

# Reports of Committees

We your committee on Associational Missions and nominations submit the following recommendations.

We consider the Associational Mission work one of the chief interests of our churches. We find that the Lord has abundantly blessed the work of our Missionary the past year and that the needs are as great if not greater. Therefore we recommend that this association take up this feature of our work for the salvation of the lost and upbuilding of our Lord's Kingdom with renewed interest.

We find that the churches are not supporting the work as they should and we recommend that each church of our association contribute Quarterly to this work.

We recommend the following brethen as composing the Executive Board: Bro. F. A. Grane of Oakland; Bro. A. M. Reed of Friendship; Bro. J. R. Harris of Fayetteville; Bro. S. R. Wilson of Prairie Grove; Bro. E. B. Cummings of Springdale, Ark. Also each church is authorized to elect one member of said executive board.

### State Missions.

Your committee on State Missions would report as follows: As the days go by the great importance of State Missions grows on the student of missions.

If the Baptist denomination would become weak and lame and lose its power at home and abroad, let us cease to emphasize State Missions. State Missions by the churches operating through the State Convention and the State Association includes revival meetings in destitute places and in weak churches, baptizing, reviving and enlisting laggard churches, colportage, projecting and helping to build church houses, and aiding weak churches in supporting Pastors, raising church debts, and whatever else will send far and wide the pure gospel of Christ and upbuild the Baptist cause in this great State. Both of these agencies are in need of money to meet their needs of the work.

So your committee would make the following recommendations.

First. That agonzing prayer be made daily by all our people for God to lead us out of debt.

Second. That every pastor get all possible information about State Missions and give out in burning messages to his people.

Third. That he try to give his people a larger vision of State Missions, and faithfully endeavor to secure an offering from everyone of his members, and from every organization in the churches.

It is the time for a great strong self sacrificing heroic pull all over the State.

### Home Missions

By Home Missions we have reference to the great work of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention located at Atlanta, Ga. The primal task of this board is the assisting of state boards, to care for problems of destitution that they would be otherwise unable to care for. It is doing a phenominally great and important work.

In our strategic centers like St. Louis, Memphis and New Orleans, is helping to save the day to Baptists. In this State with its appalling destitution it is putting some fifteen thousand dollars a year.

It is also doing an important work among the Indians in Oklahoma, Texas and Florida.

It is doing a work of incalculable value among the negroes. Its work among the foreigners is of the utmost moment

Perhaps its greatest work is its great evangelistic force that is bringing literally, thousands into the churches and ushering in for many a church a new day of strength and power.

Its enlistment work by which it is seeking to enlist and

develop all of the unenlisted churches of our Southland, while comparatively new, has already demonstrated that it is latent with great possibilities.

We urge the taking of the Home Field that our people may inform themselves of the great work of this mighty force for the bringing in of the Kingdom.

Last year more than 33,000 baptisms were reported.

The General Association is also doing home mission work and has seven missionaries.

### Report on Foreign Missions.

By Foreign Missions we mean our efforts to give the gospel to the benighted in the heathen and papal lands beyond.

This is the work that had the first place in the heart of our Lord as evidenced by His great commission, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations."

To fail to obey this impearative command of our Lord is to be heterodax at the most vital point. There is no denying that this association in this first and greatest work of the Kingdom makes a lamentable showing.

Your committee would urge that pastors and messengers from the churches see to it that in the coming year this work of Foreign Missions is presented, stressed and a good offering secured. The every member canvass, where whole heartedly worked, has in every way more than justified itself.

Our Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond, Va., is composed of eighteen local and eighteen State members. We have missions in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argentine, China, Japan and Africa. In these fields the missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out-stations, 33,584 members, 442 Sunday Schools with 23,959 scholars.

In our Mission schools we have 8,833 students, of these 394 are in Theological Seminaries and Training Schools preparing to preach the gospel to their own people.

We have 300 missionaries and 651 native workers. Last year we sent out 20 new missionaries. These were 5,190 baptisms.

The terrible scourge of war that is devastating in a way that beggars description, the old world, makes the missionary call to us more urgent than ever.

We urge that every home take the Foreign Mission Journal and keep in sympathetic and prayful touch with this work.

Last year in order to pay the missionaries and keep our work going our board was compelled to pay out more than \$15,000 in interest and yet not withstanding this and other large items of expense in conducting the work voted by the Southern Baptist Convention, yet let it be noted that 88 cents of every dollar actually reached the workers on the foreign field.

The General association of our state is also doing some foreign work, the extent of which your committee is unfamiliar with.

We, as Baptists have always been in hearty sympathy with, and ardent supporters of the principles of democracy as set forth by the founders of this government. These principles stand for free government, religious liberty and an enlightened citizenship Anything which directly or indirectly opposes these principles is un-American and undemocratic and therefore unsafe as a factor in American life.

There has become evident during recent years a tendency on the part of the Roman Catholic element in this nation to bring this nation in subjection to the principles of that heirarchy. A subsidized press, continued activity in politics, opposition to our system of public schools, efforts to keep the Bible out of the schools are some of the means used to accomplish the aim. We commend the agitation whose aim is to counteract this influence. Let it be stated that we do not believe the semi-political aspect of the Roman Catholic church to be in accord with the Bible teaching in regard to Religious institution.

We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion in water of a believer; into the home of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost, to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified. buried and risen Saviour, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is pre-requisite to the privileges of a church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church by the Sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self examination.

#### Ghurch Govenant.

We also engage to maintain family secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplory in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to obstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our effort to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in our prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress, to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it with delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this convenant and the principles of God's word.
