- Article I. The Association shall be composed of messengers or degates, chosen by the churches in our union who, on presenting letters tifying to their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.
- Art. II. The messengers thus chosen, when convened, shall be have as the "Crooked Creek Association" who shall be not merely an advancement, but also for the advancement of the cause and kingdom blook Lord Jesus Christ.
- Art. III. Each church in the Association shall be entitled to four legates and any church failing to represent herself shall render the remains the next Association; failing to do so she shall be dropped from the relation the Association.
