MINUTES.

SPRINGTOWN ASSOCIATION.

SILOAM SPRINGS, BENTON, CO., ARK.,) Sept. 14, 1883. (

The Association met according to previous appointment, with church at Siloam Springs, and the introductory sermon was delivered by Eld. S. C. Robertson, from 1st Peter 5-10: "But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, establish, strengthen, settle you."

The former moderator being absent, Bro. P. R. Johnson was chosen moderator pro tem. Elders A. J. Estes and J. H. Hogan were appointed reading clerks, and the letters from the churches were called for,

read and the delegates names enrolled.

Bros. R. A. Rhodes and C. W. Walker were appointed tellers, and the Association went into permanent organization, electing J. H. Hogan Moderator, and J. C. Robertson Clerk.

Petitions called for, when letters were presented from the church at Council Grove, and the church at Pleasant Valley, which were received, the messengers names enrolled and the hand of fellowship extended by the moderator.

Correspondence called for and responded to by Bro. J. A. Stone, bear-

ing a letter from the Fayetteville Association.

Visiting ministers invited to seats, and responded to by Elder S. Corneilus, D. D., State Sunday School Missionary, of the American Baptist Publication Society, Elder G. B. Mitchell, of the Green County (Missouri) Association, also Eld. Wm. Cunningham, of Siloam Springs church and Eld. B. Moore, of the Zion Hill Church. committees were then appointed:

On motion it was ordered that a committee on Digest of Letters be

appointed. E. J. Gibbs and Eld. J. M. Harris were appointed on said committee.

The Association adjourned until 9 o'clock Saturday morning; pray-

er by Elder G. B. Mitchell.

SATURDAY MORNING, SEPT., 15th.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Bro. L. H. Palmer and others.

After calling the roll of delegates, the minutes of Friday were read

and approved.

Appointing of correspondence deferred until some future time.

It was ordered that the caption of the Associational letter blank be changed to read: "The Baptist Church at &c."

Reports of committees called for, when the committee on Education

submitted their report, which was read and adopted.

Took recess for preaching, after which, resumed business.

The following correspondence to sister Associations was appointed:
To the Bentonville, to meet with the church at Pleasant Hill, on next
Friday, the 21st inst., P. R. Johnson, J. H. Hogan and J. M. Abercrombie.

To the Cherokee, J. H. Hogan, A. J. Estes and P. R. Johnson.

To the Fayetteville, deferred until the next meeting of the body.

It was determined to elect by ballot three messengers to represent
this body in the Baptist State Convention, to meet at Fayetteville in
November. The following Brethern were elected: Elds. A. J. Estes.
J. H. Hogan and J. C. Robertson.

The committee on Obituaries made their report, which was read and

adopted.

The committee on Home Missions made their report, which was

read and adopted.

The committee on Finance made their report, which was read and adopted

The report of the committee on Sabbath Schools was read and

adopted.

The Association adjourned until Monday at 8.1-2 o'clock, A. M.; prayer by Eld. Bradford Moore.

Sabbath Exercises:—Missionary sermon preached by Eld. A. J. Estes at the Baptist church, followed by a collection for missionary purposes. Also a Sunday School mass meeting in the morning, at which a collection was taken for the Sunday School missionary. Also preaching at the M. E. church, by Dr. S. Cornelius, after which a collection was taken for Sunday School missionary, Total amount of all collections, \$28.00.

MONDAY MORNING, SEPT., 17th.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Eld. B. F. Cooper.

After the call of the roll, the minutes of Saturday were read and adopted.

The report of the committee on Temperance was read and after some discussion was adopted with amendments.

The report of the committee on Publications was read and adopted.

The Executive board made their report, read and adopted.

The following resolution was offered by P. R. Johnson, read and adopted:

Residued., That this body continue the missionary work, by appointing an executive board of three, whose duty it will be to take charge of the missionary work, employ a Missionary, or Missionaries, to preach to the destitute in the bounds of this Association, as the means can be collected.

The Executive board was appointed as follows: P. R. Johnson, W.

M. Murphy and H. Highfill.

Pledges were then taken for the support of the missionary work, which resulted in cash \$5.50, pledged \$34.00, collection on Sunday \$19.50; total in cash and pledge \$60.00, also for Sunday School missionary about \$8.50.

The following, offered by A. J. Estes, was adopted:

Resolved. That we recommend that the various churches composing this Association, take up collections, and ferward the same to the executive board.

The report of the committee on Digest of Letters read and adopted.

The following resolution, offered by P. R. Johnson, was read and adopted.

Resolved, That the title page of the minutes of this Association be changed to read "The Springtown Association of Baptists" instead of "United Baptists."

It was ordered that the indebtedness of the Missionary \$1.95 be for-

given him.

It was determined that the next meeting of this Association be held with the church at Wager Mill, commencing at 11 o'clock on Friday before the third Sunday in September, 1884; A. J. Estes to preach the introductory sermon, J. W. West, alternate.

It was ordered that the Clerk attend to the printing and distribution of 500 copies of these minutes, and that he be paid \$5.00 for his ser-

vices.

The following, offered by J. C. Robertson was adopted:

Resolved, That this body tender its thanks to the church and citizens of Siloam Springs, for their kindness and hospitality during our stay in their midst.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS:—Resolved, That this Association request each church to state in their Associational letter the amount paid their pastor during the year, also how much raised for missionary purposes.

Resolved, That the pastors of the churches be requested to report to the Association, how much each church has paid them, as salary, during the year.

Resolved, That we advise the churches to give the names of each of

their deceased members, in their Associational letter.

Resolved. That we request the churches to send up a contribution for the support of the missionary with their letters to the Association.

The minutes having been read and approved, the Association adjourned to time and place of next meeting. Prayer by Eld. G. B. Mitchell.

EDUCATION:—Your committee on Education would advise a more earnest and active move in that direction, for it is the only means we have for the development of thought and mind, thereby enabling us to discriminate between truth and error. We know of no greater benefit that we can confer on our children than to enable them to understand and grasp the truth, and prepare them for the duties of life. As to the need of ministerial education, it is before us, and so clear and plain that all must acknowledge the necessity. Therefore we recommend an earnest move in this direction. All of which is submitted.

SABBATH SCHOOLS:—We your committee on Sabbath School submit the following: We have great reason to thank God that the Sunday Chool work, in this Association, is on the increase. The churches are ing more interest, and yet there are several churches without a Sunday School. While the children are the hope of the church, and the church is the light of the world, we should inform them as is within our power. Nothing will be more successful in this than the Sunday School. Brethren, let us, as far as practicable, organize a Sunday School in every church, and supply them with suitable literature, and thus prepare them for the conflict before them. We find, out of twenty two churches, only twelve of them report Sunday Schools, and only three of them report Baptist Schools.

Resolved, This Association advise the brethren to organize a Sunday School Association, in the bounds of this Association, to meet quarterly; the first meeting to be on Thursday before the fifth Sunday in this month, at the Flint Creek Church, and Eld. J. C. Robertson to preach a sermon on Sabbath Schools on said day. All of which is respectfully

DIGEST OF LETTERS:—Your committee would respectfully submit, that while the churches show a numerical increase of near two hundred members, only eight churches report money, or amounts, paid for minesterial support, and the amount is to be paid by these eight churches, which is only \$248.50. Only four churches report money

paid for missionary purposes. Not a prayer-meeting reported! But few churches report Sabbath Schools. The seeming remisness ought not so to be; and your committee would earnestly recommend a forward movement all along the line.

RULES OF DECORUM.

The association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
The moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

3. The moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time. 4. Any member not satisfied with decision on any point of order may appeal to the associa-

tion on the same day, but no other time.

But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtaining leave pro-5

ceed 6. The moderator when addressed for leave of speech shall signify the same by naming

him or otherwise.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject in hand. or use words of personal reflection; and every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the association, except withdrawn by the member who made it.

8. Every case taken up by the association shall be decided on or withdrawn before another

is offered.

9. When anything is taken up by the association, after allowing a reasonable time for de-bate, the moderator shall take the question and those in favor of the proposition shall rise to their feet, and those against it shall keep their seats.

10. The moderator shall pronounce the dicision before the standers take their seats.

11. No person shall depart from the service of the association without leave. 12. The appellation of brother snall be used in addressing one another.

The names of members shall be called as often as the association may direct.

 The names of members shall be called as often as the association and the last at tendency to interrupt in
 No member shall be countenabled in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in time of public speech.

The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any provided he appoint some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not be allowed to vote unless the association be equally divided.

16. Any member breaking this decorum shall be reproved at the discretion of the association

but only on the day the breach is made.
