastor/Outreach, Maumelle, First Baptist Church; Randy Dill, Minister of Music and Youth, Levy Baptist Church; Paul McClung, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church; Richard Avey, pastor, Zion Hill Baptist Church; Eugene Ryan, pastor, Runyan, First Baptist Church.

8. Dr. H. E. Williams, president Emeritus, Southern Baptist College, and State Chairman of the World Hunger Committee, spoke to us concerning Southern Baptist College stating that enrollment is up 15% over last year.

9. Dr. Williams also spoke to the World Hunger report declaring that every 12 months ten million people die from starvation. He encouraged us to be concerned for the hungry in all parts of the world.

10. The following reports were adopted as printed in the book of reports (these reports will be found in the Report Section of this Annual): Executive Board, Treasurer, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music, Youth, Senior Adults, TACMO, Evangelism, Stewardship and Mills Valley Retreat.

11. Greg Jackson, Associational Sunday School Director presented awards to Maumelle, First Baptist Church for the Largest Numerical Enrollment Gain, the Largest Percentage of Enrollment Gain, and the Largest Percentage of Average Attendance Gain. The Largest Numerical Average Attendance Gain award was presented to Park Hill Baptist Church.

12. Hardy Bell, Chairman of the Committee to Purchase Video Equipment, reported that an RCA 19-inch Color Television set, a Panasonic model 1300

VCR, a Wheelit Folding Video Table and a carrying case for the VCR had been purchased and was now available for check-out to the churches. The following guidelines were presented and approved by the messengers:

1. Each church will be responsible for damage incurred while equipment is in your charge.
2. Adult supervision of equipment is required when checked out by your church.
3. Churches are asked to keep the equipment in a safe place when not in use.
4. Churches will call the Association office to reserve the equipment and the number of weeks it will be used.
5. Inform the Association office when there has been difficulty in operation so the next church will be assured of equipment that functions properly.
6. Read the instructions and know how to operate the equipment. Also, instructions will be reviewed when you check out the equipment at the Associational office.

13. The Missions Committee Chairman, Lee Lawson, gave information of areas for work in the North Central and Northeastern Associations of Indiana and encouraged the churches to consider helping in these areas. He will be in Indiana this week to get further information.

14. The report of the Nominating Committee was approved as printed. This report is in the report section of this Annual.

15. Otto Brown, Chairman of the Time, Place and Preacher Committee presented the following report which was approved:

Place: Central Baptist Church

Preacher: Tim McMinn

Alternate: Ron Ford

16. The Music Men of North Pulaski Association, directed by Glen Blevins and accompanied by Peggy Pearson, sang "I Gave My Life For Thee" and "I'll Tell the World That I'm a Christian."

17. Homer Shirley, from the Baptist Family and Child Care, gave the report of that department. He gave a certificate of recognition to churches who reached their goal in gifts last year. Those receiving awards were: Amboy, Calvary, Central, Cedar Heights, Chapel Hill, Crystal Valley, Forty-Seventh Street, Graves Memorial, Highway, Indianhead Lake, Jacksonville, Second, Military Road, Morrison Chapel, First, North Little Rock, Park Hill, Remount, Runyan, Sherwood, Stanfill, Sylvan Hills, and Lakeside Mission.

18. There was no miscellaneous business during the period set aside.

19. Glen Blevins led the messengers in singing, "My Faith Has Found a Resting Place."

20. Rick Smith, Minister of Music at Sylvan Hills Baptist Church, sang "The New Twenty-Third Psalm."

21. Garland Brackett, pastor of Amboy Baptist Church, brought a message from Joshua 3:1-5 entitled, Sanctify Yourselves-Tomorrow God Will Do Wonders Among Us.

22. We were adjourned to the fellowship meal with prayer by the moderator.

EVENING SESSION

23. The evening session was called to order at 6:30 following a mini-concert by the choir of Cedar Heights Baptist Church.

24. Greg Jackson, Minister of Education at Central Baptist Church, read from the second chapter of Philipians and offered prayer.

25. "Victory in Jesus" was sung by the messengers.

26. The Moderator, James Hays, called attention to the names of those who had gone on to be with the Lord this past year and following a moment of silence offered prayer.

27. Bob Holley, State Church Training Secretary, brought greetings from the 12 departments, three agencies and two institutions in the Baptist Building. He stated that there is a new era of hope and optimism with the new executive secretary's arrival. Following the word of greeting Lex Eaker, pastor of Pike Avenue Baptist Church, led in prayer for the new Executive Secretary, Don Moore, who began work today.

28. Roger Harrod, Vice-President for Development at Ouachita University spoke for that institution.

29. Tom Logue, State Baptist Student Director, brought the BSU report and presented plaques to those churches who were involved in the Third Century Campaign. Remount, Sherwood, First, Jacksonville, First, Jacksonville, Second, North Little Rock, First, Park Hill, Baring Cross, Bayou Meto, Bethany, Calvary, Cedar Heights, Chapel Hill, Graves Memorial and Indian-head Lake.

30. The 1982-83 Budget totaling \$76,992 was presented by K. Alvin Pitt. The proposal included a payment of \$10,200 from the general fund savings to the principle of our indebtedness on Mills Valley Retreat. The budget was approved.

31. Paul McClung, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church and Don Moseley, pastor of Sylvan Hills, First Baptist Church were nominated for Moderator-Elect. Following a vote by show of hands, Don Moseley was declared Moderator-Elect.

32. Six resolutions were presented by that committee chairman, Ron Raines. The resolutions which are printed in the report section of this Annual were approved.

34. In the period for miscellaneous business, Jerry Hogan, pastor of the Baring Cross Baptist Church, made a motion that the Executive Board of North Pulaski Association study thoroughly the article on Salvation and Apostasy by Dale Moody and make a definitive statement before the State Convention. The motion carried and the moderator stated that a meeting would be called for this purpose.

35. A recommendation from the Missions Committee which had been approved by the Executive Board was presented: "That the Moderator be directed to appoint a committee to study the position of Director of Missions for North Pulaski Baptist Association. The study to include:

1. Need - what can we do that is not presently being done?

2. Objective - how can be better fulfill our Biblical responsibility by having a Director of Missions?

A written report detailing the results of the study shall be presented to the missions committee prior to the Executive Board's regular meeting in June, 1983." The recommendation carried with no discussion.

36. Glen Blevins led the congregation in singing "Because He Lives."

37. Otto Brown, moderator-elect, read from Matthew 9:35-38 and led in prayer.

38. The choir of Chapel Hill Baptist Church, under the direction of Ron Taylor, sang "I've Been Changed."

39. Lee Lawson, pastor of Chapel Hill Baptist Church, brought the Annual Sermon from Psalm 126:5-6. A Necessity for Evangelism.

40. Moderator, James Hays, turned the gavel to the new moderator, Otto Brown, pastor of Levy Baptist Church. Brother Brown presented Brother Hays a plaque from the Association expressing appreciation for his term of service as moderator.

41. Brother Brown then made the committee appointments for the year 1982-83, including the study committee authorized by the messengers. (These committees are listed in the Associational Directory section of this Annual.)

42. The twenty-first Annual Session was declared adjourned with prayer by Steve Wilkes, pastor of Maumelle, First Baptist Church.

- * Approved a motion requesting the moderator to appoint a property maintenance committee.

- * Approved a motion that the Association have an 8.5 x '85 Growth Campaign in August, 1983 if as many as 15 churches agree to participate.
- * Approved a recommendation from the Video Committee that the association purchase a video tape machine, with carrying case, a 19-inch television receiver and a portable stand at a cost of approximately \$1,500 - monies to be taken from the general fund savings account.
- * Approved a recommendation from the missions committee that the following be presented to Annual Meeting: "That the moderator be directed to appoint a committee to study the position of Director of Missions for North Pulaski Baptist Association. The study to include:

North Pulaski had a good turnout of boys in both its State R.A. Congress and Camp. We encourage all pastors to see that the boys in their church attend all activities provided by the Association and State. Plans are underway for an Association R.A. Mission Fair and R.A. Mission trip. Watch for this news.

Perhaps the biggest challenge we have as Royal Ambassadors is the mission project of providing a Braille Trail at Burns Park. This is a nature trail primarily for blind people, but it will benefit any who walk the trail. A group of R.A. boys and their leader came from Virginia this last July and helped begin this project. Royal Ambassadors of Arkansas will complete the trail. An information letter will be sent to each church explaining the project.

An effort will be made in the coming year to involve more men in Mission Action. It is time for us to realize that the Lord's work should be our number one priority.

Disaster Relief

On Saturday, May 29, 1982, a tornado hit Marion, Illinois. Dr. Jim Smith, Executive Director of the Brotherhood, called the Arkansas Unit into service to help minister to the victims. 24 hours later the unit was on location and fed approximately 700 persons. While in Marion, the crew served nearly 2,000 meals and helped with a number of radio communications. Volunteers from Second Baptist Church of Marion helped prepare and dispense the food. Much of the food was taken directly to the victims.

This mission was the first for the Mobile Unit and was very successful. The unit was on the job for three full days. In addition to disaster relief the bus has been used in a number of mission projects including Indiana, Virginia and numerous state events in instructional tours concerning disaster relief.

Another highlight of the year relates to the Cooperative Program. During the year (October-August) 37 churches gave \$361,287.61 to the Cooperative Program with 97% of our churches giving to the Cooperative Program during this time period.

1982-83 Program

The 1982-83 Stewardship program will feature:

- The training of "lay presenters" to present testimonies in our churches concerning the Association's ministries and the Cooperative Program.
- A Materials Awareness Conference.
- The enlistment of a minimum of 15 churches to conduct a Cooperative Program study.
- An emphasis to lead churches to increase their contributions to Associational Missions and the Cooperative Program in 1984 budgets.
- A Staff Salary Conference.

MILLS VALLEY BAPTIST RETREAT

Mills Valley Retreat Center continues to be in demand. Associational churches used the facility eight times for day use and 16 times for overnight use. The center was used for week-long day camp three times. Outside groups used the retreat center 15 times. We are proud to have a center which is in such demand.

New gravel has been spread on the road in areas where needed and in the area behind the lodge.

For some time the beautiful trees around the lake have been cut or damaged by beavers. This problem was solved with the assistance of a trapper and the State Game and Fish Commission.

A study of the lake's levee was conducted to determine the extent of damage caused by wave action. Further study will need to be made before corrective measures can be taken.

Several times this year the paddle boats have been in need of repair. Many thanks to Al Carter, our caretaker, for taking his time to see to these needed repairs. He has been faithful in keeping the appearance of the retreat center looking so well and keeping the area secure.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Third Century Campaign

1. Most probably our goal of \$1,000,000 will have been reached by the time of the associational meetings, if our churches and alumni continue their commitment.
2. Over 400 churches have been involved in the campaign.
3. Over 400 individuals are contributing to the campaign and have already given over \$158,000.
4. Earnings are already at work.
 - (1) Nine Student-to-Student Workers will be working on Arkansas campuses this fall in the areas of campus evangelism, Bible study and dormitory visitation.
 - (2) Dianne O'Connell of University of Central Arkansas will serve as STS Worker in Chicago.
 - (3) The BSU work in Utah-Idaho has been helped through the Third Century Fund as well as Iowa and Indiana.

Personnel Changes

1. Steve Masters, a recent graduate of Southwestern Seminary, is our new BSU Director at Arkansas Tech. He served last year as associate at University of Arkansas at Little Rock.
2. Debbie Harless, a recent graduate of Southern Seminary, is our new Associate at Arkansas State University.
3. John Gilbert has moved to the position of Coordinator of Community College work, following the retirement of D.C. McAtee.

BSU Center Construction and Repairs

1. Serious consideration is being given to building a Baptist Student Center at Southwest Tech, a four-year school at Camden.
2. The recreational and dining area of the BSU Center at University of Arkansas at Little Rock has been enlarged. The apartment area of the center was removed in order to take care of the larger crowds.

Local Report

1. Two new workers are in the Little Rock Area. Pam Taylor has been elected Associate at UALR and Jennifer Newton is a Seminary Intern serving at the Baptist Medical Center.

2. Summer Missionaries served from UALR for the summer. One served as a summer Missionary from UAMS plus a Junior Medical Student who did a special mission project in Mexico.
3. The new enlarged recreation and dining area at UALR has been very helpful with the UALR program. The UAMS program has gotten off to a good start with increased interest and participation.
